They want to supplant our Government and economic system with a collectivist society.

There are two kinds of Communism just now, Stalinism and Titoism.

And there are several kinds of Socialism.

All are equally dangerous.

There are the mild Socialists of the Norman Thomas school, who belong to the Socialist Party and call their philosophy "Democratic Socialism."

There are the militant Socialists who belong to the Socialist Workers Party which advocates the revolutionary overthrow of our system of society and government.

There are the intellectual Socialists in the League for Industrial Democracy who propose to put over Socialism in the United States by infiltrating our Government and instituting a so-called "planned economy."

There are the camouflaged Socialists of Americans for Democratic Action who, with the help of Left Wing labor elements and New Deal politicians, are determined to capture political control along the same lines as achieved by their British counterpart, the Fabian Society, which Socialized England.
