MERRY GO-ROUND

And here is a note on second generation enterprise in Tokyo. A group of young American-born Japanese have opened a sandwich shop in Nippon—and are selling hot dogs, hamburgers, and other sandwiches. With mustard. The shop, we hear, is near the entrance to the Datsun motor plant in Tokyo.

One of the largest hits of recent months on Tokyo screens is Paramount's "The Lives of a Bengal Lancer." Critics in Nippon have lauded the fighting spirit of the English Lancers to that of the Bushido of Japan. The film is especially suited to the Japanese mind and temperament.

Meanwhile, Tokyo offers Sachiko Chiba, one of Los Angeles, in the starring role of a P.C.L. title "Jo-to Shinji" (Across and Feet). Miss Chiba, also appeared recently with Henry Oka, who was once a Hollywood extra, in "Tokyo, City of Romance." Harry Miura, one-time United Artists cameraman, and Helen Sumida, who has danced on two continents, were employed at P.C.L.

Dr. James A. B. Scherer, who was the first English editor of The Japanese American News, inaugurating the section in 1925, and who was formerly president of the California Institute of Technology, has incorporated the strange story of Will Adams (Miura Anjin) who was shipwrecked in Nippon in the seventeenth century into a historical novel "The Pilot and Shogun." It is at present appearing daily in the Japan Times, one of Tokyo's two English dailies. Dr. Scherer is the author of many books on Nippon among them "Japan's Advance," "Manchukuo, A Bird's Eye View," and "The Romance of Japan."

"Slayer of Nisei Girl Sentenced to Noose Death" reads a head-line. But the newspaper is not one published by the Japanese. It is rather, the "The Nippon Times," a newspaper of San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara counties. The three stars, however, carries international in scope and carries quite a bit of Japanese news. With the Japanese as employers and the Filipinos as farm laborers, both are vitally interested in the proposed anti-alien land laws in the California State legislature. So the Three Stars devotes much of its four pages to the accounts of the Japanese fight against these proposed land laws. The paper, by the way, is a semi-monthly.

Alameda Youth In Record Jump

Kido Stars as Niseis Sweep Leap Event At San Jose
SAN JOSE, Apr. 27—(CNF)—Clearing 22 feet 8 1/2 inches, George Kido of Alameda high took first place in the broad jump in a dual meet against the San Jose State college frosh here last Wednesday. Kido also ran a lap on the winning relay team besides placing second in the 220-yard dash. The Alameda quartet established a new record in the half-mile relay at 1:31. Roy Teshima, his teammate, was second in the broad jump with a leap of 22 feet 4 inches, his best mark of the season. Nun Iwahashi and Sam Yagyu, also of Alameda, cleared over 20 feet. Nun Iwahashi vaulted 11 feet to take first in the pole vault. For the San Jose frosh, Ky Miyamoto topped first in the high jump with a mark of 5 feet 11 inches, and Paul Matsumura took second in the high hurdles and third in the low hurdles. Miyamoto also took third in the broad jump by leaping 21 feet 8 inches. Alameda won the meet, 57 to 47.

Following on the heels of the Kaneko brothers, whose sensational basket-shooting enabled the San Franciscans to wallop the UCLA Japanese Bruin five the previous night, little Mits Saito, JAU's all-time guard, went on a wild scoring spree, sagging the twice for a total of 18 points including eight field goals and two free throws. Pacific Service On Mails Backed

Ask U. S. to Support Transpacific Air Mail Route

WASHINGTON, April 27—(CNF)—Rep. Florence Kahn (Republican of San Francisco and Rep. Kramer (Democrat) of Los Angeles, who met yesterday at odds over the Dickstein bill affecting nisei citizens, joined hands today for a common cause to procure government support for the Pan-American Airways transpacific route.

The two Congressmen, leading the fight for the support, declared they found ample votes to pass a \$2,000,000 contract for Pan-American to carry the mails from San Francisco to Honolulu, Manila, and Canton.

It is recalled that Mrs. Kahn, well known among Japanese American citizen league leaders in San Francisco, last year successfully fought the Kramer amendment which would have discriminated offspring of citizens of Oriental ancestry, in the Dickstein bill which was subsequently passed without the discriminatory provision.

Garden Club Women's Group Sails On Nippon Trip

The victim of a brutal murder which occurred on the evening of April 19 at her home in the South residential district will be laid to rest at the Calvary cemetery on Whittier boulevard.

Funeral arrangements were made by the Japanese Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Sei-nan Kyokai, the Southern California Japanese Nurserymen's association and the Nara Kenjin-kai, where the foster father, Juzo Nishida, a prominent nursery operator is actively identified.

KABUKI FAMILY ADOPTS NISEI

Los Angeles Nisei Girl First to Act on Kabuki Stage; To be Given Bando Name

TOKYO, Apr. 27—An American-born Japanese girl, formerly of Los Angeles, is to be adopted into a famous Kabuki family and is to bear that family name.

She is Miss Lily Nakashima, who though only 17 (she was born the year the Armistice was signed) has attained such remarkable grace and skill in Japanese dancing that she is to bear the Bando name.

She is also the only American-born girl to act on the Kabuki stage. She shatters many records that epoch-making day for in addition to the fact that she was an American was also the fact that she was only 16. But most important to her was the realization that she was acting with Minonaka Bando. The play had been written by the late Prof. Shoyo Tsubouchi and was a popular success, as indeed it was.

When she is adopted and given the Bando name, this delightfully unsophisticated, pretty and eager young girl will be the youngest of the Bando family. At the head of the dynasty is Mitsugoro Bando, distinguished Kabuki actor whose name is synonymous with the new school of thought at the Kabuki. He is the eighth of his famed line.

Next to him is his son, Minonaka Bando, who, some critics claim, is one of the great actors in Japan today. He and his father are appearing this month at the Kabuki and it was he who arranged for Miss Nakashima to appear on the Kabuki stage.

Connecting Link
The connecting link between Miss Nakashima and Minonaka and his father is Miss Mitsuomi Bando who is the Los Angeles girl's teacher. The two met when Miss Mitsuomi toured America in 1932. Between the young girl and the accomplished actress, there is a bond of friendship. (Continued on next page)

T. Asaeda Returns From Expedition to South Sea Islands

Telephoto Develop System to Submit Photos

TOKYO, April 27—(Dentsu)—Perfection of an amazingly clear and inexpensive telephoto apparatus, under the so-called NE system, was announced here today by Dr. Nitta following a series of tests acclaimed by experts as "remarkable." Production of these telephoto sets on a large commercial scale will be begun at once, and arrangements are already being made for their exportation to the United States.

Due to the high cost of telephoto transmission in America, most of the smaller newspapers there have not been able to afford the services already offered by the Associated Press. The new Japanese invention, said to be the best perfect of its kind in existence, is expected to bring the telephoto service within the reach of even the smallest of dailies.

Navy Maneuver Not Directed at Nippon, Report

TRIANGLE

Operations Will be Wholly in East Says Admiral

WASHINGTON, April 27—Pacific maneuvers scheduled to begin May 3 in the "San Francisco-Hawaii-Alaska" triangle are not in fact, and cannot be, directed against Japan, according to Admiral William H. Standley, chief of naval operations, in an interview with the Scripps-Howard newspapers.

"At no time, he said will any of our ships come within 2000 miles of the Japanese mainland. Every phase of the operations will be confined to the eastern half of the world's most spacious ocean and well within a triangle every point of which is American territory.

"There is apparently considerable misunderstanding concerning the coming fleet problem to be played in the Pacific," he said.

Not Near Japan
"All naval powers habitually hold fleet exercises in the vicinity of, and sometimes within sight of, the coasts of neighboring states. We have held problems in the immediate vicinity of British, Mexican and Central American territory. In the present problem some of our units will of necessity approach the immediate vicinity of Canadian territory.

"For reasons of economy and because of the limited time available, the operations have been restricted to the area east of the 160th meridian. It will not be held in the Far East or in the Western Pacific or off the coast of Japan or at Japan's front door, as has been variously but inaccurately stated.

"In fact, the area of operations will be wholly in the Eastern Pacific, and none of our ships will approach within 2000 miles of the Japanese mainland. Under such conditions it is hard to believe that these maneuvers can be considered provocative."

Upward of 200 fighting ships and auxiliaries, more than 450 airplanes and a personnel of 50,000 will participate. Maneuvers will last until well into June.
