Nisei In Sac'to Is Suicide

GIRL DEAD OF POISON

Imagined Illness Is Report in Sac'to Hospital

SACRAMENTO, May 29—A second generation girl, 21-year-old Doris Kikayo Takahara, daughter of a Takahara district rancher, was dead today because of her imagination.

Hospital attaches in Sacramento who examined the girl who was brought here from her home said that she had believed she was a victim of tuberculosis. The thought as preyed on her mind that she committed suicide by drinking poison, the coroner's office stated.

S. F. Japanese Give Sakuras; Ceremony Set

Consul General Kazuo Shimomura will officially present the cherry trees to Mayor Ross. Mr. McLaren, superintendent of the Golden Gate park, Mrs. Brown, representative of Japanese civic organizations and other Americans and Japanses will be present at the occasion.

Japanese girls in kimono will be present to add color to the ceremony.

The planting of the trees will immediately take place after the ceremony.

Kadono to Talk On Trade Over Radio Network

Broadcast Carried on NBC Blue Next Wednesday

Chokuro Kadono, head of the Nippon Economic mission now visiting the United States, will speak on trade and international good will in a Japanese American radio broadcast Wednesday, June 2, from New York.

The broadcast will be heard over the NBC blue network from coast to coast, and will be retransmitted in Nippon for a nation-wide distribution there.

The program will not be heard in Northern California, but the station KGOA in Los Angeles will pick it up, as well as the stations KOA in Spokane and KJR in Seattle. It will be heard 7:30 to 7:45 p.m. Pacific Standard Time.

In addition to Kadono, two other speakers will be on the program. They include Cameron Forbes, former ambassador to Japan, and Eugene P. Thomas, head of the American reception committee for the Japanese mission.

MANILA, May 29—"I do not believe that Japan 'covets' the Philippines," General Douglas MacArthur was quoted as saying today as he returned to Manila on the President's Callage to continue his duties as military adviser to the Philippines commonwealth.

Gen. MacArthur told newspapermen that he believed that the Philippines could defend themselves after they gain full independence from the United States.

Japanese Send Gold Shipment To Stabilize Rate of Yen Exchange

TOKYO, May 29—(Domei)—Seventeen million yen worth of gold left Kobe this afternoon for the United States on the Nipponkai Maru, the shipment being the second installment in the third series of gold shipments abroad to replenish Japan's foreign reserve.

Today's shipment brings the second series of shipments to a total of 50,000,000 yen, which is the identical amount of both the first and second series.

Discuss Policies of Budget

OPPOSITION ON CABINET

Dissolution of Diet Looms Again in Nippon Crisis

TOKYO, May 29—(Domei)—In spite of the unforeseen obstacles and crises which may develop over military expenditures in the next twelve-month, the government will convene a ministerial conference May 31 to lay down fundamental policies regarding compilation of the national budget for the next fiscal year.

It is understood the chief discussion Monday will center around appropriations for national defense and for the policy of national renovation.

With the triumphant political parties charging outright that the government had "betrayed" parliament in the last budget controversy, the ministry of Premier Sanyo Hayashi is expected to meet an enraged opposition if it survived until the next budget discussions in the Diet.

It is recalled that the Diet passed the current budget, with its unprecedented military appropriations, only on the tacit understanding that the Hayashi government would refrain from resorting to any "unparliamentary" acts. Then, hardly had the Diet passed the budget, when the Premier dissolved the Lower House and called a general election.

The current wisecrack among the political circles is that the Hayashi government "ate the dumplings" and ran away without paying for them.

The new Diet, triumphant after general election and pledged to oppose the Hayashi government, may cause much trouble for the regime of the Premier with the handle-bar mustache. The Minseitō and Seiyukai are forming a "popular front" against the government, and they have more than enough votes to sabotage any government measure.

The Diet's chief prerogative is its control of the nation's pursestrings, and no government can survive in the face of a Lower House refusal to pass the budget. The only resources are either ministerial resignation or dissolution of the Diet.

Premier Hayashi may, with the Army, reinvigorate the Diet after revamping the election laws to assure better chances of his own victory.

Micheletti took an Asahi News plane at 3:34 p.m. from Kimigawa airport.

Doret, on the other hand, took off on the Asahi plane Divine Wind from the Joto parade ground at 3:40 p.m.

Midway to Tokyo from Osaka had weather overtook them, causing the usual good sailing between Osaka and Tokyo to be fraught with danger. The plane on which Micheletti rode was forced down at Hiratsuka near Yokohama almost within sight of Tokyo. He took a train from Hiratsuka to continue his journey here.

The Divine Wind was forced down at the Hamamatsu airport, and Doret took a train from there at 6:50 p.m.

All members of the crew of the two planes, as well as both Doret and Micheletti, are safe.

Control of Costs Sought

TO STABILIZE JAPAN PRICES

Government to Start Drive to Prevent Suffering

TOKYO, May 19—Declining the sudden increase in the national budget expenditures to be the main cause of the rise in commodity prices, the government today began its earnest to control prices and prevent suffering among the middle and lower classes of consumers.

As higher prices may make the governmental budget imperative, restrictive measures are necessary not to protect consumers but also to maintain national defense at its maximum efficiency, the price control commission decided.

The commission met at the official residence of Premier Oka, Genji Hayaishi to map out definite control policies.

The commission's first task was to establish sub-committees, which was immediately undertaken with view to:

1. Consider means of upward tendency in commodity prices and discuss taxation problems.
2. Draw up plans to economize iron, steel, coal, and other basic products.
3. Watch daily prices of necessities.
4. Consider freight imports.
5. Watch the influence of rising commodity prices on the living conditions of the white collar workers and the lower official classes.
6. Watch the foreign trade movements, exchange rates, and the gold market.

Twenty Dead in Gunpowder Factory Blast in Kumamoto

KUMAMOTO, May 19—More than twenty persons were believed killed or seriously injured today in a gunpowder factory explosion at Kumamoto yesterday.

The explosion followed a fire which broke out in the plant of the Nihon Nitrate and Fertilizer company plant.

While investigators launched an inquiry to determine the cause of the blast which shook the entire town of Kumamoto, on the outskirts of Kumamoto, the report was made that an acetylene gas tank had been ignited, causing the terrific explosion and the fire.

The inhabitants of the neighboring district rushed from their homes when the force of the shock rattled doors and windows. It was believed by the residents that an earthquake had shaken the town until today of factory fire spread.

The ringleader, a Frenchman by the name of Neurey Chaura, was fined 181,242.30 yen. His chief Japanese accomplice, Eizo Kadotani was fined 697,222 yen and given a one-year sentence in prison. Others in the ring were given lighter fines.

Anti-Japanese Rulings Charged In North China

TOKYO, May 19—(Domei)—Japanese Foreign office critics expressed great concern today over reports that the Hsiao-Chang political council of North China had imprisoned on May 17, a Chinese landowner for having leased 250 acres of farm land to a Japanese subject.

Such an act, it was indicated here, permits a concerted attempt by the Chinese authorities to check economic advances by Japan in North China.

The Hsiao-Chang council recently promulgated a new land law which prescribes death penalty against those who leased farmland to foreigners. The Chinese is awaiting definite comment pending the arrival of official report concerning the action.

22 Drivers to Start in 300-Mile Memorial Day Classic Sunday Afternoon

Providing he qualifies in Saturday's trials, George Rokutani, crack Alameda nisei pilot, will be one of the 22 starters in the grueling 300-mile Memorial Day stock car championships at the Oakland Speedway on Sunday.

Over 40 entries had been received, but it was believed this number would be cut down to 22 Saturday when the qualifying tests were to have been held at the Oakland track.

Racing against some of the best stock car drivers in the country, Rokutani, who operates the Ishi City garage in Alameda,

was confident he will be among the leaders in the Memorial Day classic.

In practice spins at Oakland's one-mile track last week, he is said to have made fast time, averaging in the neighborhood of 100 miles an hour.

TRAVEL BOOK ON JAPAN

With world interest in Japan mounting and the 1940 Olympic not very far off, there should be a great demand for a travel book on Japan. The Island Empire is so fraught with things of unproved interest that we hope some able writer will author such a book before 1940.

For instance, we could think of a hundred different subjects which would prove of absorbing interest, if properly described, to the Western reader. Japan has many unique institutions, curiosities, and odd phenomena. A traveler in Japan will meet with a thousand things which are distinctly Japanese.

Take the island of Tanegashima, for instance. This island off Kyushu is a tiny mile of land, yet it was in this island that the first Japanese firearms were manufactured. For this reason the early Japanese firearms, the Japanese counterpart of the old Western match-lock arquebus, were called Tanegashima. This island too is the home of the famous onagardori, a species of barnyard fowl with extraordinary tails that trail a dozen feet behind. And that freak of nature, the half-horse and half-cattle animal, comes from Tanegashima. It is called the Tanegashima horse.

Then there is the Tosa dog, a canine indigenous to the island of Shikoku and said to have been in existence since the age of the gods. The Tosa dog is somewhat larger than the Akita dog, a product of Northern Japan. The famous Hachiko, the dog which became a household tradition for her loyalty some years ago, is of the Akita species. As every Japanese knows, Hachiko was a pet dog which followed its master to the station every day for many years, and finally died of grief when the master passed away. The story goes that even after the master's death, Hachiko would walk back and forth from the home to the station in vain wait for the return of the man she served.

A ramble through Northern Kyushu would reveal many historic sites of interest to Catholic readers. There is, for instance, a remote and obscure village in one of the islands off Nagasaki where descendants of Catholics since the age of Toyotomi Hideyoshi, more than 300 years ago, still follow a hoary ritual in chapel remembrance of those of Medieval Europe.

And the roaring dragon of Nikko continues to interest the thousands who gather from all parts of the globe to view this architectural marvel.

A talented mind writer could, with a little research, collect together these and a host of other interesting facts of picturesque Japan into a travel book, and we believe such a book would be in great demand.

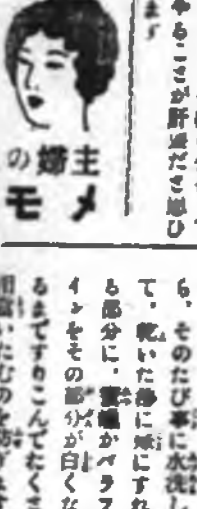

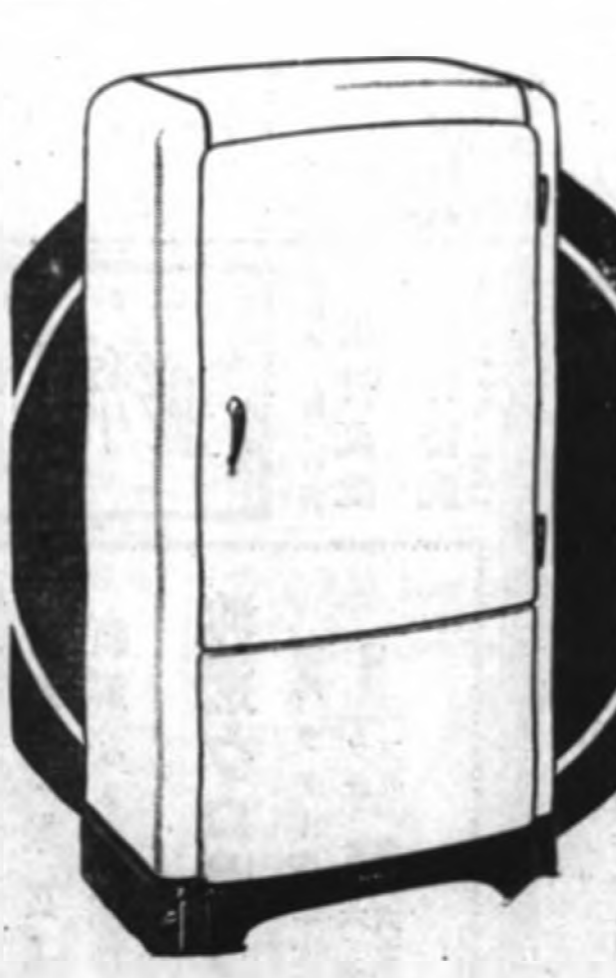
