TOKYO, Oct. 24 (Domei)—The Emperor will personally supervise maneuvers to be staged by the Imperial guard division at the base of Mount Fuji on Nov. 8, it was announced.

Ripley to Visit Japan China to Get Material

Noted Cartoonist Will Leave Aboard Nipponese Vessel

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (Domei)—Robert L. Ripley, noted creator of "Believe It or Not" cartoons, which are now syndicated to papers throughout the world, including the Japan Times in Tokyo, will make another trip to the Orient to gather additional material for his popular feature, according to a press message from New York.

The U. S. message reported that Ripley, who has already traveled in 181 countries in the world, is scheduled to sail from San Francisco on Nov. 4 aboard the Asama Maru for a tour of Japan and China.

Chinese Junk Caught on Rocks Crew Uninjured

Had Been Missing Since Departure for Seattle Harbor

SEATTLE, Oct. 24 (UP)—A wire received here tonight from Capt. John Anderson of the Chinese junk Tai Ping, which recently completed a 106-day voyage across the Pacific, said the tiny vessel was on the rocks at the southeastern tip of Princess Royal Island.

The Tai Ping left Quatsino on northern Vancouver Island last week for Seattle.

Princess Royal Island is about 100 miles north of Vancouver Island, where the junk found refuge after its arduous trans-Pacific voyage.

Capt. Anderson's wire said the crew was safe but the vessel was slightly damaged. The craft will repair at Ocean Falls, south of Princess Royal Island on the mainland.

The Red-bearded skipper was accompanied by his wife and three crew members out of the original four who accompanied him from Shanghai April 7.

The brief message did not indicate how the Tai Ping happened to sail so far north of Vancouver Island when its destination was Seattle. It was believed, however, the junk was blown off its course by heavy coastal storms.

5-Year Old Peasant Boy Officially Proclaimed Dalai Lama of Tibet

CALCUTTA, India, Oct. 24 (UP)—A five-year-old peasant boy has been officially proclaimed as the 14th Dalai Lama of Tibet, having been recognized as the reincarnation of the 13th Dalai Lama, who died in December, 1933.

In the interval the Tibetan monks and soothsayers have been searching for a child into whose body the spirit of the dead Lama passed by reason of his being born at the exact moment of the Lama's death.

INAUGURATION IN NOVEMBER Government Will Be Headed by Former Premier, Report

TOKYO, Tuesday, Oct. 24 (UP)—Agreement rapidly is being reached on final plans for the new Japan-sponsored "central government of China" to be headed by former Chinese Premier Wang Ching-wei, it was understood here today.

The new regime probably will be launched during next month in formal ceremonies in Nanking, former Chinese nationalist capital, which was captured early in the Chinese Japanese conflict by Japan.

Gen. Shunroku Hata, War minister, tentatively had been selected to head a Japanese mission which will attend the ceremonies.

The post of special envoy reportedly was offered to Prince Fumimaro Konoye, former premier, who declined because of his indifferent health and his increasingly heavy duties as President of the privy council.

Gen. Hata, who formerly commanded Japanese armies in central China, had a long conference with Premier Nobuyuki Abe yesterday and informed him of the latest conversations in Shanghai between Lieut. Gen. Sei-Shiro Itagaki, chief-of-staff of the new central command for the Japanese army in China, and Wang Ching-wei and his associates.

It was agreed, reliable informants said, that despite the danger of complications with the United States and Russia, Japan must go ahead with her China program. Any delay, the Premier was said to feel, might entail a weakening of Wang's movement.

The government was said to expect condemnation in Washington and Moscow but to feel confident that Britain and France will place no obstacles in the way of the Japanese program.

The reaction of the United States was considered of far more importance than that of Russia since Washington is in position to put more effective pressure on Japan. The government was said to be ready, however, to withstand any measures the United States may wish to apply.

In this connection foreign minister Kichisaburo Nomura, in his conversations expected to start this week with U. S. Ambassador Joseph C. Grew, probably will limit his efforts to an attempt to arrange a temporary working agreement to regulate Japanese-American relations after the present basic treaty between Manchukuo and China were set at rather than to obtain a permanent new treaty.

The foreign minister was said to feel that the American reaction to the launching of a new pro-Japanese central regime in China will be such that a satisfactory treaty cannot be negotiated until Japan has demonstrated by deeds that American rights in China are not to be infringed upon.

Incident Over Japanese Flag at Honolulu

HONOLULU, T. H., Oct. 24 (UP)—A Board of Water Supply collector, attempting to board the Japanese Navy training cruiser Iwate to collect a bill was refused admittance because he declined to bow to the Japanese flag at the insistence of a sentry. It was learned here today.

The sentry also declined to permit the collector aboard because he wore no coat, although he finally was permitted on the deck, it was said. Officials declined comment although it was indicated it was a "possible misunderstanding."

Select Dates for CYBL Confab in San Jose

SAN JOSE, Oct. 24—The dates, March 29, 30 and 31 have been selected as the dates for the fourth annual California Young Buddhist league convention to be held in San Jose next year. Plans are being made to obtain the civic auditorium as the scene for the major part of the three day program.

The San Fernandans were even more out-distanced by Hawthorne, which won, 29-10, with Uda at center accounting for 10 points. The Rams used seven substitutes, a record thus far.

BRITISH ESTABLISH NEW PROPAGANDA BUREAU IN TOKYO; SEEK GOOD-WILL

Rumors Denied by 3 Million Pound Redman in Japan

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (Domei)—The primary work of the newly-created Far Eastern bureau of the Ministry of Information will be to facilitate the distribution of photographs and news forms, M. Vere Redman, recently appointed assistant director of the bureau, explained here today. Redman will work under R. H. Scott, director of the bureau which will have its main office in Hongkong.

It will be the duty of Redman and Scott to visit all countries, including the Far Eastern bureau and will make connections with the British community in each of the countries visited.

According to Redman, his section will include Japan, China, Thailand (Siam), French Indo-China, Dutch East Indies and the Malay states.

"At present I am studying the possibilities of establishing a pictorial magazine such as was published by the British government at the time of the World War. The fact that relations between Japan and Britain has improved considerably since the signing of the non-aggression pact between Soviet Russia and Germany is also encouraging Redman said.

He said however, that the report or rumor which had been circulated in Japan to the effect that 3,000,000 pounds had been deposited in this country to carry on the new work is entirely without foundation, Redman declared.

"When I left England after being appointed to my present position, I did so with a feeling that England would not consider any Germany proposals for peace after Hitler and Chamberlain's speeches. I am more convinced that this will be a long war," Redman concluded.

Transportation Lines Agree on Through Travel

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (Domei)—A new agreement affecting through traffic between Japan, Manchukuo and China was concluded here recently by the Railway Ministry of Japan, the Railway Bureau of the Government-General of Korea, the Railway Bureau of Formosa, the South Manchuria Railway company, North and Central China railway companies, the NYK, the OSK, the North Japan steamship company, the Toa Maritime Transportation company, the Japan Airways Ltd, Mancuria Airways Ltd and the Central China Airways Ltd.

Discounts of 20 percent on round-trip travel between points in Japan, Manchukuo and China were set at the meeting for railways. There will be a 10 percent reduction for round-trip travel between designated points on waterways.

British Steamer Beached on Island After Striking Rock

HONGKONG, Oct. 24—The British steamer Fatshan, 2639 tons and carrying 1500 passengers, including 40 Europeans, was beached on an island after striking a submerged object near the Canton River mouth. The engine room was flooded but there were no casualties. The vessel, operated by the China Navigation Company, was en route from Hongkong to Canton.

Hawaiian Nisei Sentenced to Long Term for Forgery

HONOLULU, Oct. 24—A sentence of ten years at hard labor at the territorial penitentiary faced James Noboru Kiyonaga, 25, who was convicted of forging and passing a \$200 check last September 30.

Kiyonaga was indicted by the grand jury and later pleaded guilty. Kiyonaga was under probation from an embezzlement charge when he was arrested for forgery.

Japan Editor to Pay Visit to U. S. Soon

SEATTLE, Oct. 24—Sanehiko Yamamoto, editor of the Kaizo, one of Japan's most widely read magazines dealing with current Japan and international problems, will be a visitor in Seattle possibly in December, it was learned today.

Yamamoto plans to visit Hawaii, the United States and then Europe in order to gain first hand insight into problems of the various nations.

The noted editor will leave Yokohama on the Tatsuta Maru on November 2. He will disembark at Honolulu, staying in Hawaii a week. Then he will proceed to Los Angeles, San Francisco and then Seattle.

From Seattle Yamamoto expects to leave for New York, then sail for Europe.

Coast Problems Mooted During Consuls' Meet

Japanese American trade problems and U. S. public opinion on Japan occupied the interest of the meeting of Pacific Coast Japanese consular officials at the Consulate-General Tuesday.

Led by Consul-General Toshio Satow, those participating in the conference were Consuls Kwan Yoshida of Los Angeles, Yoshimi Sato of Seattle, Kenji Nakauchi of Vancouver and Ichiro Kawasaki of San Francisco.

The recent Trade Ministry issue in Japan, over which Consuls Yoshida, Nakauchi, and Yuki were believed to have turned in their resignations, was also believed to have been the subject of discussion.

Gen. Terauchi Leaves Chicago for West Coast

CHICAGO, Oct. 24—Gen. Count Juichi Terauchi, former War Minister of Japan, left here Tuesday morning by train for Los Angeles.

Gen. Terauchi, who was recently supreme commander of Japanese armed forces in North China, arrived here Monday from New York.

He will visit Grand Canyon en route, it was stated. Gen. Terauchi is scheduled to sail from San Francisco on Nov. 4 for Japan on the Asama Maru.

Seattle Area Nisei to Meet Over Problems

SEATTLE, Oct. 24—The second generation conference on agricultural problems which was scheduled for November 4 has been postponed to Saturday, November 18. The sessions will be held at Washington Hall, beginning at 8:30 a. m.

Tom Iseri of the Western Producers Exchange of Auburn, and treasurer of the Northwest District JACL Council, will preside, assisted by Daichi Yoshioka of Fife, former chairman of the Northwest District JACL Council. Yoshioka, George Yasumura, and George Ishihara, or Juro Yoshioka, will speak.

Moscow Air Line Sought by Chungking

HONGKONG, Oct. 24—Regular air service between Chungking, Moscow and Berlin reportedly will be shortly inaugurated. A traveler who has just arrived here from Chungking today said that negotiations for the purpose are progressing rapidly since the conclusion of the non-aggression pact between Germany and the Soviet Union whose antagonism hitherto thwarted the negotiations.

The distance between Moscow and Chungking, it is said, will be covered in four days by the projected airline.

To Settle Shanghai Incident

SITUATION IS CALMED

Charges Filed with Nippon Consulate by U. S. Official

SHANGHAI, Oct. 24—Cornell S. Franklin, chairman of the Shanghai Municipal Council, said today he believed differences between International Settlement police and Chinese agents of the local regime would be settled without further violence.

Franklin made the statement after a conference with Japanese Consul-General Yoshiaki Miura; Fu Siao-En, Mayor of the Japanese-held portion of Shanghai, and the commander of the Italian defense sector of the Settlement.

Recent clashes on the borders of the Settlement, in which several Chinese have been killed, caused a group of American residents to adopt resolutions yesterday asking increased Washington support to maintain the American position in Shanghai.

Meanwhile, United States Consul General Clarence E. Gauss filed with the Japanese consulate charges that Japanese commercial interests were attempting to monopolize the Chinese egg exporting business at the expense of American egg-packers in China.

American exporters complained that Japanese packers, "with the backing of Japanese bayonets," were establishing a monopoly which is keeping American plants idle.

American egg exporters in Tsingtao made similar complaints.

Tokyo's Famed Imperial Hotel Will Observe Golden Jubilee Soon

TOKYO, Oct. 24—Tokyo's world famous Imperial Hotel will next year observe the 50th anniversary of its founding and is now preparing a large sized volume of its history to commemorate the occasion.

The hotel, at the time it was opened, was more than just a house where travelers just registered for the night. It was planned to be the social center of the capital where Japanese and foreigners should come together in friendly association. The history of the hotel may really be regarded as forming an important part in the modern history of Japan; that of Tokyo, anyway. It was an institution with a vital mission.

In his "Life of Eiji Shibusawa," Ronan Koda, a celebrated scholar, says: "As to the promoting the establishment of the Imperial Hotel in 1893, aside from the objective of the hotel as a public hostelry, he (Mr. Shibusawa) intended it as part of completing all provisions that go to make a nation well progressed in the mode of its association with foreign peoples."

A dainty pamphlet recently published by the hotel management, in English, gives a concise but interesting review of the hotel's history. A glance over the list of names of internationally famous guests who registered at the hotel will give one a chain of events that were of national importance. There we find the name of Dr. Thomas Masaryk, in an assumed name of Dr. Thomas Marsden on April 14, 1918. Who Marsden was recall those exciting days when all newspapermen, at least, knew of his presence but discretely kept mum?

We also find in the list the distinguished names of General Leonard Wood, Governor W. C. Forbes of the Philippines (1911), Lord Northcliffe (1921), John D. Rockefeller, Jr. (1921), General Joffre (1922), Dr. R. Tagore (1924), and others too numerous to mention.

A study of the history of the hotel with emphasis on its part played in the social life of the capital would throw an interesting light on the role of the hotel today. Full of an undisputed hub of international cordiality.

Nipponese Drop Tie With British Pound Sterling

Greater Importance of Japan Trade with United States Stressed as Reason for Move; Rate Pegged at 23.40 to 100

Tokyo Daily Hits U. S. on Grew Speech

TOKYO, Tuesday, Oct. 24 (UP)—The popular daily newspaper Yomiuri violently attacked the United States today in an editorial commenting on last week's address by U. S. Ambassador Joseph C. Grew, in which the Ambassador voiced American opposition to some of the actions of Japan's armed forces in China.

"Much of the so-called public opinion of the people of the United States is formed by Jews," the newspaper said. "The Jews voice opinions, the rest of the population nods assent, and the government endorses it."

"To make Japan's intentions with regard to China understood by such a lot of people may be more difficult than shaking hands with the man in the moon."

"Not only Americans but Anglo-Saxons generally are arrogant, self-centered and unreflecting," Yomiuri said. "Their so-called 'frankness' is merely a product of prejudice and distortion."

Soviet Charges U.S. Pressure on Nipponese

Trying to Block Better Moscow, Tokyo Relations

MOSCOW, Oct. 24—A special dispatch from Shanghai to the Government newspaper Izvestia to day accused the United States of trying to block improvement in Soviet Russian-Japanese relations.

Quoting "responsible quarters," the dispatch said "agents of Washington are active" in trying to put pressure on the Japanese Government because of Japan's dependence upon imports from the United States.

"Japan would like to improve her relations with the U. S. S. R.," the dispatch added, "but meets great resistance from representatives of the United States, because improvement of Soviet-Japan relations would strengthen Japan which does not correspond to United States' interests."

American representatives, the article said, continued to "consider neutrality of the United States a comfortable mask necessary to cover the policy of isolation of Japan, and for upsetting the relations between Japan and the U. S. S. R."

"Apparently the Japanese people realize this maneuver of the United States and are beginning to feel uneasy under such pressure from the United States," the dispatch said.

Nippon Youths Will Be Sent to Continent

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (Domei)—Over 20,000 young men in Japan proper are going to Manchukuo and China next summer under the auspices of the Education Ministry, it was announced today.

Education authorities in Japan were pleased over last summer's result of the youth corps labor service consisting of 4000 students and 6000 laboring young men sent to Manchukuo and North China. New plans will send the youth labor corps to Central and South China as well, it was stated.

The Ministry of Finance has already been approached by the Education Ministry for a budgetary addition of 2,000,000 yen for the realization of this plan.

Tashiro Will Be Relieved of Post

TOKYO, Oct. 24 (Domei)—The cabinet of Premier Abe has decided to relieve Shigenori Tashiro from the post of Consul-General at Tientsin, it was announced.

Tashiro has indicated that he is accepting the portfolio of Vice-Minister of Foreign Affairs in the Manchukuo government.

Union Leaders Attend CIO Meet

SEATTLE, Oct. 24—George Takigawa and Dyke Miyagawa, officials of the Alaska Cannery Workers Union, represented the union at the annual Northwest district convention of the United Cannery, Agricultural, Packing and Allied Workers of America (CIO) in Seattle last week-end.

Manchu Yen To Be Linked With Dollar

HINKING, Oct. 24 (Domei)—Following Japan's example, the government of Manchukuo had decided to link the Manchukuo yen with the American dollar instead of the British pound sterling at the rate of 23.40 per 100 yen.

The new decision will be effective immediately and the Central Bank of Manchukuo had communicated with foreign exchange banks in Manchukuo to that effect, it was announced today.

The conference started on Oct. 21. As a result of the consultations an agreement was reached between the three ambassadors that the Japanese foreign policy toward Europe should be formulated with extreme caution in view of the ever-changing situation there.

It was reported that Oshima would leave Berlin on Oct. 25 for Naples from where he will embark for Japan by way of the United States.
