New NYK
Vessel
to Arrive

NITTA MAY
SET RECORD

Will Reach Coast
One Day Ahead of
Schedule, Report

Hightailing it across the Pacific today toward San Francisco at the unprecedented clip of 23.05 knots is NYK's new luxury liner Nitta Maru, scheduled to arrive here Saturday afternoon on her maiden voyage from Japanese shipyards.

Providing the Nitta keeps up its fast pace, reported by radio to company headquarters here, the 17,000-ton speedster will set a new record from Honolulu to San Francisco for a merchant liner, NYK officials report.

Heralded as Japan's "ship of tomorrow," the Nitta Maru is all air-conditioned, the first liner so equipped sailing the Pacific, and has accommodations for 127 first class, 88 second class and 70 third class passengers. Originally constructed for Nippon Yusen Kai-sha's Japan-Europe service, the Nitta was placed in the transpacific service to California for the duration of the war. Two sister ships, the Yawata Maru and Kasuga Maru, are nearing completion and will probably be placed in this trade also.

Measuring 590 feet in length, the Nitta Maru has five decks for passengers, including tiled sundecks, gymnasium, swimming pool, and modern Japanese decorations. The cargo capacity is 11,800 tons including space for 450 tons of silk, 100 tons of mail, 30 tons of valuables and chambers for 340 tons of refrigerated cargo.

Equipped with every latest navigation device, the Nitta has a wireless telephone system which enables every first class passenger to talk directly from his sound-proofed room to any place in America or Japan.

Lu Hsuan-wen, Minister of Manchukuo in Berlin, is likely to be appointed concurrently as Minister to Budapest.

Manchukuo formally recognized Manchukuo on Jan. 9, 1939, and has adhered to the anti-Comintern pact together with Manchukuo from May 24, 1939.

**NAZI THROW FULL AERIAL
MIGHT INTO MANEUVERS TO
BLAST RETREATING ALLIES**

Germany today threw the full power of her aerial might into an effort to blast from land and sea the broken, retreating fragments of the allied armies of the north.

In probably the greatest air action of the war two German airplane armadas rained bombs on a fleet of more than 60 allied warships and transports assembled off Dunkirk to effect withdrawal of the trapped British and French troops along the Franco-Belgian coast.
