# Thomas Masuda Opens Law Office in Chicago

Chicago, Ill .-- Thomas Masuda, who is be-lieved to be the first resettler to be admitted to the practice of law in Illinois, has opened his own of-fices in the Metropolitan Building in Chicago. He was admitted to the Illinois bar on September 18, 1944, Without an examination on the basis of his excellent record on the West Coast.

Mr. Masuda is a graduate of the University of Washington Law School and practiced law in Scattle for many years. He is a member of the American Bar Association and of the Scattle and Washington State Bar Associations. He came to Chicago from Poston School Center in Relocation Center in June, 1944, after visiting other cities.
While in Poston he was employed as an attorney in the Project At-torney's office and for a few months was acting Project Attor-ney. He was elected chairman of the Commu-nity Council at Poston at the time he left the project. He will be here soon.

George L. Kelley, chairman of the "Ban the Japs Committee", resigned from that position after hearing Mr. Mer speak in Pasa-dena under the sponsorship of the Committee for American Principles and Fair Play. "When I'm wrong, I'll admit it, and I was wrong," Kelley was quoted as saying. "That Dillo n Myer fellow convinced

me."
He has applied for membership in the Pasadena chapter of the Fair Play Committee.

Given permission by aj. Gen. Charles H. Bonesteel, Commanding Bonesteel, Commanding General of the Western Defense Command, to re-turn to the West Coast to continue her education, Miss Takei had returned last month to attend Pasadena

TEACUP TEMPEST IN PASADENA DIES DOWN AS DIRECTOR DILLON MYER VISITS LOS ANGELES AREA (cont. from front page)

Shortly after Miss Takei's return, the Los Angeles Examiner, on Sept. 23, published a statement by Dr. John Carruthers, president of the Pacific Coast Japanese Problem League, and former Navy chaplain aboard the USS Oklahoma, condemning the WRA for "testing" public opinion while part of the public was fighting and

without voice in the matter.

George L. Kelley, chairman of the "Ban the Japs Committee", then announced his intention to call a mass meeting to protest the Japanese relocation return. This move was commended by the Native Sons of the Golden West, Long Beach chapter, who also announced that they would oppose the return of "screened" Japanese to the state at that time. Dr. Carruthers said his organization would seek to amend the California shool Code to give authority for the admission of any student to the individual school board, pointing out that under the existing code, the city school board is powerless to deny admission to Miss Takei.

With the visit of Dillon Myer, however, Mr. Kelley resigned from the position of chairman of the "Ban the Japs Committee", and considerable other opposition is believed to have been allayed by Mr. Myer's visit to the Southland.
