GENERAL COMMENT: (Discuss briefly any significant changes or developments, problems, or difficulties in connection with health and sanitation, giving suggestions and recommendations.)

Two factors have influenced the operation of the hospital during the past month. Due to segregation and relocation the hospital has lost many key employees, including three doctors and many nurses aides. Of serious consequence has been the loss of two pharmacists, leaving only one pharmacist to cover the two communities. The Laboratory has been entirely stripped of all technically trained laboratory personnel. The loss of essential personnel has adversely affected hospital operation.

The second item of importance has been the serious shortage of evacuees who will work on the tuberculosis ward. The situation reached a critical stage during the month and drastic steps had to be taken through Project poculation, Block Managers, and Councils in order to obtain a minimum number of workers to carry on minimum essential care. The response was sufficient to temporarily relieve the situation. The outlook in this category must remain guarded.

The hospital underwent a change of Chief Medical Officers during the month and another change is expected in the next few days. Fublic Health at the Center during the past month has been satisfactory.

DECEMBER 1943

Attached is the statistical report for the Welfare Section covering the month of December, 1943.

The report shows that public assistance grants decreased slightly from the November figure. The amount for November was \$2,304.70 as compared to December's figure of \$2,237.24. These amounts were given to 308 family units in December and 303 family units in November. Money given to public c assistance elients for purchase of clothing in December amounted to \$1,967.97. This compares to \$2,387.63 in November. This decrease is due primarily to the fact that 27 families had employable members enter the camp on return from seasonal leave. This figure of 27 is entered on the statistical form under G-1-a.

The clothing allowance program also showed a slight decrease from the previous month. The November figures were 2,984 families receiving \$29,308.13 as compared to December's report of 2,870 families receiving \$28,624.97. This decrease is due primarily to the relocation of a number of families.

During December the department was successful in finding office space in one building for the entire Welfare Department in Butte Community. This will greatly facilitate the service which the department will be able to render to the community. It means that the Housing, Clothing, and Property Units are combined with the Social Service Unit into one office. We have adopted the use of a central receptionist for all units, and this will enable the Welfare Department to obtain better statistics. This also means that better use can be made of all employees inasmuch as equipment and personnel of one unit can easily be transferred to assist the work of another unit for short periods of time. This will be particularly helpful to the Social Service Unit which is lacking in adequate elerical staff and typewriters.

An important question with regard to public assistance grants arose during the month. In working out the 1944-45 budget, the Counseler was informed by the head of the Administrative Management Division that a conference in Denver of fiscal people disclosed that Gila's public assistance grants were far above those of any other center. The Counselor believes this may be due to the fact that when our department grants money to public assistance clients for the purchase of clothing, this sum is charged against public assistance grants. It is probable that some other projects charged this money to the regular clothing allowance section account. Telegrams were dispatched to three other projects and answers received indicate that at one and possibly two of these three, these grants are charged to clothing. These sums, of course, are broken down on the monthly statistical report form. In other words, on the report form, item B-6 plus C-7-d are added and charged against public assistance grants. We would like Washington's advice on this matter inasmuch as all projects should be uniform in charging these accounts.

During the month our department was informed by the Relocation Division that we should prepare to assume responsibility for the shoe rationing program. To date this has been handled in the leave office. We note that on the job classification from Washington, a job title of "ration clerk" is set up within the Welfare Section; thus it appears that this function will be added to the work of the department. However, in spite of the fact that the objective classification of ration clerk is assigned to the Welfare Department, no positions were allowed. Three positions have been requested in the budget request for the quarter and for the next year.

The Welfare Department has also requested that five positions be set up for housekeeper. These housekeepers are needed to assist families to do general housework and washing in emergencies. For example, they sometimes are needed when there is illness in a family and in some pregnancy cases.

With regard to the proposed counseling program, a telegram was sent to Washington office during the month requesting five counselors at CAF 7 and one at CAF 9. The evacues committee on relocation has been meeting regularly during the month. The counselor is commencing work on an in-service training program for the counselors.

During the month of December the Assistant Counseler completed her first series of eight weekly lectures on the evacues case-workers training program. Her report on this program is attached. The Counseler and Assistant Counseler feel that this program of in-service training already has begun to show positive results in the work of the evacues case workers. A two-week recess during the holiday was observed and in January a second series of lectures will be held. In general, it will cover the techniques of interviewing and recording. Any suggestions which the Washington office may have about this program will be most welcome.

WELFARE

In-Service Training

The in-service training program was begun on October 23, 1943, and the block of work alloted for this period carried the group up to December 14, 1943. As a result of a questionnaire submitted to the group of case workers, Butte and Canal (7 in all), the following topics in order of preference were decided upon by them for discussion for the entire year. (This report refers only to a portion of the total program.)

- 1. Family relationship problems
- 2. Mental problems
- 3. Public Assistance
- 4. Case recording
- 5. Problems of children

On October 23, 1943, the group met and received explanation of the method for conducting such a program. Emphasis was placed upon the fact that a large measure of the success of this kind of teaching depended upon the group participation and fulfillment of the assignments. The second helf of this introductory meeting was given over to a brief discussion of what is meant by family relationships, with an emphasis on knowing more about how people behave rather than why they behave as they do. The material discussed was as follows:

Assignment

1. Introduction

Topic

2. Family relationships

Each group member to chart what he considered the characteristics of good parents and children and bad parents and children.

- 3. T.B. case
- 4. Case of illegitimacy
- 5. Case of old age
- 6. Observation of incident

To observe same incident in pairs and to report back their observations for discussion of similarities and differences in observation.

7. Observation of incident

Jotting down, for worker's own use, things that she disliked in others.

8. Summing up

Concurrently with this material, there were assignments and discussions on case recording which included a discussion of chronological, topical, and summarized recording, plus a discussion of two "John Doe" letters (letters written to a welfare ageny by John Doe requesting help in planning for his sister but consistently withholding the name and address of the sister).

METHODOLOGY

With the exception of the first meeting, the group has attempted to assume the major portion of the discussion. In discussing cases, it was obvious as we went along, that things were important to observe, to emphasize, and to record. It was for this reason that they were assigned to pair off, observe an incident and report back their findings for discussion. An attempt has been made to relate the discussions to material that is available in this center and to make the experience as real as possible by using their own case material as assignments submitted. The thought also in mind has been that many of these workers are not going to be social workers when they relocate. Planning a series of about eight meetings and having short recesses between for two weeks seems to bring new life into a group program extending over a year's period.

Group response. The group has displayed varying degrees of resistance and acceptance of both method and meterial discussed. At different periods, the group tested the counselors attitude towards difference in race and the importance of religious training as related to social work. In the beginning the group was quite insistent that basic behavior was going to be very different in the Japanese culture than in any other. It was only after they attempted to define the differences that they began to see many similarities. They concluded that the difference was a cultural one and that difference in culture is very important in considering case situations.

The group discussed at some length the relationship of religion to social work. It was felt that in their discussions they were trying to find out whether the counselor was in favor of divorcing all religious thinking or concepts from social work.

Finally they began to see religion in perspective and in relation to other things. In the succeeding discussions they seemed to have less of a need to use religion as a solution to every problem than they heretofore had done. They seemed to think of religious affiliations as important now if the individual with whom they were dealing expressed a need for them or if it seemed appropriate to suggest such a solution. to be put

They had expected a great deal of pressure/upon them to produce their assignments and were quite puzzled when such pressure was not exerted. Generally speaking, they have kept up well on their assignments and have been iterested in the material that they have produced and discussed. They have enjoyed most the discussions on good and bad parent and children are and on the observational assignments. The discussion of the "John Doe" letters has been lively and interesting. On the whole, those sessions in which case recording, as such, was discussed were dull and uninteresting. This was partly because they had not seen the relationship of case recording to the job they were doing.

The group now appears to be at the point where they can work as a group, participation seems more rounded, and suggestions are offered by individual members more freely. At the last meeting on December 14, 1943, former discussions were summarized in preparation for the next block of work. This new block of work will include specific discussions of the techniques of interviewing with emphasis on the relationship of interviewing to the whole question of "how people behave". During the month of February the hospital was visited by members of the Army Doctors having charge of induction examinations for selectees. Following consultation with the doctors a schedule of pre-induction laboratory and X-ray examinations was outlined and put into operation. It is expected that the pre-induction laboratory and X-ray work will be completed on about 126 individuals by March 5. On this date the Army Doctors are expected to arrive at the Center Hospital. Facilities in one of the wards have been arranged according to a diagrammatic set-up sent out by the Army Doctors. Doctors and dentists from this Center are asked to help with the examinations. Under the program as outlined it is expected that about 200 selectees, could receive their induction physical examinations in about six hours.

Advice has been received from the Washington Office that a change of Chief Medical Officers at this Center will take place during the first part of March. Dr. Reese M. Pedicord, formerly Chief Medical Officer at Tule Lake, is to arrive at this Center during the first few days in March to replace Dr. Jack C. Sleath.

During the month of February, also, the hospital has suffered a considerable reduction in its staff due to the continued and progressive loss of nurses aides through relocation. It is evident in reviewing the past three months operation that the nursing aide service, which at this Center is mostly composed of younger individuals, has shown a gradual decline.

Toward the end of March, an exchange of Chief Medical Officers took place between Tule Lake and this Center. Dr. Jack C. Sleath left for Tule Lake, and Dr. Reece M. Pedicord arrived here to head the Gila Health Section.

On April 2nd, the hospital was once again visited by a group of army doctors at which time final induction physical examinations were given to more than a hundred Gila selectees.

During the month of April, the Health Section of this Center felt deeply the loss of two of its doctors. Dr. George Iki left for the middle west and Dr. Matsukichi Kanai left for a neighboring state with the thought in mind of getting permanently settled in the outside community. As a consequence thereof, the hospital was left with but three staff doctors in addition to the Chief Medical Officer, and work had to be curtailed accordingly. On April 25, Dr. Martin Loebmann arrived from Tule Lake for a temporary detail at Gila, which has relieved the situation considerably.

Advice has been recently received from the Engineering Section that War Production Board approval has been given for the reconstruction of a barrack to be used in the near future as a "Wayside Inn" for convalescent persons. It is our hope that this Inn will relieve the hospital of the care of patients who can do much of their work. Construction is also under way on a convalescent barrack in the Canal Camp. This barrack will be ready for occupancy within a few weeks.

The Rivers Community Hospital continues to lose its doctors. On May 29th, Dr. Tetsuo Sugiyama left for a six weeks' trip to Boston, Massachusetts where he hopes to make arrangements for permanent residence. The Medical Staff of the hospital at present consists of the Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Pedicord, Dr. Martin Loebmann who expects to return to the Tule Lake Center within a short time and two evacuee physicians, Dr. Kiyasu and Dr. Koda. It is felt necessary that three additional physicians be secured before Dr. Loebmann leaves the Center.

Also during the month of May, the hospital felt the loss of two appointed nurses, Miss Montalvo and Miss Fowler who were sent on temporary detail to the Topaz Project on May 6th. The date of their return is not known.

Although the hospital has been short staffed as far as physicians are concerned, the number of hospital patients, averaging about eighty daily for the month of May, shows considerable reduction compared to previous months. With the work curtailed we have not felt as much as heretofore the shortage of Nurses Aides. In fact, with the closing of the school year on June 9th, it is felt that a sufficient number of applicants for the nursing department can be found to cover the nursing needs of the hospital.

In certain other departments, relocation has caused serious shortage. For instance, in the X-Ray Department there is left only one employee who is able to take and develop films, and he has only been working in that department for about six weeks. We have hopes, however, that the transfer of some 2200 residents from the Jerome Center after June 15th, will make available a sufficient number of employees to fill the open positions.

In our previous report, we mentioned the reconstruction of a barrack to be used in the near future as an Inn for convalescent persons. We are glad to report that the Inn in the Canal Camp has been completed, and it is our hope that it can be fully set up and occupied within about a week's time. Thus, a number of convalescent patients who ordinarily would remain in the hospital for additional period of time may be transferred to the convalescent home, relieving the hospital of their care.

Since the May report, the hospital staff has been increased to a total of seven doctors. Both Drs. Iki and Kanai returned from short-term leave and are at present working with the staff. Dr. Loebmann expects to return to the Tule Lake Center within a short time. However, it is felt that the present staff is adequate to render good health service to the community.

Miss Montalvo who was on detail at the Topaz Project has just returned to resume work here. Misss Josephine Rappaport, Chief Nurse, is being transferred to the Minidoka Center in Hunt, Idaho early in July. At the present moment, we have no knowledge as to who will take her place, but until such time as a Chief Nurse reports, one of the nurses here will be appointed as Acting Assistant Chief Nurse, and I feel that we will get along until such time as a new Chief Nurse reports for duty.

We are happy to report that nurses aides situation is no longer critical. With the closing of the school year and the arrival of the Jerome group, sufficient number of nurses aides have been recruited to adequately cover the service.

Convalescent barrack in Canal is now in operation, but at present, there are only four convalescents living in the barrack but it is set up to take care of from fifteen to twenty in all. A housekeeper and her husband have been secured by the Welfare Department to take care of the supervise the barrack.

With the arrival of an Optometrist from Jerome who will be able to work full time, it is our hope that the optometry service can be improved to the extent that all the pending refractions can be taken care of within a few months.

MARRATIVE REPORT

July, 1944

Since the June report, a change of the Chief Medical Officer of the Butte Community Hospital took place as Dr. John F. West arrived from Poston, Arizona, to take the place of Dr. Reece M. Fedicord who left on his annual leave. However, it is now understood that Dr. Fedicord will not return here to resume his old post as Chief Medical Officer as he was transferred to Oswego, New York to head the hospital of the WRA Refugee Camp. Until further notice, I am to remain here as Chief Medical Officer. Dr. Koda who has been on leave will resume work as of today, July 31st. Dr. Loebmann expects to return to the Tule Lake Center within a short time.

Miss Jesephine Rappapert, Chief Murse, was transferred to the Minidoka Center early in July. Until the errival of Miss Priscilla Parker, Chief Murse, to replace Miss Rappapert, Miss Jean Sutherland, Mursing Consultant of the War Relocation Authority, Washington, was here to act as Chief Murse. We also had another addition to the Mursing Staff with the errival of Miss Nellie Roberts, R.N. Miss Mesia Phipps resigned as of July 14th to get married. Miss Mesia Phipps resigned as of July 14th to get married. Miss Kimmel, R.N. who was off Project accompanying patients from the Arizona State Hospital to California, and at the same time taking two days annual leave in Los Angeles, is now back on duty. Mrs. Bernice Stringer, R.N. took ennual leave from July 15 to July 26th and has now returned to duty. Miss Fowler, R.N. is still on temporary detail to Topaz.

Mr. Daneil B. Langford arrived from the Jerome Relocation Center to assume duty as Sanitarian at the Hospital here. Mr. J. Walsh Stull, Hospital Administrator, is now on leave of absence, so we are having Mr. Joseph E. Araki from Jerome as Acting Hospital Administrator.

The X-Ray Department is once again facing serious shortage with the departure of one of the technician for the army. The Pharmacy Department has also been facing shortage of Pharmacists, as one of the Pharmacist was hospitalized with an operation. However, he is now back on duty, so the Canal Pharmacy has been reopened to render service to the Community.

The Optometry service is, as yet, not open since we are unable to get equipment; nevertheless, we hope that in due time this service will be available to the residents.

On the 15th of this month, the ambulance service of the hospital was taken over by the Transportation Division, with emergencies being handled by the Internal Security. This transportation system seems to be working out very satisfactorily.

Several new coolers were installed in the hospital, such as Surgery, Medical Warehouse and other places because of the intense heat caused deteriorating of some types of medical drugs. At the present time, the morgue is very much in need of a better cooling system as well as drainage for the holding of the post mortem.

The general health of the community has been very good with practically no acute infectious disease or any epidemics. The census of the hospital at the present, is at the lowest it has been for some time.

Miss Lesil Fowler, R.N. is still on temporary detail at Topaz. Mis Florence Temple, R.N. who at one time was the Assistant Chief Nurse of the Rivers Community Hospital, will return in early September after a year's absence to resume her former position as Assistant Chief Nurse.

Mr. Joseph K. Araki, Acting Hospital Administrator from Jerome relocated leaving a vacancy in that position. The Hospital Property Office is also very much in need of workers with the relocation of its members. The Laboratory Department has an addition with the arrival of Miss Margaret Dewar, Laboratory Technician who reported to duty on August 29, 1944.

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The Optometry Department is, as yet, not open since we are unable to get equipment. Nevertheless, we hope that in due time this service will be available to the public.

The general health of the community has been very good with practically no acute infectious disease or any epidemic. The census of the hospital has been fairly high as many babies are being born.

With the relocation of Dr. Matsukichi Kanai and the termination of Dr. Walter K. Iseri, the Medical Staff of the Rivers Community Hospital is once again facing shortage of doctors. The staff at present consist of Dr. John F. West, Dr. George S. Iki, Dr. Kunisada Kiyasu and Dr. Kichiro Koda. To relieve this present shortage, Dr. Agnes V. Bartlett arrived from the Poston Relocation Center for a temporary one month detail, helping out the situation greatly.

The Nursing Staff under Miss Priscilla Parker, Chief Nurse, now consist of Miss Florence Temple who has been on duty as Assistant Chief Nurse since September 17, 1944, Mrs. Bernice Stringer, Miss Lena Bierdeman, Miss Lesil Fowler, Mrs. Agnes DeSomers, Mrs. Rosa J. Williams, Miss Grace Kimmel, Miss Elsie Houye, and Miss Kimie Monden. Mrs. Nelle Roberts who has been working here as Senior Staff Nurse has transferred to the Prisoner of War Camp in Florence. Arizona as of October 15, 1944. Mrs. Velda Brown has been on duty as Supervising Nurse as of October 20, 1944.

The X-Ray Department is now headed by Mr. Edgar W. Brown who has been filling that position since September 18, 1944. The Laboratory Department is now in charge with Miss Margaret DeWar, Technician, since the transfer of Miss Mathilde Harwich to Manzanar Relocation Center on September 15, 1944. The very much needed Medical Social Service Department is now in charge with Miss Gertrude M. Smith who arrived on duty on September 8, 1944, to fully resume that department.

The Sanitation Department has been progressing very nicely with Mr. Daniel Langford in charge, and Mr. M. Sugino, assisting.

The Optometry Department is, as yet, not open since we are unable to get equipment, nevertheless, we hope that in due time this service will be available to the public. At this writing, every effort is being made to obtain these needed equipments.

The Hospital is badly in need of workers, however, the remaining members have been carrying on very well.

On October 31, 1944, the Hospital held an Open House in honor of its second year.

The general health of the community has been very good with practically no acute infectious disease or any epidemic. The census of the hospital has been running an average count daily.

There has been a turnover of twenty three (23) in the Appointed Personnel during the year, including three Chief Medical Officers, three Chief Nurses, and Two Hospital Administrators, Obviously this has effected the efficiency of the program.

There has been comparatively little new equipment purchased during this year.

There are no extensive physical changes planned except the consolidating of the Out-Patient Record Room with the Medical Record Room, The installation of a water still, and some minor alterations in Corridor C. It is also contemplated that minor changes be made in the Morgue to facilitate sanitation and to make a new door on the south so that bodies may be more easily removed.

In view of the probable shortage of nurses in the near future, plans are being made to close G & F Wards and open H Ward. By so doing, patients from two wards will be consolidated into one, facilitating ward management, nursing service, etc.

Despite the turnover in Appointed Personnel and in view of the peculiar medical problems encountered in this type of project, it is felt that the medical care furnished the Community has been adequate.

Narrative:

Mr. Stout, Hospital Administrator who terminated March 7, 1945 entered the U.S. Navy on March 16 at Great Lakes, Illinois. Mrs. B. Temple left March 27, 1945, transferring to Zuni Indian Hospital, Zuni, New Mexico. Mrs. Lilla S. Brimhall, graduate nurse, was added to our staff March 27. Miss Parker has just completed classes for twelve part-time nurses aides who will be of considerable help to the hospital. Miss Kimmel has passed the Navy Nurse physical and is awaiting call to active duty. Since Mr. Stout left Mr. Shelly is the supervisor of the health section assisted by Mr. Edgar W. Brown as acting Hospital Administrator, and Dr. Loebmann, Senior Medical Officer, as medical and professional advisor. The return of Mr. Langford, sanitarian, or someone to fill that vacancy is hoped for with the coming of the warm weather.

Plans for the opening of a convalescent home for single aged men who are unable to care for themselves have been completed. This will lighten the burden of hospital care for number of patients.

Dr. Virgil A. Tolland, Optometrist, from Phoenix was contracted, and the needed treatments and operations were given to a large number of eye cases. Dr. Fred G. Holmes, specialist in chest diseases, has seen the majority of our tuberculosis patients this past month and plans to see the remainder in April. His recommendations will be followed by our medical staff.

When the plans for the transfer of tubercular and chronically ill patients have been completed the hospital can be maintained with decreasing personnel resultant from relocation. If these transfers are made the present medical staff will be adequate.

The general health of the community appears to be good. The Public Health Nurse has reported only one case of scarlet fever and several cases of chicken pox. The hospital census averages 85 patients per day.

GENERAL COMMENT: (Discuss briefly any significant changes or developments, problems, or difficulties in connection with health and sanitation, giving suggestions and recommendations.)

The hospital in-patient census has reached the lowest point recorded in more than a year. This reflects a general improvement in the physical condition of the center residents.

A visiting optometrist examined more than two hundred patients. Nearly all of these were found to need glasses. It is believed that expediting auxillary services will materially aid relocation.

Miss Carmen Hughes was detailed to the Central Utah Relocation Center. Miss Grace Kimmel was detailed to Minidoka. Both details are for a period of thirty days. The loss of these two registered nurses and the resignation of Mrs. Bernice Stringer has necessitated readjustment and curtailment in services.

All possible effort is being made for the transfer of tuberculosis and chronic patients to their resident county institutions. One patient was transferred to Santa Barbara, Galifornia. Lack of beds hamper the transfer of these patients.

Ob. cases are on the decline.

The Hospital Administrator, Mr. O. L. Prather, visited Los Angeles for consultation with Dr. A. Pressman and county authoritites relative to the transfer of tuberculosis patients. The results of the conference were negative insofar as immediate action is concerned. There is no problem of discrimination and the counties are willing to accept Japanese residents as soon as beds are available.

Dr. Iki, Chief Surgeon, has accepted a position with/clinic in Los Angeles, California. Most operation cases will have to be taken to outside institutions, and certain readjustments will be made in the out-patient clinic and medical staff assignments.

Communicable diseases were of no consequence in number or serious in nature.

Sanitary conditions are satisfactory.

The Medical Social Department is very busy preparing summaries for medical relocatees. In some cases, difficulty is being encountered in establishing residency.

Dr. Iki relocated to Los Angeles, California, to assume a residency position with a prominent clinic. Dr. A. Pressman, Chief Medical Officer of WRA, visited the Center and discussed transfer of patients to West Coast institutions. Mrs. Hughes returned from a detail to the Cen tral Utah Center.

Chosing of the Canal Clinic, except for service which can be rendered by the Public Health Nurse, was announced. It was also decided to close the diet kitchens in both camps, and reduce to a necessity minimum all diet service. In extreme cases, the diets will be cared for in the community hospital.

Three more tubercular patients are to be transferred to California institutations.

Dr. Kawamura, who has been carrying the dental load in Butte, is relocating to the West Coast to open his own office.

Dr. Lawson, distician, completed the teaching of a class of adults in a short term cooking and serving course.

The in-patient census has increased somewhat over the preceding month. Surgical cases have been reduced.

Over six hundred refractions have been completed by the visiting optometrist. Results of this service have been very satisfactory. More than \$2,000 worth of glasses and repairs for same have been purchased by the evacuees at their own expense.

Relocation is taking many nurses aides and replacements are becoming more difficult to secure. This is an anticipated condition, and curtailment of services necessarily follows to compensate.

Arrangements are being completed for the transfer of the residents in the Canal Rest Home to the Wayside Inn in Butte.

No appreciable change occured in the communicable disease category.

Sanitation is satisfactory. A few dgrees higher temperature was noted in the milk supply but not of sufficient importance for alarm. Correstion measures are being taken.

Approximately one hundred dogs were innoculated for rabies.

The morale of the personnel is very good, and the general health situation maintains a favorable standard.

Hospital Administrator, Mr. O. Lee Prather, has been detailed to Minidoka, July 15th, and Mr. Edgar W. Brown was appointed Acting Hospital Administrator.

Dr. Koda is in Fresno, California, making preparatory plans for relocation. He is due back on duty August 1st.

The Wayside Inn in Canal is completely closed, and all old men have been transferred to Butte. All clinical services in Canal Hospital have been discontinued. The Dental Department is the only remaining medical service in that camp operating.

Seven T.B. patients were transferred to California institutions. One new tubercular patient has been admitted to the hespital. Tubercular wards at the present have a total of twenty-eight patients.

Due to a very unfortunate bus accident on the night of July 27th, our hospital medical secretary was killed and eight other evacuee nurses' aides and hospital personnel were injured.

Dr. Lawson has completed all distitic work and has resigned effective August 15th.

Plans for the consolidation of our hospital wards are underway and are expected to be completed by August 15th so that the patients will be cared for with coverage of more nurses aides and hospital personnel than with the present distribution for the patients throughout the wards.

Our laboratory technician, Miss Dewar, has resigned as of August 15th. Due to the curtailment of our services to the camp, this loss will in no way hamper adequate necessary care to our patients.

It is of interest to note that our obstetrical ward was vacant of patients for four days for the first time in the history of the camp; however, it has resumed its operation as of this date.

Sanitation condition in this camp is satisfactory and is hoped that it will continue to do so for the remaining hot days.
