
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ACTIVITIES PROGRAM



MANZANAR

INTRODUCTION

Objectives of the Summer Program. The Summer Activities Program has been planned to meet the needs and interests of all age groups in Manzanar. Effort has been made to develop activities which will provide types of experience not as a rule available during the regular school year. Emphasis is placed on leisure-time, work-shop, and recreation activities rather than academic courses. Vocational training classes and work opportunities are also incorporated in the program.

The Summer Activities Planning Committee, which has developed the program, believes that summer activities in a relocation center should provide for constructive use of vacation time and also for experiences that will supplement the school-year program. The summer program, like other organized activities in Manzanar, is designed to aid the individual toward adjustment in a normal American community.

Division of Activities According to Age Groups. The program has been divided into three parts according to age groups with each of the three parts appearing on a different color of paper. All subjects are grouped under appropriate headings which are listed in alphabetical order. The subjects under each heading likewise appear alphabetically. Following the programs for the three age groups is a special events calendar for all age groups.

I. Children's Activities-(Begins July 3 and ends August 25). This program is adapted to children of elementary school age. It is expected that every child will register for at least one regular activity. Due to the hot afternoons at Manzanar, the majority of these activities are offered in the forencons. The program for children of elementary age is directed by Clyde L. Simpson, Elementary School Principal.

II. Teen Age Activities - The activities under this heading are for junior and senior high school students. It is anticipated that every youth will find some activity in which he will wish to take part. This program consists of three parts:

A. Academic subjects for school credit on the same basis as during the regular session (Began June 26 and ends Aug.19).

B. Make-up Classes for those who must take review work in order to advance into a higher class next fall. (Began June 26 and ends August 5).

C. Recreational subjects without school credit. (Starts July 3 and ends August 25.)

The program for the High School age group is directed by Rollin C. Fox, High School Principal.

III. Youth and Adult Activities - This program is open to all adults and to young people who might belong under class II above but who either are working or find activities more suitable to their interests and needs under III.

The activities schedule in this category is adjusted to meet the needs of the working adult. However, since everyone's working hours do not come during the day, a few day classes are available. Additional day classes for adults are now being planned. These do not appear on this program but will be announced separately soon after July 1.

The Adult Activities program is directed by Aksel Nielsen, Community Activities Supervisor, and Dr. Carter with the aid of their respective staffs.

IV. Special Events - This calendar is, of course, not all-inclusive. Activities will be scheduled and added to the calendar as the summer progresses. It is suggested that those who possess a copy of this program keep the calendar up to date by adding events which will be announced from time to time.

Planning of the Summer Activities Program. The summer activities Planning Committee, composed of representatives from various sections and groups, was appointed by Mrs. Lucy Adams, Assistant Project Director, who initiated the planning by suggesting that the Education and Community Activities sections pool their personnel and facilities for the summer. Before the committee met to work out a coordinated program, the two sections conducted a survey in order to see what leadership would be available for the summer. While many of the regular staff members were leaving on vacations, furloughs and indefinite leaves, enough indicated they would remain to assure a well rounded summer program. The available staff members from each of the two sections were combined for the summer as each teacher or leader showed his or her willingness to serve where the need for his skill was greatest.

Before the end of the regular school session, the Elementary and High School departments also made a survey to test pupil interest. Questionnaires listing all types of activities were distributed to all pupils who were asked to check the activities in which they were particularly interested. The results of this interest survey, together with the list of available leadership, were used as the guide in formulating the present summer program.

In addition to the regular staff members we have been fortunate in securing the services of certain volunteers. A few temporary staff members have also been hired for the summer.
