

San Francisco December 5' 1854.
Case no. 523, was ordered to be placed at the foot
of the 3rd class cases on the Trial Docket.

San Francisco December 17' 1854,
Case no. 523 was submitted under the Rule of 21st
March 1854.

San Francisco Jan. 23' 1855.
In the same Case Commissioner R. A. Thompson
delivered the opinion of the Board rejecting the

Honors the undersigned William Hecks and
James Martin Citizens of Sacramento County in
the State of California, that said claim to be
the Owners in fee simple of a certain unconfirmed

los Cosumnes and described as follows Consis-
ting of One league, three miles, or five thousand
varas (Yards) bounded as follows; On
the North or North West, the Cosumnes River on
the East or North East by a line three statas from
a point on the Cosumnes River called Red Gap
(Red Gap) and runs in a line directly crossing
the line of the River above referred to, On the
South or South East by a line that runs One
league or five thousand varas parallel with
the Cosumnes River On the East or South East
by a line that runs One league or 5000 varas
parallel with the line on the East or North East

day of December 1844 granted by his Excellency
Michael Corra Governor of the Department of
California unto Helene Chief of the Chislean

and delivered unto Augustus Sutter he then
being Justice of the Peace and Military
Commandant of the Frontiers. And afterwards to
to wit on the 13th day of May A.D. Eighteen hundred
and six and forty eight before John Sinclair then
Justice of the Peace of the District of New
Helena and before John A. Sutter, John Beck
Wells, Levi McKenney and Thomas M. Starkey

Seal of Thomas Shadon duly Conveyed and accepted
according to Law to your Petitioner William
Hecks by deed of date September 30th A.D.

The undersigned your petitioner

ers William Stocks and James Martin do
most respectfully represent that on the 22nd
day of December A.D. 1844 his Excellency Man-
uel Micheltorena Governor of the Department of
Upper California, granted according to Law
unto Heleno Chief of Chrestian Indians
called Moquelumnis and his tribe a certain
tract or parcel of Land described as follows
to wit, known and called a part of the Ranch
de los Bosquimes Consisting Of One League or
five thousand acres varies the boundaries
of which are as follows, On the North or North
West the Cosumnes River on the East or North
East by a line that starts from a point on the
Cosumnes River Called Paso Napa (old rap) ^(old rap)
and runs in a line directly crossing the line of the
River above referred to - On the South or South
East by a line that runs one league or five
thousand acres parallel with the Cosumnes
River on the East or South East by a line
that runs one league or 5000 acres parallel
with the line on the East or North East

That after said grant was made
and delivered, the said Heleno for himself and
his tribe their heirs and legal representatives, to wit,
on the 18th day of May 1848 granted, sold and
conveyed unto one Thomas Shadden the said
tract described tract or parcel of Land, who
afterwards, to wit, on the 30th day of September
A.D. 1850 sole transgress and conveyed the
same unto your petitioner William Stocks
who afterwards on the day of A.D.
sold and conveyed the one half thereof
to your petitioner James Martin the
present claimant thereof all of which execu-
tions of claim title are herewith filed and
respectfully referred to - That there are no
known interfering claim or claims of any
kind what so ever.

John A. Butler

United States Land Commission
San Francisco Jan'y 31. 1854

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On this day before Commissioner Thompson and his
Counselor came John A. Butler a witness in behalf of
claimants, Stocks and Martin Case No. 523
who being duly sworn deposed as follows

1st. Ques: What is your name
age and place of residence?

Answer. My name is John A. Butler
I am fifty years of age and I reside at Stock
Farm in Santa Clara County

2nd Ques: Were you acquainted with
Heleno the Indian Chief

Ans. I know him very well

3rd Ques: Was he ever mustered in to
the Service of the Mexican Government by
Order of General Michelena

Answer. Yes he was

4th. How long was he in Mexican Service
and did any of his tribe serve with him?

Ans. He was three months in actual
Service. His tribe consisting of his braves men
were with him during all of the time.

5th. Ques: Did he and his tribe
receive a grant from General Michelena
in consideration of their Services to the Government

Ans. Yes they did

6th Ques. Where is the Land situated
to which you refer in the preceding answer
If you are acquainted with the Services embrac-
ed in said grant, please state all you know
in regard to the inhabitation and Occupation
by the said grantees - the time when they first
Occupied them, and all the circumstances
connected with the possession of the same

Ans. I am acquainted with said
Rancho. I applied to the Mexican Government
to make this grant to the Indians, the applica-
tion was granted. The grantees Occupied said
Land by clearing them and by living upon
them - immediately after they returned from
the Campaign which was in the month of April
1845 they went on the trail for which they had

Received a grant and commenced cultivating
the same by planting Corn, Melons &c. and
making gardens -

Sacel truce is called losumus

being the same name by which it was desig-
nated in the grant - The lands embraced in
Sacel grant, are situated on the South side
of the Conchos River, at the point where the old
San Lorguin road crosses Sacel River, at the
point known as the Old pass - I think the
point was for one League, but it is so long
that I cannot recollect the precise quantity

The grant was obtained at my recommendation
and given for the services which they had rendered
to the government

7th Quesst. Were you a subscriber
Witness to a Conveyance made by Stelmo to
Thomas Shadron of the property above referred
as having been granted to Sacel Stelmo by the
Mexican Government, and of so Stelmo, who
went onto the possession of Sacel property after
the execution of Sacel Conveyance

Ans. I was one of the subscribers
Witnessing to that Conveyance. Immediately after
the execution and delivery of Sacel Conveyance
the grantee Shadron went onto the possession and
occupied Sacel property

8th Quesst. Was Stelmo and his
heir in possession of Sacel place at the time
the Sacel grant was made

Ans. Yes. They had been in
possession of it a long time before and were
in possession when they received the grant

9th Quesst. Was it the law or custom
of the country to make grants in consideration
of military services rendered to the Government

Ans. Yes sometimes it was the
case and was so in this instance and at
my request, on account of the good services
which they had rendered to the Government

Questions by Associate Law Agent

1. Quesst. Was the grant Sacel to have been made
to the Indians made voluntary or by force of

1. Question. Was the grant said to have been made

to the Indians made verbally or by issue of
a title paper made to them

Ans. It was done by a paper.

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2^o Question. When and where was said title
paper issued?

Ans. I can't recollect the precise
time. The grant was made during the Cam-
paign.

3^o Question. Were Stelmo and his
Indians all or any of them Mexican Citizens at
the time of the said grant

Ans. They were the Natives of the
Country and were enrolled as Mexican
Soldiers.

Before me John Sinclair

Justice of the Peace of this District and also
before the witness whose signatures appear at
foot of this instrument personally appeared Heleno
Chief of Christian Indians called Moquelinos
and declared that for himself his heirs and
executors, and in the name of his tribe their heirs
and executors and all others who may claim
through him or them, grants bargains and sells
unto Thomas Shadon his heirs and assigns known
as piece of Land granted to them the 22nd day of Dec.
1844 and delivered to Augustus Sullen he being
Justice of the Peace and Military Commandant of
these Frontiers at that date.

Said Land is part of the
called Ranch de los Cosumnes and Conceded as
above declared consisting of One League (three miles)
or Five thousand Six hundred Varas (Yards) the bounds
are described as follows: On the North or North
West the Cosumne River, On East or North East
by a line three miles from a point on the Cosumne
River called Paso Vap (old rap) and runs in a
line directly the line of the river above referred
to, On the South or South East by a line that
runs One League or Five thousand Varas parallel
with the Cosumne River, On the East or South
East by a line three runs One league or 5000
Varas parallel with the line on the East or
North East.

The said Heleno further declares
that said property is entirely unencumbered by private
or public claims of any nature and on such
condition now sells it to the said Thomas
Shadon at and for the sum of two hundred
dollars the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged
himself and on the name of his tribe freely giving
up all his claim for himself and all his and
guaranteeing to said Shadon that this said
shall more certain true and effectual -

15 Opinion of
Board

Hicks & Martin vs
Rancho de los Losumnis
The United States 3159 Leagues of Land

This claim purports to be founded on a grant made by Gov. Micheltornia on the 22nd day of December 1844 to the Mexican Chief Soembo and his tribe called the Musqueumis "from whom the present petitioners claim to derive their title by regular legal transfer." The original grant is not produced and no attempt is made to prove its loss or account for its non production.

The deposition of John A. Green is taken and filed in the case in which he states that a grant was made by Governor Micheltornia to the same Mexican chief and his tribe in consideration of their ^{meeting} "services". That the said grant was in writing, and that the Indians occupied and celebrated the land under it.

It is very doubtful whether this testimony would be sufficient proof of the execution and contents of the grant if a power of attorney had been ~~given~~ ^{granted} to its owner - but in the absence of any proof of the loss of the grant, or any delay on the part of the claimants to obtain it and put it in evidence, the testimony is clearly admissible for the purpose for which it is introduced.

The repetition of this testimony leaves the claim without any proof whatever to sustain it - it is therefore unnecessary to discuss the other questions which would have arisen on the case, since the due execution of the grant here established by the proof.

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





and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California, in Case
No. 523, on the Docket of the said Board of Commissioners, and was duly

1st
QUESTION, BY Claimants' Counsel

State if you know the lands
claimed in this case, if yes, where is it situated
and what are its boundaries?

Answer

I do know the lands. The tract
is situated in the present County of Sacramento,
on the South side of the Cosumnes River. It is bounded
on the north by the Cosumnes River, and on the west
by the Yule lands. The other boundaries I do not know.
The old road from Sutter's Fort to Stockton runs
through this tract of land.

2nd Question by Claimants' Counsel.
How long have you known the
said lands?

Answer.

I have known the said lands since the fall of the year 1841. I was last on this place in the fall of the year 1849. during this time I lived part of the time at Lutter Fort and part of the time on this very land.

3^d Question by Claimants' Counsel

State what you know of the occupation of said land during the time mentioned by you in your last answer. - by whom was it occupied - and in what manner?

Answer.

It was occupied when I first went there by the Moguelumne Indians a Christian Tribe - They lived on the land had portions of the land enclosed with fences - and cultivated in corn beans vegetables and some wheat; they also had some stock. I was on these lands in the years 1843 1844, & 1845, and saw their crops growing - these Indians cultivated by ploughing the land they planted. In the fall of the year 1846, Thomas J. Shaddou went into possession of a portion of the lands claimed by said Indians - he increased the fencing of lands and improved those already built - he built a house the same year and lived in it with his family - the next year he built a substantial adobe house and moved into it with his family and lived there with them until I left in the year 1849. Shaddou had a large stock of horses and horned cattle he took out of the place when he first went there in the year 1846. My recollection is, that the Moguelumne Indians raised wheat on these lands as early as the year 1844.

4th Question by Claimants' Counsel

Please to name the chief and as many of the tribe of Moguelumne Indians as you now recollect.

Answer.

I recollect the name of Helano, the chief of the tribe. I also recollect the names of Jose Maria, Jose Jesus, Sapatara, Hobobono, Manco, Juan, Leon, Mogone, Fernando, Panio. I know the names of most of the tribe but I do not now recollect any others at this time. Akilos was another

5th Question by Claimants' Counsel.

State how many persons there were comprising the tribe of Moguelumne Indians - and how many were grown persons -

Answer.

I should say there were between forty and fifty altogether, and about thirty were grown persons -

6th Question by Claimants' Counsel

What was the character of this tribe of Moguelumne Indians as to language, learning, and religion.

Answer.

They all spoke the Spanish language, there were several of them among the men that were educated and could read and write the Spanish language. They were known and called Christian Indians, and were in the constant observance of the Catholic Christian Religion. I have seen many of them wearing the emblems of the catholic church such as the cross and rosario. They have often spoken to me of their belief and practice of the catholic religion.

7th Question by Claimants' Counsel

State if you know of any of this

tribe of Moquelumum Indians having been in the service
of the Mexican Government; if so, when - and in what
capacity?

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Answer.

I do know of their being Soldiers
in the service of the Mexican Government; Helmo the
chief spoken of by me, and all of the men of his tribe
were Soldiers under Capt Lutter during the revolution
of Micheltorne in the years 1844, & 1845. I was one of
the Soldiers at this time in Capt Gants Company and
we were all under Lutter's command during
said revolution - my recollection is that all those

QUESTION BY 1st Claimants.

State if you know the land claimed in this case. if you! where is it situated and what are its boundaries?

answer. I know the said land claimed in this case. it is situated on the South side of the Cosumnes River in Sacramento County California. The old road from Sutter's Fort to the town of Stockton, or French Camp, passes through it. The Cosumnes is the northern boundary, the Julie or marsh lands bound it on the west. the other boundaries I do not know.

2^d Question by Claimants

How long have you known the said lands and what do you know of its occupation — by whom

has it been occupying - and in what manner.?

Answer

I have known the said land since the year 1840. up to the Spring of the year 1848. about the year 1841. the Mogulumone Tribe of Christian Indians were in occupation of the said lands - they lived on it and cultivated the land. they planted corn, beans, melons, &c. and in the years 1843. & 1844 they had grounds fenced in and cultivated, they continued to increase their improvements and cultivation up to the time I left. they had some stock and poultry. as early as the year 1843. and the years following they cultivated by ploughing the lands they planned - My recollection is they raised wheat from the fact of their applying to Capt Sutter for a band of mares to thresh their wheat. and I assisted in furnishing them the mares at Capt Sutter's direction. this was in the years 1844. & 1845. I was then in the employ of Capt Sutter at Sutter's fort. It is about 18 to 20 miles from Sutter's fort to the said lands. and I have been very frequently on the said lands during the time first above stated in this answer.

3^d Question by Claimant

Do you know of any other occupation of said lands. if yes state what you know.?

Answer.

I do know of other persons occupying these lands - In the fall of the year 1846 Thomas J Shaddow went into the possession and continued up to the time I left in the year 1848. he improved the fences already made and made additional enclosures. he built a very good house in 1846. when he first went into the possession of the land and the next year ~~the~~ he built a substantial adobe house; he occupied these houses with his family - he had

a considerable stock of horses and horned cattle, which he took out to the place where he first went there in the year 1846. he raised wheat, corn, beans and various vegetables.

4th Question by Claimants

Please to name the chief and as many of the tribe of Mogulamme Indians as you now recollect?

Answer

I recollect Adeno was chief of the tribe, I also recollect the names of Homobone, Manco, Jose Maria, Mogone - Rufino he is now dead - I did know the names of nearly all the tribe that were grown persons but it is now so long since I have seen them I do not now recollect any more of their names.

5th Question by Claimants

State how many persons there were comprising the tribe of Mogulamme Indians - and how many were grown persons?

Answer

There were between forty and fifty persons all told - over one half were grown persons.

6th Question by Claimants

What was the character of the said tribe of Mogulamme Indians as to learning, language and religion

Answer

Several of them were very well educated, they all spoke the Spanish language. Some of them could read and write the Spanish language. I have frequently seen written communications

from these Indians to Capt. Sutter also written communications from Capt. Sutter to them. They were Christian Indians - Catholics - They were in the constant observance of the Catholic Christian Religion - and wore the emblems of that church, the cross and rosario.

7th Question by Claimants

State if you know, of this tribe of Christian Indians or any portion of them having been in the service of the Mexican Government; if you when - how long - and in what capacity -?

Answer.

I do know of their being in the service of the Mexican Government as Soldiers - in the fall of the year 1844, and spring of 1845, during the revolution of Micheltorneo - Adano, the chieftain of said Moquolumne Indians and all of the men of this tribe were soldiers under Capt. Sutter's command this chief was in command of the Indian forces that were attached to Sutter's forces. I think they continued in such service during the whole of that revolution. I was a soldier in service during a portion of this time attached to Capt. Gant's rifle company that composed part of Sutter's command.

8th Question by Claimants

State what position or office John A. Sutter held during the years 1844, and 1845, under the Mexican Government.?

Answer

He was Commandant General of the military forces and Judge charged with the jurisdiction of New Helvetia on the northern frontier of Sacramento.

Do you know the lands claimed in this case being part of the Cosumnes Ranch?

Answer. Yes it is on the south side of the Cosumnes river and the old road running from Sutters Fort to French Camp on the San Joaquin river.

2. State what you know of its occupation, by whom and in what numbers?

The Mokelumne Indians were Christians, understood the Spanish language and

one of them could read and write the Spanish, they lived on this Rancho and were cultivating the soil, I loaned them oxen and a ploughs, several ploughs, and they raised melons, & vegetables, wheat and corn, and have purchased wheat & corn from them - this was in 45 and 46. The wheat & corn was raised on the Rancho I have spoken of. They first established themselves there in 1843.

Question - Do you know of this tribe or any portion being in the service of the Mexican government, and if yes, in what capacity at what time and who were they?

Answer - This tribe professed the Roman Catholic faith - and some of them were soldiers in the service of the Mexican government in the years 43, 44, & 45 - and were considered Mexican citizens their names were as follows

Rufino was Lieut. and chief of the Mukollum Tribe.

Democotes Oderly Sergeant
Augustine, (Corporal) (weaver by trade)
