

Petition

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Your Petitioner Manuel  
Gonzalez of the City and County of San Francisco  
State of California respectfully represents to  
Your Honorable Board that he claims a  
certain tract of land on the northern side of  
the American River called the "Rancho de  
San Juan" being of the extent of three leagues  
from West to East along the Banks of the  
American River and one league and a half  
from South to North in depth from the River, em-  
bracing four and one half leagues more or less  
situate principally in the County of Sacramento  
in said State of California that he claims the  
same in fee by virtue of a grant made to Don  
Pedro de Arce under the authority of the Mexican  
Government by Manuel Micheltona Governor  
Comandante General and Inspector of the  
Department of the Californias bearing date  
the twenty fourth day of December one thousand  
and eight hundred and forty four.

Your Petitioner further rep-  
resents that the said grantee on the third day of  
August one thousand eight hundred and  
forty five transferred all his right title and  
interest in said land to John Sinclair  
(his wife joining him in the conveyance)  
on the twenty seventh day of February and  
one thousand eight hundred and forty nine  
transferred all his right title and interest  
in said land to your Petitioner the above  
Manuel Gonzalez.

And your petitioner would  
further represent that the said grantee Don  
Pedro de Arce took possession of the said  
land in pursuance of the said grant and

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and that he and those claiming under him have been in the peaceable possession thereof ever since and your petitioner further shows that he has no knowledge of any interfering claim

Your petitioner presents herewith a copy of the original grant in the Spanish Language together with a translation of the same and will make further proof of title if required by the Board.

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Your Petitioner prays Your Honorable Board to take into consideration his claim to said tract of land and decree his title to be valid and confirm the same.

I do not know that the original grantee did not settle upon the land. Sinclair had possession before the grant to Bidmond. I do not know that official possession was ever given of the same.

Testimony by Mr. Whitecomb attorney for claimant -

Question -

What are your name age and place of residence? and where did you reside in February 1849.

Answer.

My name is William M. Carpenter my age is forty four years and I reside at Sacramento City in California State.

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resided there in February 1844.  
2 Question.

In the year 1844 did you know John Sinclair Mary Sinclair his wife Peter H. Burnett and Henry A. Schoolcraft; if you where did they reside.

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I know them all at that time Peter H. Burnett and Henry A. Schoolcraft resided at Suttens fort which is within the present limits of the City of Sacramento. Mr Sinclair and his wife resided at that time on his Rancho which is on the North side of the American River about three miles from Suttens Fort.

3 Question -

Look on the document here presented marked "Exhibit No 2" annexed to the deposition of James J. Keusch and filed in this case and also marked with the initials J. J. and state whether you are acquainted with the signatures of the persons above named and if so whether the signatures of those individuals appearing on said document are their own true and genuine signatures respectively and whether you was present when said document was executed and thereupon subscribed your own name as a witness thereto.

Answer.

I know the signatures of those persons named in the second interrogatory and have seen each of them write.

The document was executed in my office when I was personally present and I saw John Sinclair, Mary Sinclair and Peter H. Burnett sign their names respectively thereto and know the signatures to be genuine and I subscribed

my own name at the same time that as a Witness. I did not see Mr Schoolcraft subscribed his name thereto. He was in another Office within the Fort. I have often seen him write and know his hand writing and I believe the signatures on said paper purporting to be his is in his own hand writing.

Do you know the Rancho of San Juan claimed in this case and if so state what you know of its settlement occupation and cultivation?

Answer,

I first knew said Rancho in the Spring of 1845 - Mr Jacob P. Sidman was then living there. He had on it then a house built of adobe and a corral and some eight or ten acres of land fenced in and in cultivation also a large stock of cattle and horses.

I have seen as many as three or four thousand cattle on the place.

The Rancho is situated on the North side of the Arroyo fork about twenty miles from its mouth. The land has been constantlly occupied ever since up to the time I last saw it which was about three years ago.

When I first knew it in 1845 Mr Sinclair was his nearest neighbor on the North side of the River. He lived on the El Paso Rancho about six miles below Mr Sidman's there was no other house on the level except the adobe one above mentioned -

I lived on the river opposite for about two years from 1845 -

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interrogatory. The year which is there stated to be 1844 should be 1845.

That answer refers to the quantity above mentioned as the time when I was on the place, and it was in 1845.

That I did and the original grant was about Sutter's Fort in the Spring of 1845.

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Question by Claimants Counsel.

What is your name age and residence?

Answer.

My name is George F Hyman My age 35 years. My residence is Alviso San Francisco County.

Question Second.

Do you know the San Juan Ranch so called claimed in this case, if so state what you know of its occupation settlement and cultivation?

Answer.

I have known the San Juan Ranch since 1844. An adobe house was built on the Ranch in the Spring of 1845 by Joel P Delamunt. He had some 4000 acres of it under cultivation at that time principally in wheat. I saw there while Mr Delamunt was on the Ranch between two and three thousand head of cattle.

Mr Delamunt lived in the adobe house until the middle of August 1845 at which time he transferred the premises to John Sinclair who occupied the same until the year 1848 when I left that part of the country.

Question Third.

State as near as you can where the San Juan Ranch is situated? -

Answer.

It lies on the North side of the American River. About three or four leagues from the Sacramento River. East and directly adjoining the El Paso Rancho of Elias Gomis -

Question Fourth -

Who did you live in the year 1845

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1846.

Answer.

I lived on the South Side of the American River nearly opposite the San Juan Ranch. was well acquainted with Joel S. Edmunds the grantee of said Ranch after the transfer of the Ranch to Sinclair I sold him some land on the South side of the River -

Crop Examined by U. S. Law Agent.

1st Question - by the Law Agent -

At what place on the South Side of the American River did you live when did you commence residing there, and how long did you reside there?

Answer -

There was no name for the place. It was on the Sutter Ranch. I commenced residing there in 1844 & was there until the Spring of 1846.

2<sup>nd</sup> Question -

How do you know the place where lived by Edmunds was on the Ranch of San Juan?

Answer.

I know by Mr. Edmunds and Mr. Sinclair they both having so informed me?

3<sup>rd</sup> Question -

Where is said Edmunds at this time?

Answer.

I do not know.

4<sup>th</sup> Question -

In what place on the American River was the one in which you

Answer.

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land?

Answer.

It was eight or nine miles above Sutter's Fort on the same side of the river -

5th Question -

Up to what time do you know that house was standing?

Answer.

It was standing in July 1846.

6th Question -

How far East of a North and South line drawn through this dwelling was the house of Deamund?

Answer.

About a mile and a half.

7th Question -

Up to what time was the house of Deamund standing to your knowledge.

Answer.

It was there in July 1849.

8th Question -

Do you know the boundary line between the Ranch San Juan and the Ranch El Paso if you know where was it if you know do you know the house of Deamund was on the San Juan Ranch?

Answer.

I know by what Mr Deamund and Mr Sinclair told me that the house of Deamund was on the San Juan Ranch and the house of Sinclair was on the El Paso Ranch.

I do not know exactly where the boundary line was, the El Paso Ranch extended down to the Sacramento River -

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9th Question -

Was the house built by Ded-  
mund Subsequently or at any time known  
as the St. Clair house?

Answer.

I never heard it called by that  
name.

10th Question.

Was there any adobe building  
on the same side of the river within a few  
miles of Dedmund?

Answer.

There was one, Mr Sinclair's  
house between seven and eight miles below.

11th Question -

What direction was the  
fence and/or enclosure from Dedmund's home  
& how enclosed and by whom?

Answer.

It was in the bottom just below  
the house enclosed by a ditch made by  
Indians in the employ of Mr Dedmund  
in the early part of the year 1845.

12th Question -

Did Mr Dedmund have a  
family?

Answer.

No to my knowledge

13th Question.

What was the Character  
of the house, dimensions Materials, and  
did he make this his home?

Answer.

It was an adobe house one story  
thatch roof, about sixteen feet by twenty four  
feet divided into two rooms. Dedmund  
lived there from the time he built the house

lived there from the time he built the house  
until he sold it.

What is your name age and residence?  
Answer.

My name is Patrick O'Brien my  
age 31 years. My residence in Sacramento County  
California.

2<sup>d</sup> Question -

Are you acquainted with the  
district of country lying on the north side  
of the American River from its mouth to  
the hills. if you how long have you known it  
Answer.

I am acquainted with it and have known it since the Spring of 1845.

3<sup>d</sup> Question -

Were you acquainted with Abel P. Dedmond if yes how long did you know him and where did he reside?

Answer -

I knew said Dedmond. I became acquainted with him in June or July 1845

He was then living at Sanclaus on the American River where Morris Snow had on the Rancho then called del Paso. Said Dedmond was a Carpenter - He was there about 2 years, 1845 and 1846. After I knew him he was superintending the Indians, building the houses &c.

4<sup>th</sup> Question -

State whether from conversations with said Dedmond you learned where he had resided previous to that time?

Answer.

I never have learned from him where he had previously lived.

5<sup>th</sup> Question -

Did said Dedmond ever live upon, occupy or cultivate a Rancho adjoining del Paso on the East?

Answer.

I know him to build a small adobe house there. I never knew him to live in it, and I never knew of the place being cultivated till 1851. Dedmond built that house in the fall of 1846. Do not remember the month?

6<sup>th</sup> Question -

Was there any house on said place in 1845?

Answer.

There was not to my knowledge.  
7th Question.

When did you live in 1845 and 1846 and what were your opportunities of knowing of the occupancy or cultivation of said Ranch?

Answer.

I lived on the Cosumnes river I used to go over and occasionally to help Sinclair collect his stock together.

8th Question.

Could there have been a house or cultivation on the Rancho now claimed as San Juan in the years 1845 or 1846 without your knowing it?

Answer.

There could not have been any cultivation at that period without my knowing it?

9th Question -

Look at the Desmo in the document now shown to you marked "H B" and exhibit to this disposition and state where Sinclair's house was built in which said document is indicated?

Answer -

It was about at the end of the river where is marked in red ink by the Commissioner "Sinclair's House".

10th Question -

Point out the place where said Diamonds built the above house subsequent to the Eastward.

Answer.

It was about where the square dot is made in black ink and the Commissioner has written in red ink "Diamonds House" -

11th Question.

Were there any ruins of a former house on said Rancho in 1845 and did said Edmund pretend in any way to occupy said Rancho in that year? —

Answer.

I never saw any such ruins on the Rancho. I never saw know Edmund to occupy it, he used then to be kept gradually around Suclairs —

Crops Examined by Mr Whitcomb Attorney for Claimant —

12th Question —

State in what part of Sacramento County you now reside?

Answer.

I live with Samuel Morris, on the old Saper Ranch just where Suclairs house stood —

13th Question —

When were you first on the San Juan Rancho?

Answer.

In June 1845 I went over there with Perry Macoon to hunt up stock to take to market for Suclairs and Grimes.

14th Question —

How often were you on the San Juan Rancho in 1845? —

Answer.

I was there 3 or 4 times the stock was to be run up there and he went to attend them —

15th Question —

Did you in any of the visits you made to the San Juan Rancho go all over it?

Answer —

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Answer -  
I was never in those days more than ten miles off from Tom's place say 15 or 18 miles from the McClair house.  
5th Question -

Are you in any way interested for yourself or your friends in the refutation or confirmation of this claim?

Answer - I am in no way interested in it on my own or any other account.

How long did the building put up by Belmont in 1846, stand?

Answer.

I think it was there in 1857. the roof was then off, a part of the walls and still to be seen there -

Questions by Mr Whitcomb for Claimant.

1<sup>st</sup> Question -

What is your name age and residence?

Answer.

My name is Daniel Leahy I am 39 or 40 years of age. I was born in San Francisco County California.

2<sup>nd</sup> Question -

Do you know the Rancho claimed in this case called "San Juan" if you know where it is situated and State what you know of its occupation and Cultivation?

Answer.  
I am acquainted with said Rancho. It is on the North side of the Alameda River about 1 1/2 miles East of Sinclair's home. I came in there on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of October 1843 and at that time Mr Dedman a carpenter was living on said Rancho. He had a house and corral and as far as I can recollect there was a field enclosed by a ditch a short distance below the house. I think it was sowed in wheat. There was a good deal of stock on the place. I do not know who owned it then, this Dedman sold out to Sinclair.

I was frequently over the Rancho. I used to go up there from Sutter's Fort to cut timber for my business which is the cooper's trade. Dedman used frequently to come down to the Fort where I lived.

3<sup>rd</sup> Question.

Do you know Mr Buzzle and Mr Sherman if you where did they live at that time.

Answer.

I knew Mr Bogle and Mr Hyman Bogle lived about 3 miles East of Deduends house on the opposite side of the river. Hyman lived out with the Cosumons now with Perry McLevon at that time.

1<sup>st</sup> Question -

Was you generally acquainted with the people in that section of country at the time of which you have been speaking if you do you know Patrick O'Brien and state if you ever saw him there in the years 1843, 1846, or 1847.

Answer.

I was generally acquainted there then. I know Patrick O'Brien living with Mr Honis he is an Irishman with whom I am well acquainted. He was not there in 1843 or 1846. I do not think he was in this country till 1847. I first knew him upon the American River 1848. I think he came with an Artillery Company to Monterey in 1847.

2<sup>nd</sup> Question -

What were said Patrick O'Brien's habits as to Temperance?

Answer.

He was a man who drank very freely and was quite an intemperate man up to the time I last saw him which was about a year ago.

3<sup>rd</sup> Question.

From your knowledge of said O'Brien for the last five or six years state whether he would be likely to be correct in his statements or accurate in his representation of facts?

Answer.

I do not think his statements

would be altogether reliable. I would consider him liable to mistakes, especially when he is in the habit of drinking.

7th Question.

Where did Perry McLeoon live in 1815 & 1846?

Answer—

He lived on the South side of the American River about 2 miles West of Dedman's place. He and Nymaw lived together there in those years and afterwards moved up to the Cosumnes River. In my former answer I was somewhat inaccurate as to the time of their going to live on the Cosumnes. I think they went to the Cosumnes late in 1846 or early in 1847.

8th Question.

Are said Perry McLeoon and John Sinclair still living—

Answer.

They are both dead.

Cross-Examined by U.S. Associate Law Agent.

1st Question.

Of what description and size was the house on Dedman's land?

Answer.

It was a one story adobe house with I think a thatched roof. I think it was not less than 20 by 30 feet.

2d Question.

Did anybody live on the land after Dedman sold it to Sinclair?

Answer.

I believe Dedman lived there after that when he was not out at work

after that when he was set out at work  
at his Carpenter's trade.

3<sup>d</sup> Question.

How often during the years 1845-1846 & 1847 did you visit this Ranch of Deeds - mounds and state whether O'Brien might not have been in the Country without your knowing it?

Answer.

I passed by the Ranch often in 1845 and 1846 up to the 14<sup>th</sup> of June 1846 then I found Fremont and went South and returned to Sutter's Fort April 1. 1847. I do not think he could have been in that part of the Country in 1845 without my knowing it. I believe he came to the Country in the Lexington state in 1846 or early in 1847. he told me he did.

4<sup>th</sup> Question -

Can you state any instance in which you found said O'Brien's statements to be false?

Answer.

No I cannot.

5<sup>th</sup> Question.

Do you think intemperance had destroyed his memory and truthfulness?

Answer.

I can hardly that question. his memory might have been affected by his drinking but I cannot say positively that it was.

What is your name age and

Answer.

My name is William Hicks. My  
age 35 years. My residence in Sacramento County

2<sup>d</sup> Question.

Where and how long have you  
resided in California and in what have  
you been employed?

Answer.

I came to California in February  
1844 and have resided in the State ever since  
that time. Most of the time in Sacramento County  
I have been engaged in trapping Otter and  
beaver part of the time and have also been  
overseen or Major Duno for Capt Sutter  
and Suclair. These were my associations till  
the war broke out. Since the war I have been  
raunching for myself.

3<sup>d</sup> Question.

Did you know John Suclair

and where he resided and in what was he employed?

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in the years 1844, 1845 and 1846, if you where  
did he reside and in what was he employed?  
Answer.

I know him from August 1841  
on till the time he left the Country about  
1849. I was well acquainted with him  
He lived from the time I know him on his  
ranch 4 miles from Sacramento City  
or rather on Grimes ranch - Suclair is the  
only man I ever saw in possession of it.

He was engaged in raising Cattle  
and horses and also in farming raising Grains  
4th Question.

Did you know during those  
years J. P. Dedmond, the original Claimant  
in this case, if you where did he reside and in  
what was he employed?

Answer.

I knew Dedmond first in the  
Spring of 1845. Shortly after I first knew him  
I went out trapping and was gone about  
three months when I returned about Septem-  
ber I went to work for Suclair and found  
Dedmond at work there at his trade as a  
Carpenter and then living with Suclair's  
He continued to work there at his trade till  
Fremont came out in the winter of 1845 then  
in the Spring of 1846. I went with Fremont  
I left Suclair's I think in January 1846  
and then Dedmond was still working round  
there at his trade. I do not know what his  
Employments were in my absence.

5th Question -

Do you know where Samuel  
Ponis now resides if you how far is it from  
the house Suclair occupied.

Answer.

I know where said Ponis lives

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and it is about 50 yards from the one  
 Sinclair used to live in. They were building  
 that house Morris lives in September 1845  
 when I returned there from my trapping  
 excursion -

Ed. Guston.

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Do you know that a  
 house was built on the North side of the  
 American River eastward from Sinclair's  
 house prior to 1846, if you know and by  
 whom was it built and how often did  
 you see it while it was in process of construc-  
 tion and how long and by whom it  
 was occupied.

Answer.

I know that a house was built  
 there about 8 miles above Sinclair's house.

It was an adobe house I  
 first saw in the fall of 1844. It appeared  
 then from the outside to be a finished house.

I do not know when it was  
 built or who built it - Sometime in the  
 fall of 1845 while I was at Sinclair's it  
 was occupied by Mr Sumner, that was the  
 first I knew of its being occupied.

I think Sumner lived  
 there from six to eight months, and then he  
 went away to the States. When I went there  
 with Stradden his son in law in the fall  
 of 1845 from the appearance of things I should  
 Judge Sumner had been living in it some  
 three months. I know of no others ever  
 living in that house.

Ed. Guston.

Are you acquainted with  
 the land claimed in this case called the  
 Rancho of San Juan, if you how long had

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Rancho of San Juan, if you how long had you known it and how often did you pass over the arable land of said ranch? and how much of it is fit for Cultivation -

Answer.

I am acquainted with all the land round there. but I did not know it by the name of San Juan. I have heard it called so for a year or more. I was over the land some two or three times in 1845. All the American soil cotton is fit for Cultivation. but I cannot say how much there is of it.

5th Question.

If there had been any Cultivation of said Rancho would you probably have known it?!

Answer.

There was no Cultivation on the ranch that ever I saw there might have been Cultivation there without my seeing it.

9th Question -

Was Joel P. Edmund a man of some family and did he ever live on said ranch or Cultivate the same?

Answer.

I never knew of his, having a family I do not know whether he ever did live on or Cultivate this ranch or not.

10th Question -

Do you know from said Edmund in what he was employed in 1843 1844. and that part of 1845. during which you were not acquainted with him.

Answer.

I do not.

11th Question.

Where could there have been Cultivation on this land without your

Knowing it while you were at Sinclair's?  
Answer.

I do not suppose I was over all the parts of the ranch which could be cultivated. I never heard of any of it being cultivated. There could have been cultivation along the river without my necessarily having seen it?

12th Question -

Is it possible to obliterate all traces of cultivation of land within two years after the land is plowed and have you ever seen any traces of former cultivation on the land in question?

Answer.

I think the traces of cultivation when land has been plowed will not disappear in two years and I never saw any traces of former cultivation on this land.

Crops - Examined by Mr Whitcomb for claimant.

1st Question.

State what persons were living in the neighborhood of this land in 1845 and 1846 who would be likely to know the condition of the place at that time?

Answer.

A man named Willard Buzgle and Lihik, Sinclair and the man Buzgle and the man lived at Leidersdorffs place about a mile and a half from the Adols house I mentioned.

Lihik was a cooper and made barrels for Capt Sutter. I think these men would be likely to know more about the place than I do in three years

They were living there at the time and I was not.

2<sup>d</sup> Question.

Do you know a man named Patrick O'Brien now or lately living with Samuel Horns if you when did you first know of his being about in that section of the country?

Answer.

I know the man, O'Brien I first knew him in October 1847. he had lived at Livermore. in December he came up with Martin Murphy from Livermore ranch, he came up at that time to Murphy's ranch about 14 miles from Sacramento.

3<sup>d</sup> Question -

If said O'Brien had been about there in 1845 or 1846, would you have been likely to have known it?

Answer.

I think I would have known it. I am satisfied in my own mind that he was not there.

4<sup>th</sup> Question -

Was the place Sinclair lived on as you state in your answer to 3<sup>d</sup> Question in Chief, the Horns Ranch or the San Juan Ranch?

Answer.

It was the Horns Ranch and not the San Juan Ranch.

The 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>d</sup>. 3<sup>d</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Questions on Cross Examination are objected to by the Law Agent as new matter and not pertinent to the Examination in Chief.

Re Examined by U.S. Law Agent.

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1<sup>st</sup> Question.

Heard Joel P. Diamond  
any cattle with which to stock a road  
which when you know him if you know names  
and where they kept?

This 1<sup>st</sup> Question objected to by Claimants  
because as new matter not in reply &c.  
Answer.

I never knew of his having any  
cattle. And if he had had any I think I  
would have known it.

2<sup>d</sup> Question -

Have you ever heard any  
one say who built the house in which you  
say Sumner lived, if you who said it?

2<sup>d</sup> Question objected to as new matter not  
in reply & hearsay.

Answer.

I have heard Sinclair and his  
wife both say in 1845 after I returned  
from trapping that one Bennett built that  
house and that he was the first person  
who lived in it. I do not know that I  
ever saw Bennett myself.





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

The Citizen Manuel Micheltorna General of Brigade of the Mexican Army, Adjutant General of the Plaza Mayor of the same, Governor Commandant General and Inspector of the Department of the Californias.

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Whereas Paul P. Diamond Mexican by Naturalization has petitioned for his personal benefit for the land known by the name of the Rancho de San Juan bounded on the west by the land of Senor Gomez on the south by the American River on the east by the foot of the Sierra Nevada <sup>and on the north by the white lands</sup> its extension being from West to East three leagues and from South to North one league and a half, the preliminaries and proper investigations having been gone through with in obedience to the laws and regulations concerning the parcels upon the California. In the name of the Mexican Nation therefore granted to him the above mentioned land declaring it his property by these present letters Submitting it to the approval of the Honorable Departmental Assembly and under the following conditions -

1<sup>st</sup>. He shall not sell alienate nor mortgage it nor assign it but or tax upon it nor pledge it nor subject it to any other Encumbrance.

2<sup>d</sup>. He may Enclose it without prejudice

prejudice to the cross roads roads or rights of way, and he shall enjoy it fully and exclusively without it to the use or cultivation which best suits him, but within a year he shall build a house and it will be inhabited -

3<sup>d</sup>. He shall solicit from the proper Judge to give him Judicial possession in virtue of this grant for the which the boundaries shall be marked out in whose limits he shall plant besides the usual land marks some fruit or forest trees of some utility -

4<sup>th</sup>. The land which is hereby granted is of four and a half leagues, more or less for large cattle the Judge who gives the possession shall have it measured conformably to the ordinance, retaining the surplus remaining to the Nation for its proper use.

5<sup>th</sup>. If he shall contravene these conditions he shall forfeit his right to the land, and it shall be alienably by another.

Wherefore I order that these proceedings presents serving him for a title and being of themselves firm and valid, record thereof be taken in the proper book, and that they be delivered to the party interested for his security and other purposes.

Given in Montevideo on the twenty fourth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty four.
