

In Case No. *234*, *George A. Cornwall*, for part of the place named *Soulajulle*, the Counsel for the Claimant filed the following Stipulation, to wit:

To the Board of Commissioners for ascertaining and settling private land claims in the State of California.

Your Petitioner George A. Cornwell of Sapa City County of Sapa in the State of California respectfully represents to your honorable board that he claims a certain tract of land called a part of the Rancho of Ramon Mesa or lands called Sulayulli containing one and  $\frac{3}{4}$  square miles more or less situated in the County of Marin in said State of California; that he claims the same in fee by virtue of a grant made to Jose Ramon Mesa under the authority of the Mexican Government by Manuel Micheltorena Governor of the Department of the Californias bearing date March 29<sup>th</sup> 1844 and approved by the Territorial Deputation on the \_\_\_\_\_

Your Petitioner further represents that the said grantee on the sixth day of December 1849 transferred his rights in said land to your Petitioner jointly with one Lewis O. Watkins who on the sixth day of August 1850 conveyed all his rights in said land to your Petitioner as per deeds filed herewith.

Your Petitioner would further represent that judicial possession of said tract of land was given to the said grantee — the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ and the boundaries thereof designated and that he and those claiming under him have been in the peaceable possession thereof ever since; and that he has no knowledge of any interfering claim whatever.

The original grant of said land is filed in the case of Joshua S. Brackett No to which you are referred.

Your Petitioner presents herewith a copy of the original grant of said land in the Spanish language and a copy of the Expediente together with translations of the same, and will make further proof of title if required by the board.

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Your petitioner prays your honorable board to take into consideration his claim to said tract of land and decree his title to be valid and confirm the same. And your petitioner will ever pray.

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This day before Court Alphens Felch came José Ramón Mesa a witness in behalf of Claimant Joshua S. Brackett No 233 who after being duly sworn deposed as follows.

The Secretary Mr Fisher acted as Interpreter.

Questions by Mr Spear Attorney for Deposition the Claimant.

1 Question. What are José Ramón Mesa your name, age and place of residence?

Answer. My name is José Ramón Mesa, my age is twenty nine years, and I reside in the County of Contra Costa in California.

2 Question. Look on the paper now here exhibited to you purporting to be a grant by Governor Michelmore to José Ramón Mesa and marked "Exhibit No 1" with the initials "A F" and answer to the Deposition and state whether you recognize the document and if so what it is.

Answer. I cannot read or write but I know that this paper is the title to my Rancho. I know that Michelmore and also Gimeno signed this paper. They signed it in my presence.

(The witness pointed out the signature of each on the document)

3 Question. State what you know about the occupation and improvements

of the Rancho named in the grant and called  
"Soulayulle"

Answer. The same year  
when the grant was made to me I settled  
on the land built a house and lived in  
it. put some cattle & horses on the place  
and built a corral and inclosed & cultivated  
some of the ground, and made a garden,  
planted some fruit trees and grape vines,

I think I planted something like two  
hundred fruit trees there at that time.

I lived on it about four years from the  
time I first settled on it, after which I  
retired to Sonoma in consequence of  
sickness, and left my brother on the  
place occupying it for me,

When my brother left the place,  
another man occupied it for me.  
During all the time we had some men  
in our employment living on said Rancho

It was so occupied up to the time  
I sold it, I sold the greater part of it to  
Vasquez, and the remainder to some  
Americans.

4<sup>th</sup> Question, What are  
the boundaries of the Rancho above named?

Answer, It is bounded  
on one side by the lands of the Rancho  
known by the name of Laguna de San  
Antonio, on one side by the lands known  
by the name of Meacio, & on another side  
by the boundary of the lands of Juan  
Martin.

There is a small creek  
near the house of permanent waters,  
There is also a water hole near  
where the house stood.

5<sup>th</sup> Question, Did you

7  
even receive juridical possession of the property?

Answer, I never did.

The same year when I was about getting juridical possession the Americans took possession of the Country.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. Have you any interest at the present time in the land?

Answer, I have not.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Did you ever apply for juridical possession of the land? if nay, why not?

Answer, I never did apply for it because I was afflicted with a sore leg for eleven years, so that I could not move, and did not get well until about two years ago.

8<sup>th</sup> Question. In what country is the said Rancho situated?

Answer, I do not know in what county it is. It was in the jurisdiction of San Rafael at that time.

1 Quest. What is your name  
age, and place of residence?

Ans. My name is James  
Heaves, I am fifty eight years of age,  
and I reside in Marin County.

2 Quest. Are you acquainted  
with the Rancho called "Soulayulle".

Ans. I am acquainted  
with it. I lived eight years within about  
half a mile of it. I know of Jose Ramon  
Mesa lived on said place about two years  
he had a house, corrals, and cattle there  
and when he left the place his brother  
took possession and after having lived  
there about twelve months they sold out  
and left. Ramon Mesa first settled there  
about the year 1845.

3 Quest. Look on the  
Map now shown you which is a part of  
the Expediente filed in this case, and mark  
Red "B" and state whether the natural  
objects represented on said map as the  
boundaries of said Rancho are so plainly  
designated that a Survey could locate the  
land.

Ans. There is a creek running

right through the rancho and empty

sight through the rancho and empties into Tomales bay.

The said tract of land lies between the region of Country called Arcadio and the Laguna San Antonio, and that the line dividing the Rancho from the lands of John Martin has been settled by a Justice of the Peace

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Questions by Mr Eschenow,

1<sup>st</sup> Quest. How long did Jose Ramon Mesa live upon the land himself?

Ans. He lived there about twelve months it might be a little more he left the place before the Americans took possession of the Country. His brother then lived on it for eighteen months when he left. Since which time no one has lived on it. No person to my knowledge has pretended to use it in any way since that time.

Re-examined by Claimants

1<sup>st</sup> Quest. Do you know whether Ramon Mesa by himself and brother occupied said Rancho until he sold it to the present claimants.

Ans. They did so occupy it, by having cattle on it, and the first year they cultivated a part of it. after Ramon Mesa's brother left the place as I have before stated, they never worked or lived on said place, but they kept some horses there.

2<sup>d</sup> Quest. Who was living on the Rancho at the time the Americans took possession of the Country?

Ans. No one was living on it at that time.

3<sup>d</sup> Quest. What time did the Americans take possession of the Country.

Ans. It was either in the year 1846 or 1847 I don't remember which.

4<sup>th</sup> Quest. You state that Ramon Mesa settled on said place in the year 1846, that he lived there about one year, and that his brother took possession and lived there eighteen months, will you now state whether you are clear in your recollection that Ramon and his brother occupied the place for two years and a half altogether?

Ans. Yes somewhere there, abouts.

Question by Mr. Greenhow.

Quest. Are you certain that neither Ramon Mesa nor his brother nor any other person acting under them lived on this land, at the time when the Americans took possession of this Country?

Ans. No they did not, they had left before that, <sup>his</sup> James <sup>mark</sup> Hawes.

The Citizen - José Ramón Mesa a native of this Department and resident within jurisdiction of Sonoma before your Excellency in my own right and as the best manner of proceeding, respectfully say: — that since last year I directed to your Excellency a communication soliciting a tract of land known by the name of "Soulajulli" in the vicinity of San Rafael

Mission and as doubtless said communication was not considered, I now renew my application to the generosity of your Excellency to the end that in view of the unavoidable irregularity of the office of said Establishment you will do me the favor to grant me the land above referred to, bounded on the South and West by the land called Nicasio and on the North by Lake San Antonio and on the East by John Martin's Rancho the extent of which is three leagues as is shown by the map which also accompanies this to your Excellency said land I have been occupying about one half year, with a small house, a cattle yard, garden and moving effects, with the consent of the aforesaid office: for which I gave years to having the arms of my Country, and am now the actual Foreman of said Mission.

I wait for your Excellency to take into consideration my request.

For which I humbly supplicate that your Excellency will see fit to grant my request which will be received as right & just, making the necessary affirmations.

I do not know how to write my name

This Honor the Governor,  
The information required is from the office of Don Rafael to which you give your approval, according to the certificate which accompanies the petition of the person interested all of

which being favorable and the land public.  
 You can put on this same dispatch  
 a Provisional Grant and in the meantime  
 the Secretary can conclude the negotiations

 to Mexico by the Schooner California,  
 this would be the most convenient,

Whereas the Citizen Ramon Mesa has petitioned for his own personal use and the use of his family the lands known by the name of Doulayulli bounded by the Lake San Antonio, the land called Nicassio, and the Rancho of Juan Martin exercising due diligence and investigation according to the laws and regulations concerning the same, by virtue of the power in me vested by the Mexican Nation I hereby grant unto him the above mentioned land declaring it by these presents to be his property subject to the approval of the Departmental Assembly and under the conditions following, to wit:

1<sup>st</sup> He shall not sell, alienate, pledge transfer, impose, entail nor in other manner bind said land.

2<sup>nd</sup> He may fence the same without prejudice to the public roads and rights of way. He shall hold said land freely and exclusively, applying it to whatever use and benefit may best suit him. Provided that within one

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year he shall build thereon a house which shall be inhabited.

3<sup>rd</sup> He shall solicit from the respective Judge the Judicial possession of said land by virtue of this despatch the boundaries of which shall be marked out and the limits thereof there shall be put besides the proper land marks, some fruit trees and other useful shrubbery.

4<sup>th</sup> The land which is hereby donated is three leagues in extent, a little more or less, as is shown by the respective map.

The Judge who gives the possession will have the same measured according to law, and the surplus shall remain for the use and benefit of the Nation.

5<sup>th</sup> If these conditions are not complied with, he shall forfeit his rights to said land and it shall remain open for another.

In testimony whereof I command that this title be taken for good and valid and that it be recorded in the corresponding book, and this delivered to the person interested for his safety and other ends.
