

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5 Petition

To the Board of Commissioners for ascertaining and
settling private Land claims in the State of
California.

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The petitioners Samuel G Reed and
Reuben S Illarde both of Boston in Massachusetts
respectfully represent to your honorable board that
they claim a certain tract of Land called the
Rancho del Puerto, containing three leagues more
or less, situated in the County of San Joaquin, said
State of California; that they claim the same in
fee by virtue of a grant made to Mariano Hernan
^{Pedro Hernandez} de Leon under the Authority of the Mexican Government
by Mariano Michel Torre Governor of the
Department of the Californias, bearing date June
20th A D 1844 and approved by the Territorial
Deputation on the day, if at all to your petitioners
now unknown.

Your petitioners further represent that
that the said grantee on the 16th day of August
A D 1847 transferred all the right in said land
to Abram Grimes, and that said Grimes by his death
of the Eleventh day of June A D 1850 conveyed
all his right being the same received from the
said original grantee to your petitioners.

Your petitioners would further
represent that the said original grantee of said tract
of Land was given to the said grantee if at all
on a day to your petitioners unknown, since the
descendees thereof designated and defined, and
that they and those claiming under them have
been in the possession thereof ever since.
And that they have no knowledge of any encroaching
claim.

Your petitioners present herewith a true copy
of the original grant of said Land in the Spanish
language together with a translation of the same
and will make further proof of title if required
by the Board.

Your petitioners pray your honorable
board to take into consideration their claim to said
tract of Land, and decree their title to be valid
and confirm the same. And your petitioners will
ever pray

Hernandez whose first name I do not now recollect
etc. I also knew John Benton who was at that
time first Alcalde of the Pueblo of San Jose and
Charles White who was his Clerk. John Benton
and Charles White are now deceased.

Question. Look upon the document
marked "Exhibit No 1 A F" file in this case and
state whether you know the signatures of John Ben-
ton Alcalde, Charles White Clr, and Isaac Brink-
an, and if so whether their signatures wherever they
occur in and upon the said document are their true
and genuine signatures?

Answer. I do know the signatures
of John Benton Alcalde, and Charles White
Clr. I have often seen them write and sign their
names, and their signatures wherever they occur
in and upon the said document are true and
genuine. The signature of Isaac Brinkman
thereupon is my own signature.

This day before Comr. Alpheus Felch came John M Murphy a witness in behalf of the claimants in Case No. 309 and after being duly sworn deposed as follows.

Question by Mr Whitcomb Atty for claimants
1 Question. What are your name age
and place of residence?

Answer. My Name is John M Murphy. My age twenty eight years and I reside at San Jose Santa Clara County California

2^d Question. How long have you lived in California and what has been your principal place of residence

Answer. I have been in California since the fall of 1844 and have resided a greater portion of the time in Santa Clara Valley

3^d Question. Do you know Mariano Hernandez and Pedro Hernandez and if so when did you first know them?

Answer. I know them both. I know them well since I came into the country in the fall of 1844

4^d Question. Do you know the tract of Land called "Rancho del Puerto" and if so where is it situated and how long have you known it?

Answer. I have known it since the month of June or July A.D. 1847. It lies on a hillside, but only well over it without knowing whose it was. It is situated on the west side of the San Joaquin River. In 1847 Mr Duram names employee a Surveyor at San Jose to go and Survey the Ranch and I went with the Surveyor. Mr. Names at that time had purchased the Ranch. We went on to the Ranch -

The Surveyor built a pile of stones and put a stick on it as a corner. The corner was close to the foot of the hills. He then ran a line in a North Easterly direction to the River San Joaquin. He marked some trees at the place

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where he struck the river, and then swam up the river and made another corner close to the bank of the river, near the mouth of a small creek called the Prestimbee creek. I do not recollect the distance run between these two corners. He then struck in a direction about South West to the hills where he formed a corner - He ran down along the foot of the low hills to the place of commencement.

5th December. Do you see any cattle or horses on the place at that time? And was there any carcasses or dead things on it? I saw some horses on it, There was also a very large boat on it.

6th December. Do you know by whom the horse was killed?

Answer. I do not of my own knowledge. Mariano Hernandez told me that he killed it. Some persons who were with us at the time of the robbery also said that Hernandez killed it.

The Clerk will now give his opinion to this answer.

7th December. Where is Mariano Hernandez now?
Answer. I do not know. The last time I saw him he was in the custody of the Sheriff of Santa Clara County, under a charge of murder and he made his escape from custody - This was in 1850 or 1851.

8th December. Took on the document and note here presented to you Mariano "Exhibit No 1 with the exhibits at F" file in this case and hereto attached purporting to be an original letter given by Governor Michellorano on the 30th day of January 1844 to Mariano and Pedro Hernandez.

And also on the same paper a deed of transfer from them and Mariano de Rosario Hernandez to William Barnes dated August 16 1847. And please whether the signatures of Mariano Michellorano Charles White, and John Burton are their true and genuine signatures. Please also whether you are

acquainted with the hand writing of these persons respectively?

Answer. I know the signatures of each of those persons and have seen them sign frequently. These signatures are the genuine signatures of these persons, because while and John Bereton are dead. At the time of the date of the above mentioned deed of transfer John Bereton was just deceased and Sacie White was heir to him.

Questions by Mr Greenhaw opposite Sacie Agre

1st Question. Who made the Survey of which you speak?

Answer. James D. Hiram.

2nd Question. Was it made under the direction of any Magistrate or other authority?

Answer. I do not know.

3rd Question. Was any Magistrate or other authority present when it was made?

Answer. There was not.

Question by Mr. Whetstone

1st Question. From 1844 to 1847 what was the condition of the country where the Ranch is situated in reference to Indian depredations?

Answer. The Indians were very bad at that time all along the creeks of the San Joaquin River. No one family would go out there to live at that time. They could not keep stock there.

Question by Mr. Greenhaw.

1st Question. Were there any families living in the San Joaquin Valley in the years last mentioned?

Answer. There were not. The last person living there was Mr. Sinsay, who was killed in the early part of the year 1848. He lived on the Ranch now claimed by Leavenworth and Hammon.

his Evidence being interpreted by the Secretary

1st Question. What is your name age
and place of residence

Answer. My name is Pedro Hernandez I am thirty four years of age and reside
in the vicinity of San Jose

2nd Question. Are you acquainted
with the "Rancho de la Peceta" if so state
all you know in regard to its inhabitation
and cultivation, and by whom and also state
whether you have one of the original grants

Answer. I am acquainted with
said Rancho, myself and brother went to examine
the lands in question to see whether they
should petition for, and were a small
parcel on it. This was in the year 1844. Soon
after this my brother went to Monterey and
petitioned for said place in our joint names
we received the grant when we immediately
went to San Jose; and took stock to the Rancho

I believe this was in the month
of September of the same year. We had four
Milk cows and eleven grey horses
In the same year the same horses were
killed a horse and another large horse
was ploughed Mels & Calabas. I was there
a very short time but my brother remained
on the place more than a year, my brother
left the place on account of the hostility
of the Indians, he sold the place, and it
was properly sold.

3rd Question. Look on the document
now shown you marked "S. L. No 1" and pur-
porting to be a true copy of the Especial in
this case, and state whether the points of the
Complaint represented on the map which
is a part of said document are correctly
represented, and state on which side of the

San Joquin river, the Rancho del Pintado is situated, and also State whether the Rancho of Valentino Hegener is correctly located on said Map, and which end of said Rancho Pintado it bounds, and whether the Arroyos represented on said Map are correctly located and between which of the Arroyos there resides said Rancho Pintado?

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Ans. I don't know on which

end of the Rancho Pintado the Rancho of Hegener is situated - The Rancho Pintado lies between the Arroyos de los Guardas and de la Pintada. Those Arroyos are well known and can now be found. The names on said Map should be reversed in order to represent the true points of the Campas.

This day came before Peter Lotte Commissioner for
taking testimony to be used before the Board
of U. S. Land Commissioners in said State Pedro
Hernandez, a witness on behalf of the claimant
Samuel G Reece et al - in Case No. 509 On
the Docket of said Board, and said witness
being sworn deposed as follows in Spanish
which was interpreted to said Board as
follows:

1st. Question. What is your name
age and residence

Answer. My name is Pedro Hernandez
My age thirty four years, my residence in

Santa Clara California.

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2^d Question. Look at the map contained in the Document No. 10000 to you Maree "A P & L" as an Exhibit to this deposition and state on which side of the San Joaquin river the Rancho claimed in this case is located, and on which side of the "Valentine River" it is located?

Answer. The Rancho claimed in this case is situated on the West side of the San Joaquin river, and on the South of Sutter's Ranchos. In my deposition given in this case before Commissioner Thompson I deposed on the 19th day of January A.D. 1854 in my answer to the 3^d question therein I stated as follows written "The needle on said map should be reversed in order to represent the true points of the compass."

I wish now to correct what I then said as follows: This map is incorrect in its delineation in this way, the San Joaquin river as has been drawn appears to be on the West side of the Rancho in question, whereas it ought to be on the East or right hand side of the map, and the hills called on the map "Sierrineo" which appear on the South East or right hand side of said map ought to be laid on the West or left hand side.

It will now correct the error by reversing the needle as I before proposed in my former deposition, because the creeks (arroyos) are correctly laid down as respects their Northward and Southward relations according to the needle as it stands on the map, and so also is Sutter's Ranch North of the Arroyo de la Peñola, and the needle is right respecting that. The map is correct in all other respects, except the one I have mentioned. "The Sierrineo" mentioned are known as the Sierra of the Peñola.

3^d Question. When you first went to live on the ranch claimed in this case were the Indians very troublesome in that vicinity?

Answer. When I first went onto the said Rancho the Indians were not very troublesome, they were committing depredations to some extent about there, but not to any great extent, but about six months after that they became very troublesome, so that we were in danger, and we were driven off from the place by them in 1845. the next year after we went there to live.

4th Question. Did you and your brother Mariano ever ask for judicial possession of said place?

Answer. Yes we did several times, of Dolores Pacheco and Salvo Pacheco from the time we lived there we began to ask it of them, but they never came to give it. On the same of the troubles with the Mexicans. They were the Compromisers in giving judicial possession of said place.

Crop Examined by the United States Apocate Law Agent.

1st Question. Do you know the Southern boundary of said Rancho claimed.

Answer. The boundary on the South is the Arroyo de Gestonbee.

2^d Question. When you obtained your grant in this case did you know that the Mexicans were troublesome in that quarter.

Answer. I did not

3^d Question. Did you live in that neighbourhood at the time you obtained said grant.

Answer. I resided on the lands claimed at that time.

Question 4th. Had the Indians been troublesome there at any time while you were getting said grant, or previous thereto?

Answer. No. they have never troubled us to that time



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This claim is founded on a grant made
by Gov. Manuel Michel Cornejo to Mariano
and Pedro Hernandez on the 30th. of
January 1844, the original of which is
filed in the case and its genuineness
proven. A traced copy of the Especial
from the Archives Conceding a map
of the premises granted is also introduced
here. It appears from the testimony that
an error occurred in drawing said map
by representing the land as lying on
the East, instead of the West side of
the San Joaquin River, but the error is
readily corrected by reference to the natural
objects and other boundaries represented
on the map and called for in the grant
with this correction there can be but
little difficulty in locating the land
claimed. The evidence shows that
the grantees went on the premises shortly
after they obtained the grant, built a
house in which they lived and a
corral, they also placed stock upon and
cultivated a portion of it, and continued
such occupation until they were comp-
elled to leave to leave in the following
year in consequence of the hostility of the
