



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Petition

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners created by Act of Congress of the United States approved March 3<sup>rd</sup> A.D. 1837 to ascertain and settle private Land Claims in the State of California

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Roland Gelston a citizen of Monmouth County in the State of New Jersey humbly petitioning shews unto your Honorable Body that sometime previous to the 18<sup>th</sup> day of June A.D. 1841 One Augustus Sutter a Native of the Republic of Switzerland and naturalized in the Mexican Nation did in Conformity with the Law of said Republic enacted on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of August A.D. 1824 and regulations of the 25<sup>th</sup> of November A.D. 1828 asked advice more appear by reference to paper hereunto annexed and marked Exhibit (A) for his personal benefit and that of 12 families to lease of Land on the Margins of the River Sacramento in the vacant Lands of the frontiers of the North to Colonize and improve them in the terms mentioned in said Law to which end he has sufficiently accredited his laboriousness, good conduct and other qualifications required in such cases and has already in advance manifested his great efforts his constant firmness and truly patriotic zeal in favor of our institutions by reducing to civilization a quantity of savage Indians Natives of those frontiers and this Government. Being sufficiently informed that said Lands do not belong to any private property of any individual Town or Corporation, and that consequently they belong to those classified in said Law: I have in Conformity with the powers conferred upon me in the name of the Mexican Nation granted to the said Augustus Sutter, by these presents for himself and his Colonists, the said Land named New Helvetic, subject to the approval or disapproval of the Supreme Government and of the most Excellent Departmental Junta, under the following conditions as well more fully appear by reference to paper hereunto annexed marked Exhibit (B) to which your petitioner begs leave respectfully to refer your Honorable Board for full and further particulars

And your petitioner further humbly shews unto your Honorable Body that in answer

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to the said petition of the said Augustus Sutter to his Excellency John B Alvarado Constitutional Governor of the California that a certain tract of Land more particularly described in said paper herunto annexed Marked Exhibit (B) as aforesaid to the said Augustus Sutter in manner and form and for purposes, and upon the conditions therein stated and mentioned, and that by virtue of said Grant, said Sutter did enter upon and take possession of the Land described in the aforesaid mentioned Grant as in fee simple, and has for a long time, to wit, for the space of ten years now last passed held and enjoyed the peaceable possession of the Land described in said petition and part exercising the full and exclusive jurisdiction and undisturbed Ownership over the same, saving and excepting such parts and parcels thereof as the said Sutter has from time to time sold aliened and conveyed by deed to various persons for good and valuable Considerations.

And your petitioner further shows unto your Honorable Body that on the 28th day of January A.D. 1850 said Augustus Sutter did by deed duly executed and acknowledged by him, bargain sell assign, and convey unto your petitioner and Gilbert A Grant a certain tract or parcel of Land being a part of said Land described in the Grant herein before mentioned & particularly described in the above mentioned deed, a copy of which is hereto annexed Marked Exhibit (C)

That subsequently to wit, on the 11th day of May A.D. 1850 said Gilbert A Grant by his release and quit claim bargained sold and conveyed unto Thomas A McComb, John S Day and John F Morse one undivided half part of the whole said tract of Land described in the before mentioned deed of the said Sutter to the said Gilston and Grant, said deed bearing date the 28th January A.D. 1850. as well more fully appear by reference to a copy of said Conveyance from said Grant to said McComb, Day & Morse herunto annexed and Marked Exhibit (D).

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and that subsequently to the said 11th day of May A.D. 1850, to wit on the 30th day of November A.D. 1850 the said undivided half part of said tract or parcel of land conveyed by said Grant to said McClure, Stuy, and Morse, was conveyed bargained sold and assigned unto the said Roland Gelston by Joseph Cloogh as the Attorney in fact of the said McClure, Stuy and Morse as well more fully appear by Notice of an erroneous cable power of Attorney from said McClure, Stuy and Morse, and assigns, a copy of which is herewith annexed marked Exhibit (E) together with a copy of said Cloogh's deed to said Gelston also herewith annexed marked Exhibit (F) to which reference is also made.

And your petitioner further shows that subsequently to this, to wit, on the 30th day of November A.D. 1850 your petitioner by his Deed of Release and quit Claim did sell assign and convey unto the said Augustus Gutter a certain part of said Original tract or parcel of Land just described as sold and conveyed by the said Gutter to the said Gelston and Grant: said tract or parcel of Land last mentioned being particularly described in the Deed of the said Gelston to the said Gutter, a copy of which is herewith annexed and marked Exhibit (G)

And your petitioner further shows that the balance of said tract of Land just described and mentioned herein, particularly described marked and shown here as per map or diagram of the same herein to annexed marked Exhibit (H) belongs to your petitioner in fee simple, by virtue of all and singular the Acts and Grants of the Mexican Government and the validity of the several Deeds of Conveyance above mentioned and referred to, saving and excepting, only such right or claim or title of any as may belong to the United States of America

And your petitioner says that in view of the premises, that the said United States of America have no right title or interest whatever in said land all of which

Your petitioner is ready to verify by documentary evidence and the testimony of decess good and true witnesses

And your petitioner further shoves unto your Honorable Body, that all the conditions stipulations and requirements, imposed upon the Saice Acquestes Sutter by the terms of the aforesaid Mexican Grant essential to its validity, have been strictly complied with by the Saice Acquestes Sutter, all of which your petitioner will also show by the testimony of witnesses as aforesaid who have by the title of Saice to Saice Land in fee become and were vested in Saice Sutter, and that he was the sole and only true owner of Saice Land and had good right and lawful authority to convey unto your petitioner the Land aforesaid

In view of all which your petitioner prays, that as a Board of United States Commissioners duly appointed for that purpose you will proceed to ascertain settle and confirm this one of the "Private Land Claims of the State of California" meaning the Original Claim of the Saice Acquestes Sutter by reason of the grant aforesaid, or such parts thereof as to your Honorable Board shall seem meet and proper according to the proceedings of Saice in that behalf made and proceeded, doing and securing unto your petitioner all legal and equitable rights, equities and privileges secured to him by law as aforesaid and particularly declared by the Act of Congress approved and entitled as herein before mentioned, to the end that your petitioner may have his right in and title to Saice aforesaid Land of Saice settled, determined and confirmed by favorable report of your Honorable Body, to the intent that a Patent from the United States may issue to your petitioner, according to and vesting in him the title of Saice Land in fee simple forever

And as in duty bound your petitioner will ever pray &c.

a witness on the part of the Claimant Roland  
Selston, petition No. 6 and was duly sworn  
his evidence being given in English

The Associate Law Agent was present

In answer to inquiries by the Claimants concerned  
the witness testifies as follows.

My name is Gilbert A Grant  
My age is thirty six years and I reside in San  
Francisco.

Question. What do you know about  
the Southern and Eastern lines of the Grant  
of New Helvetia to John A. Sutter?

Answer. I was one of the original  
purchasers with Roland Selston of the land  
claimed in this case. The Southern line was  
pointed out to me by Captain Sutter while  
we were on a Steam Boat about the month  
of January 1850 & I was directed by him where  
to find the blazed tree on the Eastern line  
The blazed tree is a few rods above Sutters  
Mill down on the American River, about  
nine miles from its mouth. The Southern  
boundary as pointed out by Capt. Sutter was  
a Slough emptying into the Sacramento at  
that distance above the house Kadee about  
eight to ten miles below the mouth of the  
American River. The house of Kadee  
stands on the site of the Town of Helvetia  
I have never heard these boundaries quest  
ioned in their vicinity. The blazed tree is  
on the line between the Sutter Grant & the  
Leicasdorff Ranch.

Question by the Associate Law Agent  
What is the extent of the land conveyed by  
Sutter to Selston

Answer. I suppose it may be  
four or five leagues according to the map  
which is attached to the petition in this case  
If it does not include lands usually overflowed

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by the area at high water the quantity would be considerably less

San Francisco April 5. 1853

On this day before Comr. William Hall came Richard A. House a witness on the part of the Claimant Roland Gelstonpetition No. 6 and was duly sworn his evidence being given in English

The U. S. Associate Law Agent was present

In answer to inquiries by Counsel for the claimant the witness testified as follows.

My name is Richard A. House my age is thirty two years & I reside in the City of Sacramento and my profession is that of a Civil Engineer.

Do you know anything about the part of the new selected grant to John A. Sutter lying South of the American & East of the Sacramento River in the vicinity of Sutter's Fort & if so how did you obtain your information & knowledge?

I am acquainted with that locality and obtained my knowledge by a survey of it

What date was furnished you to make the survey?

I was furnished with a copy of the plat of survey by Vogel & Co. dated from John A. Sutter to Roland Gelston

Did you find any and what occurrences in the survey you made?

Answer. I found a blazed tree on the Bank of the American River, about fifty yards above Sutter's dam & a big slough

On the Sacramento river. The distance from the mouth of the American River in a direct line to the beaver tree is about nine miles - The distance of the Sloop from the mouth of the American River along and down the Sacramento might be fourteen or fifteen miles. And in a straight line nine or ten miles. There is another Sloop that empties into the Sacramento on the East side below the mouth of the American until this is reached the Sloop is almost a mile above the house of an Old Settler named Kadee

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Look upon a map now shown you which is attached to the petition to the Board of Commissioners in this case marked S. S. No. 1 and say what you know of it?

Answer. It is a copy of the original map which I made from my survey

question by the Associate Survey Agent when was your survey made?

Answer. It was completed in August 1850

How did you know that the trees were in place in New Helvetia

Answer. From the map before mentioned & from common report

Deposition of Tobias Kadee

San Francisco April 15th 1853

On this day before Commissioners Harry J Thorton came Tobias Kadee a witness on the part of the Claimant Roland Gibson petition No. 6 and was duly sworn his evidence being given in English

Questions by Claimant  
Question 1st. What is your name age and place of residence and how long have you resided there?

Ans. My name is Tobias Kadel my age is 43 years and my <sup>residence</sup> is Sacramento County California where I have lived ever since the year 1846

Question 3<sup>d</sup>. Are you acquainted with the Land claimed in this Case called New Helvetia, of your State if you know what the boundaries of the said claim are

Ans. I am acquainted with the Rancho called New Helvetia. I am not acquainted with the boundaries of this Rancho I was interested in making myself acquainted with the Southern boundary line for the purpose of obtaining Land for myself so as not to be within it I made several search and examination and ascertained as I believe the beginning or Corner of the said Southern boundary. This was in the year 1846 the Corner to which I allude to and which was indicated by some marks on the trees near on a Slough making a bend from the Sacramento River and about thirty yards from the mouth of the Slough on the South side of said Slough which Slough is about six miles below the mouth of the American Fork by Land

San Francisco March 22, 1854

This day personally came before Peter Lott a Commissioner for taking testimony to be used before the Board of U.S. Land Commissioners in said State John A. Sutter, a witness on behalf of the Claimant in Case No. 6 on the Docket of said Board; in which, the said John A. Sutter being duly sworn deposed in English as follows to wit

J. M. McKune Esq. the U.S. Law Agent was present.

Questions by E. Johnson Esq. Atty for Claimant

Question 1. What is your name age and present place of residence

Answer. My name is John A. Sutter my age 51. My residence Stock Farm Sutter County California

Question 2. Please to state what you know of the Eastern boundary of the Grant of New Helvetia to Yonusef.

Answer. It is an Oak tree marked by Capt. Beagle in 1840. That tree is on the South Side of the American River immediately on the Bank of the River a few yards above a mill dam built by me

Question 3. Were you present when Capt. Beagle set this boundary

Answer. I was present, it was in the evening, and I rode home with him

Question 4. In what direction does the Eastern line run from this tree?

Answer. It runs in a Southernly direction bearing E. 30° S. and six miles

Question 5. What is the South eastern boundary?

Answer. It was a line running Westwardly about six miles distant, from the American River.

Question 6. For what purpose was this survey made by Capt. Beagle?

Answer. That I was present the plan to the Government.

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Question 7. For what purpose did you wish to present this plan to the Government and what Government do you mean?

Answer. I mean the Mexican Government and my object was to let the Government know what Land I occupied and wished to be granted to me

Question 8. What was the Western termination of the Southern boundary first mentioned by you?

Answer. It was latitude  $38^{\circ} 48' 32''$  On the map filed in Case 92 and which is now before me

Question 9. Who was Alcalde of the District when the Grant of New Mexico was made to you by the Mexican Government

Answer. There was no Alcalde there at that time, but I acted as Alcalde - I was the title of President of the Government on the Northern Frontier and charged with the duties of a Justice

Question 10. How long had you then resided on this land

Answer. One year previous or about one year

Question 11. Had you then at the time of the survey, made any improvements on the land?

Answer. Yes I had some adobe houses, some grass houses, corns garden and fields

Question 12. What crops had you planted or sown at that time?

Answer. Wheat and different vegetables

Question 13. In what direction from where the Fort now stands were these things planted

Answer. On the North and West sides

Question 14. Have you ploughed and cultivated the lands east of the Fort

Answer. Yes in 1841. I broke the ground up for a vineyard and planted

15-  
 vines where Breghon now stands, in different  
 places between Breghon and the fort. I sowed  
 wheat wherever there was good ground for it,  
 in the fall of 1841 I began to fortify by build-  
 ing a bastion on the best side, and continued  
 4 years building the fort.

I then began to employ  
 all kinds of mechanics, established a tin and  
 shoe and saddle factory, blanket factory  
 hat factory, horse mill, distillery, and  
 brewery, blacksmiths, carpenters & cooper &c.

Question 15. When did you comm-  
 ence building your mill and in what direc-  
 tion from the fort

Answer. I began to build two  
 miles in the Spring of 1847 - a saw mill in  
 the mountains, and a flour mill on the spot  
 where Breghon stands, the mill was erected  
 just a little below the Oak tree mentioned in  
 this deposition, the mill cost about \$24,000 -  
 in horses, cattle and commodities

Question 16. When did the place  
 named first receive the title of New Helvetia

Answer. In 1840 I gave it the  
 name of New Helvetia, and I asked the Govern-  
 ment to give it that name, when I applied  
 for the grant. I came in 1839, and called the  
 place Nueva Helvetia so soon as I settled  
 on it, in 1839

Question 17. State what land was  
 embraced in New Helvetia?

Answer. According to the plan  
 furnished the Government, I knew it embraced  
 more, but the fort was the head quarters of  
 New Helvetia before the grant was made or  
 application for it, the fort and its vicinity were  
 understood to be all of New Helvetia after  
 the application and grant. All the land embrac-  
 ed in the plan or map in Claim No. 92 was  
 called New Helvetia

Question 18. Was Hook's Farm  
 and New Helvetia known as two distinct places  
 before the grant was made?

Answer, <sup>no</sup>, Hook's Farm was built

about 11 years ago.

Question 19. At the time Capt. Bioge made the survey did he make any observations or remarks to you respecting the latitude?

This question objected to by the U. S. Land Agent as irrelevant and secondary evidence

Answer. Yes, he said he had surveyed as well as he could with those instruments. He took his observations with an artificial horizon ascertained with Molayes instead of quick silver, and with a quadrant without the Chronometer.

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Question 20. Were Stock Farm and New Helvetia known as two separate and distinct places after the settlement was made at the former place

Answer. Yes. Stock Farm was occupied by my block and the Fort by myself

Question 21. Have you any interest whatever in the lands claimed in this case No. 6 by Capt. Belton?

Answer. I have no interest in the land claimed by him in this case

Question 22. When did you part with your interest in it?

Answer. About the year 1855  
Crop Examined by the U. S. Land Agent

Question 1. When did you arrive in California?

Answer. In July 1839

Question 2. What were you and in what employe in July 1840?

Answer. I was at the place called New Helvetia, farming, breeding &c

Question 3. Was that before or after the land granted?

Answer. Yes I began to build immediately on my arrival, it was about a year before the grant.

Question 4. How long before the grant was made did you employ Bioge to survey the land?

Answer. About a half a year

Question 5. At what season of the year

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 will he make the survey?

Answer. In the Spring about February or March.

Question 6. How long will it take him to make his survey?

Answer. I do not recollect distinctly, about 5 or 6 weeks. I was not with him generally. I sent an Amos free with him and I was necessarily at home to look after its protection against the Indians.

Question 7. When did you first see the three Buttes and are they the same mountains called "Les Tres Picos" in your grant?

Answer. They are the same. I went there first, when George first came, before he began the survey. I went to see some Canadians who were there trapping.

Question 8. How far are the three Buttes from Sutter's fort?

Answer. I do not know exactly about sixty miles I think.

Question 9. Where did George first commence his survey?

Answer. I do not know, he took the upper part first.

Question 10. State what land mark is at the Southern Terminus of the Eastern line mentioned in your answer to 2<sup>nd</sup> Question?

Answer. I do not know of any land mark there.

Question 11. How do you know the Eastern line runs South by East?

Answer. I do not know exactly and don't like to make a mistake, it was fixed by George when I showed him what land to take in.

Question 12. What are your means of knowledge that the Eastern line was ever measured?

Answer. "George told me so, he told me he had surveyed it."

Question 13. Did he describe to you what boundaries he had surveyed?

Answer. Yes he described them to

to me, but I cannot describe them. I cannot  
with out reading over the papers or having my  
papers, tell much about them.

Question 14. Did Biogge inform  
you how he run the Eastern line, if you <sup>what</sup> inform  
ation did he give you?

Answer. It is now so long ago  
I do not know what information Biogge gave me

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Question 15. Are there any land  
marks along the Eastern line to give you  
in knowing its direction, if you what  
are they?

Answer. I do not remember any land  
marks, Capt. Biogge can tell you better, as  
he run the line.

Question 16. Did you ever see  
the South East Corner, if you, what marks it?

Answer. I do not remember seeing  
it and do not remember a particular mark  
I have been out there but do not know  
any mark I could find the corner if I  
had been there to look. I do not know  
of any particular mark at the corner. It is  
an open prairie, the country is changed and  
many trees have been cut down, and any  
particular tree marks for a corner may have  
been cut down.

Question 17. What land marks do  
you know on the Southern line?

Answer. I know of none, I have  
to refer to the Surveyor.

Question 18. How do you know the  
Southern boundary runs at six miles distance  
from the American line?

Answer. From the later Surveys  
of Capt. Belton, Col Grant and Mr Hall, the  
Surveyor of Capt. Seesdoff

Question 19. When were those  
Surveys made, do they all correspond, or which  
do you refer to?

Answer. Capt. Seesdoff and I agree  
there we would have the boundary according  
to the plat of my Land. I agree with Capt  
Belton Jan 28. 1850 my agreement with Seesdoff

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was prior to that time. I think was in the year 1844 the later surveys all correspond with each other I have seen the maps, Cape Gelsin's, was made by Mr. Chase, Secasdorffs by Mr Hall I think in 1845. Gelsin's map was made soon after our agreement in 1850

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Question 20. Have you described all of the Eastern boundary of your grant of New Helvidia?

Answer. From the Oak tree I have mentioned to a point 6 miles South by East from it is the whole of my Eastern line I now refer to the line between my grant and Cape Secasdorff, South of the American river I cannot explain these boundaries, I am given none by the map and cannot testify accurately without the surveys, they are the basis of my knowledge, except in some general best line of portions of the boundaries of which I have spoken, which I have seen and with which I am more familiar

Question 21. Does the Eastern boundary of your grant cross the American river if you, at what point?

Answer. Yes at the mouth of the American Fork.

Question 22. How far north does the line then extend after crossing said river?

Answer. I am not personally familiar enough with these lines to give testimony satisfactory to myself I am not willing to make mistakes under oath, and I cannot answer the question definitely. I refer to the surveys which I have been made by Cape Beagle.

Question 23. Do you know where a house called Sincerus was situated?

Answer. Yes, on the North side of the American River.

Question 24. Do you know what the Southern Corner of your grant on the Sacramento river is?

Answer. Yes it is a slough

Question 25. Describe a line drawn

from that point to Sinclair's house from any part of the Southern boundary of that grant?

Answer. No.

Question 16. Did you settle on your grant permanently 12 persons between 1841 and 1845, if yes. State their names, where each was settled and when, and how long each one remained so settled?

Answer. Yes a great many more than 12 which were proved more than 2 years ago, I do not now remember the names. I have them at home and am not now prepared to name them. They were settled on different parts of my land. I will give this testimony in writing I cannot now recollect distinctly. Some were below near the Fort and some were as high up as Brighton on the American Fork and even higher than Brighton. I recollect Perry McLeon, he was at the old adobe house above Brighton, he came I think as early as 1840. The man came with him, McLeon left a few years afterwards, Montgomery settled where Brighton is, Sinclair was settled where the Sheep Corral was, Sudd was settled and lived several years, James Smith, just above Montgomery, he was in my employment, and did not build a house this is all I now recollect below, I cannot without referring to my books and papers tell more now.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. Are you acquainted with the Land claimed in this case as the grant to John A. Sutter called New Helvetia?

Answer. I am.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. When did you first visit that place?

Answer. I arrived there in the fall of 1841.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. How long did you remain there?

Answer. Until the latter part of 1844.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. State what you know of the use, Occupation and Cultivation of that Land by John A. Sutter during that time?

Answer. During that time the Fort was built, fences were fences and ditches and the ground was cultivated with grain and vegetables. I remember that a vineyard was planted on the American Fork, and Corns were there for Sutter's Stock about the year 1843. Sutter had during the time I was there about 3000 head of Cattle on the place, and from 300 to 400 head of horses and mares. There was an excellent house near the bank of the American Fork.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. Is or is not the Land claimed subject to Bonifacio?

Answer. I do remember of any encroachment above the Fort on the American River.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Did you ever hear of any proposition being made to Gen Sutter by the Mexican Government to purchase New Helvetia?

Answer. Yes. It was publicly spoken of that Jose Gaspar was commissioned by the Government to make him an offer for the place.

8<sup>th</sup> Question. How many families were settled at that time on the New Helvetia name?

Answer. I cannot state positively

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the number of families at that time settled there, but I suppose there have been from 15 to 20.

9th. Question. How were you employed during the time you remained there?

Answer. I had the superintendance of the agricultural department in John A. Sutter's employment.

10th. Question. Have you visited this land since 1844? if you state what further improvements were there made and if any of the land was then under cultivation.

Answer. I was there in the summer of 1848 found a large mill race built and several houses erected on the land. I found a field of wheat and a mill race cut, there might have been from 30 to 40 acres in wheat

traces examined by the U. S. Law Agent

11th. Question. Do you read Spanish?

Answer. Yes Sir.

12th. Question. Do you know what was the northern boundary of the tract called New Helvetia?

Answer. The northern boundary was said to be near the three Beckles (Tres Beckles) (Tres Picos) They are about 55 or 60 miles from the Fort.

13th. Question. What is the eastern boundary?

Answer. The eastern boundary was said to pass six miles eastward from the Fort in a northerly direction. I cannot state to what precise point tho I suppose to the northern limits as far as the Beckles.

14th. Question. Would not that line comprehend James' Ranch on the north side of the American?

Answer. It is quite evident it would include a part of James' Ranch.

15th. Question. How do you know this land was claimed under the New Helvetia name?

Answer. I was repeatedly infor-

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ed so by John A Sutter, that was all the way I knew it.

7th. Question. Were those improvements you have mentioned contained within the tract of Land described as follows " On the North the three peaks, on the East the Margin of the River de las Plumas, on the South Latitude  $38^{\circ} 49' 33''$  On the West the River Sacramento?"

Answer. The improvements I spoke of would none of them be included within those boundaries, tho' I do not know precisely what the latitude mentioned in the question runs.

8th. Question. How many families did leave Sutter settle in Sacramento Valley on Land he claimed, what was the name of each when was it settled and how long it remained so settled?

Answer. I am not able to tell their names, Nicolas Alger at Feather River settled in 1842. he still lives there. Gordon at Bear Creek about 1844 one or two miles from the mouth of Bear Creek I do not know whether he has left. Leonard at Yuba River came 1842, left in 1850 I believe Jack Smith at Yuba River in 1843 or 1844 I do not know when he left. He lived there several years

Stannus came 1844 or 1845  
Breacham settled on the Sacramento near below the Fork, he came about 1842 he was there several years and may still be there.  
Meccaenna he was near the mouth of the American Fork he came in 1842 or 1843 he died.

Sonclan at American Fork 3 miles above the fork, he lived there till about 1848 or 1849, he came before I came he must have come in 1839 or 1840. Perry McLoon at American River, came in 1844 or 1845 he lived there some time, do not know whether he died or left.

Three brothers by the name of Williams, they came about 1844

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 and settled at American Fork, cannot say whether they left. Keyser settled at Bear Creek about 1844 lived there till he died.

Chamberlain lived at the Fort he was there when I came in 1841 and remained there several years. Dayla was also at the Fort when I came he remained there till after I left. Atkinson was settled on the American Fork just below where Chamberlain was, he came about 1843 or 1844. Do not know whether he is still there, he was there when I left. There were a number of families in the Fort whose names I do not recollect.

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9th Question. Were not most of these men working for Capt. Sutter in his Employment?

Answer. No.

10th Question. How many of them had land opened to them?

Answer. I cannot say precisely, I do not know the particulars of that, but all those that were settled outside of the Fort, cultivated the land. I do not know on what terms.

11th Question. When did Capt. Sutter's son come to this country?

Answer. His eldest son I think came in 1848

Recommended by Attorney for claimant

12th Question. Please state what manner of factories were established at the Fort or in the vicinity, and how many men were employed in those establishments?

Answer. There were, the time when I was there, two Blacksmiths shops a wagon maker, a plow maker, a cooper, a soap factory, a hattery, a tannery, a blanket factory, a saddlery, a shoe maker & a Tailor Shop. There were employed in these from 20 to 25 men.

13th Question. Have you ever seen the Original map of New Settlement made by Wier?

Answer. I have. I saw it at Sutter's Fort  
about 1841 when I arrived.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. According to that  
map does the parallel of North Latitude  
38° 49' 30" South or North of Sutter's Fort?

Answer. On that map, that  
degree was laid down as South of the  
Fort.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. Do you know what  
the Eastern Land mark on the American  
side is of Sutter's Grant?

Answer. I was shown a  
blazed tree by Cape Sutter in 1843 as the  
mark of his Eastern line there, it was  
about six miles East of the Fort on the  
South bank of the American River. I am  
not positive as to this

3<sup>rd</sup> Question. What do you know  
of the loss or destruction of the original

grant to John A. Sutter?

Answer. I only know from what John S. Fowler told me and from Comman Report. I know the grant was in the possession of John S. Fowler, he had his office in Col. Zebuskies building, which was burnt about May 1851 I think. Everything about the building was destroyed.

4th. Question. When did you first visit the land claimed in this case?

Answer. I passed over it the first time about July 1849.

5th. Question. Is or is not this land subject to overflow by the currents of the rivers?

Answer. None of it except 2 islands in the area embracing about 125 acres.

6th. Question. Do you know the Eastern boundary of this land, if you, state what you know about it?

Answer. Yes I do know it. It commences at an Oak tree about 30 or 40 yards above the South bank of the American by one Pattersons Stream, the line runs off South and by East, I do not recollect the line exactly, I collect by the map, it runs about 6 miles then at an angle it runs to a Slough on the Sacramento River the big Slough so called, that is the Eastern and partly the Southern line.

7th. Question. State what improvements were on this land in 1849 or 1850 when you first visited it?

Answer. A mill dam and a mill race 6 miles long, adobe houses, mill stones and a foundation of an extensive grist mill. There was no water running in the mill race.

8th. Question. Who was in possession of this land in 1849?

Answer. I do not know, who was in possession in 1849.

9th. Question. State who was

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in possession in 1850

Answer. Roland Geeston was in possession of a portion of it. Roland Geeston and Gilbert A Grant.

10th Question. How long did they remain in possession?

Answer. Grant was in possession about 6 months, Geeston still holds it by tenants under leases.

Crop Examined by U. S. Game Agent.

1 Question. Have you acquainted with the hand writing of Gov. Alvarado

Answer. In those days I considered that I could recognize his hand writing from having frequently seen it tho I doubt whether or I could now recognize it I have never seen him write

2<sup>d</sup> Question. Name the documents which you have seen his signature appended, which enabled you to think you could recognize his hand writing

Answer. In 1850 and 1851 I translated several documents which had his name on them. I cannot now remember what they were. They were grants of land. I translated some for Casa Nueva, I may have seen a half dozen such. I used to see his name as often as once a week. I translated a great many papers, but don't recollect now any which had his name on them except the one I have mentioned. I think I translated papers for Rinpozo Alvarado bearing Alvarado's name. My impression is one was a grant of Murphy's ranch.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. How do you know the documents you speak of as being original was the original document in this case

Answer. I judge it so to be, it has every mark of an original document

4th Question. How do you know the tree you mention at the North East Corner of the Land is the North end of the Eastern line?

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Answer. I know it from having been the agent of those lanes, it was pointed out to me by the Surveyor, it was a land mark of Public Notoriety.

5th. Question. How do you know the direction of the Eastern line? Who established it, when was it done and by what Authority?

Answer. I know the line from the Survey and Map, it was established by Capt Folsom and Colonel Geeson through their respective Surveys the line was run for the mutual satisfaction of both parties Early in 1850. The authority so far as I know was that of Ownership.

6th. Question. Is the land of which you speak within this description "On the North a line drawn East and West through the three Peaks, on the East the margin of the Arroyo de las Flechas (Feather River) on the South, latitude  $38^{\circ} 49' 32''$  on the West the River Sacramento?"

Answer. I suppose the land to be within those boundaries. I should like to know what that latitude is. I believe it to be down about the mouth of the San Joaquin River.

7th. Question. How far is the tract of land claimed in this case South from the junction of the Sacramento and Feather rivers?

Whereas Don Augusto Utrera a Native of the Republic of Switzerland, and Naturalized in Mexico, has solicited in Conformity with the laws of 18th of August 1834 and regulation of 21<sup>st</sup> of November 1838, for his personal benefit and that of twelve families, Eleven leagues of land on the Margin of Sacramento River on the Western Limits of the National Frontier for the purpose of Colonizing and benefiting them upon the terms mentioned in the said laws and regulation; In which purpose he has sufficiently proved his industry, good Character and other qualifications required in such Cases. Having heretofore shown his increased efforts, his Constant Earnest desires, and zeal truly patriotic on behalf of our Institutions by recurring to Civilization a portion of the Native Savage Indians of these Frontiers and this Government having been sufficiently informed that the above mentioned Land does not pertain to private property of any individual, Village or Corporation; and consequently they are as is specified in the said laws; and according to the powers conferred upon me in the name of the Mexican Nation I have granted to him the said Don Augusto Utrera by these presents for himself and his Colonists the said tract of Land by the name of Nueva Esperanza to be subject to approval or disapproval of the Supreme Government of the Honorable Legislative Branch under the following Conditions.

1<sup>st</sup> He may purchase

without detriment to the papago, wages  
and easements, particularly the new trade  
and navigation.

30. He shall take care of  
the Aborigines of the several tribes of those



Augusto Sutter a native of the Republic of Switzerland and Naturalized in the Mexican Nation in Conformity with the Law of the 18th August 1834 and the regulation of the 31<sup>st</sup> November 1834 has petitioned for his own personal benefit and that of twelve families, eleven leagues (Once Sello de ganados Mayas) of lands on the Margin of the Sacramento River upon the public Lands of the Nation situated to Colonize and improve them upon the terms specified in the aforesaid Law and Regulations for which purpose he has respectfully acceded his industry good conduct and other qualifications which are required in these cases, having already anticipated his great exertions, his constant delays and truly patriotic zeal in favor of our institutions, receiving a Member of the Nation success in many of those situated to Country, and the Government being respectfully advised that the said Lands do not pertain to the particular property

of any individuals, Pueblo or Corporation and that they are consequently of those classes of the Law, and in accordance with the powers which are conferred upon me, in the name of the Mexican Nation I have concluded hereby to grant to the Sr. Don. Augusto Gutierrez for himself and his Colonists the aforesaid tract of Land known by the name of Rio del Norte being subject to the approval of the Superior Government and the most Excellent Departmental Junta under the following Conditions.

1<sup>st</sup> He may enclose without prejudice to the existing Laws and Decrees, principally the trade and Navigation of the Rivers

Second. He shall maintain the Natives of the different tribes of the said Section of Country in the enjoyment and liberty of their possessions without molesting them, and he shall reduce them to civilization only by such means as his prudence may dictate and officiously treatment without hostility to them in any manner, without the previous Authority of the Government

Third. The Land of which Donation is made embraces Alam Jitico de guarda Mayor comprehended within the limits designated on the plan which is annexed to the Expediente without including the Lands which are inundated by freshets and the Currents of the Rivers; its boundaries on the North being the three peaks (los tres picos) and Latitude  $39^{\circ} 41' 45''$  North; on the East, the Banks

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of Feather River; on the South, Latitude 38° 49' 32" North; on the West the Sacramento River.

Fourth. When this property is confirmed to him he shall select of the respective Decrees to give the possession of the lands in view that it may be measured according to Law, the Surplus which may result therefrom remaining to the benefit of the Nation for the proper purposes thereof.

Therefore, holding this title as firm and valid I order that an Entry be made thereof in the Corresponding Book, and that this be delivered to the interested party for his Security and other Uses.

Opinion of Roland Gelston  
Borne by  
Com. Thompson vs  
The United States

This is a claim for a portion of the tract of Land situated on the American and Sacramento rivers, and known as New Helvetia, the original title to which was considered and confirmed to the claimant by this Commission in the Case of John A. Sutter vs. The United States being No 92 on the Docket of the Commission.

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The present petitioner has introduced and proved in the case various mesne Conveyances from said Sutter to himself by virtue of which, he alleges that the title to that portion of the above mentioned tract of New Helvetia described in said Conveyances became vested in him.

Those Conveyances consist of the following - 1<sup>st</sup>. A deed from John A. Sutter to Roland Gelston and Gilbert A. Grant dated January 31<sup>st</sup> 1850 conveying to the said grantees two undivided third parts of the following described premises, to wit; commencing at a tree about fifty yards above the mill dam on the American Fork River and some seven miles above the Sacramento City which tree forms the boundary line on said American Fork between said Sutters and Land <sup>formerly</sup> owned by Com A. Seisendorf, thence thence down said American Fork to and including the Old Great Mill site and houses at the outlet of said mill dam and some three and a half miles below on said American Fork thence in a direct line to the lower boundary

of the town of Sutter (late Sutterville) on the Sacramento River; thence down said Sacramento River to the corner or Eastern boundary line of said Sutter's Land on said Sacramento River just above the Town of Colusa at or near a Slough: Thence in a direct line along said Eastern Boundary line to the American Fork at the place of beginning reversing part of the trace so granted any lands that may be granted or land are in "Succors by said Sutter

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2<sup>d</sup>. A deed from said Grants to Thomas A. Marbury of one third of said entire tract dated May 11th 1850 and an instrument written thereunder executed by said Marbury declaring said conveyance to be for the joint benefit of himself W. S. Hayes and John F. Morse.

3<sup>d</sup>. A deed from John A. Sutter Heirs to Rolando Gelston and Thomas Marbury June 20th. 1850 of the remaining one third part of said premises with an instrument thereunder written executed by said Marbury declaring that he held the premises conveyed in trust for himself William S. Hayes and John F. Morse.

4<sup>th</sup>. A deed from said Marbury and Hayes to said Gelston dated Nov. 30th 1850 for one undivided half of said premises.

5<sup>th</sup>. A deed from said Gelston, Marbury, Hayes and Morse to John A. Sutter dated November twenty eighth 1850 conveying to the grantee Sutter a portion of said lands. All of these conveyances are properly proved and authenticated.

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and then effect is to vest in the claimant  
Belton all the lands conveyed by  
Sutton to Belton and Grant except that  
portion reconveyed to Sutton by the last  
last mentioned of the 28th of Nov. 1850

This deed first conveys to Sutton  
by metes and bounds all that portion of  
the above described premises lying west  
of a line drawn S 11° 45' E from the South  
Eastern Corner of Nonstonen to the South  
Eastern boundary of Suttons original tract of  
New Helvidia - After which it contains the  
following, "Also any and all lands lying  
South of the American River that have not  
been conveyed by said Sutton or land over  
in towns previous to the 28th of June A.D.  
1850. This clause, it is contended by the  
Law Agent has the effect to reconvey to  
Sutton all the lands conveyed by  
him to Belton & Grant and as a necessary  
consequence to direct the claimant of  
thes entire interest therein; hence it is argued  
that the title to the premises being shown  
to be in Sutton, the present claimant is  
not entitled to a Confirmation -

On the other hand it is maintained by  
the Counsel for the Claimant that it was  
the intention only to reconvey to Sutton  
that portion of the tract described in  
the deed by particular metes and bounds.

That the general clause  
above quoted is inconsistent with this  
manifest intention of the instrument and  
must therefore be rejected, or made to  
apply only to the particular part intended  
to be conveyed - Taking the whole deed  
together we think this construction is the

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Convey one and Express the intention of the parties as evidenced by the other parts of the instrument. The Clause ~~transfers~~ cannot in question cannot therefore operate as a reconveyance of the whole tract but must be construed as applying only to the particular tract described in the deed.

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But even admitting that the deed in question did convey to Gutter the whole premises it would not affect the Claimants right to a Confirmation.

In the Case of the U. S. vs. Peckham 9th Feb. 57 the Supreme Court says, the Court will not enter into the Enquiry whether the title to the Land has been conveyed or remains in the Claimant, that is a question in which the United States have no interest, and which is not to be decided by the Court; and a deed has accordingly entered confirming the Land to the Claimant, notwithstanding it was shown that he had transferred the title to it many years before.

So in this case the title having been shown to be in Gutter he would be entitled to a Confirmation notwithstanding the subsequent transfer to Gutter.

Such Confirmation would as a matter of course accrue to the benefit of his Heirs and those claiming under him.

Authenticated Copies of two Shuff's deeds have been filed by the Law Agent in the Case, one purporting to convey the interest of said Maileup, Hays and Mass in said premises on an Execution against them issued on a judgment recovered May 31<sup>st</sup> 1851 in favor of Ralph Peters

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 and the other purporting to convey said  
 Sutter's interest therein on an Execution  
 issued on a judgment Oct. 10<sup>th</sup> 1851.  
 The premises claimed by the petitioners have  
 been conveyed by the judgment debtors Ellas  
 Chap, Hays, and Morse before the judgments  
 were reversed against them; the petitioners  
 claim under these prior conveyances,  
 and of course her interest cannot be  
 affected by the Sale on the Executions.  
 As to the Sale on the Execution against  
 Sutter, the patent which was released  
 to him by the deed from Gelston, Ellas  
 Chap, Hays and Morse may have  
 passed under the Sheriff's deed, but  
 that cannot affect the rights of the  
 petitioners, he having joined in the  
 deed to Sutter, does not claim or seek  
 a Confirmation to that patent of the  
 premises.

The mesne conveyances proved  
 in the Case show that the title to all  
 the lands described in the deed from  
 Sutter to Gelston and some of the 28<sup>th</sup>  
 1850 was vested in the petitioners  
 with the exception of that patent re-  
 leased to Sutter by the deed from Gelston  
 Ellas Chap, Hays and Hays of the 28<sup>th</sup>  
 of Nov: 1850, and whether that deed  
 embraced the whole premises or only a  
 part, is not, according to the decision  
 of the Supreme Court a question for this  
 Commission to decide. A Confirmation  
 of the whole might therefore be made  
 to Gelston which would inure to the  
 benefit of the latter in so much as he  
 was entitled to under the conveyances

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to him. But in as much as the petitioner  
does not claim the lands conveyed to  
Dutton a decree will be entered confirming  
to him all the lands described in the  
Original Decree from Dutton with the  
Exception of so much thereof as is embraced


