





San Francisco Aug. 10th 1853.
Case No. 197 Joseph B. Lillie for the place

A. Thompson, delivered the opinion of the

To the Hon. the Board of Land Commissioners
to settle private land claims in California.

Petition.

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Joseph B. Chile petitioner respectfully
showeth that he is the original & present claimant
of two leagues of land in the County of Napa -
Known by the name of the Rancho de Catuculie,
That the same was granted to him by Governor
Micheltorena in 1844, who acted under the
power & authority vested in him by the various
laws & codes of the Spanish & Mexican Govern-
ments which ruled in cases of granting lands,
& the letter of commission to said Governor
Micheltorena from the Mexican Govem-
ment.

There is no conflicting claim known
to your petitioner & he relies upon the documen-
tary evidence hereto annexed marked exhib-
its A. B. & C. - & the testimony of wit-
nesses to be examined before your Honor.
All of which is respectfully submitted for such
action as the nature & justice of the case
may require.

On this day before me Harry J. Thimont
 one of the Commissioners for ascertaining
 and settling private land claims in Califor-
 nia; came William Baldridge a witness
 produced in behalf of the claimant Joseph
 Deposition of B. Chiles being No 197 on the Commissioner,
 William Baldridge docket, & after being duly sworn testifed as
 follows.

The U. S. Law Agent was notified and
 attended.

Questions by Claimant's Counsel.

1. What is your name, age, & place of residence.

a. My name is William Baldridge, my age
 40. I live in Napa valley State of California.

2. Do you know Joseph B. Chiles the claim-
 ant in this case, & if so how long have you
 known him - & where -

a. I do. I know him since 1836 in Missouri.
 & afterwards in Napa valley California. In
 1844, he went to live on the Rancho Cataventu.

3. State what you know of the grant of the
 Rancho Cataventu & the settlement & possession
 thereof.

a. I know of Chiles taking the proceeding
 to obtain a grant of land. In the summer
 of 1844, he selected the piece of land Cataventu
 located in Napa County being then a part
 of Sonoma District. I assisted him in
 laying off the part selected by him, I drew
 for him a plot or map of the Rancho.

Chiles soon after went to Monterey with the
 map, petition, &c, & returned with a grant
 for the land, & a copy of the map I had made
 for him, the original as he informed me

having been kept & filed in the Government records.
The document filed in this case No 197. of Joseph
B. Chiles claimant & marked Exhibit A. being
a traced copy of the Especial & certified by
V. D. King N. S. Surveyor General is here shown
to witness.

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Witness says "this document appears to be a
true copy of the original papers of Chiles, con-
taining the grant & map I have spoken of.
Child went into possession of his land Catacula
in 1844 & has occupied & possessed it ever since
it. What do you know of the location and
boundaries of said land?"

A. It is located in Napa County about 20 miles
north of Napa City & over 50 miles from the sea
coast, & is the principal part of a small valley
the Indians called Catnulu from which
this Rancho derives its name.

The boundaries as we laid them out are as
follows. Beginning at a point about fifty
varas in a South easterly direction from the
Soda Springs, so as to include the Springs
within the Easterly corner of the tract, &
running thence South Westerly to the moun-
tains the distance as we supposed of about
one league, & crossing a branch of Putoback,
also a branch of Napa Creek - thence about
at right angles & along the mountains,
north Westerly three leagues as we supposed
the distance to the boundary of Popisland.
Thence along the line of Popis land the
distance of half a league, or thereabouts, thence
South easterly two leagues, thence North east-
erly half a league, thence South easterly one
league to the starting point.

5. What are the improvements made by the
claimant on said land & at what time were
they made?

A. In 1844, the same year in which he took
possession, Chiles built him a house, which

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He has occupied ever since. He also built a corral fenced in land, cultivated, set out trees & made other improvements. He has continued to improve it ever since - has set out fruit trees & vineyard, stocked it with a large number of cattle, & is now upon said land cultivating & improving it.

C. What do you know of the sitting of the Departmental Assembly since the time of Chiles receiving his grant?

A. I know very little of it. I resided on the Ranch with Chiles from the first & continued there with him until the discovery of the gold mines. During that time, we did not hear of the Assembly being in session but once, which was sometime in 1845 I think, & in a few days after we heard it had adjourned. The news of the adjournment followed so soon after, that we supposed the Assembly had adjourned at the time we received the news of its being in session. In those days communication with Monterey was very seldom, sometimes for months together we heard nothing from below.

June 21st 1852.

I have examined the above Interrogatories propounded to William Baldridge. His answer thereto, & in addition have been interrogatory to propounded to him, which is as follows.

How far is the Rancho de Cutriculu, the land claimed by Joseph B. Chiles in this case, from the Bay of San Pablo. That is to state the distance of the remotest point of said land from the nearest point of the bay of San Pablo?

is between the place named in the question, I have
never been it measured, but from my knowledge of
the country I would suppose the distance to be
about thirty or thirty two miles.







Most Excellent Sir!

Joseph B Childs Mexican by naturalization respectfully
appears before your Excellency & says: That having a consider-
able quantity of black cattle, horses, & mules,
are no proper place to put them upon, he applies
to your Excellency to do him the service to grant him

Exhibit 18.

Translation of two square leagues (sextos de ganado mayor) in
Expediente. the place called "Caticulu" which according

to the form of the annexed document given by
the Judge of Sonoma is found to be entirely
vacant. The said place has its bounds as
follows - Commencing 3000 varas South
East to the left hand of the mineral springs
from thence South westwardly, one league pass-
ing the arroyo of Napa, thence North westward-
ly three leagues to the boundary of Senor
Jose, thence North eastwardly half a league,
thence Southeastwardly two leagues: thence
North eastwardly half a league, & lastly from
this point to the starting point Southeastward-
ly one league as is clearly explained in the
annexed map.

Wherefore I humbly beseech your
Excellency to grant my petition whereby I shall
remain under eternal obligations for trusting
not to proceed by malice & whatever is nec-
essary.

Joseph B. Chiles native of the United States of
North America before you shewest. That
desiring to settle in this Department & know-
ing that the valley called Calicute in this
jurisdiction is vacant, begs of you to give him
the information which is just, so that the ap-
plicant can accompany it with the mem-
orial which he proposes to direct to the Most Ex-
cellent Sir Governor, petitioning for the
said land, the map of which accompanies
this, & he begs that you will return it with this
petition for the convenient uses. Moreover
he begs that you will please to decree as he
petitions for, by which he shall receive the
benefit he solicits, upon this common paper
having more in the jurisdiction of the cor-
responding seal.

The citizen Manuel Rodriguez, General
Brigade of the Mexican Army, Adjutant General
of the Staff of the same, Governor, Commandant
General & Inspector of the Department of the
Californias.

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Knows the citizen Joseph B. Chiles has
petitioned for his own benefit the land known by
the name of Catoculu its bounds commencing
South eastwardly five hundred varas to the left
of the Mineral Spring thence South westwardly
one league, till it passes the range of Napa, thence
to the North West three leagues to the line of
Silver Poce, thence to the North east half a
league, thence to the South east two leagues,
thence to the North east half a league & finally
from this point South eastwardly to the first
boundary one league as the annexed map
explains in detail of two square leagues which
de gauade may go in extent, a little more less,
having first taken the necessary steps & invita-
gations concerning it as prescribed by laws
& regulations, & by virtue of the authority con-
ferred upon me, in the name of the Mexican
Nation, have granted him the land aforesaid
declaring it to be his property by these present
letters subject to the approval of the Most Ex-
cellent Departmental Assembly & under the
following conditions.

1st. He cannot sell, alien or mortgage it nor
place ground rent, entail, bond or other inci-
cumbrance upon it, nor can he donate it.

2nd. He may enclose it without injury to the
crossings, roads & servitudes, he will enjoy it freely
& exclusively, devoting it to the use & cultivation
which best suits him, but within a year he shall
build a house, which shall be inhabited.

3rd. When the property is given to him he shall
ask of the respective Magistrate the judicial
possession by virtue of this title, by whom the bound-
aries shall be marked out, upon the limits
of which besides the land marks he shall place

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some fruit trees or forest trees of utility.

4th The land granted to him is of the extent already mentioned, the judge who gives the possession shall have it measured according to ordinance & any resulting oversplus shall remain to the nation for its commonest purposes.

5th If he shall violate these conditions he shall lose his right to the land & it may be denominated by another.

Witnessed Jordan, that the present writing I give as a title & being held as joint valid, it be entered in the proper book & delivered to the petitioner for his security & other purposes.



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The claim in this case is for two leagues of land situated in the present County of Napa. It was granted to the claimant a Naturalized Mexican citizen by Gov Manuel Michellorina on the 9th day of November 1844. The signature of the Government Secretary on the original grant, & on the copy of the map or decree which accompanies it are proven to be genuine by the deposition of Samuel Hensley. The traced copy of Expediente from the records in the office of the Surveyor General of the United States shows that the usual investigations were had & the grant signed in the usual form, though it does not appear that it ever received the approval of the Departmental Assembly. The grant is therefore inchoate & gives the party an equity only. The deposition of William Baldridge proves the boundaries of the land, & that the grantee immediately after securing the grant entered on the land & within a year built a house & erected other improvements. That he occupied the house from the time it was built, & has continued to do so ever since. That he has cultivated portions of the land, planted trees, & has had on it a large stock of cattle. The boundaries of the land are well defined & present no difficulty whatever to its identification & survey. The case comes clearly within those equitable rules which have been laid down & acted on in other cases by this board, entitling the parties to a confirmation. The claim is therefore confirmed.


