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



To the Honorable the Board of Commissioners for settling Land Claims in California.

Petition.

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Cuthbert Sheldon, Adm<sup>r</sup> and Gabriel W. Gunn Adm<sup>r</sup> of the Estate of Jared Sheldon dec<sup>d</sup> presents for confirmation a grant to a tract of land consisting of five square leagues lying in Sacramento County situated between the North side of the Sacramento River the Rancheria of the Omuchummas the Rocky hills and the Pass which at S<sup>d</sup> River leads to Mr Sutters Establishment. The grant to which land was made by Nicholas Dominguez, Governor of California on the 8<sup>th</sup> day of January 1844. A translated copy of which grant is herewith attached.

Petitioner further represents that S<sup>d</sup> Sheldon was a duly naturalized citizen of the Mexican Nation as will appear by reference to the papers, copies of which are herewith filed. That he was in the occupation of the land at the time the grant was made, that he built a house and houses upon it within a year of the date of S<sup>d</sup> grant and inhabited the same until the time of his death and that his family have occupied it since. That all the conditions of S<sup>d</sup> grant have been fully complied with. That he applied for the judicial possession to Capt. Geo. A. Sutter then Military Commander of the Northern frontier of California and sole civil Judge of the jurisdiction of the Sacramento in 1844, and was by the S<sup>d</sup> Sutter placed in possession of S<sup>d</sup> tract of land.

Petitioner further represents that a plat of the land claimed accompanied the petition for the grant in conformity with which plat or map the grant was made. A duly certified copy of which plat or map accompanies this application.

Petitioner knows of no interfering claim.

Petitioner further represents that S<sup>d</sup> Sheldon departed this life in the summer of 1857, leaving a widow (one of the petitioners)

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and three children of tender years his heir. That by the Probate Court of the County of Sacramento, petitioners were appointed the administrators of his estate, and that they have been duly qualified to act as such.

Petitioners rely for confirmation of this grant upon the papers which accompany this application, and the laws of Mexico, the customs and usages of California and the laws of the State of California on the official acts of the Officers of the Mexican Government, and on the facts established by such other testimony as they may deem proper to introduce.

On this day before me Henry J. Thornton one of the Commissioners for ascertaining and settling private land claims in the State of California, came John A. Sutter a witness produced on behalf of the claimant Catharine Sheldon whose petition is No 173 on the Docket of said Commissioners and being duly sworn testified as follows -

The Law Agent of the United States was notified and attended.

Questions by Claimants Counsel.

Ques. 1. What is your name, age and place of residence.

Ans. My name is John A. Sutter, my

age is 49 years, and my residence is Beck  
Farm, Sutter County, State of California.  
Quest 2. What Office did you hold in the De-  
partment of Upper California, throughout  
the whole of the year 1844.

Ans. I was Military Commander of the  
Northern frontier and sole civil Judge of that  
frontier.

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Quest 3. Did the territory within your juris-  
diction embrace the land lying on the River  
Comanche.

Ans. It did.

Quest 4. What Office did Manuel Michelto-  
una hold in this country in the year 1844.

Ans. He was Governor of the Department  
and Military Commander of the forces.

Quest 5. Are you acquainted with the signa-  
ture of Micheltona and Manuel Jimeno.

Ans. I am.

No exhibit "a"  
appears -

Quest 6. Please look upon the paper now  
shown to you marked Exhibit A. and attached  
to this deposition and state if the signatures  
of Manuel Micheltona and Manuel Jimeno  
whenever they occur in and upon said  
document are the genuine signatures of  
Manuel Micheltona and Manuel Jimeno.

Ans. They are their genuine signatures.

Quest 7. In obedience to the order contained  
in document - Exhibit A. did you deliver judicial  
possession of the land therein described to Joa-  
quin Sheldon, and if so at what time did you  
deliver such possession.

Ans. I delivered him such possession about the  
middle of April 1844.

No exhibit "B"  
appears -

Quest 8. Look upon the paper now shown to you  
marked Exhibit B. attached to this deposition  
and state whether the said document was pre-  
sented to you about the 6<sup>th</sup> April 1844 and if  
the signature of Joaquin Sheldon and the sig-  
nature of yourself therein are genuine.

Ans. I have recognized the said document  
marked Exhibit B. and the signature of Joaquin  
Sheldon and the signature of myself where they  
occur therein are genuine.

Quest 9. Was it part of your official duty to

delivered possession of lands within your jurisdiction to the grantee of the Government.

Ans. Yes, it was.

Quest 10. In what manner did you deliver possession of the land described in document Exhibit A. to Joaquin Sheldon.

Ans. I was myself on the place with Sheldon and rode round the bounds with him and gave him possession of it in conformity with a plan shown to me by said Sheldon.

Ans. Plot marked Exhibit "6"

Quest 11. Look upon the paper now here shown to you marked Exhibit C, attached to this deposition, and state if this is the plat to which you refer in answer to interrogatory 10.

Ans. I have examined the document marked Exhibit C. and recognize it as the same above referred to.

Quest 12. Look at the endorsement upon the paper marked Exhibit C. attached to this deposition, and state if the signature of Manuel Jimine when it occurs thereon is his genuine signature.

Ans. It is the genuine signature of Manuel Jimine.

Quest 13. At the time that you delivered possession of the land to Sheldon, did you designate the boundaries by placing any land marks upon the land.

Ans. No I did not, nor did I consider it necessary at that time to do it.

Quest 14. Was it customary or usual at that time in delivering judicial possessions of land to survey or measure the same to establish land marks thereon or to designate the boundaries thereof.

Ans. It was not customary.

Quest 15. Was the possession which you delivered to Joaquin Sheldon in the manner and form as you have described above in conformity with your usual mode of delivering judicial possessions, and in accordance with the then existing usages and customs of the country, as far as you are acquainted with them.

Ans. It was.

Quest 16. Was the pass of the Sacramento River

that led to establish a settlement at that time well known and well known point on the river

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that led to Sutter's establishment, at that time  
a well known and ascertained point in the geo-  
graphy of the country, and was at then and is it  
now easily identified or ascertained.

Ans. It was well known at that time, and still  
continues to be well known.

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Quest 17. Was the Rancho of the Omuchummes  
at that time a conspicuous land mark in the  
country or not? does it still continue to be so?

Ans. It was and still continues to be so.

Quest 18. State what you know of any improve-  
ments or cultivation put upon this land by  
the claimant? And if any, at what time?

Ans. Within two months after he got the grant  
he built a house and occupied it. The building  
was an adobe building. In the year 1847 he  
built a flour mill and other buildings and  
large and extensive improvements. It was stocked  
with cattle and horses. The land in cultivation  
upon the Rancho was about four hundred acres.  
He cultivated chiefly wheat. And he and his  
family continued to occupy and cultivate  
the same until the period of his death in 1851.

Quest 19. Is Joaquin Sheldon the name men-  
tioned in the original grant the same person  
whose real name is Leonard Sheldon?

Ans. He is the same person.

Quest 20. Will you state by what name the  
place is designated where the road laid down  
in the plat crosses the Cosumnes river, and  
who now lives, if any one, at that crossing?

Ans. I do not know.

### Questions by the Law Agent.

Quest 1. Did you cause the land of Sheldon  
to be measured in giving him judicial posses-  
sion? Did you then cause land marks to  
be established there at? Were any then established  
by him? Were the boundaries of the rancho in  
any manner then designated?

Ans. I did not cause the land to be measured.  
I did not cause any land marks to be established.

He did not set up any land marks at that time. The boundaries were not in any manner then designated.

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Quest 2. Were there any owners of adjoining lands at that time.

Ans. There were not.

Quest 3. Was the Rancharia de los Omoschummes, embraced within the land of which you gave him possession.

Ans. It was.

Quest 4. What amount of land did said Rancharia contain?

Ans. About an acre of the Rancharia was embraced within the limits of the land of which I gave him possession.

Quest 5. Did you ever in giving judicial possession of land within your jurisdiction cause them to be measured and the boundaries thereof to be designated and land marks to be established there at. And if so, in how many instances? And did they occur before or after you undertook to give Sheldon judicial possession.

Ans. I never caused any lands to be measured in giving judicial possession, because there were no surveys. I never caused any land marks to be made or any designation of boundaries, but only such as the map furnished, which was the map presented to me by the party requesting possession. I usually put the parties in possession with reference to the map they presented.

Quest 6. Why did you not usually in giving judicial possession of lands cause them to be measured and land marks to be established & boundaries to be designated.

Ans. Because we had no surveys and the Government was not particular about it, as it was provided for by the words *mas é murado* on

or less, and the sd ceremony I considered idle. I mean by an idle ceremony, the ceremony of measurement as it was used, because it was not correct, because I know it was not correct. I further refer to the ceremony of tearing up grass and throwing it to the winds.

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Quest 7. Did you ever in any instance test the correctness of a measurement to cause to be made by any other judicial officer in giving judicial possession.

Ans. I never did.

Quest 8. Was it not usual at the time you gave this possession with other officers authorized by law to give judicial possession to cause the lands to be measured: land marks to be established thereon, boundaries to be designated when performing the act of giving judicial possession.

Ans. I do not know what the practice was.

### Questions by Claimant

Quest 1. What distance is this land from the sea coast and the borders of any foreign nation.

Ans. It is about ninety or a hundred miles from the sea coast and at least two hundred & fifty miles from the borders of any Nation foreign to Mexico.

Quest 2. Could you have designated at the time you gave judicial possession any land marks more conspicuous than those mentioned in the grant.

Ans. I could not.

The Law Agent objects that the evidence

is incompetent.

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Quest 3. State whether or not the boundaries mentioned in the grant, to wit: the river Co-summer, the Rancheria of the Omuchumnes, the rocky hills, and the pass which at said river leads to Mr Sutter's establishment, conspicuous land marks, and did not these marks clearly define the land purposed to have been granted.  
Ans. They are.

Quest 4. What is understood by the term Rancheria.  
Ans. An Indian Village.

Quest 5. What was the size of the Rancheria of the Omuchumnes?  
Ans. It was about an acre.

Quest 6. In delivering this possession to Sheldon you state that you were guided by the limits laid down in the map. Was the map which you referred to, the one which is now on file and marked Exhibit (C)?  
Ans. It is the same.

Quest 7. What was the mode of measurement which in your cross examinations you stated was generally used in the country and which you considered an idle ceremony.  
Ans. It was done by riding on horseback and with a cord as I understood, I never saw it performed, but this is my understanding about it.

8. Did you make any record of this case in giving judicial possession, or did you make any

record in any case.

Ans. I did not because I was not requested to do so.

Questions by Mr Cuttenden Attorney for the  
claimant

1 Question. What are your name, age and place  
of residence.

Answer. My name is William E. P. Wartnell  
my age fifty five years, and I reside at Monterey  
in California.

2 Question. Look on the document here presented  
to you marked Exhibit A annexed to the depoi-  
tions of John A. Sutter taken before Commissioner  
Harry S. Thornton filed in this case on the 20<sup>th</sup>

No exhibit "A"

May A. D. 1852, purporting to be a grant from Governor Micheltuna to Joaquin Sheldon, and state when you first saw the document and what you know about the contents of its date.

Answer. I have examined the document, I first saw it on the day it was made namely on the eighth day of January 1844. It is in my own hand writing. It was signed by Governor Micheltuna and Manuel Lemos in my presence on the day it bears date.

3. Do you know of any application to the Departmental Assembly for the approval of this grant, if yes, what.

Answer. I know that such application was made through my own medium sometime in the year 1846 but I did not know until to day the result of said application. The application was made I think by Thomas O. Larkin, at my request to Mr. Stearns at Los Angeles by letter desiring him to apply for the approval personally.

Questions by Mr. Gunbow, Associate Law Agent.

1. Question. Do you know any thing about the occupation of this land.

Answer. I know that it was occupied by Joaquin Sheldon and by his partner Mr. Taylor as early as 1844 or 1845. They had houses, corral, and cattle in it. I did not myself see the place until 1849. The appearance of the houses showed that they had been built as far back as the time mentioned above.

2. Question. Have you any interest in the result of this case.

Answer. None whatever.

This day before Comr. Thompson Campbell came  
Samuel Norris a witness in behalf of the claimants  
Catherine Sheldon, et al, petition No  
173 and being duly sworn depose as follows—

1 Q. What is your name, age and place of  
residence.

Ans. My name is Samuel Norris, I am thirty  
two years of age and I reside in Sacramento  
City.

2 Q. Do you know where the Rancho of O-  
mechumner, Sheldon's ranch is situated.

Ans. I do know. I have known it since 1844.  
I was at said Rancho early in the spring of  
1844, at which time they were building a small  
house and corral and enclosing a small piece  
of ground. In the winter of 1846 I again visited  
said rancho, at which time they had a very good  
adobe house, a large amount of land enclosed &  
a growing, also a good many cattle and horses on  
the place. They were at the same time putting

up a flour mill. Sheldon resided on said ran-  
cho from the year 1846 until he died, which was  
in 1857 and his family are still living there—  
3<sup>d</sup> Inst. Do you know where the upper line of  
said Rancho crosses the river.

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Ans. I do know, at the point where said line cross-  
es the river there was a large Indian village—  
which village was situated at the foot of the hill,  
right on the bank of the river, - said village was  
there in the year 1846 and 1849 and there may  
be some remains of it at this time. I owned the  
adjoining place. Said hills are known as the  
rocky hills. They had some cattle and horses  
on the place in 1844, they were just making the  
settlement at that time. I do not know whether  
Sheldon resided on said place from 1844 till 1846  
or not, he might have been there for what I know.

This day personally came before Peter Sutt a Commissioner for taking testimony to be used before the Board of U. S. Land Commissioners in said State, Thomas McCartney a witness on behalf of the U. S. in case No 173 on the docket of said Board, wherein Catherine Shelden et al are claimants, and said witness being duly sworn, on oath deposed in English as follows, to wit: -

The Attorney for claimants is present.

Questions by U. S. Law Agent.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. What is your name, age and residence.

Answer. My name is Thomas McCartney my age 44 years, my residence Sacramento County, California.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. Look at the paper marked Exhibit A annexed to the deposition of John Sutter taken before Commissioner Henry Thomson and filed in this case, and state whether you are acquainted with the Country between the Coosumms and American rivers, and whether the map contained in said document

is or not a correct delineation of the land it purports to represent, and describe the land.

Answer. I am considerably acquainted with the country between the two rivers named and this land which this map represents, I do not consider as correctly delineated here. There is a ridge or line of hills running along close to the Cummins river, in some places touching the river, in others a half mile, and a mile distant there from, they will average a half mile or from that to a mile distance from the river, take the claim through. The only part where they touch the river is at the upper end of the claim —

3<sup>d</sup> Question. What is the distance from the pass of the Cummins river at the South West corner of this claim, to the rocky fort hills —  
Answer. It is about 19 miles —

4<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the elevation of the hills concerning which you have testified in your answer to 2<sup>d</sup> Question, and are they rocky or not.  
Answer. The hills in the lower part of the claim are ten to fifteen feet high and then they grow gradually higher as they run up towards the Slough House, where they reach a height of say 100 feet, there are places where there is rock sound stones, one place there is sand stone, they are not what would be called rocky hills, they are mostly susceptible of cultivation, some of them are ploughed.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Does or not the Cummins river, when it floods, flow back and cover the land up to the foot of said hills.

Answer. I have seen it when there was not 100 acres of land on the whole claim except the hills, which was not covered with water. It is generally so when the river floods.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. Is or is not the land lying back of these hills of the same elevation of the hills as a general thing.

Answer. About half way up the claim the

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Land lying back of the hills is level and about the same elevation of the hills, towards the upper part of the claim, the hills rise a little higher. In the lower part of the claim the land appears to descend slightly back of the hills, but there is no independent range of hills rising as in a surrounding plain, but as a general thing after ascending the elevation from towards the river, the land is like a bench or elevated plateau or table land.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. How long have you resided in that vicinity?

Answer. It will be 3 years I think the 12<sup>th</sup> of next January.

8<sup>th</sup> Question. Is there an Indian name that you know in that vicinity called the Omehummes.

Answer. I do not know of any such name, there are several Rancherias in the claim but none of that name that I know of.

Cross examined by Claimant's Counsel.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. Is there or not between the range of hills of which you have spoken, and the river and pass and junction of said hills with the river a valley of considerable extent and width, and does about the character of the land change immediately with the hills, so as to render the line of the hills marked and distinct, not only by their elevation, but also by the change of soil, and is there or not much more rock along the line of said hills than on either side of them.

Answer. There is a valley of a half mile to a mile in width, perhaps  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile. The soil changes in color when you strike the hills, and the foot of the hills is distinctly marked, along the line of the hills is the only part where I have seen any rock, there are round stones in some places along the hills, and

sand stone in one place.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. How long have you known the land in question.

Answer. About 2½ years.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. How do you know the distance of 19 miles you state in your answer to 3<sup>d</sup> Question.

Answer. I know it from my having seen the Township corner of the Government survey, and from having measured the distance with a surveyor's chain, between those corners and the line of the claim, and my knowledge of the distance of the rocky hills from the upper line of the claim, the 19 miles I testify to mean in a direct line, - It would be much further to follow the course of the river.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. Do you know anything about the boundaries of the land claimed in this case except from general rumor.

Answer. I have seen the papers in the case & know what they state and that is the only knowledge I have besides common report.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Do you live on any portion of this claim.

Answer. It is very doubtful, my object in making the survey was to ascertain that fact and if my measurement is correct, I think I do not live on the claim.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. Look again at the map, you before testified of in this deposition and say where you live.

Answer. I live in what is called the Grave Yard Hill, about 1¾ mile from the junction of the hills with river at the upper line of the Sheldon claim, and about ½ mile from the river. I live just below Taylor's house on the next ¼ section. I live in the valley of which I have testified.

7<sup>th</sup> Question Do you claim this land by

any right or title whatever, if you, by what-  
 Answer. I claim to have a right of pre-emp-  
 tion as a settler upon Government land.

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8<sup>th</sup> Question. Have you employed counsel or  
 contributed to such employment for the defence

Answer. I am a member of an association

Answer. I am acquainted with it, have  
known it about 3 1/2 years.

hibit A. annexed to the deposition of John

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A. Sutter taken before Commr<sup>s</sup> Henry S. Thornton and filed in this case, and state whether there is any range of rocky hills, running parallel with the Cosumnes river from the Pass to Sutter's and running in a North East direction as delineated on the map in said document.  
Answer. I should say there is not.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the distance from said pass to the rocky foot hills up the river in a direct line.

Answer. I have never been precisely at the pass, I have been within a mile or two of it, and I should say it is 18 or 19 miles from it in a direct line to the Rocky foot hills, the hills run back from the river and not parallel with it.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Are there any old Indian Names between the two points just named, if you, is there any one of the name of the Amochumnes?

Answer. There are several, but I do not know of any of that name.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the general character of the Country from the Cosumnes towards the American river, is it hilly, rolling or level? and is there any range of hills running parallel with the Cosumnes river, between the two rivers?

Answer. There is bottom land extending for from one to two miles back from the Cosumnes river level, at that distance from the river there are slight-irregular elevations commonly known as plains or plain land, the character of the country, is nearly the same, somewhat rolling to the bottoms of the American river. There is not to my knowledge any range of hills running parallel with the Cosumnes between the 2 rivers with the exception of the elevation I have spoken of.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Could any particular tract of land

be definitely located from the following description: "Five square leagues of land between the North side of the river Cosumnes, the Rancharia of the Omochumnes, the rocky hills and the pass which at said river leads to Mr Sutter's establishment."

Answer. I think there could not, there being no rocky hills on the North West as spoken of in the description.

Once-examined by Claimant's Counsel.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. Do you know what names the different Rancharias on the Cosumnes river bore in 1844.

Answer. I do not.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. Did you ever measure the distance in a direct line from the pass to the foot of the rocky hill.

Answer. I never have.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. How can you state this distance if you have never measured it and have never been at the pass.

Answer. I stated as near as I could judge from having travelled frequently, from a point near what is said to be the lower line of the Omochumnes ranch to the rocky hills running back from the river.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. How do you know the point from which you started, was near the West line, and did you travel the distance on a straight line.

Answer. I only know it from what others have told me, those who were acquainted with the boundary. I travelled in as direct a line as circumstances would admit, the usual travelled road is tolerably straight.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the general course of the river between the rocky hill and the pass.

Answer. I should say about South West.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the average width of

the valley on the North West side of the river between these points.

Answer. I should say, without having measured it, from one to two miles, I have surveyed it.

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7<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the height above the valley of the elevated land which you have spoken of as bounding it.

Answer. In places it is nearly on a level with the valley, slightly rolling, at other places it is higher and more rolling. I cannot give the height very accurately, there may be elevations as high as 30 feet, but the average I cannot give, it is sterile prairie land very different from the land in the valley. There may be elevations higher than 30 feet.

8<sup>th</sup> Question. Can the general line of separation between the valley and this more elevated land be easily traced.

Answer. I should say it could, at the distance back from the river which I have before mentioned.

9<sup>th</sup> Question. Is this elevated land at all rocky?

Answer. It is not so far as I am acquainted unless small cobble stones could be called rock, in places there are a few of them to be found in barren spots.

10<sup>th</sup> Question. Does the rocky hill of which you have spoken run back and connect with this broken land?

Answer. The rocky hills that I speak of run at right angles with the river and are the foot hills of the Sierra Nevada, and the elevated land I have mentioned as running parallel with the river comes up and touches the foot of the rocky hills.

11<sup>th</sup> Question. Are you a surveyor, and have you any experience in the location of lands.

in any experience in the location of lands.  
 Answer. I am not a surveyor, tho I have had some experience in locating lands in the Western country. I have dealt some in government lands and traced out the boundaries when government surveys had been made.

12<sup>th</sup> Question. If you were told to commence at the pass to follow the river to the foot of the rocky hill, to run along the base of the hill to the point where it was joined by this elevated land and to follow the line separating the elevated land from the valley south westerly such a distance that by running a line to the pass, you would include 5 leagues of land, would you have any difficulty in doing it.

Answer. I would have no difficulty in following the elevated land back of the valley, I should find no difficulty in following up the river from the pass to the rocky hill, or from the river out along the foot of the rocky hill, but I have no idea how much land would be embraced in these lines, or how far down I would have to run to get the quantity of 5 leagues.

13<sup>th</sup> Question. Do you reside on the land claimed in this case?

Answer. I do not, I live about 3 1/2 miles from Taylor's house up the river, in a valley below the rocky hills on the Cosumnes river.

14<sup>th</sup> Question. Do you occupy under any title or as a settler with a free emigration claim—

14<sup>th</sup> Question objected to as by the U. S. Law Agent as irrelevant— P. S.

Answer. I purchased the place and held a quit claim deed for the premises, I did not understand that the person who sold to me had a Mexican title, I understood that he had not such a title.

Answer. No, I should not say they were Rocky hills, I should term them bench & table land.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the distance from said Pass to the Rocky foot hills in a direct line.

Answer. I should call it 18 or 19 miles to what is termed the Rocky hills in a direct course up the river.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Are there any old Indian Rancherias between the 2 points just named, if you, is there any one of the name of the Cosumnes?

Answer. There are several such Rancherias, but I do not know any of that name.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the character of the country from the Cosumnes towards the American river. Is it hilly, rolling or level and is there any range of hills running parallel with the Cosumnes river, between the two rivers.

Answer. I should term it level land in general, somewhat inclined to all. There is no such range of hills after leaving the banks of the Cosumnes which are rather higher than the valley back of them, you cross a valley which varies in width from a  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile to 2 miles, you then rise out a more elevated plain of bench or table land, but there is no descent back of that so that I know of no range of hills in that vicinity, running parallel with the Cosumnes.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Could any particular tract of

land be definitely located from the following description. "Five square leagues of land between the North side of the river Cozumme, the Rancheria of the Amchummes, the rocky hills & the pass which at said ravine leads to Mr Cutters establishment."

Answer. Yes, I think it could.

Answer. I do not.

Answer. I never measured it - but I have rode it.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. Describe this bench land as to its elevation and the character of the soil -

Answer. It begins to rise gradually as you go in the direction up the river. It may be an average of thirty five feet in height, varying in different spots, the soil is a kind of a yellow earth mixed with small pebbles in many places, it is less fertile than the valley, cattle graze on it some times, and I have seen barley grown on it, tho' I should not think it capable of producing a profitable crop -

Answer. I perceive nothing in the question referred to which would define a line parallel with the river.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. What is your name, age and residence.

Answer. My name is George G. Snyder, my age 34 years my residence Sacramento County, California.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. Are you acquainted with the country in the neighborhood of Shulder's ranch on the Cosumnes river, if yea, how long have you known it.

Answer. I am acquainted with it, and have been for about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. Look at the document marked Exhibit A annexed to the depositions of John A. Sutter taken before Commissioner Henry J. Thornton, and filed in this case, and state whether there is any range of rocky hills, running parallel with the Cosumnes river from the pass to Sutter's and running in a North East direction as delineated on the map in said document.

Answer. There is no such range running thus.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the distance from said pass to the rocky foot hills up the river in a direct line?

Answer. From having frequently travelled over it I judge it to be about 18 or 19 miles.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Are there any old Indian Rancherias between these two points just named, if yea, is there any one of the name of the Cosumnes?

Answer. There are several old unoccupied Rancherias there, but I do not know of any one of that name.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the general character of the country from the Cosumnes towards the American Fork, is it hilly, rolling or level, and is there any range of hills running parallel with the Cosumnes river between the two rivers?

Answer. The land there is rather level or slightly rolling after rising on the bench lands. The land just bordering <sup>the</sup> ~~the~~ <sup>along</sup> the river is higher than it is back of the banks, when there is a valley between them and the elevated land in the rear, this valley is overflowed by nearly every freshet of high water in the river. There is nothing that can be called a range of hills running parallel with the Cosumnes on

this tract, there is a ridge of rolling land elevated above the valley, but I should not call it a range of hills.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Could any particular tract of land be definitely located from the following description: "Five square leagues of land between the North side of the river Comanches, the Rancheria of the Omuchumnes, the Rocky Hills and the pass which at said river leads to Mr Sutter's establishment."

Answer. Such a tract of land could not be definitely located by that description -

Over-examined by claimant's counsel.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. How far is Sheldon's House below the Rocky foot hills before mentioned.

Answer. I think about 5 miles.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. How far below the Rocky foot hills is Daylor's house?

Answer. Daylor's house is about 1 1/2 miles below the rocky hills in a different direction below from that of Sheldon's.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. Is the land about Daylor's & Sheldon's houses overflowed by any freshet?

Answer. Yes, at times some freshets of it, it is not so apt to be so as the lands below.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. About 1/2 or 3/4 of a mile above Daylor's house is there not a point of a hill or some high land running to the river or near it?

Answer. Yes there is such a point running near the river.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Describe this high point?

Answer. It is broken and irregular in its direction and elevations, as to height it is to say 20 feet above a usual stage of water when it comes near the river. It is not rocky.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. As the crossing of the road leading

to Sutter's a well known point on the Coconino, spoken of as the Pass?

Answer. This, and is now the crossing of the middle Stockton road.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Is it possible to run a line back from the Coconino river along the foot of the Rocky hill to where the upland joins it.

Answer. Yes, it would be very easily done.

8<sup>th</sup> Question. Is it possible to trace the line of separation between the valley and the upland mentioned.

Answer. Yes, it could be followed.

9<sup>th</sup> Question. Describe the upland, as to its elevation, soil and topography.

Answer. The soil is much lighter colored than the valley and mixed with fine gravel and sand, rather barren soil, as to elevation it is in the highest places from 20 to 30 feet above the valley, there may be places where it is considerably higher, down towards the pass. It is very low nearly level with the valley, there is not much stone or gravel on it, the whole of the plain or table land is covered with fine stones, finer stones you might call them, it will not produce much.

10<sup>th</sup> Question. Is the point of which you have spoken as running near to the river a half or  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile above Daylor's house, a spur or part of this same upland?

Answer. Yes, it is the same.

11<sup>th</sup> Question. What names did the several Indian Rancherias mentioned by you have in the year 1844 or 1845?

Answer. I do not know, I do not know the names of any of the Rancherias there.

12<sup>th</sup> Question. Are you a surveyor or do you know anything about surveying?

Answer. I am not a surveyor and don't

know much about surveying, I have helped survey by carrying chains and the like, but not to great deal.

13<sup>th</sup> Question. State the grounds of your assertion that a tract of land having the description stated in the 7<sup>th</sup> Question of this examination in chief, could not be definitely located.  
 Answer. In my answer to the 9<sup>th</sup> Interrogatory I spoke with reference to the map here in the case, but in my judgment no such tract could be located from my knowledge of the Country. I think so because there is nothing to distinguish one Rancheria from another and the Omochumnes therefore cannot be found or fixed as a boundary. I cannot state any other grounds for my answer.

14<sup>th</sup> Question. Have you any interest in the confirmation or rejection of this claim.  
 Answer. Not a particle.

15<sup>th</sup> Question. Where do you reside?  
 Answer. I live about 4 miles in a North Easterly direction from Dayler's house on the Mangtun road, I keep a public house there some 3 miles from the river Cummer.

ranch on the Common river, if yea, how  
long have you known it?

Answer. I am acquainted with that coun-  
try and have known it since November 1850.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. Look at the document marked Exhibit A annexed to the deposition of John A. Sutter, taken before Commissioner Henry J. Thornton, and filed in this case, and state whether there is any range of rocky hills, running parallel with the Sacramento river from the Pass to Sutter's, and running in a North East direction as delineated on the map in said document?  
Answer. There is no line of Rocky Hills running as represented here.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the distance of said Pass to the Rocky foot hills of the river in a direct line?

Answer. It is about 18 or 19 miles, I have never measured it, but have often rode over it. I know very well where the two points are, and I know the line of the Government surveys there.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Are there any other Indian Rancherias between the 2 points just named of you, is there any one of the name of the Amochumnes?

Answer. There are several Ad Rancherias, I do not know the names of any of them.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the general character of the country from the Sacramento towards the American river, is it hilly, rolling or level, and is there any range of hills running parallel with the Sacramento river, between the two rivers?

Answer. The country there is generally rolling, without any plainly marked range of hills such as you speak of.

7<sup>th</sup> Question. Could any particular tract of land be definitely located from the following description. This square league of land between the North side of the river Sacramento the Rancheria of the Amochumnes, the rocky hills and the Pass which at said river leads to Mr Sutter's establishment?

Answer. I do not think it could.

Cross-examined by claimant's counsel.

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1<sup>st</sup> Question. How far is Sheldon's house, & how far is Dwyler's house below the Rocky foot hills, and is the land about these two houses subject to overflow?

Answer. There are three houses which were built at different times by Sheldon, but the one occupied by the widow of Sheldon (since married again) is about 5 1/2 miles below the rocky hills, and Dwyler's is about 4 1/2 miles, and the land about these is subject to overflow.

2<sup>d</sup> Question. About 1/2 or 3/4 of a mile above Dwyler's house is there not a point of a hill or some high land running to the river or near it? If yes, describe it?

Answer. There is, It is a gradual elevation of 30 or 40 feet above the surrounding valley. It rises near the river in an oval form & back of that it is irregular this rather level with slight elevations.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. Is the crossing or pass on the Occumus leading to Sutter's a well known point?

Answer. Yes, it is a well known point.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. Is it possible to run a line back from the Occumus river along the foot of the Rocky hill to where the upland joins it?

Answer. Yes.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Is it possible to trace the line of separation between the valley and the upland mentioned?

Answer. It would be very easy to follow the line, it is irregular but could be followed.

6<sup>th</sup> Question. Describe the upland as to

its height and soil?

Answer. The soil on that land is light and soft compared with the land in the valley, the color is reddish in places, and in some it is yellow and sandy. The height above the valley varies from 10 to 50 feet. It is not rocky but in places gravelly, and less fertile than the valley land.

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7<sup>th</sup> Question. Is the point of which you have spoken as running near to the river  $\frac{1}{2}$  or  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile above Deyler's house a spur or part of this same upland.

Answer. It is.

8<sup>th</sup> Question. What names did the several Rancherias mentioned by you, bear in the year 1844 or 1845 or since?

Answer. I do not know. They have never been inhabited since I have been in the country and I am not acquainted with their names.

9<sup>th</sup> Question. Are you a surveyor or do you know anything about surveying?

Answer. I have surveyed some, not since I came to this country, but formerly I have done something at it.

10<sup>th</sup> Question. On what grounds do you assert that a tract of land having the description stated in the 7<sup>th</sup> Question of the examination in chief in this deposition could not be definitely located?

Answer. Because there is not that amount of land embraced in the bottom lands between the Pass and the rocky hills, and I do not know where the Cimochumnes Rancheria is situated. If I were called upon to locate 5 square leagues of land between the Pass & the Rocky hills on the North side of the Co-summes river I could do it; but if I were confined to the bottom or valley lands between these two points I could not for the land is not there.

11<sup>th</sup> Question. Have you any interest in the confirmations or rejection of this claim?  
Answer. I have none.

12<sup>th</sup> Question. Where do you reside?  
Answer. I live on the South side of the Commons on the Preston road about 25 miles from Sacramento City.

13<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the difference between a rectangle and an equiangular quadrilateral?  
Answer. I think I will make no pretensions to answer this question.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. Is there anything in the description stated in the 7<sup>th</sup> Question in chief herein, to definitely locate a line running parallel with the Commons river?

Answer. The line that we have already spoken of as marking the table land is easily located. There is no line of rocky hills there running parallel with the river.

This 1<sup>st</sup> Question objected to by claimants counsel as irrelevant — P.S.

Again cross-examined by claimants counsel —

1<sup>st</sup> Question. What is necessary in order to locate a straight line?

Answer. A starting point is all that is necessary.

This day personally came before Peter Sott a Commissioner for taking testimony to be used before the Board of U. S. Land Commissioners in said State, John P. Rhoades a witness on behalf of claimants bathurine Shelden Adm<sup>r</sup> et al, in case No 173. on the docket of said Board, and said witness being first duly sworn on oath testified before said commissioner to the end of the answer to 3<sup>d</sup> Question in chief, the remainder of the deposition was taken before Judge Felch, one of the Board of Land Commissioners in presence of the San Agent, and the final oath administered by him, as appears by his certificate hereto.

The U. S. San Agent is present.

Questions by claimants counsel.

1<sup>st</sup> Question. What is your name, age & residence.  
Answer. My name is John P. Rhoades, my age 35 years, my residence Sacramento County, California!

2<sup>d</sup> Question. Are you acquainted with the Rancho called Omochumnet, if yea, how

long have you known it?

Answer. I am well acquainted with said Rancho and have known it ever since the fall of 1846.

3<sup>d</sup> Question. What is the distance on a straight line, or by the road from the crossing of the road to Sutter's on the Occoimet to the first Rocky Hill that runs to or near the river?

Answer. The exact distance I do not know, my judgment is that it is about 13 miles or a little over that, I have travelled it very often and thus would be my opinion of the distance on a straight line, By the road which is not straight the distance would be greater, it would by the road as it now runs be about 18 miles.

4<sup>th</sup> Question. What is the situation of this Rocky Hill in reference to Sheldon's house & field.

Answer. The hill was above the house, up the river about half or three quarters of a mile. The base of the hill is immediately at the side of the field at the upper end on the river. The hill does not run all along one side of the field, but touches it at one corner which is the corner on the river.

5<sup>th</sup> Question. Please describe the hill referred to.

Answer. It is the first hill running in on the river above the Pass which is referred to in the grant on the North and West side of the river. It runs to the river terminating in a high bluff nearly perpendicular. The length of the bluff on the river is from three hundred yards to a quarter of a mile but in some places the rock is decomposed and has slidden down a little. I should think the elevation of the bluff not far from sixty feet. The direction of the hill as it runs back from the river is north-north west or a little west of north. It is a prominent and well known hill. It is a

a guide to travel by in that section of the country, and every traveller cannot help but know it. You can see it some fifteen miles off. We have now roads by which to travel, but before they were opened it was the guide of the travellers.

6 Question. Is there any difficulty in surmounting a line from the river along the base of this hill?

Law Agent objects to this question as leading. A. F.

Answer. None.

7 Question. It has been stated that Sheldon's house which is now occupied by his widow, is about five and a half miles below the Rocky hill, and that Taylor's house is about four and a half miles below the hill, is that statement true?

Answer. It is not true. Taylor's house is from a half to three quarters of a mile from the hill. I know it is not over three quarters of a mile. Sheldon's house from the bluff is about a mile and three quarters in a straight line. - There is a stone quarry which has been opened perhaps a year and half or two years; this quarry is about five miles from Taylor's house and perhaps six miles from Sheldon's house; but this quarry is not on the river and is not called the basement of the Rocky hills. - There is rock all the way from the bluff on the river to the top of the Sierra Mountains, with the exception of one or two small valleys.

8 Question. By whom was the house which you call Taylor's occupied when you first knew it and from that time to the year 1849?

Answer. It was occupied by Sheldon & Taylor both, when I first knew it. They were unmarried and were living there together. They lived there until they were married. Sheldon

was married in the spring of 1847 & Taylor a short time before. They were partners in every thing and ran off and on together at the place while they lived.

9<sup>th</sup> Question. Do you know where the Rancho of Omochumhus was?

Answer. I do. It was on the upper end of this grant in the field, and at times they moved a short distance on to the hill. They remained there until they were all killed or died with disease. There maybe a few individuals left scattered about, but they do not exist any longer as a tribe.

Questions by Mr McKune, Law Agent.

1 Question. How high is the hill you call the Rocky hill above the surrounding land?

Answer. On the North and North east side there are ravines and table lands running in, but with these exceptions the land is still more elevated than the hill, rising to the top of the Sierra Mountains; and is broken and mountainous. On the South and south west side the hill is some sixty feet high above the surrounding land.

2 Question. Are you interested in the result of this case? and is the claim prosecuted in part for your personal benefit?

Answer. I have bought a tract of land on this claim. The case is not prosecuted by me and I have no management or control over the proceeding, and I employ no Attorney in it nor do I pay anything in prosecuting it. I have a quit claim deed of the land from Shelden, and he bound himself to make me a warranty deed if his title under the grant was sustained, and if not then to refund me the money paid with six per cent interest per annum. I gave him four hundred and fifty dollars and the land described in the deed was supposed to contain about nine

hundred and fifty acres. There are not three hundred acres of it which is worth paying taxes for. The money which I would receive back would more than pay for the entry of the land if this claim should fail. The arched road and the land this year at one thousand dollars, exclusive of all improvements on it. My improvements there have cost me about fifteen thousand dollars, but would not now sell for half that amount. They are all on the one hundred and fifty acres which I expect to hold by pre-emption, if this title fails. I am the oldest settler there on the river. The table land is rocky, broken and of little value. The bottom land is about three hundred acres, or not far from that.

3 Question. What is the character of the place you call the rocky hills compared with the table land forming the Northern part of the land claimed in this case and the lands adjoining it?

Answer. The country lying North and North East of the rocky hills becomes more and more stony as you go up the hills; but this land is not on the grant.

4 Question. What is there to mark this hill as a Rocky hill more than other hills in that vicinity?

Answer. No cause it is the first rocky hill marking in on the river on that side, as you go up the river, and was also called by the name (Someta's lot pedras) by the early settlers in that part of the country and also by the Indians who speak the Spanish language.

5 Question. Do not the first hills as you go up the river entitled to the name of Rocky, occur east of the house where Pratt now lives.

Answer. They do not. Before you get within between two or three miles of Pratt's house, it is a mass of rocks.

6 Question. Look at the map now presented

See exhibit  
map. 61.

To you marked "H. Espudivote" hereon filed in this case, and state whether the hills of which you speak are correctly laid down on said map. Answer. I have examined said map. The bluff makes up immediately on the river, but I do not see it so marked on the map. The other hills running along on the North and East part of the map appear to be correctly laid down, but they come down to the river as I before stated terminating in a bluff, and this does not appear to be correctly laid down on the map. That is the only thing I see incorrectly laid down.

7 Question. Look at the shaded part of the map extending from the words "Somos o' Mumbi" to and beyond the words "Somos esteriles pedrigoras" and state what is the character of that country?

Answer. It is a poor, barren country and broken, and until you get down some five miles. It is also full of rocks and pebble stones, with the exception of a small valley running in the direction of White Rock Spring.

8 Question. What forms the Northern boundary of this Rancho Omochumnes?

Answer. I do not know, I never read the grant.

9<sup>th</sup> Question. Does the map represent the river and all its sinuities correctly?

Answer. I could take the map and find the valley very easily. The slough is correctly laid down and so are the little lakes, but as to the windings or bends of the river I cannot tell. I know that the sloughs are correct. I think the map generally correct. I except the part relative to the bluff before mentioned.

10<sup>th</sup> Question. What will do you mean in your answer to question 6<sup>th</sup>?

Answer. I mean the hill making from the river out. It is the same which comes to the river at the bluff and runs back into the country.

11<sup>th</sup> Question Would you not have the same difficulty in running that line that you would any other that could be made?

Answer. I do not know how to answer the question. Any surveyor could run a line. There is no difficulty in following the hill above mentioned; a blind man could follow the base of the hill. The top would be still easier followed, because there are sloughs at some points of the base. Back of my house the hill is about sixty feet high. The slopes there are more gradual than they are near the river. At this point the slopes are about a mile or a mile and a half from the ridge of the valley to the top of the hill, and about three miles below in the ridges disappear and it becomes a level poor country.

Mr McKim objects to this whole testimony on the ground of interest in the witness.

Questions by Mr McKune Law Agent.

1 Question. Please state your name, age and  
place of residence.

Answer. My name is John Parker, my age  
is twenty nine years and I reside in Sac-  
ramento County, on the Common river  
in California.

2 Question. Was you acquainted with Jared  
Sheldon in his life time and with the land  
claimed by him situated on the North side  
of the Common River, in said Sacramento  
County, if yes, state how long you have known  
them and when you have resided during that  
time?

Answer. I knew said Sheldon from August  
1846 until the time of his death. I knew also  
the Rancho mentioned and was on it the first  
time in 1846 and at that time I remained  
on it about two weeks, I returned there in  
August 1847 and remained on the place  
until the 18<sup>th</sup> day of April 1848. I then  
went to the States and again returned and  
went on to the place in August, the eleventh  
1849, and have remained from that time  
until the present.

3 Question. When did Saml Sheldon live when you first saw him.

Answer. In Monterey. The first time I saw him was at that place in 1845 in the spring of the year. I was not acquainted with him then. I did not get acquainted with him until the next year. I understood he was at work at Monterey when I saw him there in 1845 building a house for Mr Hartwell. He was a carpenter.

4 Question. When you first knew the Rancho above mentioned, what was the character of the pass or passes leading from the establishment of New Helvetia to the Southern country crossing the Cosumnes River?

Answer. There was only one Indian trail. There was two of the trails which crossed the river Cosumnes, they were about half a mile apart at the river.

5 Question. What is the character of the scope of country situated between the Cosumnes and the American River, opposite the Rancho claimed by Sheldon.

Answer. From the river back about three quarters of a mile to a mile in width it is bottom land. The remainder is high prairie.

6 Question. What is the average height of the high prairie above the bottom land mentioned.

Answer. I should think from thirty to thirty five feet. It rises gradually except in a few places. The steepest place I think is at a place opposite Doyler's house where it rises about sixty feet.

7 Question. What is the character of the soil

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in the country, constituting the high prairie between the Comanches and the American west. Answer. The soil is red in some places and in others a light clay. That portion of it bordering along the bottom lands of the Comanche river is a red soil and in some places a light clay. It is of the same character as the remainder of the high prairie. There are some places where you can see a little gravel.

8 Question. Are there large stones on any part of the prairie bordering on these bottom lands claimed by Sheldon?

Answer. There are some stones about as big as my two fists and none bigger, which are situated about six miles back from said bottom lands. They are in a flat prairie where the water runs during the rains.

9 Question. Is there anything where the high prairie runs into the Comanche river to distinguish the locality.

Answer. The prairie is all alike but at that place it comes into the river and is almost a bluff. There is a little gravel which is very small and there is no rocky point at that place.

10 Question. How far above the point on the river mentioned in your last answer is it to the first rocky hills or near the river?

Answer. It is six miles as near as I can judge.

11 Question. What was the character of the improvements made in the Ranch in 1846.

Answer. There was on the place in 1846 a

small adobe house which was built before I went there. There was a corral and there was a field partly fenced: they were fencing it when I arrived there. There was some wheat growing on the place at that time which had not then been harvested.

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12 Question. How far was it above the easternmost pass which you have mentioned to the first Laguna emptying into the Coconino river.

Answer. Somewhere from half a mile to a mile. It is not less than half a mile nor more than a mile. It is called the slough. It passes by Mahon's house. There is no other slough, it branches out but comes together again.

13 Question. How far is it from Mahon's house to the mouth of the slough where it enters the river?

Answer. I should think it is not over ten miles. The slough commences at or near the White Rock Springs, I think it is in El Dorado County but am not certain of that. It runs about south until it comes into the valley that adjoins the river; there it runs between the high prairie and the bottom lands: then across the bottom lands into the river. Mahon's house is situated on the North bank of the slough. In a straight line from Mahon's house to the nearest point of the Coconino river, I should think the distance about three quarters of a mile.

Questions by Mr Williams for claimants.

1 Question. What was you doing on the Ranch

in 1846.

Answer. I was doing nothing, I went there with a friend who went there on business.

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2 Question. What in 1847.

At that time I stopped there and helped out a mill on the Cosumnes river for Sheldon & Taylor. I was there at that time about eight months as near as I can recollect.

3 Question. What in 1848.

Answer. When not at work on the mill I was stopping at Taylor's house?

4 Question. What time in 1849 did you return to this property?

Answer. I arrived on Taylor's Rancho on the eleventh day of August in that year.

5 Question. In what business did you then engage and in what business have you been since.

Answer. I stopped there part of the time. I was in the mines a month or two but made that my home, some times I helped Taylor. In 1850 I went up North and was gone a month or two. In 1853 I was at Gilroy's place three or four months. After Taylor's death I leased the lower part of said Rancho from Sheldon. I have been there on the rancho all the time with the exception of the times above mentioned of my absence to the present time.

6 Question. During the various periods above mentioned or previously therein was you ever known by or did you ever go by any other name than John Parker.

Answer. Not on the Common River.

7 Question. By what other name or names were you elsewhere known?

Answer. I was known by the name of Seth Kinn. I was known by that name in Boston. I was called by that name on the road I came here in.

8 Question. Why did you change your name.

Answer. For protection to ship by, I sailed from Boston several voyages to France under the name of Seth Kinn. It was another mans protection that I had but my true name was John Parker. When I came to California I used the same protection that I used when I sailed to France but when I arrived here I assumed my true name of John Parker.

9 Question. Since you arrived in California, have you ever assumed a different name?

Answer. I have not. I may have been called here Seth Kinn by old acquaintances but not by others.

10 Question. In what are you engaged now on this Rancho?

Answer. I am raising stock and farming some.

11 Question. By what title do you hold the land which you are now occupying —

Answer. A squatters title or pre-emption.

12 Question. Do you belong to what is known as the Squatters Association?

Answer. I do not?

13 Question. Have you contributed anything towards the employment of counsel to defend that claim?

Answer. I did pay ten dollars for that purpose about eighteen months ago; but since that I have had nothing to do with Squatters Associations. I have attended no meeting since that?

14 Question. Are you still living there claiming a squatters or pre-emption right?

Answer. I am.

15 Question. You say there are two passes across the Comanche river leading to Sutters's establishment; by what names are they called?

Answer. The only name I have heard is the trail to Sutters's Fort. There is but one trail in fact it divides into two near the river and unites again after passing the river.

16 Question. Do you know which of these two passes is called the Magallowine or the Magallowine Pass?

Answer. I never heard the name.

17 Question. At the point where the range of hills skirting the bottom lands of this Rancho turns into the Comanche River is there not a high and rocky bluff?

Answer. There is a high bluff as I said before. It is not rocky. There are some round stones or boulders by the side of the river at the bottom of the bluff. The bluff itself is covered with grass and weeds the same as the other high land. On the steep side

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is the other high land. On the steep side  
bluff are some of these round rocks or stones.

Witness states his name is Emanuel Pratt, his age forty eight years, residence Sacramento Co. California.

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1<sup>st</sup> Question by Claimants counsel.

Are you acquainted with Sheldon's Ranch in the County of Sacramento called Om-chummes situated on the Cosumnes river. Answer. I am in part, I have never seen the lower part of it.

2<sup>d</sup> Question by same -

Describe the land on the North East boundary of said Ranch?

Answer. After crossing a slough you ascend a hill which is about eighty feet above high water mark in the river, in which near the bank of the river is a edge of rocks. There is a cave in the edge of rocks in which a person may stand erect. The said edge continues with the meanders of the river from three hundred yards to a quarter of a mile, it is about forty feet above the water. The point of the hill above described is the termination near the river of the range of hills which runs back of or east of Sheldon's Ranch & which from information I derived from old Californians among them Mr Perry Mcboon and Mr Sheldon formed the North Eastern boundary of said ranch.

3<sup>d</sup> Question by same.

How far do you reside from the edge of rocks above described and how far is the nearest part of your land from it.

Answer. I live four miles and half from it and my land extends to said edge of rocks, & as I am informed by Major Bidwell it forms a point in the boundary between my land and Sheldon's Ranch.

Cross examined by Mr Blanding.

4<sup>th</sup> Question by same.

Do you know the boundaries of said ranch generally and have you been over said North Eastern boundary.

Answer. I was over said North eastern boundary a few days ago. I do not know the other boundaries.

5<sup>th</sup> Question by same

Was your attention ever called to the North Eastern boundary in connection with the grant?

Answer. I never saw the grant, my attention was called to said boundary from my wish to ascertain my own southern boundary.

6<sup>th</sup> Question by same.

Who lives near said edge of Rocks and how far is it from Taylor house.

Answer. It is about half a mile from Taylor house, and Mr Pepe lives perhaps nearer.

7 Question by same.

What is the character of said edge of rock and of what kind of stones is it composed large or small?

Catharine Sheldon & al. vs The United States. For the place called Omochumnes in Sacramento County containing five square leagues of land.

Opinion of the Board believed by Genl. J. S. Phelps

The petitioners are the Administrators and Administrative of the estate of Jared Sheldon, deceased, who is alleged to be the grantee of the land claimed and to have been the owner at the time of his death.

A grant duly authenticated, is filed in the case, bearing date January 8<sup>th</sup> 1844, signed by Governor Micheltourne and made to Joaquin Sheldon, who is proved to be the same person otherwise known by the name of Jared Sheldon, and whose estate is represented by the petitioners as his administrators.

Traced copies of two Expedientes which are on file among the archives in the Surveyor General's Office are presented. By these it appears that the first application for the grant was made in 1843, and after certain proceedings had thence, the expediente was accidentally mislaid. The second Expediente is commenced by a new petition dated January 3<sup>rd</sup> 1844, stating the loss of the documents on the former application reciting the contents of the first petition and renewing the solicitation. This expediente closes with the draft of a grant agreeably to the Governor's decree of concession. Attached to the first expediente is a memorandum of the proceedings of the Department Assembly in April 1846 showing their refusal to approve the grant to Sheldon for the reason that the expediente before them did not show that any such grant had been issued by the Governor, but they ordered that he should be notified of

their proceedings in order that he might present the proper documentary proof of the land had really been granted to him. It is evident that the first expedient was before the Assembly when these proceedings were had, and not the second. The first was insisted before any grant was issued; the second was then commenced and terminated with the issuing of the grant. It seems that no approval of the grant which was issued was ever had by the Assembly, but there is nothing in the action of that body or the imperfect expedient terminating before the grant was made, which indicates any unwillingness to ratify the grant actually issued or to throw a shadow of suspicion upon it.

The grantee according to the testimony of Captain Butler and Samuel Norris built a house and corral & enclosed a portion of the land early in the spring of 1844, and resided on the place. He continued his occupancy of the premises until his death in 1855, cultivating the land extensively, and adding from time to time buildings and other valuable improvements.

The question of location & boundaries is the one which presents the principal difficulty in the case. Captain Butler gave possession of the premises under the grant in April 1844, but he defined no limits and designated no land marks. Unless the description in the original documents, aided by the oral proof in the case is sufficient to identify the land and segregate the precise premises granted the claim must be rejected. The land solicited is described in the grant as follows, "Five square leagues of land between the north side of the river Coosumnes, the

Rancheria of the Omochumnes, the rocky hills (*Serrania pedregosa*) and the pass which at said river leads to Mr Sutters Establishment; at which (pass) the measurement must begin towards the direction of N. N. W. and in the fourth condition of the grant it is declared that "the land of which donation is made comprises five sitios de ganado mayor (square leagues) as already mentioned and as the respective plot explains." The map thus referred to, a traced copy of which is before us, exhibits the premises with a clear designation of the several limits and objects mentioned in this description; and if they are found on the face of the earth there can be no difficulty in tracing the lines when an accurate survey shall be made. The hills marked *Serrania pedregosa* are clearly laid down on the map, running nearly parallel with the stream; the crossing place of the river and the road running thence towards Mr Sutters Establishment in a direction about N. N. West is placed on the limits of the land on the West side, while the Rancheria of Omochumnes located on the river, limits its extent up the stream. Within these limits the land granted must be located. From the language of the description contained in the grant especially when considered in connection with the prayer of the petition for the concession it is probable that the intention was in locating the five leagues, to commence the measurement on the West side on the road leading from the pass of the river, and extending up the stream between the river and the hills as lateral boundaries until the quantity of five leagues was included. On this point if the hills have an actual existence as represented on the map there

could be no difficulty in locating the premises, so as to give the quantity granted, and a judicial measurement might be dispensed with. If such measurement should carry the up line beyond the Rancho of the Encumbrances of course the land must be limited to that as one of the defined monuments beyond which the premises could not extend. Another principle however is involved in the case which renders it unnecessary to decide this point of construction.

It is claimed on the part of the Sew Agent - that as a matter of fact, the hills laid down on the map & made one of the lateral boundaries by the grant have no existence, and much testimony is given on both sides on the subject. The testimony shows that there is a valley of bottom land extending along the river which is terminated by a plain of a sandy soil the border of which is nearly parallel with the river. McCarty a witness on the part of the Government describes it by saying "there is a ridge or line of hills running along close to the Occumner river, in some places touching the river, in others a half mile and a mile distant therefrom; they will average a half mile or from that to a mile distance from the river take the claims through. The only part where they touch the river is at the upper end of the claim." The region of country back of this line of demarcation is represented by all the witnesses as an elevated plain or plateau somewhat rolling and unproductive, and generally extending back from the hills above mentioned without sufficient depression to form a distinct range of hills rising above it. The language of the witnesses in describing this elevation is various, but all concur in declaring the existence of a continuous elevation of land varying from ten to one hundred feet in height running nearly parallel to the river and bounding the bottom land of the sandy or gravelly plain, which can be traced without difficulty, and which corresponds generally with the delineation on the map. With the imperfect knowledge of the country then possessed, great accuracy was not to be expected, but it is the duty of the Commission, according to the well known rules of construction, to give effect to the intention of the parties if it can consistently be done. I do not doubt that the delineation on the map running parallel with the river and marked "Terreno Alto" and also "Somera pedregosa", is intended to indicate as the boundary of the land granted, the distinctly marked line between the bottom land and the elevated and more sterile plain beyond. This being designated as the rear line of the premises there is no difficulty in defining the other boundaries, which are the river on the opposite side, the pass running North North West from the ford towards General Sutter's Establishment on the Western side and a line parallel with the last mentioned commencing on the river at the ancient Rancheria of the Omochumnes. Within these limits it is certain from the proofs there is not more than the quantity of land conceded; probably it is considerably less.

The claimant contends that he is entitled to commence his measurement on the river making a front of the whole extent from the pass to the point above where the hills above mentioned comes down to the river a short distance above the Rancharia of Omochumnes and running back from the river sufficient distance to include five square leagues of land. To this proposition there are two objections; first the grant and the map therein referred to make the range of hills the line of the Western side of the premises granted and not of the northern; secondly, the grant expressly limits the premises conceded in that direction to the Rancharia above mentioned and allows an extension of the premises only to that locality, whereas the point where the hills come down to the river is above that position, and cannot therefore be made a boundary. I see no true construction which can be adopted that will give the claimant any thing more than the strip of bottom lands situated on the north side of the river, extending from the Pass to the ancient Rancharia, and running back to the declivity where the sterile highlands falls by the declivity above mentioned upon the bottom lands below; and for this a decree of confirmation will be entered.


