



Private Land Claims in California

The Petitioner Hilaria Sanchez/de Reed
respectfully Shows;

That on the 25th day of November A. D. 1845, His Pico Governor of California
by virtue of Authority in him vested
granted to the Petitioner, the Tract
of land Called "Lemalpais" situate in the
present County of Marin, containing two
Spanish Leagues of land a little more or less
as described in the Decree of grant and the
accompanying map; all of which is
shown by the original Expediente, a
certified copy of which from the Archives
in the charge of the W. S. Surveyor General
is submitted herewith marked "A", with
a Translation marked "B".

And the petitioner further represents
that a complete and formal patent,
exactly corresponding to the Decree of grant
submitted herewith, was issued thereto
on the 25th day of November A. D. 1845,
which patent has been lost or destroyed.

That the said grant was
duly approved, and that the petitioner
who has been for some ten years and now
is, in the quiet and undisputed pos-
session of said tract of land;

That she knows of no conflicting claim,
That she relies for confirmation of title upon
the original Expediente, a certified copy
of which is submitted herewith; upon
the notes and records relating thereto in the
office of the Surveyor General; and upon
such others and further proofs as she may
be advised are necessary;

Therefore she prays the Commissioners to
confirm thereto the aforesaid tract of land.

from the Governor, and according to the request
of the grantee I sent it to Francisco Guerro
in November or December 1843 from
Los Angeles to San Francisco.

Ques. Is Francisco Guerro
living or dead?

Answer. He is dead, he died in 1851.

In answer to questions witness states
his name is Andres Díaz, his age forty
three years and residence Los Angeles
Cal^a

1st Question by claimants Counsel,
State if you know any thing of the title of Helaria
Sanchez to the Rancho of "Temalpais" claimed
in this case, if yea, state what you know
in relation to said title and its contents?

Answer. In the year 1848 while I
was here at the North, Helaria Sanchez
delivered me a petition asking for a grant
of the Rancho of Temalpais, which petition
I presented to Governor Díaz Díaz, upon
which the Governor issued a grant to said
Sanchez of said Rancho, and delivered the same
to me. I sent said grant to Francisco
Guerrero by direction of said Sanchez,
I saw and read said title, it was signed
by Díaz Díaz as Governor and Jose María
Coronel as Secretary.

I know the handwriting of said Governor
and Secretary having often seen them
write and I know that their signatures
on said title were genuine.

It granted to said Sanchez the place
called Temalpais adjoining the Rancho
of Sancilito and Baulinas and containing

two leagues more or less

2nd Question by same,

Who was Hilaria Sanchez, and where did her husband live?

Answer. She was the widow of Juan Ruiz. Her husband before I came to this part of the country, I understood he lived on the other side of the Bay of San Francisco on the Rancho called "Corte de Madera del Presidio"

3rd Question by same,

Why did the Governor deliver the Title of Hilaria Sanchez to you?

Answer. He delivered it to me because I was the Agent D said Sanchez to procure said Title.

Cross Examined by W. S. Associate Law Agent,

1st Question. How long was said Grant in your possession, and state whether there were any circumstances that called your attention particularly to the terms of the Grant, and if so what they were.

Answer. Said grant was in my possession about eight days; as I was the Agent of Hilaria Sanchez to obtain the grant my attention was called particularly to it, to see if it was in accordance with the petition.

2nd Question by same

State if you know or when said grant was lost or destroyed.

Answer. I did not know anything of the loss of said title until the year 1848 when I saw Hilaria Sanchez who informed me she had not received D sh.

I then informed her that I had sent it to Guenarro according to her directions.

3rd Question by same. Examine the petition contained in the traced copy of the Expediente from the Archives filed in this case marked "A" and with the contents R. T. thereto annexed and state whether it corresponds with the petition referred to in your answer to question 1st.

Answer. Both the petition and map corresponds with those taken by me to the Governor and referred to in said Answer.

4th Question, By same,

How or by whom did you send said title from Los Angeles to Francisco Guenarro

Answer. I do not know whether I sent it by mail or by a vessel but I think by the latter conveyance as there was great irregularity and insecurity in the mails.

I, Heliana Sanchez, a native
of this Department, settled in
the jurisdiction of San Rafael
and established in the Rancho
of my ownership named San
Geronimo, before Your Excellency
with all respect in the best
form of law, appear and say;
that in the year eighteen
hundred and thirty seven
my deceased husband, Leon
Juan Reed, sent up to the Super-
ior hands of the Departmental
Government, a representation,
soliciting the addition of two
square leagues a little more
or less, in the place known
by the name "Terral Paix", as
appears by the map which
I transmit herewith; the
which he asked for because that which
I possess is very small, with little
water and pasture, and that which my
husband petitioned for was at the time
he asked for it, Vacant, and now again
I know that many persons are endeavoring
to obtain it, but considering that I
have asked for it many years ago,
I find myself obliged to devote this peti-
tion to the superior hands of Your Excellency
to the end that I also represent that
for seven years past my cattle
have become accustomed to range on the
said land which besides adjoining
my Rancho on the West, on the South
East by the Rancho of San Guillermo
Richardson, to the ridge of La Laguna;
and, on the N.W. by the Rancho de los
Bauleras and the end of the Cerro de
Terral Paix; the documents of which
previous petition have been lost.

But the Supreme decree which Your Excellency gave still exists in my power, copy of which, certified by the former Alcalde of San Francisco, I transmit to your Excellency, that you may be informed with regard thereto; and I also add that in the year One Thousand Eight hundred and forty one. His Excellency gave orders to the Justice of the Peace of San Francisco that these lands should be measured, and the commanding General at that time Don Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo, opposed the Superior decision and made answer to said Justice of the Peace, that he woud not be acknowledged as an authority competent to give possession and measure lands at this point of the frontier, and a few days after he commissioned his brother Don Salvador Vallejo who gave possession to Don Millerry Richardson, acting contrary to the Superior decree and order issued by Your Excellency to the Justice of the Peace of San Francisco, and if Your Excellency wishes to be better informed of all that has happened, you can call for these documents from the Court of San Francisco de Asis, where they are on file;

Wherefore I earnestly pray Your Excellency to be pleased to decide in my favor if you should find it just, a favor which I hope to receive, and I will be always grateful having the goodness to admit this or common paper, there being none of the corresponding stamps in this place.

which this Expediente commences, the report of the Committee on Missions, with such other information as was presented and proper to be considered; in conformity with the Law of August 18th 1824 and Regulation of November 21st 1828.

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I declare Dona Hilaria Sanchez owner of the land named "Temalpais", bounded by the Ranches of Sansalito, and that of "Los Barriles" and of the extent of two square leagues, a little more or less, as shown by the map which exists in this Expediente.

Let this be retained in order to submit it to the approval of the Most Excellent Assembly, and let the corresponding title issue to the party named Don Pio Pico, provisional Governor of the Californias, thus ordered, decreed, and signed, of which I certify,

Affidavit

Hilaria Sanchez, the claimant in this case makes oath as follows: That in the year 1845 she petitioned the Government of California for a grant of the land called Temalpais, the same which she claims in this case; and that she sent her petition and disengaged to the Governor by Andres Pico whom she constituted her agent to present the same and to receive the corresponding title for her.

That she was informed by her said Agent that the title had been issued and delivered to him for her, and that he Andres Pico

had sent it to her by Francisco Guenaro,
that at that time the claimant was a widow living
at her Rancho of San Clemente or Corte de Medera
del Presidio in the now County of Marin with
no agent to attend to her business, and that,
Francisco Guenaro was living near or at the Mission
of Dolores. That Francisco Guenaro told the
claimant that he had in his possession certain
very important & valuable papers belonging to
her but he never delivered them to her.

That since the death of Guenaro the claimant has
used all the means in her power to recover
her title papers without success.

That the affiant never saw the said concession
but that the petition she sent to the Governor
by Andres Pico is exactly copied and set forth
in the traced copy made in the office of the
U.S. Surveyor General for the State of
California, and filed in this case;

That it is impossible for the affiant to claim
where the original concession is & therefore she
cannot produce it.

The affiant further states that the traced
copy of the map annexed to the said petition
to the Govt is an exact copy of the one
which accompanied her said petition, and
that the tract of land claimed in this
case, as appears by the said documents
adjoins the Rancho of San Clemente or Corte
Medera del Presidio, the title to which
has been confirmed by this commission
to the affiant and her children, as widow
and heirs of the late Juan Reed.

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Opinion by
Commissioners

Alpheus Pelch.

The claimant alleges that a grant of the land was made to her by Governor Pico Pico on the 28th day of November 1845. The grant is stated to be lost or destroyed.

The evidence relied on showing that such a grant was made consists of a traced copy of the Expediente from the Archives and the testimony of Andres Pico on the subject.

The Expediente contains the petition of the claimant for the grant; a marginal decree therein directing information to be taken and a decree of concession; but it is remarkable that neither of the two last mentioned documents bear the signature of the Governor. Andres Pico swears that the grant was issued and delivered to him and that he forwarded it to Francisco Guerero by direction of said grantee.

The claimant has filed her own affidavit showing that she never received the grant.

She states that she was informed by Guerero that he had received certain very important and valuable papers belonging to her, but she does not state that she ever applied to him for their delivery or that search has been made among his papers for them.

The showing establishes the presumption that the grant came to the hands of Guerero as the agent of the claimant.

The rule of law is well settled, that when a written instrument is traced to the hands of a third person secondary evidence of its content cannot be received unless he be called and testify to its loss or destruction. If from death or other casualty, this cannot be effected proof be given of diligent search and

enquiry in such places and of such persons as might reasonably be expected to supply the document.

Search among the papers left by ~~the deceased~~
or enquiry of his Executor's Administrators
or heirs, would seem the least that could suffice to show an honest effort to procure the absent grant.

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There is no evidence that this has been done, and in my judgment the proof does not show sufficient to rest in secondary evidence of the contents of the paper.

But if the grant was made as is alledged by the witness and its contents such as they are described by him to be, still this claim could not be sustained under the proofs.

The witness does not state the contents of the grant, but say that it was issued according to the petition; of course we must presume that the usual conditions of inhabitation or cultivation were imposed.

All that is shown on the subject is that the claimant cattle occupied the place before the grant was made and continued afterwards to do so.

She never lived on the premises or cultivated any portion of the land.

Her residence was on the adjoining Rancho, but that was the property of her husband.

We see no reason to suppose that there was any intention to relieve her from the usual conditions of the land; on that the fact that she lived upon an adjoining rancho owned by her husband could have that effect.

A decree adverse to the claimant must be entered.



The Petition of Hilaria Sanchez de Reed, respectfully shows to this Honorable Court.

That on the 25th day of November A.D. 1845, Pio Pico, Governor of California, by virtue of authority in him vested, granted to the petitioner the tract of land called "Tomalpais", situate in the present County of Marin, containing two square leagues of land, a little more or less, as described in the decree of grant and accompanying map; all of which is shown by the original Expediente.

And the petitioner further represents that a complete and formal patent exactly corresponding to the decree of grant submitted herewith was issued and delivered to her on the 25th day of November A.D. 1845, which patent has been lost or destroyed.

That said grant was duly approved by the Departmental Assembly of California, and that the petitioner has been for some ten years and now is in the quiet and undisputed possession of said tract of land, and has duly performed and fulfilled all the conditions of the grant.

Your petitioner further shows that the said tract of land is situated in the Northern District of California.

Your petitioner further shows that on the day of A.D. , she presented her claim for the said tract of land before the United States Land Commissioners, appointed under the act of Congress passed on the 3rd March 1851, entitled "An act to ascertain and settle the private land claims in California" when sitting as a Board, and prayed

the said Board to confirm it; and that the said Board on the day of A.D. 18th, decided on the validity of the said claim and rejected it.

Your petitioner prays that the transcript of the report of the Board of Commissioners, on the claim presented to them as aforesaid, and the documentary evidence, and testimony of the witnesses on which it was founded, which is filed with the Clerk of this Court as directed by the 12th Section of the act of Congress passed on the 31st August 1852, entitled "an act making appropriations for the civil and diplomatic expenses of the Government, for the year ending the thirtieth June 1853, and for other purposes," may be held and considered as part of this petition.

Wherefore your Petitioner appealing from said decision of the Board of Commissioners, present this petition to the Honorable the District Court for the Northern District of California, being the District Court of the District in which the land claimed is situated, and he praye this Honorable Court to review the said decision of the said Board of Commissioners, and to decide upon the validity of his claim, and to make a decree confirming it. -
