ACCESSIBILITY

The Role of Geography in Census 2010 and the Census Bureau

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Geospatial data and geographic information system technologies are critical to successful planning and implementation decennial census data collection operations, and for the tabulation and dissemination of data. Through a variety of geographic partnership programs, Census Bureau geographers collected updates to the Census Bureau's master address file, to the road network in the TIGER database, and to the universe and boundaries of geographic entities that would be used to tabulate data. It is difficult to find any data collection and tabulation program in the Census Bureau that does not rely upon accurate geospatial data and geographic area information. In this plenary, Timothy Trainor, Chief of the Census Bureau's Geography Division, will discuss the role of geography and geographic information in Census 2010 and in the Census Bureau. Mr. Trainor will also discuss the variety of work in which geographers are engaged throughout the Census Bureau.

David Lowenthal is a towering figure in the discipline of geography whose many articles, books and presentations have influenced humanistic research on landscape tastes and perceptions, conservation, the relationship between history and cultural heritage, and the history of geographic thought. His studies have embraced North America, the West Indies and Britain. He is an authority on the 19th century North American philologist, geographer and environmentalist George Perkins Marsh, whose work laid the foundations of the environmental conservation movement in the United States. A renowned and prolific author, his work includes the highly regarded *The Past Is a Foreign Country* (Cambridge University Press, 1985).

Lowenthal recently received the Forbes Prize for "conspicuous services to conservation," presented by the International Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works, its highest honor. He made pioneering contributions to defining conservation goals, and his services to national and international heritage agencies and institutions have included UNESCO, the International Council on Monuments and Sites, the International Council of Museums, the International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and Restoration of Cultural Property (ICCROM), the Getty Conservation Institute, the World Monuments Fund, the Council of Europe, Europa Nostra, English Heritage, the US National Trust for Historic Preservation, the National Trust of Australia, and the Norwegian Directorate of Cultural Heritage.

Lowenthal earned his PhD in history from the University of Wisconsin after receiving an M.A. in geography from the University of California, Berkeley in 1950, and a B.S. in history from Harvard University in 1944.

Framing and Re-framing Questions of Human-Environment Interactions

In her Past President's Address at the 2011 Annual Meeting, Carol Harden will examine how, over time, geographers have changed the ways in which they frame studies of the complex interrelationships that link people and places. "Framing and Re-framing Questions of Human-Environment Interactions" will build on Mel Marcus' 1979 AAG presidential address by reviewing and extending the history of physical geography over the past century.

Recent recognition of profound and widespread environmental change has brought human-environment interactions back onto center stage. Although physical geographers have a strong tradition of studying the impacts of human actions on the environment, Harden will suggest that, after having once ventured too far down the paths of environmental determinism and social Darwinism, geography as a whole has done too little to advance understanding of the feedbacks through which the *(continued in next column)*

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environment influences the options and decisions of people and societies. Harden will use examples from her research in the Andes to illustrate feedbacks between humans and their environments and to emphasize that the atmosphere is only one aspect of the interactive, human-environment system undergoing change.

The AAG Presidential Achievement Award will also be presented to Professor **Patricia Gober**, Arizona State University, prior to the Past President's Address.

- Native American and Indigenous history, culture, language, and cultural resource management in the Pacific Northwest and Alaska, around the Pacific Rim, and throughout the Pacific Islands
- Native American and Indigenous practice and representation in literature and the arts.

Forthcoming OSU Press works in the First Peoples initiative include Asserting Native Resilience: Pacific Rim Indigenous Nations Face the Climate Crisis, edited by Zoltán Grossman and Alan Parker, due out fall 2011. Ancestral Places, by Katrina-Ann R. K. Oliveira, is a comprehensive look at Hawai'ian epistemologies, geography, language, and sense of place. Other forthcoming titles include: Sensuality: The Nature of Hawai'ian Performance Cartography, by Renee Pualani Louis, and "Salmon Is Everything": Theatre for Democracy in the Pacific Northwest, by Theresa May, a play and text about the 2002 fish kill in the Klamath Basin.



One of his paintings earned Best in Category at the Eiteljorg Indian Market in 2010.

Denise Emerson (Skokomish/Diné) translates basketry patterns of the Twana (Skokomish) and Diné cultures to the beaded medium to produce exquisite and unique beadwork pieces.

Jerry Laktonen (Alutiiq) was born and raised on Kodiak Island, Alaska, and is one of the premier Alutiiq carvers. He produces masks and paddles in addition to prints. His work is featured in museums and galleries throughout the country, including the Smithsonian, the National Museum of the American Indian, and the Museum of Art & Design in New York.

Israel Shotridge (Tlingit), who was born in Ketchikan, Alaska, is known for his public art and, in particular, for his totem pole carving. He adapts his Tlingit motifs for jewelry, prints, and cards.

Finally, Haida artist Sondra Simone Segundo hand paints traditional Haida designs on contemporary shoes and clothing. She has also written and illustrated a series of cultural children's picture books, which includes "Killer Whale Eyes."

Cloud computing is becoming the next generation IT solution for saving resources and conducting green computing. Government agencies are investigating cloud computing for their information technology needs in the following years. Pioneering projects are being conducted to investigate how geospatial applications can leverage cloud computing for provide reliability and scalability. For example, Microsoft is utilizing Azure Platform as a Service (PaaS) to support Earth, Environment, and Energy program within its external research. FGDC is conducting the GeoCloud Sandbox initiative with multiple agencies to develop common geospatial Platform as a Service (PaaS) solution. NASA is conducting Infrastructure as a Service (IaaS), spatial cloud computing and Data as a Service (DaaS) to investigate how cloud computing can be utilized for geospatial sciences and how to use geospatial principles to optimize cloud computing for serving a variety of dynamic user requirements. We employ the term of Spatial Cloud Computing (SCC) to capture these relationships and characteristics. This workshop is the first of four sessions on cloud computing to provide hands-on

experience about how geographers could use cloud computing through our experiences in the multi-agency GeoCloud Initiative, NASA Cloud Services, and Microsoft Azure-based GEOSS clearinghouse. Participants will be able to learn:

2. Canada-US Border (Security) Tour

3. Northwest Tribal Climate Change Initiatives

Tribal nations in the Pacific Northwest have already seen their cultures and economies threatened by climate change, including impacts on the salmon and other aquatic resource, increased flooding and glacial runoff, and damage to coastal communities. Northwest tribes have also been at the forefront of responding to the climate crisis, by drawing on traditional ecological knowledge, political sovereignty and a sense of community to enhance their historical resilience. This tour will go north of Seattle to visit the Swinomish Reservation near La Conner, and the Tulalip Reservation near Marysville, which have carried out innovative research projects for the adaptation and mitigation of climate change effects. The Swinomish Climate Change Initiative has emerged as a model planning project in Indian Country, and Tulalip's Qualco Energy biogas facility generates renewable energy as it reduces cattle waste in salmon streams. Both of these projects are carried out in collaboration with neighboring non-Native communities, in the spirit of a larger commitment to treaty rights and natural resource co-management in Washington. Come join us on a guided Edible & Medicinal Plants Tour in one of Seattle's celebrated green spaces located within minutes from the conference. The field trip will be led by Seattle plant expert Arthur Lee Jacobson (author of Wild Plants of Greater Seattle) and Environmental Anthropologist Dr. Melissa Poe (Institute for Culture and Ecology). The focus will be on in-season edible and medicinal plants, providing a chance to walk in a nearby forested area, learn about various uses of plants in the city, and hear about current applied research and urban planning efforts pertaining to urban foraging. 7. Seattle Downtown Walking Tour by Regional Development and Planning

This year's Regional Development and Planning Specialty Group signature walking tour features the past and present development highlights in Seattle's downtown core. With the cooperation of the Seattle's Department of Planning and Development, the tour will meander through the city's financial district to examine major commercial projects representing various generations of Seattle's innovative incentive zoning program, as well as new public facilities including the Seattle Public Library, light rail transit tunnel, Benaroya Symphony Hall, and the Seattle Art Museum. Skirting along the edges of the historic Pike Place Market and Belltown residential neighborhood, the group will travel through the downtown retail core and follow the new streetcar route along Westlake Avenue to the emerging Denny Triangle mixed use neighborhood and South Lake Union development beyond. The walk through this area will pass major projects that include the new Federal Courthouse square, new mixed use and residential towers, and the renovated Paramount Theater, returning the group to the convention center.

8. Seattle Rail Transit and Transit-Oriented Development

This one-day field trip will feature the light rail, streetcar and commuter transit systems operated by Seattle's Sound Transit, and the development occurring in and around their current and future station areas. Sound Transit has been busy building the foundation of the regional mass transit system approved by voters in 1996. The Sounder commuter rail line has been operating between Seattle and Tacoma since 1999 and between Seattle and Everett since 2003. The Central Link light rail system from Downtown Seattle to Tukwila opened in July 2009 and service extended to SeaTac airport in December 2009. In late 2008, work began on a northern extension to the University of Washington. On Nov. 4, 2008, voters of the Central Puget Sound region approved a historic Sound Transit 2 ballot measure that will add regional express bus and commuter rail service while building 36 additional miles of light rail to form a 55-mile regional system.

All field trips will depart from the Parking Garage Entrance on the Lower Level of the Washington State Convention Center.

The field trip will start at the Sound Transit headquarters with an overview of the current and future rail transit system in Seattle. We will ride the Sound Transit Link light rail to Rainier Valley to observe examples of transit-oriented development as a result of Sound Transit/City of Seattle/private sector collaboration. Then, we will walk two blocks and board Seattle City Streetcar to travel through the South Lake Union area with stops at key locations. After a presentation and lunch at Fare Start on the streetcar route, we will visit the King Street Station area and adjacent Pioneer Square. Finally, we will take a motor coach and follow the alignment of the recently approved East Link Light Rail Line over Lake Washington through Bellevue to the Microsoft Campus in Redmond.

14. Chateau Ste. Michelle and Hollywood Schoolhouse Wine District

From the anchor of the state's largest producer, Chateau Ste. Michelle, to numerous small boutique wineries, Woodinville is unique in that it may be the largest collection of wineries, in such a small region, so close to a major city anywhere in the world. This field trip will visit the beautiful Chateau Ste. Michelle winery, for a tour and lunch, and the historic Hollywood Schoolhouse district where one can visit over a dozen wineries.

9. Outer Limits and Beyond: The Impacts of Metro-Seattle's UGB on Rural Communities

The Seattle metropolitan area imposed an urban growth boundary (UGB) in the early 1990s. The purpose of the UGB was to assist in decreasing urban sprawl and limit the expansion of metropolitan services into the ever-expanding suburbs and rural areas. The impacts to the rural communities surrounding metro-Seattle include increased housing pressures, differences in tax revenues and changes in land uses. This field trip is designed to visit sites within King County, WA that represent the communities on the rural side of the urban growth boundary. Communities at the north and eastern edges of the UGB will be visited and local citizens will provide their insight into the UGB impacts.

16. Catastrophic Missoula Floods and Central Washington's Channeled Scablands

Join us as we explore the Central Washington evidence of world-class, late Pleistocene floods that originated from Glacial Lake Missoula in western Montana. These floods interacted with Miocene basalt flows and a loess cap to leave a bewildering array of landforms, collectively known as the Channeled Scablands. Field trip stops will include key flood evidence at Potholes Coulee, West Bar, Ephrata Fan, Soap Lake, lower Grand Coulee, and Dry Falls. Enroute, we will see the impacts of the Missoula Floods on prehistoric as well as contemporary land use. The field trip will involve several short (<2 mile) hikes on dirt trails. Bring footwear appropriate for such hikes. Weather east of the Cascades is typically very different from that of the Seattle area. Be ready for everything from sunny and warm (60-700F) to cloudy, windy, and cold (40oF). Lunch, snacks, and water will be provided.

13. The Queen City Comes Out: Historical Geographies of Lesbian and Gay Seattle

David Lowenthal's many articles, books and presentations have influenced humanistic research on landscape tastes and perceptions, conservation, the relationship between history and cultural heritage, and the history of geographic thought. A renowned and prolific author, his work includes the highly regarded *The Past Is a Foreign Country* (Cambridge University Press, 1985).

Lowenthal recently received the Forbes Prize for "conspicuous services to conservation," presented by the International Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works, its highest honor. His services to national and international heritage agencies and institutions have included, among others, UNESCO, the Getty Conservation Institute, the World Monuments Fund, the Council of Europe, Europa Nostra, English Heritage, the US National Trust for Historic Preservation, the National Trust of Australia, and the Norwegian Directorate of Cultural Heritage.

Lowenthal earned his PhD in history from the University of Wisconsin after receiving an M.A. in geography from the University of California, Berkeley in 1950, and a B.S. in history from Harvard University in 1944.

In her Past President's Address at the 2011 Annual Meeting, Carol Harden will examine how, over time, geographers have changed the ways in which they frame studies of the complex interrelationships that link people and places. "Framing and Re-framing Questions of Human-Environment Interactions" will build on Mel Marcus' 1979 AAG presidential address by reviewing and extending the history of physical geography over the past century.

Recent recognition of profound and widespread environmental change has brought human-environment interactions back onto center stage. Although physical geographers have a strong tradition of studying the impacts of human actions on the environment, Harden will suggest that, after having once ventured too far down the paths of environmental determinism and social Darwinism, geography as a whole has done too little to advance understanding of the feedbacks through which the environment influences the options and decisions of people and societies. Harden will use examples from her research in the Andes to illustrate feedbacks between humans and their environments and to emphasize that the atmosphere is only one aspect of the interactive, human-environment system undergoing change.

The AAG Presidential Achievement Award will also be presented to Professor **Patricia Gober**, Arizona State University, prior to the Past President's Address.
