



The Petitioners, Maria Juana Lugo de Foster,
widow and Maria Antonia Ruiz, my child of the
late Jose Ruiz now deceased, respectfully show
That on the 4th day of Sept A D 1840, Juan B
Alvarado Governor of California, by virtue of an
authority in him vested granted to the said Jose Ruiz
in company with one Engravi Lipulian, the tract
of land called San Pascual, situate in the
present County of Los Angeles, containing three
square leagues of land, within the boundaries set
forth in the grant, all of which is shown by the original
Espejante, a copy of which is submitted
herewith marked A with a translate or marked B.
That immediately after the date of the aforesaid grant
the said Ruiz and Lipulian received in full from
the said de jure, possession of the land aforesaid
That in the month of September A D 1841 the said
Jose Ruiz died in California, leaving the petitioners
his sole heirs,

That the said Ruiz remains to his death, & the petitioners
since his death, have occupied and possessed
the land aforesaid with stock a house and other
improvements,

That the said tract has not been surveyed by the
Surveyor General, but that its boundaries are
well known & fully described in the title papers;

That they rely for confirmation of title upon the
original papers copies of which are submitted herewith
& upon such other and further proofs as they may
be advised or necessary.

Wherefore they pray the commissioners
to confirm to them the undivided half of the
aforesaid tract of land called San Pascual"

de Foster whose petition is No 272 on the docket of the commission and was duly sworn his evidence being given in Spanish was interpreted by the Interpreter

The U.S. Associate Land Agent & contestants were notified and attended

In answer to questions of the counsel for the claimants the witness testified as follows

My name Jose de Leonnen Lugo, my age is forty years and I reside in Los Angeles and am a native of California

I was acquainted with Jose Arroy and Enrique Lopez - who are now dead. They are both dead, Lopez - re - da died at Monterey but I do not recollect the time, they died in this city in the beginning of January 1841. They died before the birth of September, they left a widow whose name was Maria de la Murcia Lugo, The daughters name was Maria Antonia Arroy who is now about fourteen or fifteen years, Arroy at the time of his death left a stock of cattle and horses on the rancho called San Pascual. This remained there four or five months when they were taken to the rancho of Antonio Maria Lugo the father of the widow of Arroy, and if his widow they were taken away because the owner, not being there, they were exposed - into the lost or destroyed and some had been

Killed. Lucy has lived on the land with his family
time I do not know how long - I frequently saw him
there in passing - Lucy came to this city in consequence
of sickness and to be cured. I came here
about three months before his death and
found him sick. I was sick in the same room
with him.

In answer to questions by the contesting claimants
(the claimant objecting) the witness says that
immediately after the death of her husband, the
widow of Lucy lived in her father's family. I
do not know whether she returned to the ranch
to him afterwards or not, I not residing with her.

On this day before Roland Hall one of the commissioners for ascertaining and settling claims under the Williams Land Claims in California, came Abel Stearns a witness produced in behalf of the claimants, Simon Basualdo Foster et al whose petition is No 277 on the docket of the Commission aqua was duly sworn, his evidence being given in English

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The W. Y. Associate Land Agent & the contestants were notified and attested

In answer to questions by the claimants the witness testified as follows

My name is Abel Stearns, my age is fifty four
now I reside in Los Angeles I have resided in
California twenty two years

I am acquainted with the hand writing and
signatures of Juan B Alvarado & Mamie Jimin
A paper now shown me purporting to be a
grant made to Dr George Sepulveda & Dr Jose
Perez by Juan B Alvarado dated 24th of Sept 1840
and marked No 1 H H and has to arrived, I have
examined the same and before the signatures
of the said Alvarado & Jimini appearing on
said paper be three true and genuine signatures

Also on the land described in "m" the title paper
before mentioned, it is situated in the county of
Los Angeles about six or seven miles in a Northern
direction from this place I was on the place
in the year 1840 or 1841, I saw a man named

in a small house on the land which we own
now. They have stock on the place Lipulveda
He collects have a pretty good stock of horses & mimos
and a small stock of cattle. They I think have
stock there. The occupation of Ruiz continued
until he died which was I think in 1841
Lipulveda I think occupied until his death
which I believe was in 1843, though he might
have been or driven off in consequence of another
grant of the land to Manuel Gorfis. Ruiz left a
widow and I think one child at the time of his
death, I cannot say whether she occupied it after
his death or not, I am inclined to think she did
not reside or keep stock there long.

The claim for the damages refers to any occu-
pations by the contending claimants,
In answer to questions by the committee of Manuel
Gorfis contending claimant the witness testified
as follows

I cannot tell the number of years Lipulveda
was on the land, I think he was there sometime be-
fore the grant to him, Ruiz I think must have
been there about two years. I cannot tell the
time with more certainty than I have done
that Lipulveda ceased to occupy.

Since Lipulveda and Ruiz ceased to occupy,
the land has I believe been occupied by Manuel
Gorfis or those employed by him. Gorfis I
believe has possession of the land at the present
time.

September 1840, It is situated in this county near
the mission of San Gabriel, When the grantees
made to Sepulveda and Ruiz & that they immediately
began to occupy the land with cattle horses &
and they built a house on it, & they afterwards urban-
ized it, Both Sepulveda & Ruiz are dead,
but do not recollect the time of the death of either
Sepulveda died with the small pox at Monterey
in the time an epidemic prevailed there Ruiz died
in this city in my opinion I think about the
year 1842, Ruiz left a widow and daughter the
name of the widow is Anna ^{also} married I do not know
the name of the daughter, she may be sometime or

fifteen years old, the widow is married to Stephen C. Foster. Her Father's name was Antonio Manadago. They had no stock on the land when he died, but he had a house there which house stood there two years ago,

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In answer to questions by the committee for the certifying claimant (submitted to by the committee for the claimant) the witness testifies as follows:

I do not know how long the land has been abandoned before the death of Lucy, Manuel Gompis is now in possession of the land I do not know how long he has been in possession.





The United States { claim for one half of the
Rancho called San Pascual in
the County of Los Angeles

This is a claim by the widow and only child of
José Ruiz deceased for one and a half leagues of
land in the County of Los Angeles being one
half of the Rancho known as San Pascual.
The petition sets out that Governor Alvarado
granted to the said José Ruiz in company with
one Enrique Sepulveda the same tract of
land containing three leagues within the
boundaries set forth in the grant. That imme-
diately after the date of said grant, finding no
possession of the land aforesaid was given to
said grantee. That said Ruiz died in Sept
1841 leaving petitions his sole heirs. That
said Ruiz remains to his death upon the petition
as true have unopposed possessed said
land with stock a house & other improvements.
A petition from Manuel Gafins, praying for
remission to intervene & contest the rights
of the claimants upon the ground that a grant
of the same land had been made to him
by Governor Micheltorena on the 28th of
Nov: 1843, upon denunciation of the previous
grant made to the said Ruiz and
repudiated by Governor Alvarado in 1840 is
found among the papers in the case. Although
the order of the Board allowing intervention

of this character has been long since rescinded
a question might nevertheless arise as to how
far the bonfire would take precedence of
official documents or records which are
on file in other cases before them, but which
are not kept in evidence in the one under consider-
ation, so far as I have been able to look
into the authorities on this point they tend to
the conclusion that a court in the examination
of a case cannot consider a fact which is within the
own knowledge but which is not proven by the
testimony, This rule would seem to apply with
equal force as to official documents & records
unless the authority on this last point are
very full and explicit, I however do not con-
sider it necessary to decide the question with this
leisure, The testimony presented without going
out of the record in the cause is sufficient to show
that the present claimants are not entitled
to a confirmation of the claim, The following
is a translation of the document upon which
it purports to be founded, Transl. B. Alvarado
Constitutional Governor of the Department of
the California.

Thomas Don Enrique Sipulvian & Don Jose
Perry have demanded the place called San
Pascual, with the extent of two & a half
square leagues for the purpose of occupying
it for their own personal benefit and that of
their families, the boundaries being the
River of San Gabriel, the Arroyo Seco and
the hills next to the Roblar, the proper measures
and examinations being previously made
as required by the laws and regulations I have
provisionally granted them the aforesaid place

observing the following conditions, They will
not impede the crossing of roads & boundaries
and will subject themselves to the command
of the lands which the establishment
of San Gabriel should acquire as its Imme-
diate Lands.

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PAGE 29.

In consequence of the fact that the present document
be sufficient to the persons interested for their
security and other purposes, Given in San
Gabriel the 24th of September 1840

(Signed) Juan B. Alvarado
(Signed) Manuel Jimenez
Secretary

The above document cannot be called a grant
or title in the legal acceptance of the term or as
contemplated by the Mexican Colonization Laws
and would therefore confer on the grantee no
right of property in the land itself. It is clearly
a mere grant of a provisional right of occupation
which might or might not have been perfected
into a complete title according to future circum-
stances and circumstances. Whether a grant
of this description would furnish a foundation
for such an equitable right as this does
would be bound to respect and ratify it is not
necessarily to enquire such a right would
only result from a full compliance with the
terms and conditions of the grant by such an
occupation or cultivation as was required by the
Mexican Laws and the equity thus created must
have been continuous and subsisting at the
time the jurisdiction of Mexico ceased and that
of the United States commenced. The evidence in
the documents in such state of facts, but on
the contrary it bears distinctly the reverse, it appears

that the ancestor of the claimants Jose Piny went upon the land built a house and had some cattle on it, That after remaining on it one or two years in the language of the witness he abandoned it and went to Los Angeles where he shortly after died in 1841 or 1842. That after his death his widow removed the few remaining cattle and that neither of the claimants have had possession of or occupied the land since under the Mexican Law or any provision or inheritance or grant like (the) the one now under consideration might be forfeited by a total abandonment of the premises by the grantee.

This abundantly proves by the history of the present claim, the record showing that the ancestor of the present claimants renounced his right to the land by denouncing that of another. The evidence in the lease also shows that after he had abandoned it, it was again granted by Governor Manuel Micheltorena to Manuel Gómez who has continued to possess and occupy it ever since,

This would only be done according to the law and usage of the country after a decree of for future issued upon appeal of the claimant,

From the evidence presented in the case without any reference to the facts stated in the petition for intervention or proven in the existing case to which it refers we can see no grounds either in law or equity which would entitle the petitioners to a confirmation of their claim.

It is therefore rejected
