





To the Honorable Commissioners to Settle Private Land
Claims in California

Petition of John
Wilson

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The petition of John Wilson respect
fully shows - That on the 10th day of October A.D. 1845
Pico Pico Governor of California, by virtue of authority
in him vested, granted to the petitioner jointly with his
partner in business James Scott the land called "Camado
del Chorro" in the present County of San Luis Obispo
containing about One Square League of land with
the boundaries described in the grant and set forth in
in the corresponding map: which said grant was
approved by the Assembly of California on the 8th day
of July A.D. 1846 a copy of which grant and certificate
of approval is submitted herewith marked "A"
with a translation marked "B"

That on the 15th day of May A.D. 1846 the said tract
of land was duly surveyed and the judicial possession
of it given to the said James Scott and the petitioner,
his partner in business in due form of law: a copy of
which act of survey and possession is submitted herewi
th marked "C" with a translation marked D

That on the 1st day of June 1848 the said Scott sold and
conveyed his right and interest in the said tract of land
to the petitioner - a copy of which conveyance is subm
itted herewith marked E with a translation marked F
And the petitioner further shows that the said
tract of land has not been surveyed by the Surveyor
General of the United States but that it was duly
surveyed and its boundaries marked at the time
of giving the judicial possession of it in 1846 as aforesaid
and since been surveyed by the County Surveyor of
the County of San Luis Obispo, a copy of a plan of
which survey is submitted herewith marked G
that petitioner has been ever since and before the date

of the grant aforesaid and now is in the quiet peaceful
and undisputed possession of the said tract of land
that he knows of no conflicting claim
That he relies for confirmation of title upon the original
papers, copies of which are submitted herewith
and upon the records and minutes in the Archives of
under the charge of the Surveyor General: And upon
such other and further proof as he may be advised
are necessary
Wherefore he prays the Commissioners to confirm to him the
said tract of land

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Whereas Don Diego Scott And Don Juan Alvarado have
for their personal benefit and that of their families
petitioned for the lands known by the name of
"Canada del Chorro" which is situated between the
lands of Guadalupe and those of the Indians
Romualdo and Trumbo and of the Rancho of the
Canada "los Osos", the necessary examinations having
previously been made as required by laws and
regulations on the matter, using the faculties which
are conferred on me in the name of the Mexican
nation I have in decree of this day granted them
the aforesaid land declaring to them the ownership
of it by these presents in conformity with the laws
of August 18th 1824 and regulations of Nov. 21st 1828
subject to the approval to the approval of the most
Excellent Assembly and under the following
conditions viz

1^o They may inclose it without prejudice to the cross
roads and servitudes and enjoy it freely and exclusively
making such use and cultivation of it as they may
see fit with the understanding that this is granted
as an extension of the land which they possess called
Canada de los Osos

2^o The land thus granted in donation is in extent
One sitio de ganaderia mayor (One by League) or some
what less as shown on the map, which goes with the
Espediente; the proper Magistrate will give them
judecial possession in virtue of this order and will
make out the boundaries with the necessary lands
marks

In consequence I order that this title being held as
firm and valid, note be made of it in the proper

book and it be delivered to the parties interested for their security and other purposes

In the place of the Chono on the 15th day of the month of May One thousand eight hundred and forty six present I the Justice of the Peace and Assisting Witnesses, there arrived the Señores Guadalupe Martínez Victoria Linarez, and Jose Mariano Bonello, for the summons which was made them, and I made official note of it, which I signed in rubric

In the same ^{year} month & year I the Justice of the peace of the demarcation of San Luis Obispo accompanied by those of my assistance and being present Don Juan Wilson; for want of a profound Surveyor, I decide to appoint two measuring rope bearers, and did appoint from the bystanders the inadvertent Augustin Martinez and Vicente Félez, of whom after having accepted the office, I required an oath which they made by God our Lord and the Holy cross to discharge faithfully their appointment, and I made official note of it and signed it with the assisting Witnesses

In continuation in the same place day month and year I the Justice of the peace of the demarcation of San Luis Obispo with the assisting witnesses went over a end to be measured one hundred Varas long with which to make the measures of the land and a rope of pita (grass rope) was measured one hundred Spanish Varas long and two stakes were fixed to its extremities which I noted officially and signed with assisting witnesses

In continuation in the same place day month and year & the Magistrate of the demarcation of San Luis Obispo accompanied by those of assistance and bystanders before mentioned for the purpose of commencing the survey we went to the place where meet the boundaries of Rancho of Los Osos and that of don Guadalupe Contreras which place is designated by the name of Piedra Spanada which is at the foot of the Cerro which is called Romualdo and the rope bearing taking the cordel by its extremities and stakes commenced to measure N^o E^o to some Oaks which are seen on the ridge near S^o to the "Sieru del pinar" which point is marked by a portacuelo which is opposite to it on the main ridge of said sieru distant fifty cordels, thence the measurement was continued E^o S^o to the boundaries of Olivet and this place is marked by a cornallu in which ^{the} "Tiroyo" which is called of the Chino commences, distant twenty nine cordels. Thence they measured down the said arroyo to the boundaries of the lands of Romualdo in the direction S^o E^o distant thirty cordels, thence it was continued westward and ended at the same rock where the measurements

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were commenced of said Land, distant twenty nine
 Cordels with which the measurements were finished
 and the boundaries designated, the sum of which
 was thirteen thousand eight hundred Varas said
 Survey being thus finished and the Colindantes
 ascertained, and there no opposition of any person, to
 perfect the act, in the presence of all the bystanders
 I took by the hand Dm Juan Wilson and in a
 loud voice said to him. In the name of the Mexican
 Nation I give you possession of the Land which
 has granted to you, and now measured, and
 having directed him to make some demonstration
 of having acquired the useful and direct knowledge
 and with it the ownership of said Land as the
 sole Lord of it, he dug up earth, pulled up grass
 & three stones with which the act was finished.

Don Juan Wilson having at this time, requested that
 these Original documents be delivered to him, in testi-
 mony of which I signed with those of Apóstoles

The United States Opinion by Commissioner H. J. Thimble.

The claim in this case presented, is founded upon a grant made by Pro Poco Governor of California to the claimant, and one (Drego) James Scott in virtue of the Decree of the 18th of August 1834 of the Ordinance of the 3rd of November 1838 of the Mexican Government. The grant is for one square league or somewhat less which alternative terms are inoperative or insignificant except as they constitute a restriction of the grant within the boundaries of the deceno. By a statement of the Custodian of the Archives of the former Government of the Country which is agreed to be taken as evidence: by the production of the original documentary evidences of title, and by the other testimony in the case it satisfactorily appears that the grant was duly made by competent authority on the 10th of October 1845. That it was approved by the Departmental Assembly on the 8th of July 1846. That a measurement and jurisdiction upon was had of the premises in May 1846; that the requirement of the Law and of the grant as Occupation or Cultivation was fully complied with, and that the interest of the joint grantee Scott was regularly conveyed to the claimant. Having decided already in many cases, that the approval by the Departmental Assembly of the grant of the Governor did not constitute such a necessary ingredient in the vestiture of any right or title, as that the failure of the Governor to procure it would prevent a confirmation, under the Act of the 3rd March 1851, it is not thought necessary to do more than merely advert to the fact that the approval in this case was made after the 7th of July 1846 the day on which the American flag was hoisted and the rule of the

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Country aforesaid, by the authority of the United States.



That said Judicial Survey and possession was not made according to the Calls and boundaries of the alleged original grant and map; and that said Survey is vague and indefinite; and there is no evidence that said Pico was a magistrate on the 15th of May AD1846, with lawful authority and jurisdiction in the premises.

10. That the Grantees have not proved that they built a house on the land within a year from the date of the grant, and that it was occupied, and that they cultivated the land. And it is denied that they built a house on the land claimed within a year from the date of the grant, and that it was occupied, and that they cultivated the land, as required by law.

11. And it is alleged that the said Diego Scott and Juan Wilson, grantees as alleged, at the date of said grant by said Pico, were not either of them, by birth, citizens of Mexico, and that they were foreigners, and were not naturalized citizens of Mexico, and could not therefore at that time lawfully acquire, or hold lands in fee in California.

Most Excellent Departmental Assembly.

Whereas Don Diego Scott and Don Juan Wilson have asked, for their own personal benefit and that of their families, for the Land Known by the "Canada del Chorro", which is bound manifest between the lands of Guadalupe Cantua, of the Indians Romualdo and Toribio, and of the Rancho of the "Canada de los Osos", the examinations concerning the matter being previously made according to what is directed by the laws and regulations on the subject, using the powers conferred on me in the name of the Mexican nation, I have by decree of this day granted to them the said land, declaring to them the ownership of it by these present letters, in conformity with the law of August 18th 1824 and the regulation of November 21st 1828, subject to the approbation of the Most Excellent Assembly, and under the following conditions:

1st They may enclose it without prejudice to the crossings, roads and easements, and enjoy it freely & exclusively, making the use and cultivation of it which may best suit them, with the understanding that it is granted to them as an addition to the land which they possess called "Canada de los Osos".

2nd The land which is granted is of the extent of one square leagues, or

a little less, as the map in the expediente shows; the respective judge will give the judicial opinion in virtue of this despatch, and will mark the lines with the necessary land marks.

Wherefore I order that the present title being held as good & valid, note be taken of it in the proper book, and it be delivered to the parties interested for their security & other ends.

Given in the city of Los Angeles on this common paper for want of the corresponding stamped paper, this 10th day of October 1845.




