





Be it Remembered, that on this twenty sixth day of May, Anno Domini One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-Two, before the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San Francisco, in the State aforesaid, in the United States of America, the following Proceedings were had, to wit;

The Petition of Juan Pico de Rodriguez et al. for the place named "Canada de San Miguelito" was presented, and ordered to be filed and docketed with No. 242 and is as follows, to wit;

Petition

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The Petitioners, Juana Pio de Rodrigues,
widow, and José de Jesus ^{Jose Ignacio} Rodriguez, and
Juan Antonio, children, of Don Ramon
Rodrigues deceased, respectfully show:

That on the 30th day of May 1848 Pio Pico,
Governor of California, granted to Ramon
Rodrigues provisionally the tract of land
called "Canada de San Miguelito" or Cañada
del Diablo, in Santa Barbara County, which
is shown by the original papers copies of
which are submitted herewith marked "A" with
a translation marked "B".

That on the 21st day of March A.D. 1846,
the said Governor of California, by virtue of
authority in him vested, granted in fee to
the said Ramon Rodrigues the aforesaid tract
of land, containing two square leagues of
land, as described in the corresponding map;
that the said grant was duly approved on
the 10th day of June 1846; all of which is fully
shown in the original Expediente, a certified
copy of which is submitted herewith
marked "C" with a translation marked "D".

That the said tract of land has not been
surveyed by the Surveyor General of the United
States, but that its extent is definite and
its limits fully defined in the grant and
corresponding map, and are well known;

That the said Ramon Rodrigues and
the petitioners his heirs, have been ever
since the date of said grant, and that

his heirs now are, in the quiet, peaceful, and undisputed possession of the said tract of land;

That on the day of December A.D. 1848 the said Ramon Rodrigues died, leaving the petitioners, his widow and children, as his sole heirs.

That they know of no conflicting claim; That they rely for confirmation of title upon the original papers, copies of which are submitted herewith, and upon such other and further proofs as they may be advised are necessary:

Wherefore they pray the Commissioners to confirm to them the aforesaid tract of land.

I know the Rancho called "Cáñada de San

San Buenaventura; Ramon Rodrigues occupied
it in 1843 with his cattle; he was killed in
1848 or 9 near Santa Barbara; he left a
wife and children who have occupied it since
his death.

Deposition of
H. W. Halleck

This day before Comr. Stephens Welch came
Henry W. Halleck a witness in behalf of
Claimants Juanita Tio de Rodrigues et al.
No 242, who after being duly sworn deposed
as follows.

I, Henry W. Halleck, one of the Atts of
Record in this case, do solemnly swear that
Ramon Rodrigues the Grantee in this case
was killed in the service of the United States
near Santa Barbara in 1848, and that I
am acquainted with the Petitioners in this

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case and believe them to be his only heirs.
The original title or Testimonia, dated the
21st day of March A.D. 1846, and being the
same as copied in the Expediente filed in this
case and signed by the Governor & Secretary,
and ~~is delivered to the original grantee~~, has
to the best of my knowledge and belief been
lost. It was sent by the widow to Santa
Barbara to be recorded prior to filing it before
this Honorable Board, and the messenger
on his return reported that he had acci-
dently lost it in the surf on the Beach
near Santa Barbara. Said Messenger
lives some five or six hundred miles from
this place and could not be brought here
without great expence. The land claimed
in this case is mostly barren hills and of
little value, and the widow is too poor to
pay the expenses of a journey of over five
hundred miles to make affidavit of these
facts, or to send witnesses to prove them.
The above statement is true to the best of
my knowledge and belief.





Notwithstanding the report of the Justice of the
Peace of San Buenaventura, this Sub-Prefec-
ture is well assured that in the place pe-
titioned for by the person interested in this
instance has never been occupied by the
Mission with self-moving property, for in
former times it was occupied only as a
pasture ground for horses which belonged
to the equipment of six men, soldiers who

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remained as an escort in said Mission, and consequently I think that there is no objection to granting the said land to the person interested, he leaving in peaceable possession some Indians who have established themselves in the mouth of the Canada which forms the said land. This is all I can report in compliance with the superior desire of His Excellency the Governor.

Having seen the petition with which this expediente commences, the reports made on it, which have been considered necessary with all other information presented and proper

title given and necessary with the following

"Canada de San Miguel" named also "Canada
del Diablo" in San Buenaventura, and in extent

manner prejudice the Indians who may be

grant for the approval of the Most Excellent
Departmental Assembly Pio Pico, Governor *ex*

Whereas, citizen Ramon Rodriguez
Dept. Gov. of Califas has, for his own personal
benefit and that of his family petitioned for
the land named Canada de San Miguelito also
Canada del Diablo in the Mission of San Buenaventura,
the proper examinations being
previously made, using the faculties which
are conferred on me in the name of the
Mexican Nation I have, in decree of this day,
granted him the aforesaid land, declaring

To him the ownership of it by these presents, in conformity with the Law of Aug. 18' 1824 and Regulations of Nov. 21' 1828, subject to the approval of the Most Excellent Departmental Assembly and under the following conditions:

1. He may enclose it without prejudice to the crossings, roads and servitudes, and enjoy it freely and exclusively making such use and cultivation of it as may best suit him, but he shall not in any manner prejudice the Indians who may be found established there.

2. He shall begesh the proper magistrate to give him judicial possession in virtue of this Title, by whom the boundaries will be marked out with the necessary bounds.

3. The land of which donation is made is solely two square Leagues, as shown by the map which goes with the Expediente.

The Magistrate who may give the possession will cause it to be measured agreeably with the ordinance, leaving to the Nation for the uses it may think proper, the surplus which may result.

In consequence I order that the present title being held as firm and valid, note be taken of it in the proper book and it be delivered to the person interested for his security and other purposes.

Given in the City of Los Angeles, on this common paper for want of that of the proper stamp on the twenty first of March eighteen hundred and forty six.

Opinion

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The Petitioners in this case represent in their petition that, on the 31st day of March A.D. 1846, Governor Pio Pico granted to Ramon Rodrigues a certain tract of land containing two Square Leagues which was described on a map. The said petitioners further represent that, on the 10th day of June A.D. 1846, the said grant was duly approved by the Departmental Assembly. And that on the

day of December 1848 the said Ramon Rodrigues died, leaving the petitioners his widow, and children as his sole heirs.

In support of the foregoing allegations and averments the petitioners have placed on file as evidence in this case, a traced copy of the Expediente taken from the Archives on file in the United States Surveyor General's Office for California, which contains a copy of what purports to be a copy of the original grant, together with the record of approval by the Departmental Assembly.

The petitioners have also placed on file, an ex parte affidavit of Henry W. Halleck, one of the Attorneys of record in this case.

This is stated in said affidavit that Ramon Rodrigues the grantee was killed in the service of the United States in the year

25
1848, and that he believed the petitioners in this case were his only heirs. It is further stated in said affidavit that the original title dated 21st of March A.D. 1846 is the same copied in the Despacho which is filed in the case, and which was signed by the Governor & Secretary and delivered to the grantee, but was lost before it could be filed before this Commission. The affidavit contains other statements in regard to the loss of said title which it is not necessary here to state.

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It is proved by the Deposition of A.A. Dew that, Ramon Rodriguez the original grantee, occupied the place called Canada San Miguelito or Canada del Diablo in the year 1843, with his cattle, and that he was killed near Santa Barbara in 1848 or 9, and that he left a wife and children who have occupied said place since his death.

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Without enquiring into the legality of the secondary evidence, which has been introduced in this case, the claimants have not only failed to prove the inhabitancy of the original grantee upon the land, or that he built a house within the time prescribed by the land, but they have failed to show that he even occupied it with cattle, within that time. The proof is that he occupied it with cattle in the year 1843, this was after the time when the Government of Mexico had ceased to exercise jurisdiction over California, and when it was in possession of the Americans. We have repeatedly decided that no such could be

performed after the Mexican Government ceased to exercise jurisdiction in California, that would create an equity as against that Government, which would be binding upon the United States to carry into a complete title. We can only adjudge that which was binding upon the former Government, at the time when jurisdiction ceased, and such obligations subsequently incurred by our own Government, a case presenting merit of the latter character must seek relief from the political department of this Government, this Commission has no jurisdiction in such cases.

In this case it does not appear that any judicial measurement was ever made, or that any separations of the land granted from the other public lands was ever effected, for this reason as for want of equity, the claim is deemed to be invalid, and its confirmation is therefore denied

Remarks.

This case was decided by the Commissioners
under the rule and with such testimony only as could
be found in San Francisco, none of the proper
witnesses having appeared in the case. It

were necessarily rejected for want of proof
These proofs are now supplied and the
case comes within the rules of decision
made in other cases.

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The occupation and improvement of this
land and the building of a house by the
grantee is proved, even prior to his receiving
the formal title, and under the provincial
grant purview given.

The existence of the original grant in the
hands of the original grantee is proved, also
its loss, with all the attending circumstances,
and its contents. The loss of this title being
proved, the upholder becomes the best
secondary witness: This contains all
the proceedings of the case, with the decree
of concession. A full copy of the title issued
to Rodriguez; the grant is for quantity
- 2 square leagues - and the boundaries
described in the grant and represented
on the map in the upholder are sufficiently
definite to enable the Surveyor General to
locate the land.

Besides, the testimony makes the map
perfectly clear - the ranch is by the
map intended to be two leagues long &
one league wide - it lies west of
the San Benaventura River which is
one boundary - and it is on the sea-coast
which is another boundary - make a
parallelogram - one side being one league
on the river - and another, two leagues on
the sea coast, and you have the land
conveyed - according to the map, and
the testimony which fully explains the map.

ques. Do you remember when you lost these papers?

Aus. I believe it is impossible from the manner in which they were lost.

Ques. ~~According to the pledge signed by any person or persons, if so, by whom~~

Ques. How old are the children of Ramon Rodriguez whom you have mentioned.

Aus. I think the eldest must be about twelve years old.

Ques. Who se presents them as agent and Tutor in this case, and who employed the Counsel in this case, if you know.

Aus. I am their agent and Tutor, and I employed the Counsel in this case.

Ques. Were the title papers which you mention as having lost, signed by any person or persons, and if so, by whom. (objected to by ~~Ady.~~)

Aus. They had the signature of the Governor, ~~Pico~~.

Ques. Was there any other paper beside the Concession when these title papers were lost?

Aus. There was no other paper beside my appointment as Tutor to the children.

Ques. Do you remember the date or the contents of this paper so lost. (objected to by ~~Counsel~~ M.S. Atty.)

Aus. The date was some time in March 1846. and the contents were a concession of land made by the Mexican Government.

Ques. To whom was the concession made and of what land.

Aus. The Concession was made to Ramon Rodriguez, for the land known as the Canada de San Miguelito, otherwise called

Ques. Was it or not in the usual form of concessions of land in California (objected to by his Atty.)

Aus. He occupied I don't remember the month, but it was in the year 1845. He ~~occupied~~ put about five hundred head of cattle on it, and between twenty five and thirty head of horses,

Ques. Did he ever have a house on it, if so, when, and what kind of a house.

Aus. He built a house shortly after he put the cattle on the Ranch, the house was made of Palo Parado.

Ques. Who has occupied this Rancho since that time, if any one.

Ans. It was occupied by Ramon Rodriguez up to his death, & since then by his widow, mother and other relations.

Ques. Has any other house been built on the land since the one built in 1845. If so, when, by whom, and what kind of a house.

Ans. There was another built near the river by the widow, the same kind of a house as the one first built. The second house was built some time during this year.

Ques. Who lives in it.

Ans. The widow lives in it, and her brother Joaquin my son.

Ques. Where do you live.

Ans. At San Benaventura -

Ques. How far from the Mission and in what direction.

Ans. Close to the Mission on the western side.

~~Ques.~~ Immediately adjoining the Mission buildings -

Ques. When were you appointed Tutor of the Children of Ramon Rodriguez -

Ans. I think it was in 1837. I am not quite sure '37 or '38 - I am not quite sure but think it was previous to 1837.

Ques. Who appointed you Tutor.

Ans. My daughter the Mother of the Children

Ques. Did she give a paper of your appointment.

Ans. She did.

Ques. Have you ever had any other paper besides that making you Tutor.

Ans. No.

Ques. Was that paper signed by the Mother of

Ques. Did you ever get a paper from your daughter like the one you lost, or from any body else.

Ans. No, I did not.

Ques. When was it that you lost these papers you have described.

Ans. I don't recollect whether it was at the end of 1831, or beginning of 1832.

Ques. Whose names were signed, if any, to the paper which you have described as a grant from Pico.

Ans. I don't recollect of any other than the signature of ~~Pio~~ Pio, Governor Pico. It had other signatures of members of the Departmental Assembly, approving the title but I don't recollect the precise names.

Ques. What was the date of that approval.

Ans. I don't recollect. I might recollect

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by looking at the copies in the manuscript,
and I presume they must be of the
same date, but I do not like to
do so, as the question refers to the paper
I actually lost.

Ques. What was the date of the concession
when Goussay was given by Governor
Pico.

Ans. I do not recollect. I have seen the

Ques. Where did you lose these papers, what part of the Road was it.

Aus. I lost at the edge of the water on the Beach, and that a place about four leagues from San Buenaventura called Punta Gorda. I first missed the papers and returned to search for them.

Ques. Was there any one with you at the time you searched them.

Aus. No.

Ques. Which way were you going at the time.

Aus. I was going to Santa Barbara to present the papers to the Probate Court.

Ques. How far is the land you have mentioned from the Mission of San Buenaventura at its nearest point.

Aus. From the Church to the River is about one thousand yards, which is the nearest point to the Rancho.

Ques. How far is the Rancho from the main Road between San Buenaventura

and Santa Barbara.

Aus. The Road passes through the Rancho.

Ques. What part of the Rancho does the Road pass through

Aus. along the edge of the Sea Beach which is a boundary of the Rancho.

Ques. How far is it from the Sea Beach ~~to~~ to the mouth of the Canada of San Miguelito or San Diablo.

Aus. A league, a little more or less.

Ques. What is the length of this Canada from its mouth, and what is its average width?

Aus. I don't recollect exactly what length it is. As to its width, it is very narrow, the mouth being its widest part. in some places it may be one hundred yards wide in others less.

Ques. What is the general course of the Canada from its mouth to its head.

Aus. It is not straight, but generally runs in a westerly direction.

Ques. Was the little ^{house} which Gonsalz Ramon Rodriguez built in 1845 located in this Canada or not.

Aus. ~~at the~~ It was located at the extreme end ~~edge~~ of the Canada on the brow of the Hill on the South side of ~~at the~~ Canada, and immediately below the House was the water running into the Canada.

The appellants in this case claim the ~~land~~ land in question as the widow and children, and only heirs of the said Ramon Rodriguez who is proven to have deceased - There is no question as to the rights of the appellants as the heirs of the said Ramon Rodriguez, he is proven to have died in 1846 leaving them his only heirs.

The grounds upon which this claim was rejected by the Commissioner was that no substantial compliance with the condition of the grant had by the original grantee within the required time had been shown, and that there was no judicial possession of the land given, These

objections have been so often, discussed and overruled by this Court, that it is not necessary for me to notice them further ~~more~~, than merely to say, that they are sufficient to defeat a grant otherwise good. —

The real question in this case is to the sufficiency of the evidence offered: to ~~suspect~~ the allegation of a grant to prove the fact that a grant did issue as alleged at the time it was approved by the General Assembly — This question the Commission did not undertake to determine as they had come to the conclusion to reject the claim upon the grounds alone stated —

~~The evidence offered to prove~~

The original has not been offered in evidence in this case and it is alleged to have been.

The affidavit of one of the claimants, Inana Tico de Rodriguez, (widow of the original grantee) is on file as is to the effect, that her said husband Ramon died in or about the 11 December A.D. 1846, leaving his self and the

claimants in this case his only heirs,
that when he so died he was legally
possessor of the land claim, by virtue
as she believes of a written title from
the Government of California.

With on the death of her husband, her
father took possession of all his papers
as the agent of himself and Tutor of
her minor children, and that the
paper taken charge of by her father Fer-
nando Yico, was as she was informed
and believed, the original for the land
in question, but being unlettered she
is unable to describe them or to state
particularly their contents. —

That she was afterwards informed by
her father that he had left said title
papers on the beach between Santa
Barbara and San Buenaventura
some time about the year 1851. or 1852.
With she has never seen said papers
since, that she does not know where
they are, nor can she produce them.

The next evidence in order is the
 deposition of Fernando Yico, the father
 of the widow, taken before the United
 States Commissioners.

He means that on the death of

that on the death of Ramon Rodriguez
which occurred in 1848, he took
charge of all his papers, that
among them ~~were~~ were the title papers
for the land in question, that the
grant was in the name of Ramon
Rodriguez, and that he took the
title papers, while he was going from
San Buenaventura to Santa Barbara.
This in my opinion is sufficient
to let in secondary evidence of the
nature which is offered to hit the
affidavit of the proceeding had
upon the original return of Rodriguez
for the land, and a copy of the
grant, found among the papers
of the former Government, now in
possession of the Surveyor.

My question was asked the hit
was lied as to the handwriting
of the grant, and some
times his evidence was contradicted
but not more so than might be
expected from so ignorant a
man, but his evidence upon
that point need not have been
admissible under the circumstances
and therefore to that extent it is

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ruled out, and we must look to the evidence for the contents of the grant, that being admitted as evidence proves conclusively taken together with the other facts may such a grant did issue and also the contents of that grant and it is evidence of as high a character almost as the grant itself, & that expedient than we must turn our attention.

From it we learn that Brodrig was petition Governor Pico for a tract of land as described in a map which accompanied his petition after the usual steps were taken the grant was issued by Governor Pico on the 21st March as alleged and was approved by the Board mortal Assembly on the 10th of June 1844, the grant describes the land under the name of ^{La} ^{Cangada} ^{Miguelite} or Cangada del Diablo in the mission of San Buenaventura, and the 3^r condition further describes it as being for two square leagues, as shown in the accompanying map; reserving the sobrance to the natives

The map is thus made & pack
up the trunk and to it we add
with a description of the land.

The map is quite definite
enough to enable a surveyor to
go upon and survey the land
the tract is surrounded by natural
boundaries which can easily
be found; on one side is a River
(the Río Buena Ventura) in two
of the other sides high hills and
on the other an aqueduct or swamp.
There can be no difficulty in as-
certaining the tract within the ex-
terior boundaries of which the
quantity called for in the grant
is to be located. The claimant
is therefore entitled to a confirma-
tion of his claim to the extent
of two square leagues within
the exterior limits as marked
upon the map; and a decree
will be entered accordingly.
