

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Be it Remembered, that on this Seventeenth day of February,
Anno Domini One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-two, before
the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in
the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San
Francisco, in the State aforesaid, in the United States of America,
the following Proceedings were had, to wit;

The Petition of Francisco Perez Pacheco,
for the Place named
"San Justo,"
was presented, and ordered to be filed and docketed with No. 47 and

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Petition

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To the Honorable the Commissioners for
settling private Land claims in California -

The petition of Francisco Pacheco respectfully shows us that he claims the
tract of land known as San Justo a descrip-
tion of which will be given hereafter under the
following claim of title to wit:

That one Jose Castro a
Mexican by birth and inhabitant of the Pueblo de
San Juan in the Northen part of the present
County of Monterey on the 11th day of April 1839
made and presented his petition to Hon^{ble} (Hon^{ble} ^{Sir})
Alvarado then Governor of California, solic-
iting for himself the grant of the tract of land
known by the name of San Justo and setting
forth therein that the Government had previously
granted the same land to an Rafael Gonzales.
That that the said had abandoned it entirely
Wherefore said petitioner Jose Castro
claimed to annul the said Gonzales or any body
claiming under him for the non performance of
the conditions of said grant.

That said Governor Al-
varado referred said petition to the Alcaldes of
the Municipality for report thereon on the 12th of
April 1839 -

That said Alcaldes on the 13th
of April 1839 reported that said lands were
waste and did not belong to anybody and
that there was no obstacle to grant a grant
of said land according to the prayer of
Jose Castro's petition.

That thereafter the said
Governor Alvarado on the 15th day of April 1839
by virtue of the authority vested in him as
Constitutional Governor of California declared
the said Jose Castro to be the owner of the
tract known as San Justo. Stating at the same
time that this said document whereby he
had declared him as owner should serve him
as a sufficient title to said land.

That on the 26th day of July A.D.
1844 said Jose Castro made and executed
a conveyance of all his right title and interest

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in Ano de Señor Francisco Pachico, your petitioner.
And your petitioner further states that
said petition of Jose' Castro reference report
and a copy of the grant made by said Gover-
nor are now on file among the Archives of the State
of California in the possession of the Surveyor
General of the United States of America for
California, and that duly certified copies and
translations of the same are herewith submitted
and prayed to be made a part to this petition
and further that said original grant or
decreed together with the Causance of said
leashes to your petitioner are in the possession
of your petitioner and ready to be offered in
Evidence whenever required.

That the boundaries of said
land according to the terms of the grant are as
follows -

On the North by the lands of Don
Francisco Pachico -

On the East by the Oak woods called
Pollar do San Joaquin and the River del
Rosario -

On the South by the Gavilan Mountains -
On the West by the point of the hill of the
Buenafuerte -

That said land lies in the County
of Monterey in the neighborhood of the Old
Mission of San Juan, is known under the
name of San Justo and contains four square
leagues more or less.

And your petitioner further states that
said Jose' Castro immediately after obtain-
ing said grant took and held possession of
said land until he conveyed it to your peti-
tioner and that since the time said conveyance
was made to him your petitioner has been in
possession of it and exercised full and complete
ownership over the same -

And your petitioner further states that
he has recently been informed that a certain
Hernando and Charles Philip pretend to have
title to said Rancho San Justo under a convey-

couerfance from Rafael Gonzales who had
once obtained a grant of said land as aforesaid.
but then abandoned it, but that said Hernandez
and White cannot have a good
and lawful title thereto, as said Rafael Gonzales
did not comply with the conditions of his
land grant and thereby lost his right to it.

Your petitioner therefore claims to be
the owner of said tract of land and prays
that your Honorable Body will confirm his
claim and title thereto —

Before Mr. Camp & Thornton
one of the Board of Commissioners to ascertain
and settle private land claims in the
State of California. Name Jose Rafael Gon-
zales a native supernumerary to testify in behalf
of the claimant Francisco Perez Pachico whose
petition is No. 17 on the docket —

The Law Agent of the United States being
present and the said witness having been by
me first duly sworn testified as follows to wit.

Questions propounded by the Claimant —
Question 1st —

What is your name, age, place of
nativity and residence at present?

Answer 1st —

Jose Rafael Gonzales, my age is
sixty seven — my birth place the city of Mexico
and my present residence San Jose de Guadalupe.
Question 2nd,

What have you resided for the last
fifteen years?

Ans. 1st

I have resided in Monterey since
1833 with few exceptions -

Ques. 2nd

In what part of Monterey?

Ans -

I resided at the port of Monterey.

Ques. 4.

State if you held any offices under
the Government of Mexico in California?

Answer.

I was the collector of the customs in
Monterey -

Ques. 5th

No you know a place or Rancho
in California called San Justo?

Answer.

I do know it because it was granted
to me -

Ques. 6th

State where it is situated?

Answer.

It is about one league North of the
Mission of San Juan and believe it is in the
present County of Monterey opposite the mouth
of the Mission -

Ques. 7.

No you know who has been in posses-
sion of San Justo if anyone has for the past
six or seven years -

Ans -

Francisco Pino Pacheco has occupied it
during that time by transfer made to him by
the Jose Castro for valuable consideration -

Ques. 8 -

What was the date of your grant of
which you spoke -

Ans -

It was granted to me in 1836 but
I do not remember the date -

Ques. 9.

Did you do anything towards taking
possession of it by virtue of that grant -

Ans -

I did not -

Ques. 11th.

Do you know who was in possession
of San Justo first after the year 1834 and
how it was occupied thence up to the time
when Pachico took possession -

(The Law Agent objects to the above Question)

Answe -

No one occupied it.

Ques. 11.

In what way has Pachico occupied
it since he took possession?

Ans -

He occupied it with his cattle.

Ques. 12.

How far is San Justo from the port of
Montevideo -

Ans -

About thirteen leagues -

Cross interrogatories propounded by the N S
Law Agent -

Cross Ques. 1st.

Is San Justo within two leagues
of the sea? -

Ans - It is not.

Cross Ques. 2.

Why did not you take pos-
session of San Justo under the Grant made
to you in 1834 -

Ans -

Because I had Conveyed my right
to another person - I did not consider myself
authorized to take possession of it -

Cross Ques. 3d.

What other reason of any was
there why you did not take possession, have
you not named another reason in attempting
to answer Interrogatory Nine, in Chas - If so
state that reason -

Ans -

Because in 1836 a revolution broke out
in California in consequence of which all
Militia were dispersed, and in order not to lose

My interest in the grant I made a transfer
to a Native Californian
Crops Inst. 4.

To whom and when did you
make such transfer -

Ans -

To the late Juan Hernandez in the
said year of 1834 -
Crops Inst 5

Did you transfer it to him to
hold for his benefit or for yours?

Ans -

For the benefit of both.
Crops Inst. 6th

Do you now claim an interest in
this Rancho? -

Ans -

I claim none -
Crops Inst 7th

Why do you not claim an interest?

Ans.

Because White paid me two thousand
Five hundred dollars - The person I refer to
is Charles White an Englishman living in San
Jose who brought the interest off which
Manuel Hernandez as heir of Juan Hernandez -
dy might have -
Crops Inst 8th

Has Mr. White to your knowledge
any interest in this Rancho - has he to your
knowledge made any bargain about the
Rancho with the Claimants?

Answer to Crops Inst 8th

I do not know that White has
any interest in this Rancho, but I do know that
White has instituted suit in the County of
Montejo against Pacheco claiming the
said Rancho -
Crops Inst 9 -

Please for her paid anything
by the Claimant with reference to this claim
or the Rancho?

Ans

There not been paid anything by the

by the Claimant.

Ques 1st Inst 14th.

Have you made any bargain
with the Claimant Pelegrino from which you
are to derive any advantage from this claim
if confirmed?

Ans.

He has made no bargain with me

Claimant Continues by Claimant,

Inst 1st.

When did those transactions, of which
you have just spoken between yourself and
White and between White and Hernandez
take place?

Ans -

Between myself and White the transaction
took place about a year ago. but
between White and Hernandez I do not know
the date.

Inst 2.

Do you know when White first came
to live in this country.

Ans -

I do not know when nor how White
came to this country. I knew him first as
Alcalde of San Jose de Guadalupe about
six years ago -

Inst 3 -

Do you know when Juan Hernandez
died?

Auswer

I do not know.

Inst 4th -

Did you leave in California in
consequence of the Revolution?

Ans.

I did not leave.

Inst 5th -

Where did Juan Hernandez continue
to reside after the year 1836?

Ans -

Has he continued to live in his house in
San Jose until he died?

Ques 1st.

Do you recollect whom last year
I saw Juan Hernandez -

Answer -

About three years ago I saw him
for the last time when he was sick -

Ques 2d.

Did you or Juan Hernandez in
his life time ever exercise any acts of
ownership over the Rancho of San Justo
or attempt to take possession of it.

Ans -

I know Exercise any acts of own-
ship over the Rancho of San Justo or
attempt to take possession of it? -

Ans -

I never exercised any act. over it
myself and do not know whether Juan Her-
nandez ever did?

Ques 3d.

Know you a Rancho of your own
if so who is it & how long have you had
possession of it.

Ans -

I have a Rancho in San Miguelito
in the County of Monterey which I have
occupied thirty two years - distant from
San Justo about thirty three leagues.

Ques 4.

State whether Juan Hernandez
in his life time had a ranch of his own -

Answer -

He had one at a place called
Apo de la Cuchara in the County of San Jose'
distant from San Justo about fourteen
leagues -

Ques 11th -

State whether what White paid
you in cash for the sale of your ranch,
and how the transaction was brought about?

Ans -

It was a part consideration of the
Ten thousand dollars for a horse I bought
of White worth only four thousand and

it was White who brought to my a/c
that trans action -

Question 11th -

How many leagues of land
was granted to son in 1831?

The Law Agent objects to the above Question

Aus -

Six leagues -

Question 12.

In the negotiations between son
& Charles White relative to the purchase
of your interest, was Pachico's ownership
of four leagues mentioned? And if so what
was said about it?

(The Law Agent objects to the above question)

Answer.

I received a grant of six leagues
of which Castro said four leagues by
Pachico and I said what interest I
might have to Charles White in the remain
ing two leagues.

Question 13th.

State on what terms you have
lived with Francisco Lopez Pachico, and
whether you have been frequently with him
at San Jose for the last fifteen years -

Aus -

We were Countrymen & had known
each other ever since we were boys and
lived on friendly terms.

I never saw him at San Justo but
I met him often at his house at San
Felipe, which borders on San Justo -

Ques

Opp Question by Law Agent.

Question 14 -

Did son ever know that Juan
Hernandez ever attempted to take possession
and if so ever heard him give any reason
why he did not take possession of the
Rancho of San Justo.

(The claimants attorney objects to the
above question)

Ans.

I do not know it of my own knowledge, but Juan Hernandez told me that he went to take possession of the Rancho and that Jose Castro refused and drove him off -

This ends in the year 1836 soon after I had made the donation to Juan Hernandez -

Quest 2.

Is Jose Castro yet alive?

Answer.

He is living at Monterey?

ing duly sworn testified as follows.

Ques. 1.

What is your name age and place
of residence?

Ans.

My Name is Comilio Hernandez
my age is thirty nine. My residence the
town of San Jose de Guadalupe -

Ques. 2 -

Whose Son are you?

Ans.

I am the Son of Juan Maria
Hernandez

Ques. 3. If your father living -

Ans.

He is dead. Died in the Month of
August 1849.

Ques. 4 -

How many children did he have
and does your mother still live.

Ans -

He left nine children to live -
Alvina - Tomas. Jose Mariano. Comilio
(out of) Maria de Jesus; Thomas. Santiago
Pedro Lauriano - Jose de Jesus. Mrs.
Mother still lives and her name is Francisco
F Lauriano Gutierrez -

Ques 5 -

Do you know whether Jose Ra-
fael Gonzales ever made a donation of his
San Pedro grant to form Father and if
so when was it -

State if your Father went to
take possession of it and when he did so
and who prevented him from going out
if anyone State who it was and all you
know about this matter?

Objected to the question as being leading
by the counsel of Pachico -

Ans -

I do know that Jose Rafael
Gonzalez made a donation of his San

Last grant to my father about the year
1831 or 1832 - I do not recollect the precise
time - My father went to take possession
of it accompanied with my Mother and
several of his children myself included
but he was prevented from taking posse-
sion by Jose Latho - My brother Man-
uel Hernandez had the title papers with
him at the time and was acting as the
representative of my father and his family
who came third at that time for the purpose
of settling on the said Ranch -

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August 6 - We soon know the San Justo Rancho
and

~~ans -~~ I do know it -

Just T. Where is it?

Ack - It is situated near the Museum of
San Juan Bautista -

Qwest 8- Do you know to whom it was granted

Aud - I have been told that it was granted.
to Augusto -

Q. What did Gonzales do with it?

Aus - He made a donation of it to Prof Gathen
Juan Maria Hernandez -

Just III - Did your Father take any steps
to occupy it, and state all he did to take
possession of it.

Aus - He has - He started with a part of his family and goods and Charles packed in carts and came as far as the Mission of San Juan Bautista when he received a message from Jose Castro by his cousin Ignacio Castro, stating not to come because he would prevent his statement that he Jose Castro had as much and perhaps

more insight than Sam Maria Harmon
ans - This was told to me by Mrs brother
Manuel Hernandez who with myself accom-
panied our Father on this occasion -

Qwest 11 -

At what time did he make this
attempt to take possession of it?

Objected to by Plaintiff -

Ans -

It was either in the year 1836 or 1837
April or May but I do not recollect the
year -

Qwest 12 -

Read you any conversation
on the subject with Jose Castro
himself -

Objected to -

Ans -

I had on one occasion - I asked him
why did he prevent us from setting on the land
upon which he answered with a great deal
of austerity - saying do not bother me.

Qwest 13 -

Please you ever had any conversa-
tion with him since -

Ans -

I had none -

Cross Questioned by the Plaintiff -

Qwest 1 -

Did you see Miguel Castro at the
time when he came from Jose Castro as
stated in your answer to Question No 11 -

Ans -

I did not see him -

Qwest. 2.

What amount of goods and effects
and cattle you were removing to San Justo?

Ans -

We had about five carts loads of
goods and chattels with us on the way and
three more in muddings to be removed about
200 head of cattle and horses.

Qwest 3

What do you mean when you say you

that your brother Mariano was the referee
intimate of your Father at the same time that
your Father was present? -

Aus - My Father being old and infirm
appreciated his Eldest Son Mariano to act
for him in all cases and to manage his af-
fairs, and he approved of all Mariano's actions.
Question 4.

Who owned the cattle of which you
have spoken?

Aus - The greatest portion belonged to my
Father and the remaining to his Sons.

Question 5 - Where did your Father continue to
live from that time up to his death?
Ans - At his house in the town of San
José de Guadalupe -
Question 6.

Where did Mariano live from that
time up to the present.

Aus - At his house in San José de Guadalupe up to the year of 1849.

Question 7 - Where has he lived since 1849?

Aus - I do not know, he is not in California

Question by Constantine -

Question 1 - How long since he left his home?

Ans - It will be two years in September
of this year.

Question 2 - How long after Gonzalo donated
San Justo to your Father before he attempted
to recover it?

Answered to by Constantine -

Aus - I do not recollect, but it was a
very short time afterwards -

Cross Examination resumed.

Ques 1 - Do you know the date of Gonzales donation to your Father -
Ans -

I do not know.
Ques 2.

Where did your Brother live between the year 1849 of which you have spoken and September 1850 -
Ans -

Upon refreshing my memory I recollect now that he lived in San Jose until September 1850 and not 1849 as previously stated - Cornelio ^{his} Hernandez -

docket of said Commissioners and after being
 duly sworn testified as follows.

His evidence being given in the Spanish
language and interpreted by the Sergeant Major
Fisher -

What is your name age and place
of residence -

Aus -

My name is Jose Rafael Gonzales,
Isty, 38 or 39 seven years residence San
Jose

Trust 2. State all you did to make the
necessary instruments and approvals of
your San Justo grant?

Aus -

That a grant was given to my by
the Government and confirmed by the Territorial
Assembly - The only act that I performed
was the planting of a cross on the top of the
hill as a land mark of my land so granted
reaching to that point I made no statement
nor approval because I was prevented by
the taking out of the Revolution by which
all Mexicans lost their Native of California
were expelled the Country by the Californians
in consequence of which I made a transfer
of the said grant to Juan Hernandez -

Trust 3 -

What was the contract as understood
between you and Hernandez about your
San Justo grant was he to take
and hold possession of the same and for
whose benefit -

The question was objected to by the Plaintiff
as having and secondary Evidence -

Aus -

The Contract as understood between
was that Hernandez should take posse-
sion of the land as his own property by
virtue of the donation elicited by me in
his favor and subsequently him to transfe

one half of the same to me by a legal document -

Quest 4 -

Did anyone else sit to upon your San Justo grant of 10, and who and when the settlement was made and for what purpose the settlement was made -

Objected to by defendant -

Aus -

From the time that the grant was made to me no one sat to on it. Hernandez was to have sat to on it, but Don Castro the leader of the revolution presented the statement of Hernandez and sold the land to Francisco Ruiz Polanco -

Quest 5 -

Do you know the place called the Canada de la Puesta in the County of Minton -

Aus -

I do know it -

Quest 6 -

Who has occupied that place since 1831?

Aus -

Objected to by defendant -

Aus -

Angel Castro by evacuation made to him by me -

Quest 7 -

What improvements did Castro make where he resides?

Aus -

He built a house and a mill (just) he cultivated the land and made a garden -

Quest 8 -

At what time did he make these improvements?

Aus -

In the same year, 1836, immediately after I made him the concession -

Quest 9 -

Is the Canada de la Puesta within his San Justo grant or not?

Aus -

It is -

Janst 10.

How long did Angel Castro or
try to reside upon your Rancho of San
Justo and cultivate the same -

Ans -

He occupied it from the time I
made the concession to him until he sold
the house to Mr. Charles White but I cannot
tell the time when he sold the house as above
stated -

Janst 11.

How long since you saw Angel
Castro living there?

Ans -

The last time I saw him living
there it was since the occupation of California
by the Americans - I was there and took
breakfast with him -

Janst 12.

How long since you passed by the
house of Angel Castro.

Ans -

Since the time above stated I have
not been that way -

Janst 13.

What was the practice under the
Mexican law in California in relation to
the disbursements of grants of land previously
made?

Objected to by Plaintiff -

Ans -

It was customary for the Governor
to notify the first grantee asking him for
a showing why he did not occupy the
land granted, if the showing was sufficient
and the reasons first are deemed sufficient
was granted on the contrary the land was
granted to the claimant -

Janst 14.

Was any notice ever given you
of any attempt by Alvarado for San
Castro grant in favor of another -

Ans -

It was not -

Just 15.

What offices have you held
either in Mexico or California under the
Mexican Government?

Ans.

In Mexico I held the Office of
Collector of Excise of the district of
Asta pas also, and in California I held
the offices of Collector of Customs of Monterey
and Commissioner of the Department. I
held also at various times the offices
of Alcalde of Monterey was also Member of
the Departmental Assemblage.

Just 16.

Look at the paper now handed
to you marked A to see if it with this
Assemblage and state what you know about
the Election and object of the same!

Ans.

I recognise the paper as above
stated to have been executed by Mariano
Gundaloupe Baigorri Commanding in Chief
of the Military forces in Upper California
as a safeguard in my favor to return home
from the town of Santa Clara when I was
held as a prisoner of war by the Revolutionaries
party.

Just 17.

You have stated you were ordered
to leave the Country State when the order
was made by whom it was made and what
cause was alleged against you?

Ans.

I do not recollect the date of the
order the order was signed by Jose Castro
the Chief of the Revolution the cause alleged
against me was that I was a natural
Mexican all the Native Mexicans were
expelled by the Californians -

Just 18.

You have stated you had a grant
of the San Justo Ranch, who were witnesses
that gave testimony before the Alcalde upon
the enquiry as to your qualifications to receive
a grant under the Mexican law -

Ans - I believe they were Francisco
Perez Pachico, Joaquin Gomez and Simon
Castro -
Ques 14. Is or not Francisco Perez Pachico
the same person that claims the San Justo
Ranch under a grant to Jose Castro

Are you the owner in possession
of a Ranch at the present time? -

Ans - I am -

Cross Ques 2.

What is it called and how long
have you been in possession of it -

Ans -

It is called San Miguelito de la
Piedad - I am and have been in possession
of it about two years -

Cross Ques 3.

When did you petition for it
and when was it granted to you? -

Ans -

I do not recollect the time when
I petitioned for it but it was granted to
me as soon as petitioned for -

Cross Ques 4 -

Read you petitioned for it as
early as 1841 -

Ans -

I do not recollect the date nor the
year when I petitioned for it as already
stated above but upon reflecting my
memory I find that I petitioned on the
1st of May 1841, and the grant was made
on the 21st of July 1841 -

Cross Ques 5. How much land was granted

to sow at that time and when was it deducted?

Ans - P.

These leagues were granted to me at the time above stated and the San Miguel city in what is now the County of Monterey -

Cross Ques 10.

At the time you stipulated for the San Miguelito Rancho were you the owner of any other land in California -

Objected to by Contestant -

Ans -

I was the owner of three town lots in Monterey all the land that I owned having donated the other as already stated to Hernandez -

Cross Ques 11.

Was the donation which you made to Hernandez reduced to writing?

Ans.

It was. I gave it to him in writing -

Cross Ques 12.

What was the date of it -

Ans -

I do not recollect the date of it but think it was in 1836 but upon refreshing my memory I state that it was the 14th of October 1837.

Cross Ques 13.

Did you make the donation to Hernandez alone or to him jointly with others -

Ans -

To him alone and to his family under the contract into which we entered between us.

Cross Ques 14.

Where was your return home at the time the sum it was given to you to return home -

Ans -

At San Jose Pontista where I had a stone and from whence they carried me a prisoner -

Cross Ques 15.

Did also Castro ever present

your taking possessem of San Justo princi-
pally to your donation to Hernandez.

Aus -

He did not.

Crop Just. 12.

At the time you petitioned
for San Justo where did Angel Castro
reside -

Aus -

In a Rancho called Palomino near
the Cuesta del Rosario which joins the
Rancho San Justo.

Crop Just 12.

Please tell us his house from
the Mission Church of San Juan Bautista
at the time you petitioned. if he had any house
on his Rancho.

Aus -

I dont know whether he had a house
or not.

Crop Just. 13.

On which side of San Justo
did Angel Castro's Rancho extend -

Aus -

On the South East -

Crop Just 14.

What was the name of the track
that passed between the two Ranchos.

Aus -

San Benito Creek.

Crop Just 15 -

When was this permission given
by you to Angel Castro of which you have
testified!

Aus -

A few days after the grant was
made to me -

Crop Just 16.

Where were you and Castro at
the time you gave him the permission?

Aus -

In the house of Tiburcio Castro at the
Mission of San Juan Bautista -

25-

Cross Tues 17.

It was the permission which you
gave to Castro reduced to writing
Ans.

It was not, it was verbal because in
those days bargains were not reduced to writing
the words were the same as a bond.

Cross Tues 18.

What was & you gave Angel
Castro permission to do?

Ans.

I permitted him to take possession
of the land and to dispose of it as his own
property to build on and to use it as he thought
proper which I granted to him in consideration
of his being a native of the country and not owning
a foot of land in it.

Cross Tues 19.

What land did you give him
permission to dispose of?

Ans.

Of all the Canadas you whence the
water runs and which I have known by
the name of the Canada de Chada -

Cross Tues 20.

What is the extent of the length
and breadth of the Canada?

Ans.

I cannot tell for I have never measured
it.

Cross Tues 21.

Is the San Benito Creek in the
Canada de los Caustas?

Ans.

It is not. It is in an opposite direction.
Cross Tues 22.

How far the San Benito
creek did Angel Castro build the house which
he built by your permission?

Ans.

About three miles moreover less.

Cross Tues 23.

In what part of the San
Justo Rancho is the Canada de la
Cuesta?

Aus, In the Southern part -

Cross Ques 13.

Was four Concessions or permission
to Angel Castro made in presence of any Alcalde
Magistrate or official or before any witness?

Aus -

It was before his brother Jose P. Buncio
Castro who was the Prefect of Montaña, and
the Administrator of the Mission of San Juan Bautista Uncle to the Isle Queen of whom I
have spoken.

Cross Ques. 14.

Did the said Prefect take and
note or make any Memorandum of the Concession
or Permission?

Aus -

He did not because as I have already
stated above, it was not customary in those
days to reduce every transaction to writing. A
man's word was as good as his bond, I under-
stood that Castro obtained from the Government
papers that related to the same land, but I
have not seen them and don't know the fact
I only heard it said so -

Cross Ques 15.

Was there anything said by
you or Angel Castro at that time about his
subsequently getting a grant or confirmation of
the same land from the Government.

Aus -

There was nothing said on the subject.
Cross Ques. 16.

Was there anything said about
the length of time he was to occupy the Rancho
by your permission?

Aus -

There was nothing said about it.
Cross Ques 17.

Do you mean to say that
you made a donation to Castro of the whole
of the Rancho in such a way that you yourself
would afterwards have no right to occupy any
part of it with Cato or otherwise.

Opposed to by Contestant

Objected to by Contestants.

Ans -

I did know as above stated, and nothing more or less and have considered that neither my self nor my wife had any right to it.
Cross Ques. 18.

To what extent and in what way has Angel Castro occupied said Canada since that time?

Ans -

Castro built the house on it as I have already stated, cultivated the land and occupied the whole Canada with team cattle and Mexican Cows and had a large flock of sheep.

Cross Ques. 19.

Did Angel Castro ever have any difficulty or dispute with Jose Castro or with Francisco Ruiz Pachico after the boundaries of their respective lands.

Objected to by Contestants -
Ans.

I do not know our neighbors whether they had or not -

Cross Ques. 30 -

Are you not intimately acquainted with Francisco Ruiz Pachico, have you not frequently been at his house and in company with him on his lands?

Ans -

I am intimately acquainted with Ruiz Pachico, have been frequently at his house and have travelled on many occasions over the land, but never with him -

Cross Ques. 31.

Has not Francisco Pachico been in complete possession of all the Rancho San Justo except the Rancho de la Chisteg, ever since the Rancho was conveyed to him by Jose Castro?

Objected to by Contestants.

Ans - I am totally ignorant of Everything
embraced in the foregoing question -
Cross Ques 32.

Do you know who has been
in possession of San Justo ab Amstur since
the year 1830. whose cattle have grazed upon
it, and who has been the reputed owner of it.
Objection to my Contestant -

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Ans - I did not know who had it or who
was in possession of it in consequence of the
sale made by Castro to Pachico. Pachico
was considered the purchaser. the cattle that
grazed on it belonged to various persons
among the contiguous neighbors whom I may
report Pachico as the purchaser of the Rancho
was concealed the name.

Cross Ques. 33.

In all your intercourse with
Pachico since he bought the Rancho of
Castro did you hear it, of any claim to it
yourself or any part of it?

Ans - I never did nor have I ever
conversed upon the subject.

Cross Ques 34.

When did you first hear of
Pachicos purchase from Castro?

Ans - It might be six years ago.

Cross Ques 35 - Did you hear any talk about
the contemplated purchase before it was
made?

Ans. I did not hear anything talked
about it until some time after the purchase
was made by Pachico & changing cattle for
the land -

Cross Ques - 36 -

When did you first hear
about Jose Castro getting a grant of
the land?

Aus - About a year ago -
Ques. Ques. 37.

When did you first hear that
José Castro claimed to be the owner of the
Rancho of San Justo?

Aus - I do not recollect -

Ques. Ques 38 - You have testified that
José Castro prevented Hernandez from
taking possession of the land. How and
when did you cause to know that fact?

Aus - I did not testify that Castro prevented
Hernandez taking possession of the land, but
I stated that I heard the same. It was Hernandez
by himself and his wife told me the same
after the lapse of a few months from the time
that I made the concession to Hernandez.
Ques. Ques 39.

What did you learn from
Hernandez that Castro had assigned as his
reasons for preventing Hernandez from occu-
pying the lands?

Aus - He told me that he went out to the
land to Castro and that Castro sent him word
by his nephew Miguel Castro to leave his station
inrasans to me whatsoevr -
Ques. Ques. 40.

Did Hernandez speak of
any right which he supposed Castro had
or any power to prevent his taking possession -
AUS

He spoke of no other right but that
of the sword as the chief of revolution -
Ques. Ques. 41.

At what place did Hernandez
communicate this to you?

Aus - In my own store at the Mission
of San Juan Dantista -
Ques. Ques. 42.

What became of Hernandez

after this?

Aus -

He went to his Rancho Eel 'afo
de la Cochó from Murphy and from there
he went to the town of San José de Guadalupe
where he lived until his death -
Censo Justo 13.

Read Hernández a son
named Mandu - Objetado to.

Aus -

He had.
Censo Justo 44.

Where is he now being living?

Objetado to -

Aus -

I do not know.

Censo Justo 15 - Has son ever known when
he resided?

Aus -

He always lived in the town of San
José de Guadalupe -
Censo Justo 46.

Aus -

How long is it since he went
away from there?

Objetado to -

Aus -

I do not know the time when he left
I saw him and conversed with him about
a fair up at the same place -
Censo Justo 47.

Aus -

Is he not reported to have
run away and if so for what cause -
Objetado to -

Aus -

I understand it so he was charged
with homicide -
Censo Justo 48 -

Aus -

In what years were you a
Member of the Departmental Assembly?

Aus -

It was either in the year 1833 or 1834

but do not distinctly recollect which it was however before the arrival of Micheltorena as Governor.

Cross Ques 114.

In what way did you become a Member of the Assembly?

Aus -

By Election - The Elections were in the following manner. namely, the department of California was divided into districts. Each district elected annually an elector from the various districts. but at the Capitol at Monterey and there elected the seven members who composed the Legislative Assembly. the members were elected for two years and was presided over by the Governor of this Body. these members vacated their seats after the first year and the other year after the second year of their election. Their vacant seats were filled by new elections. In this manner Seven Elected -

Cross Ques 115.

Did you ever make any attempt to get possession of San Justo during the administration of Chico or Gutierrez or Alvarado, or Micheltorena or Peco, or did you ever make any claim during either of these administrations?

Aus -

I did not, because I departed with my right, and made no claim and claim. etc -

Cross Ques 115.

Did Hernandez ever attempt to get possession or lay claim to the land during the administrations of the last several governors.

Aus.

I am entirely ignorant on the subject -

Cross Ques 116.

Did you ever have any communication with Hernandez. Subsequent to the time when he told you that Castro refused to submit him to you after the trial about his Hernandez taking possession of San Justo.

Aus - I never did tho subject was
brought between us and never alluded to after-
wards.

Cross Ques 53.

Was there anything to prevent
Hernandez taking possession of San Justo to
during the year 1838.

Aus - I absolutely do not recollect.

Cross Ques 54.

Do you know of anything sub-
sequent to the time when Castro refused to permit
Hernandez to go upon the land which could
have prevented Hernandez from taking pos-
session of it?

Aus - I have not learned of anything upon
the subject referred to in the above question -

Cross Ques 55.

How near to San Justo
have you resided since 1834.

Aus -

Up to about 8 months ago I have
lived at Moutain which is 12 leagues from
San Justo, since the middle of 1834, previous
to that I lived at the Mission of San Juan
Baptista which is about one league from
San Justo -

Cross Ques 56.

How far was the Cross for
shot off from El Agua Viva in Chuf from
the Quada de la Quista?

Aus -

I cannot tell the distance precisely
It was upon the top of a hill about a mile
distant -

Cross Ques 57.

In what direction was the
Cross from the Quada -

Aus -

I cannot tell.

Cross Ques 58.

When did you first know of that

When did you first know of this

Cross being there?

Aus -

In the year 1833.

Cross Ques 59.

What was it made of and how large was it?

Aus.

It was made of pine timber and about 20 feet high.

Cross Ques 60.

What was the object of its being there in the first instance?

Aus -

It was erected by the Missionaries priests of San Juan Bautista as it was customary with them to erect crosses at many other places for the purpose of banishing idolatry among the Indians.

Cross Ques 61.

Of how many pieces of wood was the cross composed?

Aus -

Of two pieces, one perpendicular and one horizontal.

Cross Ques 62.

Is it standing there yet?

Aus -

I do not know.

Examination w/ Chif resumed.

Ques 1.

At what time were you taken prisoner, and how long were you deprived of liberty?

Aus.

I was made prisoner during the month of 1831, and was deprived of my liberty for 20 odd days.

Ques 2.

Were you kept as a prisoner from the time you were taken until you got the discharge of which you have spoken?

Aus.

I was taken prisoner at San Juan

Bautista and was sent to Sonoma
but on my arrival at Santa Clara
José Mariano Estrada then Administra-
tor of the Prison detained me at that
place until I received permission from
Genl Vallejo to return to my home unmolested
as always stated -

Ques 3.

Did anyone after that restrain
your liberty?

Aus. No one -

Ques 4.

Were you ordered to leave the
Country after you obtained your discharge
from Vallejo and if so by whom?

Aus. No one informed with me -

Ques 5.

What Office has José Castro
held in California since 1836?

Aus -

He held various Offices Civil and
Military Commencing his Military career
as a Lieutenant in the Revolutionary Forces
and ascended to Lieut Col.

In the Civil Service he filled
the Station of Prefect of the District of Montaña
He was also an active Member of the
Territorial Assembly -

Ques 6.

What office did he hold under
Genl Alvarado?

Aus -

I do not recollect.

Ques 7.

What district was San Justo in?

Aus -

Montaña -

Ques 8.

Who was the acting Governor that
made the first order in your petition for
San Justo? -

Ans.

I do not recollect the documents will
show it
Iust 9.

Have you seen the Expediente of
Simon Bolívar grant that goes him in file in
the Office of the Surveyor General of the United
States and I examined the signatures thereto?

Ans -

I have seen it and have examined the
signatures they are my signatures -

Iust 10 -

Are you acquainted with the hand-
writing of Simon Castro?

Ans - I used to be acquainted with it.

I have seen it and know & examined the
signatures

Iust 11.

Have you seen the Expediente of Simon
Castro in the Surveyor's General's Office?

Ans -

I saw it day before yesterday.

Iust 12

Do you know the signature of Simon
Castro?

Ans.

I do know it.

Iust 13.

Is the signature to that document
purporting to be the signature of Simon Castro
his true signature?

Ans -

It is. Simon Castro made his signature
at different times somewhat differing in conse-
quence of being a bad scribe & he unauthorized
his Son Manuel to sign his Father's name to
public documents for the purpose of preventing
forgeries being committed. This is the reason why
the signatures on those Expedientes are different
this I know of my own knowledge. In the
Expediente marked 1839 the rest of Simon
Castro and his signature and scribal are in the
same writing of his Son Manuel Castro as is
the case with many other public documents which
I have seen.

Howard whom did you learn
that the two gave this permission to Manuel
to sign Public documents for his Father?

Ans -

Why I cannot tell but how it is be-
cause Manuel was the Secretary of his Father
and attended to all the public business and
it was public and notorious in the town
where they and I live -

Just 15 -

Did you examine the signature
presented to be that of Alvaro Soberanis
at the foot of Simon Austin's report. In the
original Expediente and is said signature gen-
uine! -

Ans -

I did examine it and it is genuine
and he was Alcalde.

Cattle to the number of from two to three thou-
sand during that time. He has advised that
time had people living in the house in it.

the witness says he thinks the distance of the
Rancho from the Sea Coast is from eight to

My name is Antonio Manco Pico. My age forty two years & I reside in the town of the town of San Jose & have resided in California from my birth. I have lived in San Jose ever since the year 1832.

I have held various offices since 1835 such as Alcalde of San Jose & attorney for the Corporation & Sheriff of the District of San Jose.

I know the place called San Justo. It is situated about one league south of the Mission of San Juan Bautista in the County of Monterey. From about the year 1839 to about 1844 it was in possession of General Jose Castro at which time he delivered the possession to Francisco Long Pacheco. Pacheco has continued in possession to the present time.

Castro placed five hundred cows on the land, built cattle pens & also a house in it. This was done a short time after Castro obtained his title but I cannot recollect the precise time.

Pacheco has occupied it with his own stock. At times his number of cattle was as many as twelve thousand & they ranged over this land & other lands of his adjoining to it. This distance of the land from San Jose I think is from eleven to twelve leagues.

In answer to question by the Law Agent the witness says that Pacheco had a large number of cattle ranging in the valley. Most as I understand were placed on San Justo & a part on other lands, but they became mixed & ranged together. The land is about ten leagues from the Sea Coast but whether more or less than that distance I cannot say.

I do know it. It is situated about a
half a league on the other side of San Juan
Plantado.

Question 3.

Do you know to whom it was granted?
If yes state to whom?

Ans. It was granted to Rafael Gonzales.

Quest 4.

What did he do with it?

Ans.

He granted it to Juan Maria Hernandez.

Quest 5.

State whether Juan Maria Hernandez took possession of such Rancho or not, or if presented, if would do so or not?

Ans.

He did not, because he was presented by Jose' Castro.

Quest 6.

State how and in what manner he was presented.

Ans.

Juan Maria Hernandez sent his son Mariano Hernandez my husband to take possession of the said Rancho and he stated with his family on it. We started on our way to the said Rancho and arrived at the Tucson of San Juan Bautista with our goods and chattels loaded on two carts, where my husband Mariano received a written message from Jose' Castro left the hands of his Cousin Miguel Castro, ordering him not to go upon the said Rancho which my husband would not obey whereupon Jose' Castro the Commandant of the Presidio of San Juan Bautista dispatched an armed force to apprehend and arrest him and which arrived here next to our camp and informed me that they came by order of Commandant Castro to arrest Mariano Hernandez and prevent him from taking possession of the Rancho of San Justo.

Quest 7.

Has Jose' Castro ever previous to your leaving the Oficina la Cachet acknowledged that the Rancho of San Justo belonged to your family or not?

Ans.

He always said that the said Rancho

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was ours. I heard him say so.

Ques 8.

Said Jose Castro, commanding General, Encouraged your family to move to and possess said Rancho of San Justo or not and if so when?

Aus -

He did ask on many occasions before we started for it why we did not go to said Rancho.

Part 9.

Said Jose Castro offer your family any assistance before you going to the Rancho?

Aus -

He did offer to assist us when there as a neighbor -

Part 10.

Have you heard any conversation between your husband and General Jose Castro, on the subject of being prevented from taking possession, and if so, state what was that conversation?

Aus -

I did hear a conversation between the said Jose Castro and my husband, which took place in my presence in which conversation my husband remonstrated with the said Castro on the subject of his preventing him (Hernandez) from taking possession of the said Rancho of San Justo, to which said Jose Castro replied that he Castro is also a native Californian and as such he dismists myself that said Rancho de San Justo to which Hernandez replied that he (Castro) ought to pray to God that no other Government should be established in California, that his (Hernandez) children may not claim and deprive him of the said Rancho -

I don't know in what fear it was -

Ques 2. Who was the Political Chief at that time of California?

Ans. Jose' Castro.

Ques 3. Did your husband Mariano Hernandez or his Father Juan Maria Hernandez ever attempt to take possession of the said Rancho after this Concession?

Ans. They did not.

Ques 4. Why did they not.

Ans. Because Mariano Hernandez said that he could not complain successful in consequence of Castro and Alvarado being alike that one would approve the acts of the other.

Ques 5. Do you know whether Castro got the land afterwards from Alvarado and died for himself?

Ans. I do not but I heard it stated that after receiving having disposed Mariano Hernandez of the said land he obtained title papers for himself but before what Magistrate or Governor I do not know.

I know that the said Jose Castro sent Miguel Castro with a stock of cattle to the said place and Miguel settled upon the land with the said cattle about one month after the Concession above stated took place between Mariano and Castro and while we were set at San Juan Bontista.

Ques 6. Up to what time did Castro continue to keep his cattle on the said Rancho.

Ans. I do not know.

Ques 7. Do you know what account did

Charles White paid to your husband Mariano Hernandez and his father Juan Maria Hernandez for the said Rancho.

Ans -

I do not. But I was told by my husband that it was three thousand five hundred dollars. I received the money at several times, but I did not count it.

Ques 8.

Have you been on the Rancho since Pacheco bought it of Lestro?

Ans.

I have not been there.

Questions propounded by the Law Agent of the United States.

Ques 1.

Was the grant which you say Gonzalo Elizalde & Juan Maria Hernandez received before our Magistrate in California -

Ans.

I do not know, but I know that Mariano Hernandez went to San Juan Bautista to receive the papers, and he brought them home and in my presence delivered them to his Father Juan Maria Hernandez.

Ques 2.

Did you read the papers?

Ans -

I did not read them -

Ques 3.

Do you know whether the land is within ten leagues of the Sea Coast?

Ans.

I do not know -

Ques 4.

How soon after the date from Gonzalo to Hernandez did your husband go to take possession of the Rancho as you have before stated.

Ans -

At least nine or less than three months.

A paper is now shown me & attached
attached & marked No 1. It is the original
deed of transfer of the land from myself to said
Pachico. It was made at the time it purports
to have been.

Previous to the 15th of April
1839. when the land was granted to me it
was entirely vacant. Gonzales had taken
no steps towards occupying it.

Immediately after the grant was
made I took possession of the land & occupied
it with five hundred head of cattle had some
portion of it cultivated had an orchard on
it & had people living in it in huts built
for that purpose & continued thus occupying
it until I sold it to Pachico as before
stated.

During that time I know of no adverse
claimant to the land. Pachico on the sale to
him took immediate possession of the land
& placed four or five thousand head of cattle
on it & has continued to occupy it to the present

The present claimant alleges that he acquired title to the land claimed by a conveyance of the same made to him by Jose Castro on the 20th day of July 1811. A document executed in due form to that effect is given in evidence, and shows that he became by it the owner of all the interest in the premises which was possessed by Castro on the day of its date.

Castro's title is alleged to have been derived from the Mexican Government by grant made to him by Governor Juan B Alvarado on the 15th day of April 1834. The original grant is not presented but the claimant has presented a facsimile copy of a document in the Archives of the former Government now in the hands of the Supervisor General over which in connection with other prob he relies to establish the alleged grant.

The document is the Espidiente in the case, containing the petition of Castro for the grant an order by the Governor referring it for information, a report by two Alcaldes on the subject and a final decree the Governor dated April 13, 1834.

This last decree declares the applicant to be the owner of the property which is described therein as specified. Accordingly and the additional declaration that, these presents shall serve him as a sufficient title. He is enjoined to obtain judicial possession and to occupy the place within one year. This document is evidently something more than the ordinary decree of concession intended to be retained in the Government Office. It is the title paper intended to be given to the grantee and to serve him as an incipient title.

This title to the land can not be a perfect legal title without the approval of the Territorial Disputation and

a final document in accordance therewith
but it was a legal meitine of a title and
sufficient with proofs of the performance of
old legal conditions to entitle the party to a
confirmation of it.

But the document in order
to be available as a grant must have been
delivered to the grantee. Whereas this is found
among the archives and is brought before the
Court-supply a duly certified traced copy
only. There is no proof on the case however
which I think establishes the fact that this
document was delivered to the grantee as his
title paper and was returned for greater safety
to the keeper of the archives after the conveyance of
the County of the Annas.

We have abundant evidence
that this was done in many instances by the holders
of titles under the former Government. In this
case the certified copy from the archives brings
with it the copy of a certificate endorsed on
the original dated July 29, 1850 by the then
keeper of such archives stating that the original
document was that day deposited with
him.

A traced copy of an entry on the
Book of titles in the Archives shows the making
of a title to the grantee on the day when this
hears state.

The testimony of witnesses shows
this knowledge of the grant held by said Castro
and the instrument of conveyance from Castro
to the present claimant made as early as July
1844. Contains a certificate of the Mayor who
before whom it was elicited that the docu-
ment upon which he held title dated in 1839
and from which the description of the land con-
tained in the conveyance was evidently copied
was inspected by him and attached to the convey-
ance. It cannot admit of a doubt in my
judgment that this document was issued and
delivered to Castro by the Governor and that he
and his grantee are entitled to the full benefit
of its provisions.

The land granted is described by
Meters and bounds of which are alleged to
contain four square leagues of land a little
more or less the whole of which is conceded to
the grantee - Occupancy and cultivation soon
after the grant are provided.

In the petition on which
this grant was made it is alleged that a pre-
vious grant had been made in 1835 to Rafael
Gonzales but that the place had been aban-
doned and was vacant - In the reports made
by the Alcaldes to the Governor the land is reported
to be vacant and belonging to no private
ownership and the testimony which is filed
in the case shows that such was the fact -

In an early stage of the proceed-
ings Ellin & White and others who claimed to be
the owners of the interest originally granted to
said Gonzales were permitted to introduce
and contest the title of the present claimant
holding under the grant to Castro and they have
introduced testimony on the subject -

They have not however
presented the grant to said Gonzales or given
any evidence of its terms and conditions -

So far as the proof enables us to
judge of the case it seems that Gonzales never-
occupied the premises in any manner but that he
sold out his interest to another person and
entirely relinquished the same - that long after
the grant was made that individual was directed
not to take possession of the premises as he had
no right to the same, and that he never did
go into occupation thereof.

If the case rested
on the proof before us we should not hesitate
to express our conviction that all right to the
land under the grant to Gonzales had been
forfeited and that the same was subject to
concession to any applicant in 1839 when
Castro made his application for it -

We do not however *dum it*
mean to rest the decision on this point -

The petition of Castro sets out the
former grant and the question of establishing

rights under it was investigated by the Governor and his decision had on the subject - His grant to Clusino was an adjudication of the invalidity of the claim of existing rights under the first grant -

This was a subject which it was peculiarly the privilege of the Governor to investigate and decide and this Commission would feel great reluctance in attempting to overrule his decision -

I am not prepared to say that no case could be presented in which he would give effect to a prior over a subsequent grant of the same land, but unless the strongest evidence of fraud or gross mistake was presented the question could not be entertained -

No such evidence as given in the case now under consideration - authorizes the decision of the Governor seems to have been in accordance with justice and the Mexican law and we see no reason for overruling it by setting aside the latter grant in order to give effect to the former -



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
