



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Be it Remembered, that on this first day of March, Anno Domini One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-three, before the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San Francisco, in the State aforesaid, in the United States of America, the following Proceedings were had, to wit;

The Petition of Nicolas Morchon, for the Place named "Cahuenga," was presented, and ordered to be filed and docketed with No. 675 and is as follows, to wit;

Upon which Petition the following subsequent Proceedings were had in their chronological order, to wit;

San Francisco September 15' 1853.

In Case No. 675, Nicolas Morchon for the place named "Cahuenga," the deposition of William A. Richardson, a witness in behalf of the claimant, taken before Commissioner Alpheus Felch, was filed.

San Francisco Sept. 5' 1854.

Case No. 675 was ordered to be placed at the foot of the 2^a class Cases on the Trial Docket.

San Francisco Oct. 17' 1854.

Case No. 675, was submitted under the Rule of March 21st 1854.

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San Francisco October 24 1854.

In the same case Commissioner Alpheus Welch delivered the opinion of the Board rejecting the claim:

the Ascertaining and Settling of Private Land
Claims in California -

Petition

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The petition of Nicolas
MorChon a resident of California respect-
fully Showeth unto Your Honr Body that
our Luis Armas on the 2d of July 1844
obtained the grant of a tract of land known
as Cahuenga from Jose Castro the Comman-
der in Chief of California and that such grant
was properly entered in the archives of
California.

That your petitioner holds under
Conveyances derived from said Armas the orig-
inal grantee and that such original grant
as well as the Conveyances to your petitioner
are herewith submitted for the inspection of
Your Honr Body.

That such land is situated
in the present County of Los Angeles is known
by the name of Cahuenga contains four
Square Leagues and is occupied by the land
of Vicente Al la Rosa, Rancho Lopez as far
as the Encina or rancho of this name and
by the Lomas Muertas de Cahuenga.

And your petitioner further saith
that said Armas and after him the persons holding
under him have been and that your petitioner now
is in the quiet and undisputed ownership thereof
and is not aware of the existence of any
title conflicting with or superior to his own

He therefore claims to be the
owner of said land and prays that your
Honr Body will confirm his claim and
title thereto -

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José Castro, Lieutenant Colonel of the Army & Commander in Chief of the California's.

Authorized previously by the Supreme National Government for the purpose of recovering of all lands, property and goods belonging to the Nation particularly in this Department with a view of creating resources which would serve as a common defense in case of a foreign invasion like the present. In addition to this Gen'ls Arenas has submitted to this Military Command for a payment of the amounts which at different times he has loaned & therefore encloses to him the place known by the name of Cahunga, he offering for the land the sum of (\$2000.) two thousand dollars thereby closing his accounts which he has against this Command, and in consideration of the whole and in virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Supreme Government in the name of this and that of the Mexican Nation, I have concluded that a sale shall be made real & effective, perpetual alienation forever, unto the said Gen'ls Arenas, the above mentioned place which consists of four acres of gavada Major more or less which lays between the boundaries of the land of Vicente de la Rosa and Juan Lopez as far as the Encino or Ranch of this name & on the part of the Mission from the back of the orchard which is front of the Mission building & as far as the Gates Muertas de Cahunga. The title on said land is sold with all belongings thereto including Monte Agua etc. And he cannot now nor never be troubled or made inquiry or protested by any of the authorities which soever they may be consequently by these presents I

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declare that the said land & house, its
legitimate owner is the above mentioned Don
Luis Armas which he has left subject to the
terms mentioned but on no other condition.

On behalf of which, he can take
possession if demanded that its term of rent
has expired. And for his better use at all times

by all the authorities of the State both
Civil & Military & by their General Govern-
ment authorized justly by my signature -

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Know all men by these presents that
wheras Joshua M. Rodman Attorney in
fact of James M. Jones assignee of Hon
Luis Armas acting under and by virtue
of the power of attorney, did on the first day of
February 1851 and at divers times thereafter
advertise in the State Journal a newspaper
published at San Jose that he would sell
at public auction at San Jose on the
first Monday of April 1851 for the benefit of
the creditors of Hon Luis Armas certain
property of said Armas lying in the State
of California. And wheras in pursuance of said
advertisement he did on the said first day
of April 1851 at the hour of 2 o'clock
proceded to sell the said property publicly
before the Court House door at San Jose
whereupon John Murphy became the last
and highest bidder for a portion of said
property of Hon Luis Armas to wit. The
rancho known by the name of Cahumga being
about four leagues or "titus" de gorda
"mayor" described and bounded in the quo-
tial grant thereto to Luis Armas by Jose
Castro quem at Los Angeles on July
29th 1844 was follows viz. Se Encuentra entre

payable after Ninety days. Now by these pres-
ents for the consideration aforesaid and the
sum of two hundred and forty one $\frac{1}{2}$ ^{1/2} dollars
cash in hand to me paid by the said Murphy
and his obligation executed as aforesaid
the said Joshua M. Redman attorney do
hereby assign all my right title and interest of
the said Don Luis Armas and A. M.
Jones or either of them in and to the hereinbefore
mentioned ranch and the appurtenances therof
to have and to hold the same unto the said
John Murphy his heirs and assigns forever
free from all encumbrances created by the
said Luis Armas A. M. Jones or myself
as their attorney. And for a more particu-
lar specification of the property herein consa-
eed I annex the original title of Don Luis
Armas thereto as part of this deed.

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This Sixtenth made the second day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty one between John Murphy of the first part of the County of Santa Clara State of California and Nicholas Marchan also of the same County of the second part witnesseth that the said party of the first part for and in consideration of the sum of two thousand dollars lawful money of the United States of America to him in hand paid by the said party of the second part at or before the sealing and delivery of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged has promised released and quit-claimed and by these presents does remise release and quit claim unto the said party of the second part and to his heirs and assigns forever all that tract of land known bounded and described as follows.

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The petitioner alleges that the land claimed was granted to Lars Armas by Jose Castro the Commandant in Chief of California on the 28th day of July 1826 and that he holds the premises under Concessions derived from said Armas; no authority in Castro to grant land in his capacity of Commander in Chief is known to the Commission and none is found in the case. For this reason the claim cannot be adjudged valid.

It is also fatally defective in the proof of title in the present claimant there being no sufficient evidence of any transfer of title from said Armas.

It is therefore advised to the petitioner will be denied.

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

This day came before Peter Lath, Commissioner for taking testimony to be used before the Board of U.S. Land Commissioners in Said State, Jose Castro, a witness on behalf of the claimant Jose de Armas, in Case No. 689, on the docket of Said Board, and said witness being sworn deposed in Spanish, which is interpreted by the interpreter to Said Board as follows:

The W.S. Law agent is present

Questions by Mr. Paekard who appears for Claimants Attorney

1st Question What is your name, age and residence?

Answer My name is Jose Castro, my age 46 years, my residence in Monterey, California.

2nd Question Did you hold any office, Civil or military under the Mexican Government in the year 1846, if yes what office?

Answer I was in 1846 commanding General of the Mexican troops in California.

3rd Question Look at the document now shown to you marked "A.P.L." exhibited to this deposition and heretofore filed in this case, and state whether your name thereto signed is your genuine signature?

Answer Yes, this is my genuine signature, written by me, at the date of this document and for the purpose mentioned herein.

4th Question In what manner were you authorized by the

Supreme Government to dispose of Public lands?"
Answer A Special decree of the Minister of War of the Supreme
Government made about May or the 1st of June 1846
and received by me at Monterey (in June or July) of
that year, authorized me to sell or dispose of any
lands or property belonging to the Mexican Government
in California, for the purpose of defraying the war
expenses, and waging war against the United States
of America.

5th Question. What became of the decree which you received?

Answer I had it with my other papers on a Pack Mule,
on our way going from Los Angeles to the State
of Sonora. I had an escort of some 20 officers and
soldiers we found no water and the men became
insensible and fell. Some of them from their horses.
the mules became scattered and lost and with
them my papers, which I never recovered, that decree
was among them.

6th Question. State as near as you can the contents of said decree?

Answer It was a brief order. It was a circular which was
issued to all the commandants in Mexico as well as
to myself. It was signed by the Minister of War
and bore the ministerial seal. I do not remember
whether it was signed by Dornel or Almonte. I
received official communications from both of them,
the latter succeeded the former in the War Department,
but which one of them signed this decree,
I cannot recollect. It was in the usual form
of orders and decrees from the War Department,
and fully authorized me to act in disposing
of the land and property of the Government
by sale or otherwise, for sustaining the war.

7th Question. State, if you recollect the transaction to which

the deed before exhibited to you marked "A.P.S." relates, and whether you received any part of the consideration money for which said deed was given. if yea. how much did you receive at that time when the deed bears date?

Answer. I remember makin' of the Sale, of which this deed is the record, and I had before the time of making the said deed received all the consideration money named in the deed, and the recital in said deed of my Conveying in consideration of money before paid and paid definente, is a mere form used in conveyances. I received no money thine. it had all been paid before the deed was executed.

Cross Examined by W. S. Law Agent

1st Question. In whose hand writing is the body of the document of which you have spoken and exhibited to you in this deposition?

Answer. I do not know.

2nd Question. When did you first see it?

Answer. At the time when I signed it, August 1st 1846.

3rd Question. Who presented it to you for execution?

Answer. Gase de Arnas the interested party, in the deed.

4th Question. Where was it presented to you, and who was present?

Answer. I was at my General Quarters in Los Angeles, there might have been several persons present, there were officers and Soldiers there most of the time. I cannot remember at that particular time who was present, there were no doubt some persons present.

5th Question. Name some of them who were present?

Answer I cannot now name them,

6th Question. How long after the paper was presented to you, was it that you signed it?

Answer I do not remember it may have been a moment, or five minutes, or something of that kind.

7th Question. How long before you signed the paper, did you know said Arnaz desired the land?

Answer I had directed him to make selection of such property as he wished, and I did not know that he had selected this land till the deed was brought to me to be signed.

8th Question. Was that paper signed before or after you last
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PAGE 35 the decree of the War department spoken of
herein before?

Answer It was signed about 2 weeks before I last the Decree.

9th Question. Who gave you the decree or order of the War Department?

Answer It was brought by a courier, a regular monthly express. I do not remember the person who brought it

10th Question To whom was it addressed?

Answer It was addressed to General Don Jose Castro.

11th Question How do you know it was a circular?

Answer It was a special decree to myself, and by a letter from the Minister which accompanied the document, I was instructed of the object of the decree, the paper itself showed that it was a circular. The word circular was written in the document.

12th Question Was the circular and letter on one sheet of paper and under one envelop?

Answer They were on different papers. I cannot now remember whether they were under one envelope.

13th Question In which was contained the power you have mentioned

Answer It was in the Special decree I received. The circular conferred the same powers upon the other commanders.

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14th Question Who were the other Generals to whom said circular was sent?

Answer I do not recollect.

15th Question Did you ever know?

Answer I now recollect it was directed to the Generals of Sonora, Sinaloa, Chihuahua and New Mexico.

16th Question Was it directed to the Generals of those Departments by their names?

Answer It was directed to the commanding Generals not by their names. The circular I received was not directed to me by name.

17th Question How did you happen to receive a circular and letter at the same time, of the same import?

Answer It came from the War office, and was not remarkable. They might have sent more.

18th Question State the difference between the directions of the letter and the circular?

Answer The letter commenced "My esteemed and distinguished friend" and was addressed to me, the circular was addressed to the commanding Generals of the Departments as I before stated.

19th Question How did the letter proceed after the address?

Answer The letter after the address commenced about in this way: "Finally what you apprehended in 1839 or 1840 is likely to occur". I cannot pretend now to recollect all the letter. There was a great deal more. I cannot remember the words.

The letter directed to me individually expressed its regret that the country was about to be lost, and lamented the want of resources & the letter was dated in May or June and signed either by Sornel or Almonte, not officially, and it came when the circular came and was also accompanied by the Special decree, and other decrees,

20th Question, State the contents of Said Special Decree?

Answer. It Stated that it gave me authority to sell and dispose of all the Government property in California as near as I can recollect it was about in this form: From the circumstances which have occurred and the relations existing between Mexico and the United States it seems that war is inevitable, The most excellent President orders me to say to you that you may dispose of all the property belonging to the General Government in the Department of California, and all such as is recognized, and that the Commanding General Shall apply it and its proceeds to the support of the war." The decree contained more words, but substantially it was about as I have Stated, It related to no other Subject. It was dated in May or June 1846, and signed as I have before Stated by Sornel, or Almonte.

21st Question Wherein did the General circular of which you have spoken differ from this Special decree?

Answer The difference was that this was directed to me, and the other was of general direction to the other Departments as well as California Substantially the orders were the same.

22nd Question, Which one of those papers did you lose?

Answer I lost them all at the same time

23rd Question, Who besides yourself received in California, one of those general Circulars?

Answer The Governor Pio Pico received one.

24th Question What was the first item of the consideration for the deed in this case received by you?

Answer I think the first was some Shoes for the Soldiers. It was chiefly all paid in goods and equipments.

25th Question Where, to whom, and upon whose order, and how many were these?

Answer They were delivered at Los Angeles, to some one upon my order, I do not know who received them for the men, and do not remember the number there might have been 25 or 30 pair.

26th Question What was the price of the Shoes?

Answer I think the price was about \$3.50 per pair.

27th Question What other items were delivered to the Government in consideration of said deed?

Answer There were received about 37½ pounds of powder, 150 pounds of lead, 2 braces of pistols, 10 lances, and money at different times. Sometimes \$100. Sometimes \$400. at a time.

28th Question What business was Arnaz the grantee engaged in at that time?

Answer He was a merchant in Los Angeles.

29th Question Did he petition in writing for the land in question?

Answer He did not.

30th Question Was there any record of the sale made by you preserved in the Archives?

Answer The deed was given to the interested party. I think there was no record placed in the Archives.

31st Question Did you not know that the lands of the Mission could not be sold at that time?

Answer I knew that they could be sold, I had the authority to sell them.

32nd Question Who collected and disbursed the funds of California in 1846

Answer Alvarado and Pablo de la Guerra I think were the collectors of customs that year. I am not certain.

33rd Question Did Said Arnaz render his account for payment to them, or to any other person?

Answer He did not

34th Question How did you know he did not?

Answer Because in June of that year I ordered all the offices to be closed, and all persons, to follow me, in defense of the country.

35th Question Were not Alvarado and de la Guerra Government officers at that time, and as such had they ~~no~~ charge of the public funds?

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Answer Alvarado was a Government officer and de la Guerra was chief treasurer, they had no funds of the Government, for there were none,

36th Question Were they not the proper officers with whom to settle the public accounts?

Answer During times of Peace they would have been so, but under the circumstances in time of war, the military chief had every thing at his disposal. Alvarado was in the military service under me, and de la Guerra went home to attend to his private affairs.

37th Question Who audited the account of Arnaz and approved it?

Answer I myself did, at my General quarters in Los Angeles, two or three days before the execution of the deed.

38th Question What became of his vouchers?

Answer They were all lost with my other papers.
