



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Be it Remembered, that on this ninth day of September, Anno Domini One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-two, before the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San Francisco, in the State aforesaid, in the United States of America, the following Proceedings were had, to wit;

The Petition of Victoria Dominguez et al, (heirs of Jose Antonio Estudillo,) for the Place named "Otay," was presented, and ordered to be filed and docketed with No. 330 and is as follows, to wit;

In Case no. 330, Victoria Dominguez for the place named "Otay", the deposition of Santiago Arguello, a witness in behalf of the claimants, taken before Commissioner Helias Hall, with document marked A, annexed thereto, was filed:

San Francisco September 19th 1853.
Case no. 330, on Motion of the Counsel for the claimants was ordered to the front of the Docket.

San Francisco September 5th 1854.
Case no. 330 was ordered to be placed at the front of the 2^d class cases on the Trial Docket.

San Francisco October 14th 1854.
Case no. 330 on motion of the Counsel for the claimants

with the consent of the U. S. Law Agent, was ordered
to be placed at the foot of the 3^d class cases on the
Trial Docket.

taken on the 13th. September 1853 before Commissioner
Thompson Campbell, evidence in conformity to

To the Board of Commissioners for Ascertaining and
Settling Private Land Claims in the State
of California

My Petitioners Victoria Dominguez widow of
Don Jose Antonio Estudillo and the children of
the said Jose Antonio Estudillo late of the County
of San Diego in the State of California deceased,
respectfully represent to your Honorable Board
that they claim a certain tract of land called
Elay Chulaniingue Squan Lagoon near
less situated in the County of San Diego in said
State of California and that they claim the
same in fee by virtue of a Grant made to Jose
Antonio Estudillo under the authority of the Mexican
Government by General Mariano de Echeandia Com-
mandant General and Governor of California
bearing date the twenty first day of March
A.D. 1829.

Your Petitioners will further represent
that peaceful possession of said tract of land
was given to the said Mariano the _____ day of
and the boundaries thereof designated and
defined and that he and those claiming under him
have been in the peaceful possession thereof ever
since and that they have no knowledge of any other
prior claim.

Your Petitioners will present the original grant
of said land in the Spanish Language together
with a translation of the same and will make fur-
ther proof of title if required by the Board. Your
Petitioners pray your Honorable Board to take
into consideration their claim to said tract of
Land and to decide thereon to be valid and
confirm the same and your Petitioners will
be in pray.

Auson The Grant is genuine
with year eighteen hundred and twenty three,
one thousand eight hundred and twenty three
Commandant of San Diego and was in frequent
intimacy with Echevarria and Zamora
and knew that the grant was made by
Echevarria to Jose Antonio Estudillo

Question what do you know
of possession having been given to Jose Antonio
Estudillo of the Rancho of Otay the land name
is in the Grant numbered A

Auson It was given in 1827 or

1828 when Captain Don Pablo de la Portilla
the former Commandant of San Diego gave
possession of said Lands to Don Jose Antonio Estor
also having been called upon as a witness by
said Portilla but Estor did not receive a
title until 1829

Question 10th was the information
you have in California of the adoption of the
Regulations of Number 21 of 1828

Ausur I have received in
California since the year of March of
number 1829

Question 11th was if customary claim
grants were made upon common paper because
of having no sealed paper for the authorities to
make another grant of the same land upon
sealed paper afterwards

Ausur I have known of such
instances

Question 12th was the unsealed paper
in San Diego in the year 1829 eighteen hundred
and twenty seven

Ausur This was not

Question 13th was he commandant
General in the years 1830 and 1831

Ausur Don Jose Manuela de Ich
caudia was during 1830 and part of 1831
when paper was stamped either annually or
otherwise it was usual for the authority to date
the date of the stamped paper in year in advance
as well as for the year in which it was stamped
so that it might answer for ten years

Question by Law Agent

Question 14th you know grants
to be made by Mexican Government in California
after the passage of the General Colonization
Law of August 18th 1824 and before the pub-
lication of the General Regulations of 1828
and if so what such grants consisted of values

Ausur In November 1829 there
military commandant of the Presidio of San
Diego and received as such officially from the
Government of Mexico a copy of the colonization
Law of August 18th 1824 and the Regulations
of Number 21 of 1828

With due time to publish the same which I
caused to be done with due solemnity.

At the
time the colonization Law was unknown
in that part of California I recollect the Law
and Regulations were published in the latter
part of the year 1829 because there was a new
colonization in California that time

I know these boundaries from having had them shown to me by the owners and rough bars and have seen the title

I am not sure the boundaries are described as they describe them in said title know the boundaries west of this

and the dividing line between me and this Rancho is at the west of said Roads This Rancho in question is in the part of the country called Ulay and contains about one league in a square form

Please state what you know of the occupation of said Rancho

Answer In 1827 or 1828 Jose Antonio Estudillo played some cattle and I know said Rancho and kept them there about four or six years There was a small garden there

testimony in this case

This affiant further says
that the Ranchos is but comparatively little value
and the claimants cannot afford to send out
witnesses or great assistance to prove up said claim

This affiant further says that he adduced
after some time since before him of the said
Estudillo requesting him to furnish testimony
and in consequence of his Jesus Munoz
friendly alcalde of San Diego commanding
to give testimony in this and other cases

Where
the lands are located in San Diego County
but upon the arrival of the said Munoz
this affiant learns that the said witness
is not acquainted with the said boundaries
of the Rancho so as particularly define its
limits

although he is cognizant of the fact of
its occupying the original tract for
nearly thirty years after this affidavit is made.
it is and truly believe and that this affidavit
is not made for the purpose of delay &c



Nectia Dominguez et al vs The United States

This claim is filed by the widow and children
of the deceased of the same Autumn Entituled

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A grant of the
Land, it appears made to him by Jose Maria
de Bolivar in Superior Political belief of the
In California on the 24th day of March
1829 is pursued and found

The testimony shows
that the grantee had possession of the place
before the grant was made and continued pos-
sibly to occupy it with his cattle and that
he cultivated part of the land in a garden

The description
of the premises contains in the grant words
after testing of the witness no specimen was
present when person was given to him
before the grant was made would seem to
be sufficient to identify and designate the
square league of land intended to be gr-
anted

The testing in this case is not so
definite and explicit as could be desired
yet we think after while careful and ex-
-amining which certifies the claimant
to a fair and accurate description within
fair call according to custom

TO THE HON. ISAAC S. K. OGIER, JUDGE:

The Petitioner of Pacificus Ord, a resident of said City, County, and State, Attorney of the United States for the Southern District of California, who petitions in this behalf for the United States, and being present here in Court, in the name and behalf of the United States, represents as follows: That heretofore, to wit: on or about the 9th day of December A. D. 1854, Victoria Dominguez, alleged Widow, and the alleged children of Jose Antonio Estevills,

presented a petition to the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the private land claims in the State of California, when sitting as a Board, claiming a tract of land called Otay,

situate in the County of San Diego State of California, which said petition is referred to for a description of the land claimed, a copy of which appears in the transcript hereafter referred to. That thereafter, to wit: on or about the 19th day of December A. D. 1854, the said Commissioners confirmed, by final decision, the said claim of said petitioner. That thereafter, to wit: on or about the 6th day of June A. D. 1855,

a duly certified transcript of the proceedings and decision of the said Commissioners in said cause, and the papers and evidence on which the said decision was founded, was filed in the Office of the Clerk of the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of California, and marked No. 330; reference to which it is prayed may be had and made part of this petition. That on or about the 14th day of June A. D. 1855,

the Honorable Caleb Cushing, Attorney-General of the United States, received a duly certified duplicate of said transcript of the proceedings and decision of said Commissioners in said cause, and the papers and

evidence on which said decision was founded. That thereafter, to wit: on the 4th day of October A. D. 1855; the said Attorney-General of the United States filed, or caused to be filed, in behalf of the United States, a notice with the Clerk of said District Court of the United States, that the appeal in said cause from the said decision of the said Commissioners, in the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of California, would be prosecuted by the United States. Your petitioner further represents, that the land claimed, as aforesaid, is situate in the Southern District of California, and within the jurisdiction of this Honorable Court. Your petitioner further represents and insists, that the said claim is invalid; and the said decision of said Commissioners is erroneous, and ought to be reviewed, reversed and set aside, for many errors and imperfections of law and evidence, apparent in said certified transcript of the proceedings and decisions of said Commissioners in said cause, filed and appealed from as aforesaid. And your petitioner denies all and singular, each and every allegation in the said petition of said claimants presented as aforesaid to said Commissioners. And your petitioner further denies that the said claimants ~~has~~^{have} any valid right or title to said land claimed as aforesaid, or any part thereof.

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And no sufficient proof having been made of the allegations in said petition to said Commissioners, or in support of the said claim, no decision confirming the same should have been made by said Commissioners; but the

said claim should have been rejected by them. And the said
claimants having no valid right or title derived from the Spanish or
Mexican Governments, to the land claimed as aforesaid, the lawful
right and title in and to the said land was acquired by, and it now
belongs to the United States, by virtue of conquest, and the Treaty
of peace, friendship, limits and settlement, between the United States
and the Republic of Mexico, made at the City of Guadalupe
Hidalgo, February 2d, A. D. 1848.

Wherefore, the said Pacificus Ord, Attorney of the United States
for the Southern District of California, for and in behalf of the
United States, by reason of the premises, and in pursuance of the Act of
Congress, entitled "An Act to ascertain and settle the Private Land
