

land defining them the ownership of it

He may enclose it without prejudice to  
the cross roads road and limited he may  
use it fully and exclusively applying it  
to the use or cultivation which may best suit  
him but within one year he will build a house  
on it and it shall be inhabited

Ind. Decr. 11 against the proper Magistrate  
to give him the judicial possession in virtue  
of this Patent by whom the boundaries will  
be marked out with lines of which he will  
place the corresponding bounds and fence  
first or first time opportunity

four thousand leagues square by the maps  
 which will be made to the magistrate  
 who may give the possession will cause it

In this case the only evidence filed by the Petition in support of this claim consists of the original Grant which purports to be genuine and a certified copy of the Map from the Office of the Surveyor of the Government.

No approval of the Departmental Assembly and no private possession or usage amount as required by the Grant appears to have been had.

In view of this description the Commission has misinformedly decided that the conditions of occupation or cultivation being the consideration upon which the grant was made

of this preference was essential in order to establish such an equitable right in the claimant as would entitle him to a confirmation of his claim.

No proof on this point has been introduced in this case nor does it appear that the party ever was in possession or occupation of the land in any manner.

The claim must therefore be rejected.

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Redin Garrido 46 years of age, am a Ranchero  
I reside in Santa Barbara

Questions by W H Patterson atty for Plaintiff

Ques. Are you the Redin Garrido grantee for the  
Camulos Ranchos

Ans. Yes I am

Ques. After the Rancho was granted to you  
and before the Cession of California to the United  
States, did you use it for any purpose. If so  
what.

Ans I was going to use it for the raising of  
stock and cultivation

Did you put any stock on it. If so  
what

I put a manada of mares on it in the  
Year 1843

When did you live, in Reference to this  
Rancho

I lived on the adjoining of Ranchos of those  
belonging to my father

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Ques. Was you prevented by any person - if so  
by whom - from taking full possession of that Rancho

Ans. I applied to Don Luis Kiss not to be molested  
in taking possession of the Rancho. He told me  
that I could go. I made preparations to leave  
for the Rancho, when I found out that Don Ignacio  
Del Valle was in possession of the Rancho.

Mihettoreua was the man who granted me  
the Rancho, but when I went to take possession  
I found that Del Valle claimed a portion of it  
as belonging to his Rancho. - I could not then  
proceed on account of the revolutions that  
immediately took place, Mihettoreua was  
sent out of the Country and Kiss became  
Provisional Governor of the Country.

For what use is the land of Camulos  
Appropriate,

For pasture, and a small patch of it  
fitted for cultivation - a few acres

What is it you take as its best

What is its present value, as it stands  
It is not worth much, not over \$200,  
I would suppose

Please, by Det' day,

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What number of mares did you put  
on the Ranch

About 50, mares, but with Colts, some  
100 head,

Where did you take them from.

I took them from the adjoining Ranch  
then belonging to my father; - the Mares were  
mine.

How far did you drive them,

The Ranches adjoin, from my father's  
house to the Cañulos is some 3 leagues  
the

How far did you drive the Mares  
When you put them on to the Cañulos

About 15 or 18 miles - from my father's

Ranchos.

How many men were with you. <sup>two</sup>

Two Indian Vigilantes were with me  
I was with them and went the whole  
way. I built no corrals

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Did you leave anybody with them

No. there was no necessity for it

Did the mares come back to your father's  
Ranchos

Sometimes. but we always drove  
them back. They remained upon the  
Camulos some 4 or 5 months. ranging  
all over the Ranchos

Did they range a part of that time on  
your father's Ranchos

Of course the country being all open  
they would sometimes cross over. They  
could go where they pleased. When no one was  
with them but I always turned them back  
as I wished to get them waylured to the Ranchos

I would send a boy and drive them a  
part of the way,

Was this before or after - this circumstance  
of driving Mares on to the Rancho - that  
you went to see Rio Loco about being let alone

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It was before, and just after the Grant  
was made to me
