



the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San
Francisco, in the State aforesaid, in the United States of America,
the following Proceedings were had, to wit;

The Petition of *Luis Roubideau*, *for the place named*
San Jacinto & San Gorgonio,
was presented, and ordered to be filed and docketed with No. 443 and

Claimant, taken before Commissioner Roland
Hall, with documents marked H. H. No. 152
and translations marked B & D, annexed thereto,
was filed:

San Francisco, November 28th 1854.
 Case no. 443, on motion of the Counsel for the
 claimant, with the consent of the U. S. Land
 Agent, was ordered to be placed at the foot
 of the 3rd class Cases on the Trial Docket.

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San Francisco Decem. 19th 1854.
 Case no. 443 was submitted under the Rule of 21st
 of March 1854 and taken under advisement by
 the Board.

San Francisco January 2^d 1855.
 In the same case Commissioner Alpheus Felch
 delivered the opinion of the Board rejecting
 the claim:

Petition

To the Hon. the Board of U.S. Land Commissioners appointed to settle private Land claims in California

The petition of Louis Roubidoux respectfully represents, that on or about the 22nd day of March 1843 Manuel Micheltorena then Governor of California in the name of the Mexican Nation, by virtue of the Laws then in force the customs and usages of the Country affecting grants of Land in California granted in fee property unto Santiago Johnston the tract of Land and Rancho in the present County of Los Angeles known by the name of San Lacento and San Gorgonio containing about one square league of Land more particularly described in the papers and maps relating to said part of Land. Copies of said papers and maps are herewith filed as part of this petition.

And your petitioner further shows that the said Santiago Johnston received a duplicate copy of said Sales from the proper Officer having jurisdiction of such matters as appears by original documents and papers now in the possession of your petitioner ready to be produced and proved - three copies of said documents and papers are herewith filed as part of this petition.

That Copies of said Original Documents and papers are herewith filed as part of this petition.

And your petitioner further shows that on or about the 12th day of April 1844 the said Santiago Johnston sold and conveyed the said tract of Land and Rancho unto your petitioner a memorandum of said Sale in writing being now in the possession of your petitioner ready to be produced and proved - three copies of said Memorandum are herewith filed as part of this petition.

There is no conflicting claim to said lands known to your petitioner and the said lands have not been surveyed by the U. S. Surveyor General of California.

The evidence upon which your petitioner relies in support of this claim consists of the records of this Court in the Archives in custody of the U. S. Surveyor General of California - Original

Los Angeles Nov. 5th 1853

On this day before Leon. Silence
Hall came Stego Reis a witness produced in
behalf of the Claimant Luis Robledano
petition No. 443. and was duly sworn his
evidence being given in English.

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The U. S. Associate Law Agent was present

In answer to inquiries by himself of the claimant
the witness testified as follows.

My name is Hugo Reis my age is forty one
years and I reside at San Gabriel in the County
of Los Angeles. I have lived in California
nineteen years.

I am acquainted with the hand writing and
signatures of Antonio F. Coronel, Santiago Johnson
Luis Michelena, Francisco Acea and Felipe
Valenzuela.

A paper is now shown me purporting to be a
petition for pedeal possession; to which is
attached a grant to Santiago Johnston of a tract
of Land called San Geronimo date of March
1843 & also a testimonial of judicial possession
given on March 1843. The signatures of the said
several persons appearing on said paper I
believe to be genuine. It is hereto annexed &
marked A. It No. 1 Antonio F. Coronel was
at the date of said possession acting as Justice
of the peace & authorized to give it.

A paper is now shown me purporting to be a
copy of Espediente upon which is a memorandum
of sale from Santiago Johnston to Luis
Robledano date April 1st 1843 - The signature
of Santiago Johnston to said memorandum of
sale I believe to be genuine. The paper is
hereto annexed & marked A No 2.

I know the land described on the papers I made
the sketch or plan of the same land which
was sent to the Governor with the petition for the

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land Johnston placed cattle on the Land immediately after Judge Poppey was given him but I cannot tell how long they were continued there I think he took them from time to time and never had any horses

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In answer to Questions by the Associate Law Agent

I am not aware of his building a house on the Land, he was at the place until he came to Los Angeles. I never heard of his giving up the place until he sold to Seelye Rockbridge I have not been on the land since I drew the sketch before mentioned -

numbered on the Locket of the Survey Board
with No. 443 who upon oath de clareth and
saith as follows

Questions asked by licensed for Claimant
Question No. 1. What is your name age
and place of residence

Answer. My name is Jose Carmen
Seguro I am forty one years of age and reside in
the County of Los Angeles

Question No. 2. State if you know
a tract of Land or Rancho called San Jacinto
San Gorgonio or San Tomotio and where is the same
situated?

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Answer. Yes. I know all three, they are situated
from the City of Los Angeles on the other side
of San Bernardino.

Question 3. Did you know San
Santiago Johnston in his life time?

Answer. Yes.

Question No. 4. Did he own and
occupy any of these Ranches and if so state
what Ranches they were.

Answer. Yes, he was the owner of
San Tomotio and occupied the same

Question No. 5. Is or is not the place
you call San Tomotio situated between or adjoin-
ing the places called Yucaipa, San Jacinto
and San Gorgonio, and are they or not generally
called by either of those names

(Question objected to by C. E. Thom as being leading)

Answer. It is situated between
and adjoining them every one is distinguished by
its own proper name.

Question No. 6. Did Santiago
Johnston in his lifetime occupy any portion of
these Ranches and if so which portion and how
did he occupy the same?

Answer. I know that he occupied
San Tomotio in the year 1843 & I believe he occ-
UPIED the same with cattle and horses.

Question No. 7. Do you know
whether or not he built a house upon the place
and if so in what year and for what purpose

Answer. I do not know

Question 8. When did you first know
Robideau?

Answer. In the year 1843

Question No 9. Do you know whether
or not Robideau left California for New Mex-
ico, and if so what year and for what purpose

Answer. I know that he left
California. I think in the year 1843 for New
Mexico for the purpose of bringing his family
here.

Question No. 10 Did you ever
occupy the same Rancho and if so when and
how long and for whom?

Answer. Yes I have Occupied

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Sacee Rancho, commencing in the year 1844 and
continued for five or six years. On account
of Sacee Rancho

Question No. 11. Do you or not
know that Roberdeau purchased the Sacee
Rancho from Johnston and if so whom?
(Question Objected to by C. E. Thom acting Law Agent)

Answer. I know that Roberdeau
purchased the Rancho from Johnston in the
Year 1843 or 1844

Question No. 12. At the time you
occupied the Rancho of Roberdeau Steele whether
or not you had a house and Corral upon the
place and cattle and horses and if so what
number of cattle and horses you had on the
place and further Steele if the same was cattle
Received or any part thereof and if so in what
manner?

Answer. I built a house three
of Poles and branches and a Corral and also
placed a number of cattle and horses. Fifteen
hundred head of cattle and twenty gentle horses
about five hundred head. Some of the Ranch
was cultivated with Corn Wheat Barley Beans
Molons Pumpkins &c.

Question No. 13. During this
time did you or not live on the house you
spoke of and take care of Sacee Rancho and if
so for whom and on account of whom did
you do it

Answer. I have a Mayordomo
with servants that did not live than myself
and they were placed there by me on account
of Luis Roberdeau

Question No. 14. Where did you
live at that time and how far was your place
of residence from the Sacee Rancho

Answer. I lived in San Benito
dijo which is a little over two leagues from
Rancho of San Tomo. Most of the time I
was in San Tomo going and coming
(Questions Asked by C. E. Thom Acting Law Agent)

Question No. 15. When did you
know Santiago Johnston. How long did you know
him and when and where did he die?

Answer. I knew him in Los Angeles - I knew him from the year 1833 until the time of his death
Question No. 3 If he was alive in 1843 where was he then residing?

Answer. In the year 1842 he was living in Tampico, in the year 1843 I do not know where he was residing as I never saw him.

Question No. 4 What part of the Land mentioned in your Examination in Chief was occupied by Santiago Johnston when and in what manner?

Answer. The Rancho he occupied was called San Tomotio but I do not know if he occupied any of the adjoining ranchos this was in the year 1842 and on my return a year afterwards he was not there he occupied both above lots bounded each of cattle more or less I do not know how many horses he had there, he had no horses there but lived in Tampico which is certain about four leagues from San Tomotio.

Question 4. In what month of what year did Luis Robedearo leave California & for what length of time was he absent?

Answer. He left here in the year 1843 or 1844 I saw him here in the year 1843 and do not recollect how long a time he was absent.

Question No. 5. Was Luis Robedearo absent from California for as long a time as three years?

Answer. I am certain he was absent for as long a time as two.

Question No. 6. Do you know that Mr Robedearo purchased a Rancho from S Johnston?

Answer. Because Mr Robedearo told me so afterwards I heard it from Diego Sepulveda who was living in Tampico this was in the following year I do not know it from any other source.

Question 7. To whom belonged the cattle and horses mentioned by you in your Examination in Chief as having been placed by you upon the Rancho?

Answer. The horses and cattle placed there were
my own, the Mayo Domo placed there was
my servant and his responsibility to me for his acts
Question No. 8 Described more
particularly the house or house placed there
by you

Answer. The roof was of tiles
the sides were composed of poles and interwoven
with small twigs and fastened together
with crop poles, it was ten yards long and
over four yards wide and two yards and a half
high in the middle, it had no window or
doors, and was inhabited in the rainy season
(Examination in Chief resumed by Counsel for
Claimant)

Question No. 1. State distinctly of whom
you were upon the Rancho of San Simoteo
and occupied the same as you have
before stated, you did so at the request of
and for the benefit of Señor Robledo and
if not in what capacity did you go there
Answer, I went there for the
benefit of and at the request of Señor Robledo
Crop Examination resumed by C. E. Thom acting
Law Agent.

Question No 1. What became of the
products of the Rancho during the time you
were in possession and to whose use and benefit
if any were they appropriated

Answer. They were consumed
by my family and my servants

Testimony to be used before the Board of Commis-
sioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land
Claims in the State of California. Personally
appeared Jose Diego Sepulveda a citizen
in behalf of Luis Robledo and Clamanto for
the Land named San Vicente de San Geronio
and numbered on the Register of the said
Board with No. 443 who upon Oath declar-
eth and saith as follows

Deestens asked by counsel of the claimant

Question No 1. What is your name
age and place of residence

Answer. My name is Jose Diego
Sepulveda I am thirty four years of age and
I reside in the County of Los Angeles

Deesten No 2 Do you know
a tract of land lying between places called
San Vicente and San Geronio in the County of
San Bernardino formerly a part of the County
of Los Angeles, and if so what was the said
place called?

Answer. Yes I do. It is called
San Timoteo and comprises a part of San Gago
no and is sometimes called by both names.

Question No 3. Do you know if
pedeal possession of that tract of land
was ever given to Santiago Johnston and if so
when and by whom?

Answer. I know that I gave
possession to him on the 16th or 17th of
March 1843 by Antonio Flores, he then being
Alcalde, a man by the name of Bacilio Raulog
and myself assisted when the Land was meas-
ured

Question 4. Describe as well as
you can recollect the manner which it was
measured and its boundaries

Answer. They measured first
a rope one hundred varas long and affixed
Sticks at each end of the rope. They commenced

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First there is an Oak tree on the boundary of San Bernadeno, from thence went along a lanada where they came to a small hill (Somito) the top of which was the boundary in that direction, from thence along a lanada to an Oak tree in the middle of a creek in San Ignacio upon which they put a brand cut with a knife which was the brand used by Johnston in marking cattle, from thence through the Land of San Ignacio to some other small hills where they placed a pile of stones on the side of the road as a Land Mark from thence along the road to the top of a hill which forms one of the boundaries of Yucayapa, from there along the foot of the hills of San Ignacio forming the boundaries line of the Yucaypa to the place of beginning Yucaypa forms a part of San Bernadeno.

Question No. 5. How much land was included in that measurement?

Answer. I do not recollect but it contains one or two leagues I do not recollect which.

Question No. 6. Was there or not a map of said lands made, and if so by whom and when was it made?

Answer. Seigo Peice made a map of the said before popopon was given

Question No. 7. Were said lands ever occupied, & improvements made thereon and if so how were they occupied and what improvements made and when by whom

Answer - Yes the lands were occupied and a house (Casal) and a corral with stakes which grew into trees, fields of corn and wheat were planted some months after popopon was given for years occupied by a Mayor domo who Jose Ramon Seigo placed there with cattle and who made these improvements -

Question 8. How many and what kind of cattle was placed upon the land by Seigo, and by orders of whom and how long were they kept there?

Answer. He had a quantity of cattle there and
would cattle in considerable numbers, he had
also a dairy there, the cattle were placed there
by Order of his Robedear, the cattle rema-
ined there about four & five years. There was
also a large quantity of cattle houses and one
dozen of Mares there.

Question No. 9. about the time
Lugo took possession of the place for Seis Robedear
ex, placed the cattle on and made the improvements
there on, when did Robedear go and for what
purpose and how long was it before he returned

Answer. He made a journey
to New Mexico for the purpose of bringing his
family and I know that he remained with his
Family, and there he has been living on the Rancho
of Tulipa about three or four leagues
from these lands.

I do not know the exact time he was absent

Questions asked by le E Thom acting Law agent

Question No. 1 Name all the per-
sons that were present with you at the time of
giving general possession of the Rancho?

Answer. Mr Johnson was present
Anto. Fernandez & Cecilio Valdez, there were also
servants of Mr Johnson whose names I do
not know.

Question No. 2. Is the ~~old~~ Oak
tree to which you allude as having been the
point of commencement on the boundary of San
Benedicto the Only One on that line?

Ans. There are numerous oak trees
there on the hill but this is the Only One at the
bottom of the hill. I know the points of the comp
up, the course from the ~~old~~ Oak tree to the small
hill is in a South East direction, I do not know
the distance. I was always carrying the rope
The Rancho is an irregular shape they put a
pile of stones for one mark and the other marks
were trees. One of which was marked with a
knife.

Question No. 3. did Santiago Johnson

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over base upon the Rancho?

Answer. We had servants cutting wood there; the cattle placed there belong to Jose Carmen Diego, but he never lived there. The Rancho was burnt in the midge of the year 1843 by the Maya Adams of Jose Carmen Diego - I have seen the map of the Land I do not recollect the exact time when the Rancho was burnt.

an Oak tree on the boundary of Yuccapoo and runs
in a South Easterly direction to a hill about five
thousand yards, from thence in a North East
direction about five thousand five hundred
yards to an Oak tree in a ravine fixed on as
a Land mark, from thence in a North West
direction two thousand ^{varas} along some hills where
a Land mark was ordered to be placed ^{from} thence
in a Westerly direction along the edge of the hills
four thousand four hundred yards to a hill in
the middle of a ravine being the boundary
of Yuccapoo from thence along the said bound-
ary of Yuccapoo, three thousand yards to the
place of beginning, the land was measured in
the month of March in the year 1843 A. Floronel



Proof is given in this case, of a grant made by Gov-
ernor Manuel Michel Torreza on the 22nd day of
March 1843 to Santiago Johnston and of the Office
of Act of peaceful possession which was given
to the grantee on the 10th day of the same month.
The approval of the Departmental Assembly does
not appear to have been obtained.

The evidence of the purchase of the
premises of the grantee by the present claimant con-
sists of a brief and informal memorandum at
the end of a copy of the Expediente Semper apyn-
ing said document together with all and singular
the papers contained thereby to Louis Robideau.
This document is signed by Louis Johnson and
bears the date of April 2nd 1844. This purchase it
will be observed was made a little more than
a year after the grant. The grant contains the usual
concessions exceeding the requirement of occupying
a house within a year.

It is claimed from the
proof in the case that Johnson performed substantially
all the requirements of the Law and regulations
under which he took the grant. Nothing more could
possibly be claimed than that he put a few cattle
on the place which could have remained but
a very short period of time. He built no house
and made no cultivation, and is not proved to
have had even a servant established there. The
putting of a few cattle temporarily on the place
granted is not, and we have before held in
several cases, a compliance with the conditions of
the Colonization Laws and regulations as will
entitle a party to a decree of confirmation in his
own behalf or in the name of his espouse.

But on examining the proof in this case we think
the testimony insufficient to show that Johnston
ever put any cattle on the premises granted.
One witness states that he did so immediately
after the peaceful possession was given to him, but on
the cross examination he declares that he was never

Opinion.

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On the place after the grant was made, and he very
doubtless does not speak from any personal knowl-
edge of the fact. Another witness says that Johnson
occupied the place (San Tomote) in 1843 but in
a subsequent portion of his deposition he states
that this occupancy was in 1843 and that he was
in 1843 not there in 1843 and that he (the witness)
does not know where the grantee resided in 1843
the year the grant was issued.

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The place referred to by these two witnesses whose
depositions contain all the material testimony on
this branch of the case is denominated San Tomote
but the premises described in the grant are bounded
by San Tomote, and consequently the place known
by that name is excluded from the land conceded.

There is some confusion in the use of this appella-
tion, but I incline to the opinion that the place
which the witness testifies was occupied by Johnson
in 1842 was the adjoining place known as San Tom-
ote and was not within the limits of the land
granted and enjoyed by plaintiff measurement.
Be this as it may however, the proof is not suffi-
cient to show that he took cuttings on the premises
espoused to him under the conception and now clai-
med by the petitioner at any time during the
year that intervened between the issuing of the
grant to him and his sale to Rockbridge; and
no other acts of settlement or cultivation are
presented. If Johnson had really occupied the
place in any manner, or had cultivated or
improved any part of it, there surely would be
difficulty in proving it, as the case is presented
on the proofs now before us, we cannot find
that he did anything towards the performance of
the conditions of his inchoate title, which conveys
authorizes him to claim to be made the absolute
owner of the premises, or enables him to sell it to
another with a similar right.

For the want of proof of the performance
of the conditions imposed by the law and reu-
lating especially to the case, the claim must
be rejected.


