

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Be it Remembered, that on this nineteenth day of February, Anno Domini One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-~~Three~~, before the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California, sitting as a Board in the City of San Francisco, in the State aforesaid, in the United States of America, the following Proceedings were had, to wit;

The Petition of Blas A. Escamilla, for the Place named "San Vicente," was presented, and ordered to be filed and docketed with No. 608 and is as follows, to wit;

(Vide page 3 of this Transcript.)

Upon which Petition the following subsequent Proceedings were had in their chronological order, to wit;

San Francisco Aug. 31' 1854.
In Case no. 608, Blas A. Escamilla for the place named "San Vicente," the depositions of Manuel Rodriguez, Manuel Cartio, and Cornelio Perez, witness in behalf of the claimant, taken before Commissioner Peter Solt, were filed.

San Francisco December 5 1854.
Case no. 608 was ordered to be placed at the foot of the 3rd class Cases on the Trial Socket.

San Francisco December 19' 1854.
Case no. 608 was submitted on briefs and taken under advisement by the Board.

San Francisco January 23 1855.
In the same case Commissioner R. Aug. Thompson

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delivered the opinion of the Board confirming
the claim:

What is your name, age and residence?

Answer.

My name is Cornelio Perez, my age 43 years, and I reside in the County of Santa Cruz, where I was born and have always lived.

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2^d Question.

Do you know the Rancho of San Vicente, if yes, describe it?

Answer.

I know the Rancho. It is in Santa Cruz County - The boundaries are from the Arroyo San Vicente to the Arroyo del Molino, and from the to the mountain -

3^d Question.

Is the mountain a conspicuous mountain? Is it a single mountain or range of mountains?

Answer.

It is a large mountain or range of mountains, well known and conspicuous. The mountain is about 3 leagues from the sea and the Arroyos are about 1 league apart.

4th Question.

State what you know of the occupation of said Rancho in the years 1845-1846 and 1847?

Answer.

I saw Blas Escamilla take some houses out to the place in 1845, in 1846 he built and a house and corral there & planted a small portion of the land and lived there - I was there and saw these things - and he continued there with his cattle and stock and cultivation in 1847.

Escamilla, in case No 608 on the docket of said Board, said witness being sworn deposed in Spanish, which is interpreted by the Interpreter to said Board, as follows -

Questions by Mr Packard who appears for the Attorney for claimant.

1st Question.

What is your name, age and residence?

Answer.

My name is Manuel Rodriguez, my age 36 years, I reside at the Mission of Santa Cruz, in Santa Cruz County, California.

2^d Question.

Do you know the Rancho of San Vicente, if yes, describe it?

Answer.

I know the Rancho named. It is in the County of Santa Cruz. It is bounded on the South by the Arroyo of San Vicente, on the North by the Arroyo del Molinillo,

on the East by the mountain (sierra) and on the West by the Pacific Ocean —

3^d. Question.

State what you know of the occupation of said Rancho in 1845, 1846 and 1847,

Answer.

In 1845 I saw houses belonging to Don Blas Escamilla; in 1846 I saw a house and corral and some planting there and also some cattle on the place, said Blas Escamilla lived there at that time, and he still continued there in 1847.

4th. Question.

How do you know these boundaries?

Answer.

I passed through the Rancho nearly every week, and the owner of the ranch & the neighbor have frequently told me these would boundaries.

5^d. Question.

Are the boundaries so connected as to enclose all the land?

Answer.

They are —

3^d. Question.

What is the shape of the Rancho and how much land is imbraced within it, and what is its average length and breadth?

Answer.

It is in an oblong shape, quadrangular. It is about 3 leagues long from East to West, and about one league wide from North to South — I believe it contains about 3 square leagues of land —

4th. Question.

Is the mountain boundary on the East, a single mountain or range of mountains, and what is its name?
Answer.

It is a continuous range of mountain between the 2 canyons, and I know of no name for it except, "Sierra".

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5th Question.

What was the cultivation on the place, and how do you know Escamilla lived on the place?

Answer.

There was barley, potatoes and beans planted, some 5 or 6 acres. The land was hilly, and but little of it fit for cultivation. I know he lived there by having seen him often as I passed through the Ranchos in going to my own.



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Government of the Department of the Cal. Thomas, Don Blas A. Es-
camilla has solicited for his son, the name of San Vicente, situate on
the shore of Santa Cruz; in virtue of the judicial inquiries which have been made
and other investigations which have been
effected relative to the same, all of which
are favorable to the party interested; I have
by decree of this day, and in virtue of the
authority invested by the Supreme
Government, and in the name of the Mexican
Nation, granted to Don Blas A. Es-
camilla, the land of San Vicente, declar-
ing the ownership thereof to be in him by
these presents, in conformity with the law
of the 18th of August of 1824 and Article
5th of the superior regulation of the 21st
of Number 1828, and under the following
conditions -

1st. He shall have authority to fence the
same without detriment to the roads,
crossings and rights of way; he shall en-
joy the same freely and exclusively, reser-
ving it for such use and cultivation as
may best conduce to its improvement -

2nd. He shall solicit from the competent
judge that the judicial possession thereof
be given to him, in virtue of this decree,
by whom the boundaries shall be marked
out with the customary monuments, and
whereon he shall plant some fruit and
other trees of known utility -

3rd. The judge who shall give possession
thereof shall cause it to be measured as
provided by law, carefully observing the
plan or topographical sketch and setting

fourth the number of leagues or farms
which said place may contain.

Wherefore, I command that this
present title be held binding and valid,
that it be recorded in the book relating
to the same, and that it be delivered up
to the party interested for his security and
other ends.

Opinion

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This claim is founded on a grant made by Governor Pio Pico on the 16th of June 1846, the original of which is filed in the case and its genuineness and authenticity established by the testimony. The land is granted by the name of San Vicente situated on the sea shore of Santa Cruz: This is the only description contained in the grant, except that the 3^d condition directs the judge in giving the judicial possession to be governed by the map or topographical sketch, setting forth the number of leagues or sides it may contain. The evidence from the archives is produced, but a map is filed with the grant in which is found the memorandum of which the following is a translation. Presented for Don Blas A. Escamilla, Pres^a of Monterey June 3^d 1846, signed Manuel Castro. Manuel Castro when deposed has been taken and filed in the case swear that in the year 1846 he was prefect of the district of Monterey and made the memorandum or note on said map at the time above date, and that said map is the plan which was presented by Blas Escamilla when he applied for the grant of the Rancho of San Vicente. This evidence identifies the map as the one referred to in the grant and is sufficient to admit it in evidence as part of the description of the land granted. Taking the natural objects thus delineated and the testimony of the witnesses filed in the case that would seem to

be no difficulty in locating the land and fixing its boundaries -

It is also shown by the proof that the grantee had cattle on the place in the year 1845, and that in 1846, he built a house on it in which he lived and cultivated some portion of it.

The evidence is considered sufficient to establish the validity of the claim and a decree will be entered accordingly -

In this case on hearing the proofs and allegations it is adjudged by the Commission that the claim of the petitioner is valid, and it is therefore decreed that the same be confirmed. The land of which confirmation is made is situated in the County of Santa Cruz, and is known by the name of San Vicente, being the same which was granted to the claimant by Governor Rio Pio on the 16th of June 1846; and is bounded as follows: on the South by the Arroyo de San Vicente, on the North by the Arroyo de Molino, on the West by the ocean, and on the East by the Sierra, containing about three square leagues.

For a more particular description reference to be had to the original grant and map filed

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among the papers in the case.



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

TO THE HON. ISAAC S. K. OGIER, JUDGE:

The Petition of ~~Pacificus~~ Ord, a resident of said City, County, and State, Attorney of the United States for the Southern District of California, who petitions in this behalf for the United States, and being present here in Court, in the name and behalf of the United States, represents as follows: That heretofore, to wit: on or about the ~~29th~~ day of February - A. D. 1853, Blas A. Escamilla

presented a petition to the Commissioners to ascertain and settle the private land claims in the State of California, when sitting as a Board, claiming a tract of land called San Vicente

in the County of ~~Santa Barbara~~ ^{Santa Cruz} State of California, which said petition is referred to for a description of the land claimed, a copy of which appears in the transcript hereafter referred to. That thereafter, to wit: on or about the ~~23rd~~ day of ~~January~~, A. D. 1853, the said Commissioners confirmed, by final decision, the said claim of said petitioner. That thereafter, to wit: on or about the ~~1st~~ day of August - A. D. 1853, a duly certified transcript of the proceedings and decision of the said Commissioners in said cause, and the papers and evidence on which the said decision was founded, was filed in the Office of the Clerk of the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of California, and marked No. 608; reference to which it is prayed may be had and made part of this petition.

That on or about the ~~14th~~ day of August A. D. 1853, the Honorable Caleb Cushing, Attorney-General of the United States, received a duly certified duplicate of said transcript of the proceedings and decision of said Commissioners in said cause, and the papers and

evidence on which said decision was founded. That thereafter, to wit: ^{in about} on the 20th day of November A. D. 1855, the said Attorney-General of the United States filed, or caused to be filed, in behalf of the United States, a notice with the Clerk of said District Court of the United States, that the appeal in said cause from the said decision of the said Commissioners, in the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of California, would be prosecuted by the United States. Your petitioner further represents, that the land claimed, as aforesaid, is situate in the Southern District of California, and within the jurisdiction of this Honorable Court. Your petitioner further represents and insists, that the said claim is invalid; and the said decision of said Commissioners is erroneous, and ought to be reviewed, reversed and set aside, for many errors and imperfections of law and evidence, apparent in said certified transcript of the proceedings and decisions of said Commissioners in said cause, filed and appealed from as aforesaid. And your petitioner denies all and singular, each and every allegation in the said petition of said claimant, presented as aforesaid to said Commissioners. And your petitioner further denies that the said claimant has any valid right or title to said land claimed as aforesaid, or any part thereof.

And no sufficient proof having been made of the allegations in said petition to said Commissioners, or in support of the said claim, no decision confirming the same should have been made by said Commissioners; but the

said claim should have been rejected by them. And the said claimant, having no valid right or title derived from the Spanish or Mexican Governments, to the land claimed as aforesaid, the lawful right and title in and to the said land was acquired by, and it now belongs to the United States, by virtue of conquest, and the Treaty of peace, friendship, limits and settlement, between the United States and the Republic of Mexico, made at the City of Guadalupe Hidalgo, February 2d, A. D. 1848.

Wherefore, the said Pacificus Ord, Attorney of the United States for the Southern District of California, for and in behalf of the United States, by reason of the premises, and in pursuance of the Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to ascertain and settle the Private Land Claims in the State of California," approved March 3d, A. D. 1851, and the laws and statutes in such case made and provided, prayeth that the said claimant, or his attorney may be served with a copy of this petition; and that this Honorable Court will review the said decision of said Commissioners, and reverse the same; and decide on the validity of the ^{said claim} ~~same~~, and decree the alleged title to be invalid: with costs and general relief.



ings decision and papers and evidence on which
said decision was founded, and it appearing
that said Transcript has been duly filed acco-
rding to law, and counsel for the respective
parties having been heard: It is ordered
adjudged and decreed that the decision of
the said commissioners be affirmed, and
that the claim of the said Bles & Escamilla
is a good and valid one, and the same is
hereby confirmed to him,

The land of which confirmation is hereby
made, is situate in the county of Santa Cruz
and is known by the name of "San Vicente"
and is bounded ~~on the~~ Northly by the "Sierra"
Eastly by the "Arroyo de San Vicente" Southly
by the ocean and Westly by the "Arroyo
del Molino", being the same which was

granted to the said Blas de Escumilla by
Governor Pio Pico on the 10 day of June
1848 as appears by the grant contained in the
transcript, and for a more particular description
reference is hereby made to said grant and
the accompanying map. The quantity of
land of which confirmation is hereby
made to said Blas de Escumilla is to the
extent of the boundaries above named as
delinquent on the map contained in the
transcript, provided the same does not exceed
the quantity of eleven square leagues
but if a less quantity than eleven square
leagues be contained within said boundaries
then confirmation is made for such less
quantity.
