

The petitioner Jose' Maria
Casanekins respectfully represents.

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That on the 22^d day of
November A.D. 1843 Monseñor Micheltorena Governor
of California by virtue of authority in him
vested granted to the petitioner the tract of
land called "Castro" situated in the present
County of Los Angeles containing five square
leagues more or less as shown by the map
in the Aspediente and described in the title which
is submitted herewith marked "A" with
a translation marked B. And the petitioner
further represents that for more than nine
years he has had legal possession of said
tract of land and that he knows of no conflicting
claim.

That he wishes for confirmation of title
upon the original grant submitted herewith

of the former government and upon such
other and further proof as he may be advised
are necessary.

Wherefore he prays the Commissioners
to confirm to him the said tract of
land.

Questions by Claimants Attorney.

1st Question.

What is your name age and
present residence?

Answer.

My Name is Pedro O'Carollo
My age 39 years. My residence Santa Barbara
County California.

2nd Question.

Are you acquainted with the
Rancho of Casta, in the Neighborhood
of the line between the Counties of Santa
Barbara and Los Angeles if you describe
as near as you can the boundaries of said
Rancho?

Answer.

I am acquainted with the Rancho
named. I have known the place many
years. The Easterly boundary of the Ranch
is the Salinas de Cortes and the North is bound-
ed by the Tularas close by the Tijer Rancho
on the South it is bounded by the Rancho

of Los Alamos and Agua Caliente which
is my own ranch claimed by me in Case
498 in this Commission. The Natural bound-
aries of Castaic are plain and easily dis-
tinguished.

3rd Question.

Look on the map contained
in document marked "Exhibit th depo of
Pedro G. Cardo P.L" and state whether the
boundaries thus laid down are a correct
definition of the Rancho of Castaic.
Answer.

Yes to the best of my knowledge the
land is there correctly described.

4th Question.

What amount of land is
contained in the Rancho of Castaic?

Answer.

I think about 5 or 6 leagues.

5th Question.

Within your knowledge when was
said Rancho of Castaic first occupied and by
whom and in what manner?

Answer.

In 1844. I was there and there
were then Indians living on the place and
cultivating small portions of the land suffi-
cient for their support.

This was after Jose Maria
Cocomatius obtained the grant of the Rancho
from Micheltorena. Cocomatius had been
on the place previous to the time I visited
it. When I was there there were houses on the
place occupied by the Indians. I saw horses
on the place. I do not know whose they were.

Cross Examined by W. S. Law Agent.

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1st Question.

Who Established the Eastern boundary of said Rancho how was it Established and when and how do you know the line you describe is the Eastern Boundary, and so also of the other boundaries?

Answer.

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I Enquired of Ceovauhias and more particularly of Estevan Ordissone who made the plan what were the boundaries and they told me accordingly as I have before stated. This is the only means of knowledge I have of the manner in which the boundaries are Established. Except the portion adjoining my own Ranch that I have seen and know of my own personal knowledge.

2nd Question.

What is the form of the Rancho and are the boundary lines straight or crooked State as to each of the lines?

Answer.

It is a very irregular form I think the Map will show. The lines are generally crooked following the natural objects named as boundaries.

3rd Question -

What is the length of the Ranch from North to South and from East to West.

Answer.

I cannot pretend to say.

Answer.

I have examined said original
Esquisto in Said Surveyor General's Office
and I am acquainted with the signatures of
Santiago Arquilla Jose Maria Cavarrias
Isaacum Cardo and Manuel Micheltreina
having frequently seen them write and I believe
their signatures to said original document to
be genuine.

3rd Question.

Are you acquainted with the
land claimed in this case if you look at
the desmo in said traced copy of the Esquisto
before mentioned and state whether it is a
correct delineation of said land?

Answer.

I crossed the place in 1832 and 1833
from Los Angeles to the mouth of the Cañon
Alto Uva - I think that the places marked
A and B and C on this desmo are placed
too far to the west relative to the place marked
D (D).

I understand all this portion of the
desmo Embracing the points marked A B
C D R S & U & S as representing lands not
included in the Rancho of Castro.

Cross Examined by W. S Associate Law
Agent.

3rd Question.

What separates the portion
Embracing the points marked A B C D R
S U and S from the Rancho of Castro?
Answer.

The portion described as Embracing

those points is high table land while the
Cafon de Uva is much lower and is separated
not only by the descent but by intervening
mountains elevated above said Table land

I suppose the Rancho of
Castro to mean the Cafon de Uva. I have
always understood the place from S. to E.
and Northwardly from said S. to be called
Cafon de Uva.

I always understood the lake
here marked A to have been called Castro

I am not confident about
the names of the places as there were no per-
sons in company with me whom there who
knew the names of the places.

I learned the names of
these places while residing in Los Angeles
and affixed them to places I had seen by
the description of other persons.

2^d Question -

By what name is the portion
of land embracing the points A & C. D &
E Vg S. Known?

Answer.

I believe it to be called Castro
I have sometimes heard it called "Los Almas".

3^a Question.

Would the terms of description
in the grant embrace said portion?

Answer.

If the place marked by said
letters is known as Salinas de Castro and
Los Almas. It is not embraced within the
boundaries of the title -

4th Question.

Are the lakes marked A B & C
salt ponds?

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Answer.

There are said ponds there and I
believe that marked A to be one of them.

Do you know the Rancho of Castro if you state how you know it and what you know of the occupation of said Rancho and also what you know of the South Castro Claimancy thereof?

Answer.

I know the Rancho named - I became acquainted with it in 1843 or 1844 and have frequently been on the place -

In 1844 there were some twenty persons settled at the mouth of the Cañon de las Uvas by Jose' Maria Covarrubias, who had also a Mayor domo there. There was then a small field cultivated in Corn Melons and other vegetables. There were several small houses and a corral and a few horses.

I was there. was acquainted with the Mayor domo and saw the provisions sent to the him from Santa Barbara. I lived on the Rancho of San Francisco about a half days travel from the place where the said improvements were as to the claimancy I am not certain.

Cross-Examined by W. S. Saw Amt.
1st Question.

Did you come here as a witness of the claimant if you what conversation had you with him or his Amt?

Answer.

I did not come at the instance of the claimant - I came at the request of Mr Packard now present. we had no other conversation than merely that he asked me to come and I consented to do so to testify to what I know.

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2^d Question.

How do you know it was in
1843 or 1844, you saw the improvements and
State the names of the 20 persons you saw
there and describe the field and enclosure
none of which you have spoken?
Answer.

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I know I was there in my Rancho
at that time and it was while I was there
I am not positive about the year -

The Mayor Dono was
called Jose - I do not remember his surname
there was one who was thus all called corporal
I do not remember any other of their names
now - The field was about 200 varas square
the fence was made of poles set up and
brush.

How many times did you
visit the place in 1844, and what time of the
year?

Answer.

I was there twice or three times
I was there once before the fruit season and
once in the fruit season I recollect.






