
My Sweet and Much Loved Wife,

Rough and Ready June 3, 1853

My Sweet and Loving Wife,

I avail myself of this opportunity to address you a few lines to let you know that I am well at present and hope in God that this may find you and children enjoying the same blessing. Since I last wrote there has been of little interest taking place here. So, I shall have but have but little of importance to write and as it is night, I shall make this short. Please don't expose it to any person as it concerns anybody but ourselves and I should not have at present but for sending you a draft of \$100 on Adams and Company. For I in need of some money, please excuse me for not sending you more and I will try to make the time shorter between this and the next but as you are aware that I have ____ at considerable expense lately that I send it as soon as I can. Be careful of vour money for it is what might happen me and if anything should befall me so as to lay me up for a while you might suffer in the bare that would kill me for your enjoyment is my life. If either of us must want for heaven sake, let it be me. Now I know my sweet wife that you will find full with this last remark, for true to your loving nature, you would say it either of us has to want for anything let it be myself. But Mary, my darling girl, your happiness is my very existence. My soul is with you. Anytime you should think for a moment that I have slight you, bear in mind that it is not my fault for I would as soon as loose my good right hand as to _ your feelings. But enough of this for the present as I have not time to say more. I'm doing meddling well at present as I have my claim ___ as I have the pleasure to see on Sabbath evening last as we have a secure from though it don't very heavy rain _damage it injured almost every person in the ravine since it will cost \$500 to get in repair again. Some of these fellows laugh at me for going through so much expense to prevent being over____ when it as the rain has quit raining this summer and forever and for what they know, now they say that I am a prophet. The weather is very pleasant here now and I think our dry season has fairly commenced. The miners is very busy here both in the ravines and dry diggers in the creek and rivers. There is so much water but the claim holders is busy either ditching or repairing lumber for plumes so as to be able to commence working as soon as the stream gets down low enough for them. You may tell Burton that I am very thankful to him for that letter he sent me, though it was badly written. I think I could understand him pretty well as it must have been his young innocent heart beaming forth in love to me, he can't love me any better than I do him. This much you know and I love the rest_ as well as him. All my children is the same to me but their mother is so much more love as you can think. Dream boys is all well as far as I know. I must close up, I hear the boys hollering for me to come to
