

Dear Professor:

Many thanks for your letter of October 4 from which I am sorry to learn that nobody from the American-Swiss Foundation for Scientific Exchange has approached you during my absence and I have now spoken again to Dr. Furter in spite of your request to forget about the matter. Dr. Furter explained that he is the only one of the entire committee, that has to make the decision, who has been available during the past month, but that one other committee member has just arrived in New York and that he is going to see him on your behalf during one of the very next days. I told him that you have made your own arrangements in the meantime and have suggested to him that if the invitation could still be arranged that he might suggest to you to stop over in Switzerland on your return trip from Stockholm after having delivered the Nobel Prize lecture there. Dr. Furter will try to get prompt action now and I hope he will approach you within a few days.

My trip to the old world was more interesting than enjoyable. The scarcity of all commodities of life is appalling and the devastation I have seen in Holland and England is terrible. The progress made with regard to return to normalcy is admirable though small. I understand that the two countries you are most likely to visit, Sweden and Switzerland, are great exceptions since they have been neutral.

Incidentally, I got a good scare last week when I read about Otto Stern having been in one of the last airplane accidents but since New York was given has his address, I was rather hopeful that it wasn't you and relieved when I read your letter now.

You will probably hear from our Dr. M. Furter about the invitation. I, personally, think that one weeks' stay of yours which you mention in your letter would be too short and toostrenuous for you and I have taken the liberty of suggesting a stay of at least two, and up to four, weeks. I hope that the invitation will come through and if this should be the case, I am wishing you good luck for your trip. I am leaving for Holland and England on Friday of next week. Dear Doctor Stearn:

It was very nice to see you again at your Pacific Coast retreat. I have returned only now but have not failed to drop in on Minkowski in Pasadena. It so happened that he was on duty at the Mt. Wilson Observatory and I drove all the way up and had an opportunity to admire the big 100-inch telescope. Minkowski seems to be very happy and satisfied in his surroundings.

Regarding the possibilities I mentioned of obtaining an invitation for you to lecture in Switzerland, I have very good hopes for you. I just spoke to a member of the board of the American-Swiss Foundation for Scientific Exchange, Dr. M. Furter, who is an executive of Hoffmann-La Roche, Nutley, our associate company, and he will be glad to undertake the necessary steps. He asked me which scientist in Switzerland might be most suitable to make the necessary arrangements for your lectures in Switzerland and I suggested Pauli. I suppose this would meet with your approval or whom else would you suggest, for instance, Scherrer?

You would probably be expected to give at least two lectures. one in Basle and one in Zurich. The lectures may be identical. Could you let me know on what subject you would like to speak; this is for the purposes of the Society? I also need a short curriculum vitae of yours, particularly outlining the work you have done. This does not have to be in great detail.

The time for your trip to Switzerland should preferably be chosen after October 15 because the vacations at the universities in Switzerland will be over by that time. How long would you like to stay in Switzerland? Would you like to give more than two lectures and where, and which other scientist do you intend to contact in Switzerland?

I am sorry to have to ask you so many questions but they all will serve the purpose of arranging for the trip. I am enclosing a self-addressed, stamped envelope and would appreciate obtaining your answer very soon because I will leave for Holland in the early days of August and would like to get your matter straightened out before that date.
