
Dear Professor Stern:


Dear Professor Stern:

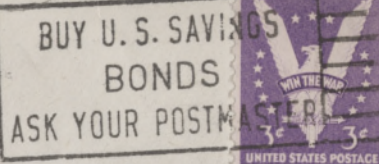
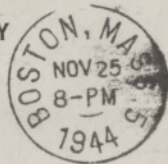

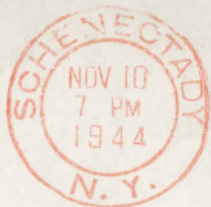
