I am not angry with you, but I would, of course, have preferred that you sign the statement.

I am just preparing a news release in which I point out that the stated policy of the United States government is to work toward the goal of total and universal disarmament (not, of course, realizable for many years or decades), and that to allow nuclear weapons to spread to more and more nations can only cause trouble for everybody.

So far about thirty Nobel Laureates have signed the statement, about one hundred members of the National Academy of Sciences, and about one hundred Fellows of the Royal Society.

What I am angry about (not really angry, but unhappy) is that I never see you. I wish that our paths would cross again.

SOCIETY KEYS AND INSIGNIA



KEYS can be provided with a pin and safety clasp, at an extra cost of 40 cents. The lapel emblem is identical in size with the smaller key, but it does not have the stems at top and bottom. This lapel emblem ordinarily has a screw back but also may be obtained with a pin and clasp. Keys may be sent C.O.D. State taxes must be added to the cost of all keys and insignia. All insignia orders must be sent to the Headquarters Office.

The tie chain and clasp shown in the illustration (No. 610) may be ordered for your present key or with a new key at the appropriate extra cost. In addition, several kinds of tie tack assemblies now are available. The one shown in the illustration has a small pin with knob at one end that passes through the tie and is secured with a clutch fastened to a short chain and bar to be inserted in a buttonhole. This (No. 612) comes without the key but either a standard size key or a miniature key may be ordered for use with this tie tack.

Another type of tie tack has the pin permanently attached to the back of the key, with the clutch, chain, and bar the same as described above. This standard key and tie tack is No. 614. The small key and tie tack is No. 616.

TO THE ALUMNI MEMBERS OF OUR SOCIETY:

The Society of Physics Students is now a reality, with Sigma Pi Sigma as an integral part of this viable new concept in student organizations. Thus far the success of this venture has met most of our expectations. We are confident that this union will enhance the benefits derived by our alumni members from their association with a now stronger and more respected honor society.

Alumni members should be reassured that not only will Sigma Pi Sigma remain as a member society within the prestigious Association of College Honor Societies but, in fact, other societies in this Association are interested in observing our operation and possibly following our lead. Thus, our Society retains its established position as a recognized companion to the leading honor societies in the country.

The growth and development of the Society of Physics Students and Sigma Pi Sigma during the brief history of the united organization has been outstanding. In the comparatively few months since the new arrangements for our Society were announced, more than twenty-five new or reactivated Sigma Pi Sigma chapters have been established. Some of these have been chartered in the leading physics departments of the country where previously Sigma Pi Sigma had not deeply penetrated. It is not too much to expect that the number of our chapters might be doubled in the immediate future.

The growth in the size and esteem of our Society clearly will result in enhanced esteem in the worth of alumni membership in Sigma Pi Sigma. The material value of this status is no mean one. Hence, we feel justified in asking for your continued support to maintain the vigor of our national organization.

The year 1968 marked a record one with respect to the success of our campaign for the solicitation of contributions to the Alumni Dues Fund of Sigma Pi Sigma. During the calendar year approximately 5,200 members contributed nearly \$27,000 to this fund. Both of these numbers are the largest in the history of our Society. They also exceed the numbers one might expect as a result of the normal growth of the Society.

It is reasonable to expect you to ask a number of questions concerning the continuance of the Alumni Dues Fund. We have attempted to anticipate these questions and have provided answers in this leaflet. However, we will be pleased to receive your additional questions and will be most happy to correspond further with you concerning these matters or other topics related to the workings of Sigma Pi Sigma as a part of the Society of Physics Students.

The enclosed statement for your contribution to the 1969 Alumni Dues Fund should not be considered as a *bill*. The amounts mentioned are merely suggestive and we want most strongly to emphasize the fact that all contributions are welcome, no matter how small. The participation of a larger fraction of our membership is especially desired and we hope that in 1969 we can materially exceed the approximately twenty-five percent response of 1968.

One of the major problems of our national office is the changing addresses of our members. You can reduce our workload by a large factor if you will keep us advised when you change your address or position. You can use the enclosed statement form and return envelope for this purpose.

Your comments and suggestions will be gratefully received.

BENEFITS OF SIGMA PI SIGMA MEMBERSHIP PERPETUATED BY ALUMNI DUES FUND

ALUMNI DUES FUND NAMED TO HONOR MEMBERS WHO CONTINUE SUPPORT OF NATIONAL ORGANIZATION

For nearly ten years an increasing fraction of the alumni members of Sigma Pi Sigma have made voluntary contributions to enable the national organization to meet rising costs and increasing services of the national organization of the Society. The budget of the Society of Physics Students (including Sigma Pi Sigma) has been established upon the expectation that this support from our alumni members will be continued.

The income from entrance fees and dues is not sufficient to balance the budget of the Society. It is felt that reguests for substantial help from our alumni members is justified because the lasting value to these members of their status in the Society depends greatly upon its reputation as a strong and well regarded honor organization. This reputation is a direct function of the activity and services of the national organization. This in turn can be maintained on a high level only by financial support that is not available from entrance fees and dues.

ALUMNI "DUES" ARE VOLUNTARY AND FAILURE TO RESPOND DOES NOT AFFECT THE STATUS OF MEMBERS

Members are not required to pay the voluntary and non-cumulative annual "dues" that are requested. This nomenclature may not seem appropriate for such contributions. However its wide use by other organizations and our own experience has proved that the use of the word "dues" is desirable in that it meets the crucial test of achieving the desired result of obtaining maximum returns from our solicitations.

Members of our Society who do not respond to our requests for contributions to this fund do not in any manner reduce their status as life members. Payment of the entrance fee and reception into a chapter makes one a lifetime member of Sigma Pi Sigma. Election to a recognized honor society yields values that continue for the professional career of the member.

INCOME TAX ADVANTAGE GAINED BY CONTRIBUTORS TO THE ALUMNI FUND

Contributions to this fund are income tax deductible because the Society is a part of the American Institute of Physics. A receipt is sent to each donor and this may be retained for the income tax record.

SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO THE ALUMNI FUND

Members who pay \$5.00 or more are classified as Sustaining Members. A member in this classification may receive, upon request and without charge, a special certificate, attractively engraved, designating him as a sustaining member. Members who contribute \$25.00 or more are classified as Patron Sustaining Members, eligible to receive a special certificate attesting to this status. Those who contribute less than \$5.00 will, upon request, be sent a handsomely engraved purse-size identification card.

PUBLICATIONS OF THE SOCIETY AVAILABLE FOR CONTRIBUTORS

Upon request members who contribute to this fund will be placed upon the mailing list to receive the SPS NEWS-LETTER. This publication provides much information to all of the members of the Society of Physics Students. Other publications of interest also can be supplied upon the request of contributing members.

NEED FOR CONTINUING THE ALUMNI DUES FUND NOT LESSENED BY UNION

The union of Sigma Pi Sigma with the student Sections of the AIP and the creation of the Society of Physics Students has made little change in the financial structure and the need for additional support for the national organization of the Society. The AIP budget permits of a modest subsidy for the SPS operations. But the Council of the Society aspires to make our organization practically self-supporting and to use any additional available funds to increase the services of the Society to our members.

CONTINUANCE OF THE ALUMNI DUES FUND

The agreement between Sigma Pi Sigma and the American Institute of Physics that led to the approval of the Constitution for the Society of Physics Students provides for the continuance of solicitation for contributions to the alumni dues fund. It is expected that these donations will continue to represent a substantial fraction of the income of the new Society and that their use will strengthen the prestige of alumni members in Sigma Pi Sigma.

A major objective of the new Society is the using of any additional resources available for the purpose of encouraging more of the able students to choose careers in the fields of physics.

PATTERN OF CONTRIBUTIONS TO **ALUMNI DUES FUND**

Members may often be puzzled concerning the amounts they feel they should contribute in response to the appeals from our Society. Perhaps this judgment may be aided by a look at the following pattern of contributions in recent years:

25% of the contributors gave \$1.00 to \$4.00 60% of the contributors gave \$5.00 12% of the contributors gave \$10.00 3% of the contributors gave \$15.00 to \$500.00

SOCIETY OF PHYSICS STUDENTS BUDGET

The expenses of the operations of Sigma Pi Sigma now are included in the SPS budget.

The Budget for 1969 totals \$81,000.00 and is summarized as follows:

Since we are committed to obtaining approximately one-third of the SPS budgeted income from the alumni dues fund it now is necessary for our faithful alumni members to respond in increased numbers and with larger contributions per member if we are to reach our goal.
