As you are no doubt aware, you and the Daily Californian staff have at least one current area of mutual interest: the lengthy and unfortunate controversy over the University's employment policy and the loyalty oath and contractual statement which have been adopted for its implementation.

For this reason, I should like to invite you to summarize your views on the subject for publication in the Daily Californian.
